From the Vicarage

On a recent trip to Siena, I visited the crypt of the Cathedral and saw the frescos on the wall, thought to have been painted in 1285, possibly by the influential Sienese artist, Duccio di Buoninsegna. These paintings were discovered a few years ago after having lain forgotten underground for 700 years. The frescos were buried within 30 years of being completed, when the crypt was filled with rubble to form the foundations of a planned new cathedral, which was intended to be the largest in the world. The Black Death which swept through Siena in the early 14th century, killing a third of the residents, put paid to the building of the larger cathedral. The crypt and the frescos were protected from damp and light and so are beautifully preserved.

We will be using some reproductions of Duccio's paintings as the Stations of the Cross at a joint service on Good Friday at Balsham Church at 11am as we meditate on the Passion of Christ.

Occasionally we find some hidden treasure in one of our churches, such as the old white and gold altar frontal which has just been restored at West Wickham. It will be used on Easter Day. Maybe there are treasures that we have overlooked because they are always there and we have not recognized their age or significance.

Lent is traditionally a time to reconnect with hidden depths in our lives through prayer, fasting (self denial) and almsgiving (generous sharing). There are lots of events in the churches to help us towards this. The Lent Course this year is exploring Prayer. It is fascinating to reflect on why people pray, and what we are doing in our brains when we pray. Is prayer all in the mind? Is silence prayer? Are there ways of praying that we haven't tried but might enjoy? And are there tips suggesting what we can do when prayer seems impossible? Around the churches there are Lent lunches when we will eat a simple lunch together and give to charity. Rather than giving up something for the whole six weeks, these lunches (or an equivalent simple lunch in another context and a donation to your own charity) could be an achievable goal for us that makes a difference to someone else. *Rev Julie Norris*

West Wratting Book Club

The book club met on 17th February to review 'A Time of Gifts' by Patrick Leigh Fermor, the first part of a trilogy completed posthumously from his manuscript. It described his walk as a young man in the 1930s, across Europe from the Hook of Holland to Constantinople. This book took him as far as the border between Czechoslovakia and Hungary.

We had a good turn-out of seven people, including two newcomers. All had enjoyed the book, although some found the descriptions of architecture such as cathedrals and the cultural history rather long and pretentious. Others, who were particularly interested in these subjects, thoroughly enjoyed such passages especially when it touched on places they had themselves visited. It gave an introduction to the development of Europe which made one want to know more. It was agreed that it was a wonderful evocation of a world that was to be shattered and lost soon afterwards in the Second World War, a presentiment of which is seen in his descriptions of the 'Brown Shirts', the discussions of National Socialism, the swastikas, and pictures of Hitler.

The descriptions of his interactions with the local people at all social levels, and evocation of the

Since last month's article we have experienced one break-in and two attempted break-ins in Weston Colville. We also had an excellent evening with Rachel Carr and our two PCSO's. Rachel made us think about security and we were told about various ways of protecting our possessions. One way is to use Smart Water kits* (£10) and shed alarms (£8), which





are available from our new PCSO Chris Wiseman via Sawston Police station. Either call 101 and leave a message for him, or email *christopher.wiseman@cambspnn.police.uk*

On the wider front the police have advised us about scams and confidence tricks. I know of no one knocking on our doors here but the internet is used by many of us. Action Fraud has seen an increase in the number of victims signing up for free trials for unapproved or misleading pharmaceuticals or supplements. If you feel that such products might help you, speak to your GP or a local pharmacist before parting with any money or card details. Call 0300 123 2040 for help and further advice.

Police are warning motorists to beware of a potential scam involving men claiming to have broken down, who say they need money for fuel. I must admit that I tend to help people in this situation, but at present this is another scam – so to protect yourself take care, keep your windows closed and drive on.



Meadow Matters

Blink and you will have missed this half term, although judging by the amount of Calpol being given, and the number of boxes of tissues that the classes are getting through, half term could not have come soon enough!

As usual we seem to have packed a huge amount into a relatively short space of time. The whole school topic of Africa is continuing to engage, inspire and amaze the children. We have welcomed a number of visitors into school to share their own stories, experiences and of course many photographs and artefacts.

Both Year 3/4 and Year 5/6 are studying African books or topics that make reference to apartheid; to the vast majority of our pupils this is something completely alien to them and to see the disgust and hear the cries of "that is so not fair, you can't treat people in that way", shows what wonderful morals and values our children have. The infants have had slightly lighter reading material. They have been reading Tinga Tinga Tales, which are all stories related to how animals became, such as how giraffe got his long neck. Listening to some of the younger children talk about how they think certain animals evolved in that way, has been very amusing!

At the end of half term we hosted a two day African Dance workshop. Oumar Sagna, originally from Senegal, taught the children authentic African dances. The children did not stop talking about their sessions, and we

It is now nearly two years since we received confirmation that Linton Village College had become the leader of a Teaching School. At



the time, few people in the community understood what that would mean for us, so I used the analogy of a 'Teaching Hospital' to explain its role.

In these two years things have developed very positively. Our teaching school has a name – CASSA



(Cambridge and Suffolk Schools Alliance), a purpose (to improve teaching and learning in Cambridgeshire and Suffolk schools), a website

(www.cassateaching.co.uk) and a

series of partners and strategic partners (22 primary schools, 5 secondary schools, a sixth form college and a special school). We work very much as an alliance and we are involved in training new teachers, training existing teachers, supporting schools in their own improvement journeys, carrying out educational research, and developing school leadership. LVC now buzzes with this kind of activity every day, as we run conferences and training activities, and recruit the teaching mentors and coaches that the improvement system needs.

Schools in Suffolk, in particular, have come under attack from Ofsted over standards of education in recent months, and Teaching Schools Alliances are a real solution to this problem. They are also good news for the students in our school because the work that CASSA does is unrelentingly focused on teaching and learning. We improve our own practice as we support and coach others.


Any sowings of vegetables should be done with caution, as later sowings catch up, and early sowing in cold ground often leads to disappointment.

Drypoint and Chine Collé



Susie Turner is an established artist and experienced tutor who regularly delivers' talks and demonstrations about traditional and contemporary methods of fine art printmaking. This one-day workshop will allow participants to work closely with Susie in her studio and learn a simple but effective technique of fine art printmaking. The technique is easy to learn – suitable for beginners and those with previous experience of printmaking or drawing. Drypoint is the simplest and most direct form of intaglio printmaking. 'Intaglio' means to cut below the surface and, by tradition, it describes a figure or design engraved into stone or metal. As a printing technique it lends itself to drawing and mark making. What characterizes a drypoint print is the soft velvet quality of its line achieved by directly scratching the surface of a plastic or metal plate with a sharp pointed needle. Chine collé describes the technique of attaching fine papers to the print.
