#### From West Wratting Vicarage

"You live here all on your own?" asked my wonderful Nigerian nurse on a home visit. "Yes", I replied. "My, I'd be frightened, it's such a big house."

When I first came to West Wratting Vicarage I had consciously to hold my tongue when people said what a big house it was. I had just moved from an eighteen room rectory in my previous parish, so West Wratting felt pretty small to me. For most people a house with three reception rooms of generous size, plus four bedrooms, all of which will take a double bed, is large. As I am coming to realise, while I look at where I might live after my retirement next year. I got rid of a lot of furniture to fit into West Wratting. I am going to have to repeat the process, but with even more rigour. I thought of my nurse's comments as the horror of the refugee crisis facing Europe unfolded. I have no idea what the position will be when you read this. It may not be on the front pages or the main item on the TV news, but it will still be there. Now I try desperately not to be a hypocrite in my preaching. I know I don't always succeed, but I try not to urge anything I don't believe or put into practice. So in urging us to be generous in our response to the crisis I am very conscious that I have three empty bedrooms. Shouldn't I offer a bedroom or two?

Well, it is not without a degree of relief that the official answer appears to be no. There are all kinds of argument against; it is such a huge and very specific commitment that just having spare rooms is among the least of the requirements. The rather prosaic answer appears to be that for most of us the best response is to give money to the various agencies who will be dealing with the refugees. I know it has become an orthodoxy that just throwing money at a problem won't solve it, but it certainly will help. So I hope that you will have done just that, that is thrown money at the problem. It will be of enormous help and it is the rational thing to do. And there's the rub. In the face of such human suffering anyone with any feeling, let alone a follower of Jesus Christ, will feel an immediate wish and need to do something big, to be generous and open on a scale that doesn't feel pinched or calculating. But for a response to be effective, actually to achieve the sort of relief we want, just having a generous heart isn't enough. On its own it can be no more than an emotional spasm. We need to be able to calculate how our help can be effective. Part of the problem lies in the fact that the word 'calculating' has a pejorative feel to it. But without calculation, actually looking at the practical nitty gritty, our generosity can be dissipated and run into the sand. Christians of all people have a duty to be generous. Generosity is one of the main strands of the Gospel. But it's not just a matter of the heart. The head is also involved. Indeed actually sitting down and bothering to work out what is the best and most effective way of being generous is as much a part of discipleship as the actual generosity. So a question for all of us, starting with me: when did we last sit down and seriously think about the best way of being generous – with our time, our energy, our wealth?

Hmm.

### Parish Paths Partnership (P3) – I

Walkers will have noticed the first cut was late this year, in early August. This was because of a new procurement procedure which took from January until July. The procedure is tedious and bureaucratic and includes – wait for it – putting the tender out to all EU countries! Approximately one quarter of the Council's grass-cutting budget is taken up on this before a lawnmower is put into action.

The good news is that the contract has been awarded to J & P Plant for two years with an option for a further year so hopefully all will be well for the next three years.

### P3 - II

In early September I received a call to say that the local landowner's gamekeeper had shot a dog and left it on the doorstep of a resident in West Wickham. Although the caller told me this in good faith, it turned out to be completely untrue. At the same time dog walkers (including me) were being told to put their dogs on a lead, irrespective of the circumstances, and allegedly sometimes threatened. I have had a meeting with the gamekeeper and the farm manager, and, to cut a long story short and looking to the future, the situation is as follows:-



The gamekeeper will in no circumstances shoot or threaten to shoot a dog, even if it strays into the poults (young pheasants) even though he is entitled to do so. He and the farm manager point out that they are both dog lovers and have dogs themselves. BUT there are certain areas where they insist that dogs are under absolute control – the whole of the concrete path from Mill Road behind West Wratting Park, all the way through the Grove, Bannisters Wood and beyond, and the wooded path behind West Wratting Park. This is particularly important from the end of July (when the young pheasants are put in situ) until 1st February (the end of the shooting season). Between lst February and lst July there is a more relaxed attitude about dogs on leads, but common sense applies - don't damage crops, be aware that there are wild ground-nesting birds, and stick to the public footpaths at all times.

I know that some dog walkers, who had their dogs under close control, were getting agitated about being told to put their dogs on a lead. This was the result of an over-zealous apprentice gamekeeper. He has been told to curb his enthusiasm, and this should not happen again.

One further point. Some dog walkers continue along the concrete path beyond the livery stables into the





farmyard at Weston Colville. This is not a byway and is strictly forbidden as there are health and safety issues in the farmyard.

I could use the whole of Challenge and go into more detail, but in summary, no dogs will be shot or threatened to be shot but at the same time the gamekeeper asks that dog walkers use their common sense (most do anyway, I know) and then things should settle down.

If anyone wants further clarification they are more than welcome to call me or come round for a chat. I have walked over 5,000 trouble-free miles on the paths round West Wratting with Molly and Daisy in the past ten years, enjoying every stride, and it would be good if we were all in the same position.

### Weston Colville Parish Council

The following items were discussed at the meeting held on 14<sup>th</sup> September.

**County Councillor's Report:** Cllr Hickford reported that the Chief Executive, Mark Lloyd, had resigned. It may be possible to share the Chief Executive of Peterborough.

**Church End Playing Field:** the area has been formally opened and continues to be used regularly. The only remaining work is the installation of notice boards, delayed due to absence of appropriate logos, and some tidying up. A request has been received for the provision of a bench for adults while watching children playing. It was agreed to provide this and also a picnic table with benches. Cllr Pagonis will progress this.

**Footpaths:** the work on the footpath between numbers 14 and 62A has been completed. Planings have been installed and the surface will compact. The holly hedge has been removed and has been replaced by yew by the adjoining householders.

**Highways and Verges:** the final verge cut has been done. A decision on the verge cutting plan for next year will be decided at the January council meeting.

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The question of speed limits was raised following data received from the Speedwatch initiative. The establishment of 40 mph buffer zones up to 400 m before the 30 mph sections was discussed. New village signs may be necessary, possibly combining with the speed limit sign. Derek Crosby, the Police Traffic Manager, will be consulted.

**River Management:** Cllr Cushion has had a site meeting with Brian Heffernan, the County Council Flood Risk Officer, Debbie Edwards from SCDC, Andrew Fraser the District Councillor, and Lee Tubby, the West Wratting Park Estate Farm Manager.

#### The Chestnut Tree West Wratting

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Despite assurances from SCDC, no communication had occurred with Lee Tubby on cleaning the river behind the council houses, and it was now too late to undertake the work this year, as a crop had been planted. It is intended to undertake the work next year after harvest when there will be a greater slot between crops.

**Seat at top of Mill Hill:** the seat will be installed at 45 degrees to the road to give a good view of the countryside. Cllr Pagonis kindly agreed to donate the seat. This was gratefully received by all the council.

**Car Park:** there is no progress regarding the legal transfer of ownership to the parish council. Further attempts will be made to contact the current legal department in SCDC, which has undergone many changes. Our solicitor needs the name of the person holding the documents in order to re-open negotiations.

**Weston Green Play Area:** some refurbishment of the fencing and gates is necessary. This is under way. Nettles and brambles have been sprayed.

One swing has had to be removed due to the top bolt shearing. It was agreed that the swings would be replaced.

**Reading Room Defibrillator:** Cllr Pagonis has made some enquiries as to types available, using advice from the British Heart Foundation. It is possible some contribution might be available from the ECB via the cricket club. This will be pursued by Cllr Garrod.

#### Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

The situation this month has remained peaceful in our village although the problems discussed in previous months have continued just a few miles away. Some matters have been brought to our attention:

Slavery has been mentioned in the media recently. I felt that this couldn't be happening here but Chief Inspector Sutherland, our commander of local policing, tells us that there are many types of crime in South Cambs but none as shocking as human trafficking and slavery. He advises us that slavery and exploitation are happening right here, under our noses. Modern day slavers' methods are far more insidious than in olden times and slavery passes almost unnoticed. To raise awareness about modern slavery and how it manifests itself he and his partners have arranged an anti-slavery day on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> October, 10 am until 1 pm in the council chamber at SCDC. Last month we looked at a fraud aimed at cheating students who were looking for flats. This month Action Fraud has mentioned a rise in people looking for pets online and particularly puppies, which are advertised using online auction websites. The fraudsters claim to have moved abroad and need to rehome some puppies. The puppies do not exist and any money sent to pay for them is lost.

Another website fraud offers flat screen televisions for sale at below market value. Payment is requested via bank transfer, which offers no protection to the consumer when the television does not arrive.

So remain vigilant. Report suspicious behaviour to the Police on 101, or 999 for immediate help.

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### West Wratting Book Club

We met in The Chestnut Tree pub in West Wratting to review two books:

**'The Sunrise' by Victoria Hislop** – historically accurate, it highlighted the plight of the Greek and Turkish Cypriots on the partition of Cyprus in the 1970s, and the resulting huge division of families, with abandonment and displacement on a scale seen all too often at present in Syria and other countries. The fictional characters covered the real contrast of tourists at that time expecting their holidays to continue in grand style regardless, compared to the fighting and hardship of the locals. An easy read, especially for summer, but some found it a little too implausible . Some would recommend it, and voted an average of 7/10.

**'H is for Hawk' by Helen Macdonald** – everyone loved it, and unanimously considered it beautifully written. It tells the story of a troubled young woman academic in Cambridge who loses her father, and decides to train a hawk, based on fields around Brandon, as well as Barton near Cambridge, and further afield. Whilst some did not find is easy to engage with, it gave us all a fascinating insight into

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www.westwratting.org.uk/village-hall/ the psychology of training a wild bird, with the parallel real-life story of T H White who did the same. White is the author of the Arthurian tales / Merlin books, and we will consider perhaps in the future some of his works for book club reading, having now seen the 'raw' side of the author, which was an unexpected bonus from this book on hawks. It covered dealing with demons on many levels well,

and is a unique book. Well worth reading, the scores were three at 9, and then a 7.5.

The October book is 'Go set a Watchman' by Harper Lee, and we will meet on Wednesday 14<sup>th</sup> October at 8 pm at the pub.

We will be reading the ghost story of 'The Little Stranger' by Sarah Waters, for November, and we also discussed reading 'The Miniaturist' and 'The Ragged Trousered Philanthropists', which cover similar issues to the Eleanor Marx book we read in June; also 'Small Island'.

Needing the victory and for Khalsa or Abington to lose, it was a nervous Saturday but things worked out well for Weston with both the other teams losing their final matches. This meant that NCI and Abington are relegated to the Cambs Senior League, and Weston and Khalsa survive for another campaign in Tucker Division 2.

The week before, away to Fordham on 5th September, was a different story and the situation looked dire going into the last game. Weston 1st XI restricted Fordham to 164 for 7 thanks to some fine bowling by Alex Meddle (4 for 51) but only one Weston batsman managed to get into decent double figures (Chris Scott 29) as they tumbled to 75 all out. This left Weston in the relegation places but all was well in the end.

A contrasting season for the 2<sup>nd</sup> XI saw them achieve promotion, along with Great Shelford, to Division 5 of the Cambs Junior League. These two sides were vying for top spot in the division from day one and the final game of the season, fittingly, was the away fixture to Gt Shelford, although the match was played at Horseheath's ground. The winner of this match would most likely win the division and in the event Shelford triumphed on the day. Great Shelford reached 168 for 5, with Carl Thompson taking 3 for 35 with his leg breaks. Unfortunately, Weston lost



quick wickets and fell well short of the required total at 85 all out, with only Michael Franks making any decent runs with 41.

Overall, a season of ups and almost downs for the senior Weston sides. We look forward to the 2<sup>nd</sup> team making further progress next season under the sound guidance of captain Craig Williams, and to the 1st XI improving on the season gone, perhaps with some new players on board.

The club held its annual end-of season event on Sunday 20th September. After some fun and games with junior and senior players involved in kwikcricket matches, awards were made to players for best performances in the 2015 season. The fine weather made it an enjoyable occasion for everyone.

#### Linton Health Centre

I am writing this update just the day before the Cambridge Dragon Boat Race – a fun charity event in aid of the Addenbrooke's Charitable Trust. The Health Centre has entered a team – 'Linton Quacks' – and we are hoping for a dry day for our supporters, who will be picnicking by the side of the river. We have a funny feeling that the crew may get wet anyway so won't mind quite so much if it rains!

We have a busy month ahead with our four Saturday flu clinics in October. We have 2,600 flu jabs to give to adults, nasal spray vaccine to give to children aged 2, 3 and 4, shingles vaccine for those aged 70 - 72 and 78 - 79 year olds, and the one-off pneumococcal vaccine for those aged 65 and over.

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### Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service

Winter is coming and after seeing a rise in chimney fires last year, Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service is encouraging all residents to get their chimney professionally swept before the cold sets in.

Top tips to enjoy an open fire safely:

- Sweep your chimney at least once a year and get brickwork inspected, especially the chimney breast and roof space.
- Do not bank fires too high or overload the grate, and remember to let them burn down well and check the hearth before going to bed.
- Use a fire or spark guard to prevent accidental fires.
- Do not place objects on or over the mantle-piece which may cause you to stand too close to the fire to reach or use them.
- Burn only suitable fuels and avoid burning resinous woods as soot builds up quickly.

Above all, ensure you have a working smoke alarm fitted on each floor of your home.
