#### From West Wratting Vicarage

One or two of us, I suspect, will be in need of a liedown in a darkened room after the second weekend in May. It's going to be, well, interesting to say the least. For those of you who have been down a coal mine with a bucket over your heads just recently, I have to tell you that Thursday 7<sup>th</sup> May is General Election day. Added to this, however, is the fact that Friday 8<sup>th</sup> May is the 70<sup>th</sup> anniversary of the end of the war in Europe (VE Day). Saturday 9<sup>th</sup> May will be Celebration Day with a 'noise' time when church bells will ring, ships hooters sound, sirens wail and so on. On Sunday 10<sup>th</sup> May there will be a national Service of Thanksgiving in Westminster Abbey, attended by the Queen. All in all it's going to be quite a few days. Hence my opening remarks.

In many ways it is a fortunate coincidence that the General Election, when we vote for a Government, and VE Day should fall cheek by jowl, as at least one of the things that the Western allies were fighting for was the right to do just that, for the people freely and openly to choose their rulers. Only once in my adult life have I not voted, and that was because I hadn't organised a postal vote. And who do I normally vote for? Well, I was rather pleased when a referee once said that he had listened to my sermons for ten years and still hadn't a clue where my political allegiances lay. In fact I have voted for all three main parties over the years. Even that is not quite as varied as my churchwarden in Surrey, the Conservative Chairman of Surrey County Council, who told me that he had voted Communist in 1945, to get rid of the officer class!

Some of you, I know, are quite pleased that bishops in the House of Lords do not have a vote, such was your displeasure at the bishops' advice to voters. After a while, hearing many of you complain, I had honed a stock response: "Well, I didn't write it and I suspect you haven't read it." In fact, if the bishops of the Church of England were serious about changing the way people voted, they wouldn't have given their advice in a 56-page document. Not what you would call snappy media-savvy electioneering. Whether or not you agree with what they wrote, they do have the right to express their views. You do not cease to be a Christian when you go into a polling booth. And perhaps we in comfortable South Cambridgeshire do need to be reminded that the austerity of the last few years, although its impact seems to have been relatively muted here, has bitten in other places very sharply. One of the Church of England's great strengths is that it is a truly national institution. There is supposed to be a report in the Kremlin saying that when the Communists took over they should get control of the Church of England, because it covered the whole country. Everyone had a parish priest. And so the bishops are sometimes aware of currents and feelings from elsewhere of which you and I are largely oblivious. Whether that will convince any of you to read the 56 pages before polling day is, I suspect, doubtful.

But it's still going to be quite a weekend.

### Tea and Cakes Anniversary!


Our gathering on Good Friday was very pleasant. We enjoyed the company of old friends who have left the village, and of new ones.


acknowledged; if you do not get a reply, we haven't received your order. Please don't phone before 8 am or after 10 pm (leave a message during the day).

We keep a note of any special requirements, such as needing a phone call the day before delivery to arrange access; please let us know if you wish to change these. The minimum delivery is 500 litres, a Trading Standards ruling because of the accuracy of lorry gauges. To get the minimum ask for 500 litres; do not ask for a 'top up' because you might get a 'fill up'.

Orders will be collated and placed shortly after the order deadline, and deliveries may or may not begin the same week. If you are close to running out, tell your contact. The price will not be known until the order is placed and the supplier may ring for payment before delivery (failure to reply to this call may put your order in jeopardy), or bill you direct after delivery. Please be aware that most suppliers now add 2% to the invoice for credit card payment. Debit cards and cheques attract no surcharge.

**Please ensure we have your correct address and postcode** because some deliveries have been delayed due to the lack of correct information.

We will meet on Tuesday 5<sup>th</sup> May at 8 pm at The Chestnut Tree to review 'The Garden of Evening Mists' by Tan Twan Eng, shortlisted for the Man Booker Prize 2012 and winner of the Man Asian Literary Prize 2012. It tells the story of a Malaysian woman who decides to create a garden in memory of her sister, killed at the hands of the Japanese during their occupation of Malaya in WWII.

Suggestions for June are 'Eleanor Marx: a Life' by Rachel Holmes, or 'Elizabeth is Missing' by Emma Healey.

## West Wratting Parish Council

**Parish Meeting:** the Parish Meeting will be held on Monday 11<sup>th</sup> May at 7.30, prior to the Parish Council meeting. Melanie Murdoch from Age UK, who is the co-ordinator of the local mobile warden scheme, will be giving a short talk about the work they do and may be accompanied by Sue Buckingham, who is our warden. There will also be reports from the Chairman of the Parish Council, the Village Hall Management Committee, and other clubs and societies. Do please come and support it.

At the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 9<sup>th</sup> March the following are some of the items discussed:

*Planning:* S/2268/14/PO – Camgrain. Mr Philip Darke, managing director of Linton Camgrain, gave a presentation in order to open a dialogue with regard to the new approved application to remove restrictions on movement of grain lorries. There is a fuller report of this in the draft minutes on the noticeboards. The chairman felt this was a useful discussion and hoped it would lead to further dialogue, when other issues might arise.

#### Maintenance:

*Village Hall:* Mike Rowland, Chairman of the VHMC, spoke about the condition of the village hall roof. An architect who had assessed the problem had suggested a polymer roof which should have a 30-year life. Three tenders had been received and a sum of £28,000 was required. A grant request of £20,000 had been submitted to the Wind Farm Trust, the Parish Council had promised £3,000 and the village hall funds of £5,000 should cover the cost if the grant is given.

*RoSPA*: Cllr Holness expressed a wish to be present when RoSPA come and inspect the playing area, and the parish clerk will inform RoSPA.

*Road Signage etc:* this was under discussion with the Highways Department.

#### Meetings attended by Cllrs:

*Sports Pavilion:* at the last meeting attended by Cllr McCall it was agreed the following:-

- 1. Fixture lists and reports will be put in Challenge.
- 2. The oil tank protection is still under discussion.
- 3. Defibrillator is now in place and there will be training on its use.
- 4. Electric shutters an Amey Cespa grant request would be suitable.

*A1307 meeting:* attended by Cllr & Mr McCall; the following points were made:-

- 1. The speed watch equipment is now out of date and how it can be used has changed, so there is a need for some retraining etc.
- 2. 4,000 new houses are planned to be built in Haverhill, increasing road use. Possible solution to traffic problems would be to build a new road to bypass Linton. Another option would be to provide better public transport.

#### Reports by Dist Cllrs Barrett & Fraser:

- 1. Refuse collection at Christmas had there been any complaints?
- Community Chest grant has been increased to £1,500.
- 3. Consultation notice regarding public houses and their closure: this had been sent round in a correspondence folder to the councillors, but no response.

#### Any other business:

- 1. The bus shelter is in need of being cleaned and tidied up.
- 2. A request to have 30 mph stickers on the refuse bins was turned down as being too costly, and only in public view one day per two weeks.

The next Parish Council meeting will take place at 8.30 pm on Monday 9<sup>th</sup> May, following the Parish Meeting. All are welcome.

#### Harold's Gardening Notes for May

By May, the sun is very powerful and the greenhouse will require shading, if this has not already been done. Trays or pots of plants that will be planted out at the end of the month will dry out quickly in an unshaded greenhouse. Watch out for an explosion in numbers of greenfly and other pests, both indoors and out. The tips of all young plants are vulnerable to attack and the appropriate action should be taken to deal with any pests. Late frosts are still possible, so have fleece on hand to protect potatoes and other tender crops on still, clear nights.





## Linton Health Centre – an Update

We have been running our **rapid access clinic** for six months now. The rapid access team, doctors and a nurse practitioner, work together to see all the urgent cases booked on the day, including visits and telephone enquiries/consultations.

How is it working?

Visits are being undertaken much earlier in the day. This is good for patients, especially for those who may need admission to hospital.



Telephone call-backs are usually dealt with quickly and, in some cases, save the patient a trip to the surgery. The feedback from patients in this respect has been very positive.

The access for those patients wanting an urgent, onthe-day, appointment is definitely much improved and appreciated by our patients. Inevitably, there are times when emergencies occur and the clinicians run behind, but our reception team try to keep everyone informed and the feedback from those using the rapid access clinic has been very positive.
