Everyone will still have their black bin emptied one week and their blue and green bins emptied the following week.

All residents affected should have received a leaflet from the council ahead of the changes, with a collection schedule; they can also check the website – *www.scambs.gov.uk/bin-changes* The new schedule will also be included in the spring South Cambs Magazine (out between 28th February and 19th March).

Black bins will be collected in West Wratting and Weston Colville on MONDAY 27th February, then 13th and 27th March. Blue and green bins will be collected on MONDAYS 6th and 20th March.

Please ensure bins are out for collection by 6 am to avoid missing the collection.


Ministry News

Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

This month two men were displaying suspicious activities in Carlton. They were seen looking through windows but may have been legitimate. Suspicions like this should be reported to the police on either 101 or 999, with car numbers if available. If the police are not told they can do nothing. There was also a report of a breakin on the airfield, near the war memorial.

Activities reported from the South Cambs police area include the following: items have been stolen from homes, gardens, commercial sites, vans and cars this past month. The items included garden tools, garden machinery and power tools, jewellery, cash, copper, a cooker, clothing, a bicycle, a motor cycle and vehicle number plates. There was also an attempted theft of an ATM machine from a post office.

The police view much of this as opportunist crime and have provided some security ideas. To make our vehicles and homes less of a target, please ensure that all doors and windows are shut and locked. With cars make sure that the electronic locking has worked by manually checking the doors. Don't leave items on display and don't leave valuables in your vehicle. Remove Sat-Navs. Don't keep registration documents

The Meadow School

Ever heard the phrase, 'Be careful what you wish for'? Well we experienced this recently when we received 'the call' at lunchtime on a Wednesday from Ofsted to say they were coming the next day for a two day inspection. As we had been waiting for this we immediately put our plan into action. The staff were amazing, rallying around to support each other, checking everything was tidy, helping each other to set up classrooms for the following day, gathering evidence ready, and checking all the displays were looking super smart. We all had takeaway together on the Wednesday evening to settle nerves and then people started to drift away late in the evening.

Ofsted inspections can make or break a school and the people who work within it. When your school has been in Special Measures, you are being judged constantly and you know how much it means to the community and the staff to prove how much things have changed, so an inspection is perhaps even more high stakes and pressurised. We had a team of three inspectors, who were all secondary school specialists, not ideal for a primary school I have to say. This, added to the new far tougher inspection framework introduced last year, provided two days of extreme challenge. I won't lie; the pressure we were all under for the 48 hours was like nothing I have experienced before, and knowing that people can and do lose their jobs if things don't go well was a hard thing to put to the back of your mind. The desire of each and every member of the staff team to show off what we have achieved was evident and the team effort was absolutely amazing. We were very well supported by our parental community too, and inundated with cakes and food to keep us going as we worked a couple of ridiculously long days.

What I am immensely proud of is that we kept our promise of doing things for us and our children and not for Ofsted. There was no show put on that we would struggle to maintain for two days – we still did Forest School and trailed mud through school, we carried on as normal. We stuck to what we believe in and practise on a daily basis. We were confident in these beliefs and morals, and our passion for learning was clear. The children were fantastic ambassadors and also made no exceptions for the inspectors; there was absolutely no preferential treatment given in the lunch queue, and the memory of the child who was incredibly sick at the feet of an inspector shall forever stay with me!

There are always going to be things that schools need to work on and anyone who thinks differently is not being honest. The problems arise when you aren't aware of these things. We have a very detailed School Improvement Plan that we write and develop each year in line with our school priorities which now continues as does the rest of life in school.

I couldn't be prouder of everyone. I genuinely love my job and feel privileged to work with such a talented team and fantastic children and families. A huge thank you to the whole community for all of your support over these past few years. As I write this we are still awaiting our official report and I am unable to share the judgements with the staff (still!) or community. As soon as I am able to share the news I will!

The Marsh Mail (news from Linton Village College)

International Women's Day, on 8th March, is a calendar event more commonly celebrated in other European countries. While some may question the ongoing necessity of such a day, the fact that we still witness women being denied equal rights and opportunities on account of their gender suggests that there remain equality issues that need addressing.

This year's theme, 'Be Bold for Change', is a plea for action to quash and challenge practices, laws and customs that prevent women from living full and equal lives. While it may be easy to cite international

examples in which women are the victims of unfair treatment, there are also causes closer to home.

Recent gender pay gap research confirms that despite girls traditionally outperforming boys in examinations and greater numbers of women entering higher education, after a short period in their early careers pay and promotion are very unequal for most of women's working lives. Furthermore, Harvard Business Journal highlights that only 24% of senior management roles are held by women, and only 5% of executive positions. These stark statistics seem quite incongruous in 2017, as does the concept that women are literally 'worth less' in terms of an hourly pay rate.

The gender gap has dramatically narrowed at LVC. In 2016, boys' academic performance was equally matched to girls, unlike previous cohorts. Despite the results showing parity between the sexes, the profile of intervention groups appeared to confirm entrenched gender stereotypes: pockets of girls deficient in confidence and self-esteem, and some boys lacking intrinsic motivation and work ethic.

Despite much progress being made in terms of gender equality, there is still work to do to counter fixed mind-sets and barriers for the benefit of both sexes. Pervasive views about 'laddish' and 'girly' behaviours, excusatory phrases such as 'boys will be boys' and notions of 'girls' subjects' and career paths need tackling too.

While gender has become a more fluid notion in modern day society, the ambition for all people to have the opportunity to be happy and successful remains a central motivation for schooling and one that over fifty teachers meeting at LVC on 8th March will be championing.

Our Safe and Well visit will provide us with sufficient information to support you and, with your permission, refer you to selected partner agencies who will be able to support you further. We will not share your data with marketing companies or for other purposes.

Our visit will last no longer than an hour, and is completely FREE of charge. Our visit will assess five key elements:

- 1. Fire safety in the home, including cooking, general safety and escape plans.
- 2. Falls prevention, including simple remedial action such as replacing lightbulbs or taping down loose carpet.
- 3. Alcohol use alcohol related illness in the over 65s is on the increase. We can provide you with helpful information.
- 4. Stay well and warm can you afford to heat your home? Do you have access to a hot meal? Do you have access to all the services available to you?
- 5. Crime reduction we can provide advice on making your home more secure, in addition to advice to make you less vulnerable to scams or fraud.

You are under no obligation to answer any questions that you do not want to, but the more information you provide us with, the better we will be able to support you. We can also provide advice in relation to promoting the health and safety of individuals with hoarding concerns, as well as providing valuable information to care providers.

We will also be raising awareness of the fire risks associated with smoking, with national No Smoking Day on 8th March. We often find smoking is one of many factors making someone more at risk of fire, for



example, when combined with poor mobility, health problems or being elderly, it increases someone's chance of having a fire.

Here are some tips to take on board or give to friends and family who smoke:

- Never leave a lit cigarette or pipe unattended.
- Always use a proper ashtray and make sure the contents are cold before you tip it in the bin.
- Never smoke in bed, and avoid smoking in a chair if you are likely to fall asleep.

Most importantly, fit a working smoke alarm and test it regularly. Don't forget to also test the smoke alarms of those you love. If you have an elderly or vulnerable relative, friend or neighbour, pop by and make sure they have a working smoke alarm. If they don't, that is something we can provide as part of a Safe and Well visit.

Granta Medical Practices

The partners of Granta Medical Practices and Barley Practice have taken the decision to merge the two partnerships. Both Granta and Barley are strong practices and very well respected in the local health community; the merger will build on that strength and ensure patients continue to receive the best possible service in the future.

The merger of Sawston and Linton has enabled us to recruit two Emergency Care Practitioners (paramedics), helping us improve care to the frail and elderly in their homes. Working with SCDC we are



about to have patient advocates in the practices to assist patients to get access to all the community services available. The Mental Health trusts are placing Community Psychiatric Nurses in the practices, giving our patients direct access to these services. These are just a few of the services we will now be able to offer directly rather than referring to other organisations.

Initially, we suspect that patients will notice very little difference! Patients will be able to choose to attend any site. All sites will continue to provide all the current services for patients and, over time, we hope to be able to provide more services shared between the sites. An example would be extended 8 am - 8 pm opening hours; neither practice could comfortably offer such extended hours alone, but together that becomes more feasible and this is certainly a better option than having to travel to Chesterton for out-ofhours care.

On 26th April the patients' records and computer system will merge and this will require both practices to close from 1 pm on 25th April and open again at 1 pm on 26th April. The out of hours service will be available to our patients during this time.

- 1. Balance heat and light too much heat / not enough light gives weak spindly plants

Harold's Topical Tips for March:

- Cut down herbaceous plants and grasses.
- Plant bare rooted trees and shrubs.
- Plant shallots cell trays work well. A cold frame or cold greenhouse will suffice.
- Hard prune winter jasmine and apply fertiliser.
- Hard prune clematis that flower after mid summer.
- Prune autumn flowering raspberries.
- Order summer flowering bulbs.

- Order seeds and seed potatoes. Set potatoes up to 'chit'.
- Mulch asparagus.
- Lift and divide overcrowded snowdrops and aconites.
