St Andrew's Churchyard

We're looking for help from a keen gardener – a small garden by the south porch has been looked after by Margery and George Payne since William (Bill) Cutter, who was Margery's father, died in 1972. We would like to find someone who will take over from Margery, who has had to give up the task that she and her husband have so wonderfully performed year after year.

Margery writes:

My husband George (Payne) has recently retired as churchwarden of our parish church, St Mary's, March, so we understand the maintenance problems of churchyards and think St Andrew's is a good example of how this can be done. Thank you all for that. I love all the flowers that appear in the grass where it is left to grow during the summer.

My parents came to live in West Wratting when they married in 1935 and my father became blacksmith for Mr Peter Taylor's father (or might have been uncle). William Cutter (or Bill as he was known) was a keen bell-ringer, and helped with the restoration of the bells around 1958 and the formation of a team of bell-ringers. He also sang in the choir formed by the Revd Ralph Dudley, in which my brother Raymond, sister Joyce and I also sang. The choir had coaching by a music scholar from Kings College whose name I think was (David) Culpeck, and we enjoyed singing in church choir festivals in Ely Cathedral.

I'm not sure when Dad became churchwarden but he continued in that role until his death in 1972.

When my mother, Dorothy, died in 1992 there was already a space for her name on Dad's headstone so with the agreement of churchwarden Joyce Wooldridge we installed the bench seat and restored the small garden surrounding it, in memory of them both.

Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

Our local police often have property handed in at Sawston police station – bikes, mobile phones, laptops, wallets, driving licences etc – mostly lost items, but sometimes property from crime. They urge us to be vigilant and watch out for elderly relatives, neighbours and friends.

Nearby recent thefts this month occurred in West Wickham and the Camps. Businesses were broken into; £100 of soft drinks were stolen; sheds were broken damaging the locks; two cycles were stolen from a garage and a child's bike was stolen from a garden; accessories were stolen from a car.

Knockers – two men wearing masks knocked twice at one house. The lady in the house did not answer. Then they looked through the window. The lady knocked back and frightened them off!

Recently there have been distraction burglaries in Cambridge, many involving the burglars impersonating police officers, Neighbourhood Watch members, or water board officials. If in any doubt, keep your door shut or on a chain and ring the organisation that these people claim to represent. If they are not genuine dial 999 and ask for immediate assistance.

There are four frauds and scams reports this month: upfront payments for online vehicle shopping; booking frauds connected with the wedding season; WannaCry ransomware as experienced by the NHS; smishing, ie fraud via text messaging etc. The reports on these are too long to be included in Challenge but do contain explanations and methods for protecting ourselves. 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Experts Wanted for Wildflower Project

Our ancient churchyards are special places but rarely receive the same attention as the buildings themselves.

They are, of course, places of memorial and contemplation. But they are also important ecologically, and historically significant. These areas of land are unlike the rest of the rural landscape: they have known no modern fertilisers or pesticides, they have undergone no reseeding with modern grass species. To examine the wildflower 'meadow' that is St Mary's churchyard is to look back in time to see natural grassland before modern agriculture. As an agronomist, it is extremely rare to find the same concentration of species and populations of wildflowers in the agricultural landscape. I can also tell you that the flowering churchyard makes the most fantastic habitat for invertebrates and pollinating insects. This makes our churchyards very special indeed and worthy of study.

For several years now we have managed the churchyard at Weston Colville, allowing successional areas of the site to remain uncut through most of the year. This was a deliberate attempt to encourage wildflower populations to thrive and grow, and this





approach has proved successful. We have controlled generally undesirable plants like ragwort and creeping thistle, but only by hand weeding.

There are good populations of Lords and Ladies, wild strawberry, agrimony, bird's-foot trefoil, cowslip, yellow and common bedstraw, and a host of others that will come through the year. If you visit now you will see a largely yellow and white colour palette; this will give way to pinks, purples and mauves as the summer progresses. In late autumn we will cut and mulch the whole site; this will allow the biomass to be broken down to feed organic matter back into the soil but, more importantly, loosen wild flower seeds and place them in contact with the soil, hopefully causing more to germinate in the following spring.

But we need the help of someone with time and knowledge to help us document these species and record how they develop. There will be other important plants that we cannot identify (there is an orchid that occasionally appears which we cannot name). The same is true for butterflies and moths. So if you can spare a little bit of time and a few grey cells, please step forward and get in touch. It is a worthwhile project.

A huge boost to our ability to manage the churchyard, not just as a place of remembrance, but as a habitat for rare plants and insects, has been the support we have received from the Wadlow Wind Farm Community Fund, a charitable fund managed by Cambridgeshire Community Foundation, and we gratefully acknowledge their support.

We're approaching the end of the breeding season for many birds, including Marsh Tits. Ben Eeles at Church End took some lovely shots of a band of young Marsh Tits all demanding food from a harassed parent.



Joyce Oliver took this picture of a male Bullfinch, hatched last year, who's just survived his first breeding season. Every parent will recognise that shell-shocked, dishevelled appearance that comes

with the arrival of your first child. The poor devil doesn't really know what's hit him. Now they've flown the coop, he just wants to slope off into the bushes, have a cold beer and change his worn-out feathers for something vaguely respectable. We've all been there . . .

A lot of birds need to change their feathers after breeding, and some go into this head first. Behold, the Vulture Tit! Rachel Durham photographed this adult Blue Tit which had moulted all its head feathers first, presumably so that it can look hard. And that's no idle threat. Any ringer will tell you that no-one



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messes with Blue Tits. One lady told me that Blueys are common because they have just one simple but

entirely successful survival strategy – naked aggression! They don't care how big you are, so long as you have a nice soft bit of skin they can peck, as painfully as possible . . .

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Weston Colville Cricket Club Report for May/June



The season got off to a flying start for the 1st XI in the CCA Senior League Division 1, winning their first three matches and four from the first seven. They stand fourth in the division, which is currently led by Thriplow.

The first match at home to local rivals Abington on 6th May saw a victory by 46 runs. Weston batted first and a splendid 85 from Adam Taylor helped Weston to a decent total of 185 in their 45 overs. In reply Abington could only manage 139 due to some tight bowling from Ade Westley (3 for 34) and Trevor Westley (4 for 18).

Weston beat Foxton at home by 117 runs on 13th May. Weston batted first and posted a fine 240 for 7, thanks mostly to Andy Brightmore (57) and Adam Taylor (73). Matt Daniels was on form in taking 4 for 27 as Foxton were bowled out for 123.

The match at home to Chatteris on 20th May was a closer match. Weston again batted solidly, making 209 for 4 with Andy Brightmore (29), Craig Williams (31), Jack Squire (56) and Pete Bragg (41 not out) all



making useful contributions. Chatteris reached 172 all out, thanks to some fine spin bowling by Joe Robins (5 for 41) – a victory by 37 runs.

Up next were league leaders Thriplow, also undefeated, but Weston had home advantage. In the event, Thriplow dealt out a heavy defeat, making 340 for 5 and then bowling Weston out for 41.

Away to Fordham on 3rd June, Weston lost by 7 wkts. Weston batted first but could only manage 89, Andy Brightmore contributing 25. Fordham knocked off the runs with only 3 wkts down. The following Saturday saw a return to winning ways with a narrow 1 wkt win at home to Cambridge NCI. NCI batted first and made a challenging total of 184 in spite of a fine spell of bowling by Matt Daniels (4 for 19). Weston struggled in reply but an unbeaten 80 not out (including no less than seven 6s) from Ade Westley, supported by Craig Williams with 30, saw the team home.

The 2nd team has been struggling to get a side out this season, with players variously unavailable. One league match in the CCA Division 5 South was played on 3rd June away to Foxton III. Weston won by 2 wkts in a close match. Foxton made 161 for 8 but Weston prevailed, passing the required total also with 8 wkts down.

The 2nd team lost their match at home to Abington in the Lower Junior Cup on 4th June. This was a 20-over match with Abington making 122 and Weston just falling short by 3 runs in reply.

West Wratting Book Club

Our book for June was 'Hillbilly Elegy' by J D Vance, a very personal account of the author's experiences of growing up in one of the many 'Hillbilly' families who moved from the Appalachian coal mining communities of Kentucky to the steel towns of Ohio, in particular Middletown, in the hope of a better life.

It gives a devastating insight into the social problems and poverty of a particular section of American society, so influential in producing the political environment now current in that country. The author paints a vivid and painful picture of the problems that beset such families, the violence and dysfunctionality of relationships which makes it so difficult for anyone who wishes to break out from the spiral and make something better of their lives. Economic instability and lack of healthcare can be devastating, while the violence and stress can literally change people's brains. It can be difficult to break out of a pattern which can see the same destructive behaviour repeated down the generations. It brought home the importance of having just one person who believes in you and is willing to help and support you, and how vital good and supportive teachers can be to this; also, how a period in the military can instil structure and discipline not found in their home environment into a

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person's life which, together with the financial support provided by the 'G I Bill' to help with further education, can turn someone's life around.

All felt that it was a good read and well written, although one person found it hard, mainly because of the language and violence which was in such contrast to their own experience of growing up in the American South. Someone else commented that this was the sort of behaviour which can grow out of poverty and the stress it causes. Some thought that there could have been more about the political situation and racism. In general, it was felt that Vance had written this as an expurgation of his own feelings and that he 'had to get it out there'. All would recommend it (perhaps with a health warning) and gave it a score out of 10 of 8 or 9.

We will now be taking a break for the summer, with our next meeting on Wednesday 13th September at The Chestnut Tree when we will talk about 'A Street Cat Named Bob' by James Bowen, and 'Colonel Belchamps's Battefield Tour' by local author, Adrian Crisp. We plan to start this meeting at 7.30 pm as we hope to invite the author to come and talk to us.

In June, all of our Year 10 students spent enrichment week engaged in work experience. Many had sourced their own placements to pursue a specific interest, ranging from the Park Inn Radisson Hotel in Ostrava, Czech Republic, to the Aircraft Restoration Company, Duxford, working on the BBMF Lancaster bomber, to experiencing legal practices in Haverhill and interior design in Linton. Granta Medical Practices Update

During April the Barley Practice (Barley and Market Hill Surgery in Royston) merged with the Granta Medical Practices (Linton and Sawston) to form one practice. The obvious question is why.

The average rate for all users of consulting a GP has more than doubled per head of the population in the last decade. More and more patients who would previously have been in hospital with complex problems are now being treated in the community by the practice team. This is only made possible through moving from the traditional 'Dr Finlay' model of general practice into a team-based service, with a mix of skills, training and backgrounds. This team can only work effectively at a certain scale – and NHS England has made it clear that future investment in general practice will be directed to those practices who have between 30,000 and 50,000 registered patients.

The mergers of Linton, Barley, Royston and Sawston into one practice has created a single practice of some 34,000 patients. More importantly, the mergers have come about because of a shared aspiration and belief within our teams that by merging we can better meet our local healthcare needs.

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to airline pilots and is known for making a huge impact on women's lives leaving them feeling mentally uplifted and physically invigorated?

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By coming together, patients of the Granta Medical Practices now have access to services across four sites, including extended opening hours every day of the working week. The practice also has Emergency Care Practitioners (Paramedics) supporting the doctors and nurses in providing rapid home assessments for those unable to attend the surgeries. With a bigger team comes the opportunity to share expertise and specialist skills across a bigger population.

Granta Medical Practices has just been recognised nationally as a 'Primary Care Home' – an entity seen as one sustainable model for the future of the NHS. Over time, as a Primary Care Home, the practice will gradually provide more and more services including some currently delivered in hospital outpatients or day case surgery. The model encourages all those working around our patients to come together in a single structure, where patient needs come first and traditional NHS boundaries between organisations become more fluid. We are hopeful that this status will give us enhanced access to new funds and support as it becomes available.

As a practice we are positive that these changes will strengthen our ability to provide high-quality personal and human care to our local villages. Already, the practice is getting other GPs asking to come and work within Granta – and this is happening at a time when there is a national and regional recruitment crisis for GPs. This is a major vote of confidence from the profession for Granta and will help ensure that all of us continue to have access to high quality general practice for years to come.

We are enormously grateful to all our patients for their support during the transition and look forward to developing the service in the months and years ahead. *Dr James Morrow*
