From West Wratting Vicarage

"Been there, done that, got the tee shirt." I first heard this phrase on the lips of a churchwarden in (where else?) my previous parish. Gwilym, who has just died, was very fond of these short phrases and aphorisms, especially those which came from his background in management consultancy. But of them all, the one that made the most impression on me was, in a church setting, slightly counter cultural. "The optimum level of conflict in any organisation is not zero." I will admit to being slightly shocked when I first heard this. Like most people I do not like conflict and will try to avoid it. It seemed especially out of place in a Christian church. But, as I came to realise, unless people are clones or robots they are going to have differences, sometimes over important matters. But differences leading to conflict are not a sign of being dysfunctional. They are a sign of being alive.

The problem arises, not in there being conflict, that is inevitable, rather it is in the way the conflict is handled and resolved. The Moravian church, which is avowedly pacifist in its doctrine, has dedicated itself, very effectively, to helping people resolve conflicts particularly within a Christian context. They always point out that right from the start there were conflicts within the Christian church, for example the disputes between Peter and the Jewish Christians on the one hand and Paul and the Gentile Christians on the other. And in some of the controversies about doctrine a few centuries later we are told of bishops pulling at the beards of those with whom they disagreed. Well, I think we have managed to avoid that in our two parishes nestling un-controversially in the Cambridgeshire highlands. But there are matters over which there are clear differences of opinion. Thank goodness, for as I say, such differences are a sign of life.

The Parish Nurse project has not been without its doubters and opponents. I have had one or two quite unpleasant emails about it. But the money is now in and an appointment made, so I hope that soon the parish Nurse's ministry will be up and running. And I hope that all of us will accept that ministry with grace and openness during the initial three-year period..

To pew or not to pew is of course the question of the moment at Weston Colville. So far I think we have managed the difference of opinion – a perfectly legitimate one – with understanding and forbearance. Or is my inner Pollyanna coming out of the closet? But when the final decision comes to be made it will inevitably be more fraught and controversial. Please be prepared to accept a decision we may not like. And please accept the sincerity of both sides and also accept that we are all on the same side. The things that unite us are far more important than the things that divide.

St Paul talks about speaking the truth in love. Christians are not always very good at that. We can easily speak the truth, but not in love; or speak in love but not the truth. For me at any rate accepting that there will be conflict in a living and lively church was

the first step in understanding what St Paul meant.





Parish Nurse

This is news just in ... a Parish Nurse has been appointed, to start on 1st December. There will be an article to introduce her in next month's Challenge.

Will the nurse try to convert people? No. But she will treat you as a whole person and have the time to listen.

Will she be stepping on the toes of other NHS nurses? No, people will go to the surgery to have their usual appointments. But she will be there in the community with her professional experience and can take some of the pressure off the GP surgeries by using her expertise to navigate people to the services and treatments that they most need.

Is this the church meddling in something that is beyond its remit? No, because the church has a long tradition of encouraging healing and wholeness. From the time of Jesus, the church has been interested in transforming the lives of people who are sick or broken. The earliest hospitals and medical treatment centres were often planned by the church and sited close to church buildings. Hospices which provided guest houses for the sick and disabled were promoted and funded by churches. Of course the church today should also want to promote healing and wholeness for the wider community. The new nurse is a highly skilled professional with a great deal of experience of many areas of nursing, who will work for the good of the patient.

This is an extra resource to complement what already exists. She will be there for you.

And what does the church get out of this? Nothing, except the satisfaction of knowing that people will be helped, and this is what Christ did.

On Saturday 7th November from 10 am - 3 pm, we will be holding a Quiet Day on the theme of Mindfulness, led by Dr Alistair Collen. Alistair is a Consultant Clinical Psychologist with a great deal of experience in exploring the mind. On this occasion he will be teaching techniques to quieten the mind and find inner peace. He tells me that this is something that can make a real difference to the way we live. This is taking place at Ferrar House, Little Gidding, near Huntingdon. The cost is £21 which includes lunch. My apologies again to those of you who, with hindsight, could have held larger events during the




past month or so. Work might have started weeks ago, and we judged it better to decline bookings well in advance rather than risk last-minute cancellations.


By the year-end expect to see substantial improvements throughout the facility, the most notable being to the disabled toilet; this will include a baby (meaning nappy) change unit – yuk!

Any orders left by email will always be acknowledged; if you do not get a reply, we haven't received your order. Please don't phone before 8 am or after 10 pm (leave a message during the day).

We keep a note of any special requirements, such as needing a phone call the day before delivery to arrange access; please let us know if you wish to change these. The minimum delivery is 500 litres; this is a Trading Standards ruling because of the accuracy of lorry gauges. To get the minimum ask for 500 litres; do not ask for a 'top up' because you might get a 'fill up'.

Orders will be collated and placed shortly after the order deadline and deliveries may or may not begin the same week. If you are close to running out, tell your contact. The price will not be known until the order is placed, and the supplier may ring for payment before delivery (failure to reply to this call may put your order in jeopardy) or bill you direct after delivery.

Please be aware that most suppliers now add 2% to the invoice for credit card payment. Debit cards and cheques attract no surcharge.

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West Wratting Oil Syndicate

Only fifteen houses in West Wratting participated in the order that was placed on 6th October, with deliveries being made on 15th. The price was even lower than in September, so prices are running counter to our usual experience at this time of year! Anyway, Certas Energy (previously Pace / Butler) won the WW Syndicate order with a price of 30.30p per litre (for the record, 34.90p in July then 31.65p in September), which was a saving of 0.74p against the Boilerjuice 'Bulk' (Syndicate) price of 31.04p. All prices + VAT, of course. As the price goes down, the cash value of the saving goes down as well, but as usual it was a great price for anybody taking less than 1000 litres.

Because it is almost impossible to get a sensible discount in the run up to Christmas, the next fillup will be in January 2016, with details in the December and January Challenge.

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Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

Contacting the police should be easy. With a telephone, it is. If you need police persons in support, if there is an emergency, perhaps an ongoing crime or a road accident, dial 999 and ask for the help you need. If you have information about a crime, need to talk to the police or need advice, dial101.

If you want to contact our local police station in Sawston, you will find it has restricted opening hours. I called 101 to discuss this matter and was told that "you'll be lucky to find a manned police station or policeman". Not surprisingly the reduced funding leads to reduced services. I feel that we are lucky to have a share in 'our' PCSO Chris Wiseman. So don't hesitate – call 101 or 999.

This also means that we need to take more care about our own security. We need to lock up and be aware of strange activities and unusual actions which cause us concern. If you feel uneasy, report using the 101 service. You may prevent a crime and you may help the police to solve a crime.

No crimes have been reported this past month relating to Weston Colville or West Wratting. West Wickham experienced an attempted break-in last month, and there have been car crime problems in Balsham and more car crimes and burglaries in Linton. There is criminal activity in larger villages away from here and closer to Cambridge, including burglaries, break-ins, theft, car crime, stolen number plates, contents theft and cycle theft. The police are also concerned about modern day slavery here in South Cambs.

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West Wratting Book Club

On 14th October we reviewed 'Go Set a Watchman' by Harper Lee. This was Harper Lee's first book but remained unpublished until this year, having been put aside in favour of 'To Kill a Mockingbird'.

It was agreed that it was well-written and structured. Other comments were: the idea that Jean Louise (Scout) had been 'born colour-blind' was not really credible because of the social context in which white and black people interacted; Calpurnia's behaviour after leaving the family following the death of Jem (Jean Louise's brother) and towards Jean Louise didn't really ring true, considering she had been like a replacement mother to them when they were growing up; Jean Louise appeared surprisingly compliant, allowing such things as the coffee morning. However, her later behaviour is understandable in the light of seemingly having had the foundation of her life cut away.

One member said: "I loved the book, and took a different message from the one reported in the popular press, and I felt that Atticus had always been a wise man, and had seen the way forward, but his honesty

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initially distracted Scout from the real message, at the point she attended the town meeting and thereafter."

Another said:"I absolutely loved it! Maybe because we have only recently read 'To Kill a Mocking Bird', from the first page I felt at home with the characters and felt I knew where they were coming from. Really interesting to learn of the racial tensions of the time. Interesting also to learn of Atticus' feelings and his reasons for working the way he did."

Everyone agreed that they would recommend it, and scores varied between 8 and 9 out of 10.

The next meeting will be on Tuesday 17th November when we will review 'The Little Stranger' by Sarah Waters. 'The Miniaturist' by Jessie Burton will be the book for December, possibly combined with a Christmas meal.

The Weston Colville Parish Plan

The meeting on 12th October was well attended by ten members of the Parish Plan Group, and reviewed progress with the various actions raised in the plan presented to the parish in May this year. The good news was that progress had been made with most actions.

The keys points on the actions were:-

1. Mobile Phone Signal – the new mast at Carlton has been operational since June but currently is only being used by EE so is only benefiting their customers. It is planned that all providers will use the mast which will eventually solve the village mobile phone problem but the dates for the other providers are still awaited. For more information see the Carlton phone mast website.

Norfolk Coast: Victorian Cottage to let 1^{1/2} hour drive from West Wratting; 3 minute walk to Overstrand beaches, 1 mile from Royal Cromer Golf Club, and 15 miles from Norfolk Broads. 2 large bedrooms, 2 bathrooms, fabulous period interior, fully equipped. Sleeps 5. Garden and outhouses for surf boards and bicycles. For more details, tel 01223 290706. Photos and references available.

2. Broadband Speed – BT have now provided fast broadband for the WestonGreen end of the village which can be accessed on payment of the appropriate fee. A member of the group is going to chase up BT about when they plan to connect Church End.

3. Maintenance of Roads and Verges – the gullies on Mill Hill were all cleared by the county council on 24th September. The parish council implemented its usual verge cutting programme this year.

4. Speeding Through the Village – the group agreed to support the local Speedwatch group as the main method of reducing speeding in the village. It recognised that the current group is short of volunteers so plans to draft a large advertisement in Challenge to appeal for new volunteers to keep this vital work going. In parallel with this the parish council is to look at sourcing its own Speedwatch equipment so that a greater flexibility of use times can be created.

5. Social Events – again good progress has been made on this with the successful start-up of film nights in the Reading Room, and a parish walk. There are plans for a New Year's Eve party in the Reading Room and its committee plans to publish a diary of events monthly in Challenge.

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6. Rural Nature of the Village – as part of the action to improve information on planning applications it is planned to put copies of all village planning applications on both the parish council notice boards. The parish council has also carried out an enhanced programme of hedge trimming and grass cutting at the war memorial, the Church End playing field and the play area on the Green.

7. Church End Playing Field – this is probably the greatest success for the village and the group have been pleased to be able to support it. The installation of the new play equipment went very smoothly and it is well used. The parish council also plans to provide a bench and picnic table for this area.

8. Public Transport – the group is still looking for a volunteer to coordinate a car share scheme for the village. An email will be sent to all those who expressed an interest to see if anyone is interested in fulfilling this role. If this fails a list of existing car sharing apps will be sent out to all as a reminder of what is already available.

The option of doing another bus survey was discussed but it was agreed to pursue the car sharing option first.

9. Housing – although the group recognises that there is still a need for affordable housing in the village no suitable land has become available so this action remains in abeyance.

10. Footpaths – a quote is to be obtained for providing a hard core footpath between Church End and The Green but the cost may well prove prohibitive.

As you will see the group has made good progress with most of the Plan actions and plans to continue to meet regularly to keep things moving.

West Wratting Parish Council

At the Parish Council meeting held on Monday 14th September the following items were discussed:

Footpaths: Colin McCall explained why the footpaths were cut in August, much later than normal. This was due to the job having to go out to tender to every country in Europe. JMP have the new contract for the next three years.

Planning: S/0890/15 – proposed cart lodge received permission from SCDC.

Finance: this information is to be seen on the draft minutes placed on the village hall noticeboard. Authorisation was given for the purchase of a new computer for the Parish Clerk, the cost to be shared with West Wickham Parish Council. It was also agreed to pay £75 to Challenge as last year, to cover the extra cost of printing the annual reports.

Maintenance:

- 1. The Parish Clerk had checked the Land Registration and the boundaries of the recreation ground are correct.
- 2. Mike Rowland reported on the repairs to the village hall which were now complete, but asked the Parish Council if the £1,026 remaining from the £3,000 given by the Council could be used to

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go towards refurbishing the toilets. This was agreed. A further grant had been applied for from Amey Cespa.


3. Quotes are being sought from Wicksteeds with regard to children's play area equipment and surfacing.

West Wratting Football Club: Cllrs Snow and Holness had attended a meeting on 6th September. With regard to the required repairs nothing had been done and no quotes obtained or application made for grant money. A decision regarding using money from the Sinking Fund would not be made until a justification for the need, costings and building up of the Sinking Fund was made.

The defibrillator now has a combi lock and the Parish Council needs to decide who should have custody of this code.

Traffic issues:

- 1. The Chairman had received a quote of £691.71 for the five rondels.
- Regarding moving the 30 mph signs further out, the Chairman had received forms to be completed with a payment of a non-returnable fee of £250. Cost would be £1,250 plus cost of the movement of the signs. No decision was made.





Report by Cllrs Fraser/Turner: Cllr Turner would like an opinion from the Parish Council regarding the consultation to change the elections to every four years, rather than three.

Report by Cllr. Hickford: before he spoke, the Chairman thanked him and CCC for the new junction at the crossroads and for their efforts in getting this off the ground. Cllr Hickford reported that changes are being made at CCC with a possible link up with Peterborough. The budget has not yet been balanced. Cambridgeshire is fourth from the bottom of all the Shire counties charging a low council tax, and fourth from the bottom in money received from the government.

Any other business: Cllr Causton had the necessary form to complete to place The Chestnuts public house on the County Council Village Assets list.

The draft minutes are to be seen on the village hall noticeboard. The next Parish Council meeting will be held on Monday 9th November. All are welcome to attend.

Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service

Fireworks and bonfires can be plenty of fun for all the family to enjoy. The fire service recommends going to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home; however, if you do use fireworks or light a bonfire at home, we would ask residents to take on board our safety advice to ensure it is just their fireworks that go off with a bang:

- Keep fireworks in a closed box and always follow the instructions.
- Light them at arms length using a taper and stand well back.
- Never go back to a lit firework.



- Never put fireworks in your pocket or throw them.
- Don't light bonfires in unsuitable weather, particularly in windy conditions.
- Don't leave bonfires unattended.
- Build bonfires well clear of buildings, fences and hedges.
- Never use flammable liquids to start the fire, and never burn dangerous rubbish such as aerosols, paint, foam furniture, rubber tyres, or batteries.
- Before you light the bonfire, check that children and animals are not hiding inside and are a safe

We started our new season with a spring in our step after the successful show last month. New members


joined us and we were quickly immersed in finding out about one of the most important jobs in any garden – pruning. Our speaker, Nigel Start, was able to explain the thinking behind when and how much to prune in order to gain the best from any plant.

Plants never stop growing but their rate of growth is influenced by factors such as the climate, soil, surrounding plants, grazing animals and human factors. With this in mind, pruning is undertaken for a range of reasons. Ask yourself, do I need to control the overall size, form a particular shape, encourage flowers, stimulate fruiting or promote leaves and stems? Once you have your objective it's important to choose the correct tools for the job. A good pair of secateurs and loppers should be adequate and then you are ready to begin. Always make a clean, sloping cut just above a bud and into healthy wood. Keep branches well spaced and cut any suckers right back to the base. Ensure that you remove all dead and diseased wood, and prune in frost free environments.

It was clear from the talk that many plants have specific pruning issues and some time was spent highlighting the importance of understanding whether a spring or autumn prune was preferable. Getting it right can make all the difference.

Our next meeting will be at The Meadow School on Tuesday 3rd November, beginning at 7.30 pm, when the AGM will precede a talk on grasses in all their glory. Please join us.

Green bin collection changes this winter


Don't forget, green bin collections change to monthly during winter when far less garden waste is put out for collection.

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


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Coppicing in Weston Colville, Lower Wood
