Just at the time when we need extra help, Rev Dr Carrie Pemberton Ford has moved into the parish of Hildersham and is willing to help us out with church services.

Carrie is the Director of the Cambridge Centre for Applied Research in Human Trafficking. This is an internationally



recognized research network diving deep on issues of human trafficking. Currently Carrie is working on the capacity of the Black African Churches in the UK to build resistance to trafficking of West African women, children and men, regionally and internationally. This report is due out in the autumn of this year.

Carrie was ordained priest in the Ely diocese in 1992, and went on to develop a role in policy work at central government, advising the Chief Constables of Cambridgeshire, Gloucestershire and South Yorkshire on the complex impacts of European migration in their regions. She was the first ordained clergywoman to be appointed as a Women's National Commissioner

in Greece and Germany, and the tragedies which followed one after another throughout his childhood and youth, as well as the activities in that social milieu at the time. Philip never had one place that he could call home, staying with different family members and friends during and after his school years. It is small wonder that he once filled in a document as 'of no fixed abode'. It threw light on his later behaviour, in particular his facility for gaffes and short temper in the face of perceived stupidity or inefficiency. However, it also showed how good he was at creating roles for himself, his inventiveness and ingenuity, seen to particular effect during his heroic war service, and his hands-on attitude when setting up a home for himself and his new wife. It seems that it was in no small part the comparative normality of Princess Elizabeth's family that attracted him and led to him spending so much time with them and, by extension, the young princess. It also shows what a large part other people played in bringing them together, possibly with their own ends in mind.

Although appearing not to have been the best of fathers to Charles, it seems that to start with, on the brief occasions that the parents were able to spend with their young son, it was Philip who showed most affection, played with him and tried to prepare him for

Weston Colville Parish Council

The following items were discussed at the meeting on 4th July:

County and District Matters: Cllr Turner spoke about the devolution between Cambridge and Peterborough that will go to the full council on 28th July. £100m will be available for affordable housing, weighted to South Cambridgeshire; £70m is for Cambridge City. Both sums are new money and not from existing. SCDC has already voted to approve.

At the October meeting of the full council a resolution will be put forward to appoint a mayor to cover the area. There will be one mayor for Cambridgeshire and Peterborough, and a second for Norfolk and Suffolk. The plan is for the mayors to be elected in May 2017 on the same day as the County Council elections. The Cambridgeshire mayor will be supported by existing staff.

Highways, Grasscutting and Hedgetrimming:

1. *Update on speed limit signs* – Cllr Garrod expects to hear soon about the new 40 mph zones. The parish council will contribute 10% to the costs of signage.

- 2. Potholes the web address to contact regarding new potholes has been published in Challenge.

 The repair of potholes is up to date except one in Six Mile Bottom Road where the repair has already been washed away, probably due to the recent flood. It will be reported by Cllr Durham.
- 3. Proposed footpath from Church End to the Green two quotations have been obtained for the installation of a footpath. Highways will be consulted as to the specification that would be accepted. It is possible that there may be an LHI grant available (Local Heritage Initiative) but it cannot be applied for until next year when new grant money becomes available.

Flooding – Update Following Recent Floods:

Cllr Durham has had several conversations with Brian Heffernan, the leader of the SCDC Environmental Protection Team. The issue was discussed at length and a separate item will be included in the next issue of Challenge.



much more work before it is a proposal. He will report further at the next meeting.

Footpaths: all footpaths seem to be in good condition at present except the one that continues across the bridge beside 62a The Green, that is overgrown.

Popup Pub: it will be possible to have a Popup Pub as part of a social evening. More information is still needed from Catherine Hawkes, who attended the last council meeting.

Recreation Grounds:

- 1. Upgrading of path to Church End Recreation Ground – Cllr Scott has laid gravel to help with the slippery surface.
- 2. Repair or replacement of fencing around play area at Weston Green – this is being progressed by Cllr Scott. The suggested contractor is on holiday for two weeks. Some work has already been undertaken by Philip Sutton. CK will find out his plans to continue the work.

Fence Repair at Car Park: attempts have been made to find the person responsible for the condition of the fence. It is now in a dangerous condition since the flood. More contacts will be made as a matter of urgency.

Defibrillator positioning: a bracket has been purchased and it will be fitted on the wall of theReading Room. Instructions for use will be published in Chassenge.

Reading Room:

- 1. Trustee nomination Matt Jackson was nominated and accepted the position. Cllr Scott will contact him about details of the commitment.
- 2. Reading Room layby funding request Richard Golding has asked if the council could fund a layby to be constructed between the bus shelter and the stream. It should have a water-permeable surface. The council is interested in helping but needs more details of the proposal and the cost.

Planning – Mines Farm: following the recent flooding, the planning application contains an out of date flood risk report. It has been returned to SCDC Planning Department requesting that this be revisited.

Financial matters:

- 1. Annual audit the documents are with the Internal Auditor.
- 2. Payments of accounts payments were authorised (Badger Benches, £394.68 for picnic tables; Zurich Municipal, £607.53 for insurance; S Ratford, £375 for grass cutting) and cheques signed by the Chairman and Cllr Pagonis.

Remaining Queen's Anniversary Medals: it was agreed that the remaining medals be offered for sale at a cost of £2.00 each. An item will be written for Chassenae.

At the parish council meeting held on Monday 11th July the following were discussed:

Planning:

S/1414/16/FL – change of access, 29 The Common. Approved by parish council.

S/1311/16/FL – Mines Farm, new dwelling. West Wratting Parish Council had received no notification or documentation on this application and therefore an extension of the deadline has been given in order for the council to give their comments.

S/1607/16/FL – replacement of lead to nave room at St Andrews Church. Approved by parish council.

Finances: the authorised payments can be seen in the draft minutes on the noticeboards.

A Community Chest award of £1,500 has been given to West Wratting for replacement of play equipment. Thanks go to Cllr Causton for putting in the application. She will now put in for a grant from the Wadlow Wind Farm Fund to replace the play area tarmac.

The internal audit had been carried out successfully with no issues.

Maintenance: the broken bollard has now been replaced, with thanks to Andrew Hodge for giving his time and skill for free, replacing the bollard with a sturdy wooden one.

West Wratting Football Club: Cllr Holness reported:

- a) The bowls area is being turned into a pitch for the Juniors. They will need to apply for grant money to cover the cost of fencing and safety boarding. A grant application subcommittee has been formed to deal with this.
- b) The defibrillator is still not in commission due to the failure of the locks (two so far) supplied by the manufacturer to work. Hopefully the third one will work.

Traffic issues:

- a) Three rondels have now been put in and painted.
- b) It is hoped to put in a request for money through the Minor Highways Improvement Scheme to allow movement of the 30 mph signs to outside the present boundaries.
- c) Flash flooding in The Causeway and the High Street occurred during heavy storms due to blocked drains, and has been reported.





First Liaison Meeting with SCDC and Other Parish Councils: to be attended by Cllr Holness.

Any Other Business: a request for five dog poo bins has been made.

The draft minutes will be placed on the noticeboards. Next meeting: 12th September.

Watercourse Maintenance - Weston Colville

Following lengthy discussions with the county flood risk officer, it was agreed that routine maintenance of the River Stour should commence on 11th July, and I can report that this has been started. There is still much to do. All will be aware of the deluge that hit our village on Saturday 25th June. Several properties in Weston Colville were damaged by the water from the storm, as well as the flooding of the roads into and out of the parish. Details have been passed to the county flood risk officer. Even if the routine maintenance had been done sooner, the damage could not have been prevented in its entirety, but could perhaps have been mitigated. What did become clear during the storm was that many of our smaller drains and ditches were blocked, either as a result of damage (during building works, careless driving etc) or by the undergrowth which had not been subject to any control recently. The drainage systems for the parish

will work best if all the components are working. This includes drains running under drives, ditches alongside hedges, watercourses coming from the fields, ditches beside roads, etc. The parish council is pursuing those with the riparian responsibilities to undertake the work on the major watercourses, but it is incumbent on us all to look after the smaller dykes drains and ditches on our own properties. The parish council is considering a working party to help those less able to undertake any work needed on their sections of the system. Please let the parish clerk, Christine King, know if you might be someone we could assist.

Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

During the day on 29th June 1,000 litres of oil was stolen from The Causeway, West Wratting. There have been no problems reported in Weston Colville this month but there was a similar theft of oil from Weston Green recently. Is someone targeting oil in our area? We need to think about security and watch out for unusual activities. If you notice anything call 101 and discuss what you have seen. Suggestions: hide or disguise the oil tank; secure lids with strong padlocks; fit alarms.

In other villages, thieves entered a bungalow from the back and stole credit cards and cheque books. Tools were stolen from a garage. A small generator and bike leathers were stolen.

There were two distraction thefts: a card user was distracted while using an ATM machine, and his card was stolen. An elderly lady answered her door and was asked if a man could look in her back garden for his son's ball; the door remained open and someone else entered, stealing cash and jewellery.

A black Nissan pickup vehicle was stolen from a locked yard; the rear doors of a kebab van were forced and the generator was stolen, while the van was

occupied; eleven cars were damaged by vandalism; both number plates were stolen from a parked car.

Nationally, fraudsters have continued to be active. Vehicles are advertised for sale on websites, customers are persuaded to buy the vehicle via email and pay into an escrow account which they believe is safely operated by Amazon. Amazon does not offer escrow accounts; the whole transaction is fraudulent. Make sure you view the vehicle and meet the seller face to face before agreeing payment. If you have been affected by this, call Action Fraud (0300 1232040).

Other matters reported this month include fraudsters placing fake letter boxes on residential properties. The mail is harvested for personal details, enabling the fraudster to open various lines of credit. Tickets for the Olympic Games in Rio de Janeiro can be purchased from Rio 2016 ticketing. 

Kimbolton on 2nd July, Weston restricted the visitors to 221 for 7 with Matt Daniels taking 3 for 24 and Torin Reedman 3 for 21. However, Weston could only manage 71 all out in reply. Away to March on 9th July, Sam Charlton made 34 but the other ten players only managed 32 between them, leaving an easy chase for the home side who won by nine wickets. The next match was at home to March on 16th July, and March put on a massive 332 for 8, with their overseas paid player scoring 130. Lower Wood and Marsh Tits

Our devoted little team – Duncan, Mel, Joyce and yours truly – are delighted to report that we have started to colour-ring these charming but very rare little birds under Government licence, to find out why Weston Colville has them and so few other places do.

I'm also delighted to confirm that, as in other studies, colour-ringing doesn't seem to affect our Marsh Tits. Here's some pictorial proof: meet young Marsh Tit S320010, aka 'Blue over Red'. We first met him/her



on 3rd July in Great Coven's Wood, by kind permission of Colonel and Mrs Kaye. On 17th July, this whippersnapper turned up, brighteyed and bushytailed, in Lower Wood. We ring there by kind permission of the Cambs Wildlife Trust. 'Blue over Red' had gained a

respectable 3% in body mass in the meantime, and, importantly, had crossed the open space between Great Coven's and Lower Wood.

Marsh Tits are a famously sedentary species; they spend their entire lives almost within the same wood. We think that's one of the reasons they're in trouble. If you don't move between woods, you can't meet fresh genes. Inbreeding results. Increasing woodland fragmentation exacerbates this to the point where the species finds itself on the conservation Red List.

Little S320010 'Blue over Red' shows that one Marsh Tit youngster is prepared to cross open rides and seek

01223 290393 the.bu11rbs@gmail.com their fortune in woodlands new. It may be that Marsh Tits don't see Great Coven's and Lower Woods as separate. It's much too early in the project to draw any firm conclusions, but this is an encouraging sign.

As usual, re-encountered birds seem to remember us and adopt a calm, resigned and world-weary tolerance, trusting us for good treatment and quick release. (I may be imagining it, but I can almost see a shrug and "Hurry up and get on with it" written on their little faces . . .)

All our Marsh Tits receive two tiny, ultralight colour rings on one leg. At the moment, all birds ringed in Great Coven's have a lower Red ring. All birds ringed in Lower Wood have a lower Green ring, so you can easily tell where any Marsh Tit you see has come from.

We suspect that they may come to feeders in Weston Colville's gardens. If you see any colour-ringed Marsh Tits, please tell us where and when you saw them. It's critical to their long-term survival to know what these birds are doing, and where.

Mel Stammers on Mill Hill, Duncan MacKay of the Cambs Wildlife Trust, or myself at *cambsmarti@gmail.com* will all be delighted to tell you the life story of the bird you've seen.

More News from Lower Wood

The first sightings of the rare but rapidly spreading Purple Emperor butterfly were reported from Lower Wood. Kevin Wilson, who works at The Ark on the

road into Fulbourn, visited the wood in search of them and amazingly he found them on his first visit. With binoculars, the males can often be seen flying around in the tops of oak and ash trees high in the



woodland canopy, and the females, which are more secretive, can be found much lower down, laying eggs on sallow. We have also got a tentative sighting for Purple Hairstreak butterflies as well. They also fly around the tops of oak trees, but are smaller. If you

come into the wood. particularly when it is sunny, you stand a good chance of seeing both of these species. Purple Emperors used to be extremely rare and confined to just a few woodlands, but recently they have been expanding their range and have started to spread into Cambridgeshire. We have been expecting them, but this is a great addition to the reserves species list.

If you do come across the butterflies, please don't disturb them, and photograph from a distance with a telephoto lens. We are hoping to see Silver Washed Fritillaries and White Admirals before too long, as they are also expanding their ranges. Could this be a beneficial effect of global warming or just a natural change which often happens to wildlife? Who can tell? It is certainly very exciting.

The Marsh Mail (news from Linton Village College)

August is a very significant month for secondary schools. Despite being closed for the summer break, the publication of GCSE examination results at the end of the month is an important milestone in students' educational journeys.

This is the last year when A* - C grades will be used as a universal attainment measure – next year's new English and maths GCSEs will be graded from 9 - 1 and other courses will follow suit the next academic year. Whatever the number or letter awarded to qualifications, at LVC we are always really keen to encourage students to go beyond the bare minimum expectations and to be ambitious for themselves. I flinch when I hear students making comments such as "I only need three 'C's for my college course" when they are capable of much more. While GCSE grades are only one rather narrow measure of educational success it is important that students achieve the best that they can.

League table measures are also changing this year to recognise the progress of all learners. Existing headline statistics give a great amount of attention to the percentage of students achieving 5 A* - C grades including English and maths without giving any attention to students' starting points. The focus on the C/D borderline has been the cause of low aspiration among some groups of students, and of unethical practices with some schools targeting support to students who 'count' more.

Last year at LVC we opted into the new achievement measure, Progress 8, a year early. We welcome the move to focus on all students and their relative progress across all subjects, rather than the narrow view of a threshold that does not reflect the success of the whole cohort. Although, like many other benchmarks, Progress 8 has its limitations, we appreciate the more holistic view that it takes of all students' performance across eight subjects.

We look forward to celebrating individuals' achievements and hard work on 25th August and will be keen to recognise those individuals who have made the most significant progress during their time at LVC, not just those with the highest grades.
