The final decision and award will be made immediately after 'A' Level/Baccalaureate results and university offers are known. West Wratting Book Club

For November we read 'The Shepherd's Life' by James Rebanks, the Herdwick Shepherd.

One person thought it was very well written and absolutely captivating, which might sound a bit odd given that it is about sheep. Others found it thoroughly enjoyable, refreshingly different. As it was, in general, written season by season, it was occasionally disjointed. It describes the very gruelling life that people who devote their lives to raising sheep endure, with the harsh climate in the Lake District, the need for constant surveillance of the flocks, and their welfare and the relationships involved. It was a fascinating insight into a way of life that is quite alien to most of us, how it occupies every minute of every day, the different seasons of breeding, lambing, and herding, and the role of sheepdogs. It was thought that not many authors could rise to the challenge of describing sheep farming in such detail and make it so interesting to people from different walks of life. It gives one a realisation of how the locals, particularly the sheep farmers, viewed the invasion of tourists, especially





walkers to what is in effect, their workplace. Later the author's view of such people was mellowed by his experience of working in the city, giving him an understanding of their need to escape. The description of the effects of the foot and mouth outbreak and the lack of government understanding of the importance of these special sheep and their relationship with the Lake District was particularly heartbreaking. It was also another example, as in 'The Hillbilly Elegy', of someone who had done badly at school being helped by a relative, in this case his mother, and the family's love of books, as well as a girlfriend supporting and helping him to fulfil his academic ability. Scores ranged between 8 and 9, and all would recommend it.

Our next meeting will be on Wednesday 13th December at 7.30 for 8 pm in The Chestnut Tree. The book to read for December is 'The Reader on the 6.27' by Jean-Paul Didierlaurent. The January book will be 'Down and Out in Paris and London' by George Orwell; date to be confirmed.

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West Wratting Football

At the start of November the first team were up at the top of the Cambs Senior league, having played nine games, won eight and lost one. In the next three cup competitions we beat Whittlesey 4 - 0 and Comberton 6 - 0 but unfortunately were only able to field half a first team and half of the reserve team against Cambridge City first team (four divisions higher) and lost 5 - 0, but the players put up a great display, only conceding three of the goals in the last ten minutes. The only league game was a win away to Gamlingay 4 - 2.

The Reserves were unbeaten until they lost in the Cup game against Alconbury 4 - 0, but since then they have beaten Exning 6 - 1 and drawn with neighbours Balsham 2 - 2, so still remain top of the Cambs league Division 1A.

Another good note was that West Wratting had three players picked for the county, playing away at Hampshire (Southampton) winning 2 - 1; this is a national competition, with the winning county going on to represent England in Europe. Cambs are now at home to Thames County in December 2017.

Sadly we lost player/manager Michael Shinn (ex Cambridge United player) at the beginning of November to Newmarket Town, though he left us at the top of the league. The pavilion and club wish him well, with many thanks for all his hard work, which is very much appreciated.

Michael Bavester has taken over the role of manager; he first came over and played for the club approximately fifteen years ago and has previously been helping Michael Shinn in his role as manager. We all know that Michael Bavester will also aim to achieve great results for the club, and wish him well.

Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

Welcome back, Leanne, who says: "I am pleased to say that I am back as your local PCSO again, so if you require any help or advice please do not hesitate to contact me".

Criminal activity has reached out to Weston Colville and West Wratting recently, in Wratting Common, Mill Lane, Bull Lane then Church End, Mill Hill and Weston Green. There have been burglaries, thefts and damage involving homes, sheds, gardens, and vehicles. Ground floor windows have been jemmied open or taken out, and items stolen from vehicles: flower pots, chimney pots, lead tools and equipment, including a fishing tackle and a vibrator plate, cash, cameras, watches, and a bracelet.

To improve our security the police suggest locking ground floor windows and putting the key(s) in a separate secure place; also keeping your doors locked when not in use.

There have also been problems in the areas round Cambridge, on to the Shelfords and back via Sawston. Outbuildings including sheds and garages have been forced open to steal tools, number plates have been stolen (do report this to the police immediately if this happens to you: just call 101), crops and fencing damaged, and of course break-ins. Stolen lead would have been heavy as would the 20 x 10 foot T steel beams stolen elsewhere; this must have needed organisation, yet no one seems to have seen anything.

Con games: another name for fraud. Action Fraud has identified scams aimed at students which include both employment and accommodation. Another scam seeking advanced fees is aimed at those seeking work as a model. Then we have phantom debt collectors and bailiffs. Advice is available on protecting yourself from phishing, plus information on security for sheds and gardens. I have started to collect these advice sheets, and if you would like a copy please just ask.

As Chris, Weston Colville's Post Mistress of the last thirty three years prepares to retire, Challenge took the opportunity to talk to her.

Your last day will be on 20th December, how do you *feel?* I think I'm doing the right thing, because if I didn't do it now, I'd go on and on and on.

Why did you start running the PO? By accident! We were looking for somewhere to live, we came to look at the bungalow and the keys were next door. She said come and have a cup of tea and there was all this paperwork all over the floor and she said "I hate doing this job". I said "it looks good to me" and they agreed I could run it there. So I walked backwards and forwards for a year while this was being built in front of our bungalow. When we started it was just greetings cards and the Post Office, and we just started adding stuff as people asked for it. Something that might surprise people: up until about 1998 I had an air raid siren here that I would have to test regularly, and had to sound it if there was a four minute warning. Unfortunately the Home Office would not let me keep it.



Who have been your most regular customers? The OAPs, coming in to have a chat, and chat to each other, it was like an hour out for them.

What have been the best things about running the *Post Office?* Meeting all sorts of folks, they kind of grow up with you from kids, and years go by and they're still around, it's lovely really.

What about the postmen? They've all been brilliant, lovely. They're ever so helpful, they'll go out of their way to pop something else in someone's door.

Anything you haven't liked? Only the dark evenings when we used to do full days.

There were burglaries here in the 1990s, did you think about those after? No, I just moved on, because I thought if I worry about it, I'm gonna be really stressed out.

Are you going to have a closing down sale? Oh, I don't know, maybe a BOGOF?

You've been described as a fixture and certainly are at the

heart of our community, the village will miss you – what will you miss? The whole lot, because doing it for so long, it's just a way of life really.

Plans for your retirement? None at all, at the moment stay put, as long as I do something, I mustn't just vegetate . . . longer walks with the dog and a bit more gardening.

Any message to your customers? I'm going to miss them all so much, and thank them all for being here for me. Hoping with a new start and fresh ideas the Post Office will carry on in the village, and I am sure it will work.

Any message to someone taking on the Post Office? If they enjoy it as much I have, they'll do brilliantly!

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
Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

Welcome to the month of generosity and festive spirits. Your Marsh Tits have decided to be generous with their appearances at your garden feeders. We have had eight on the same day on one sunflower heart feeder on Mill Hill! Enjoy them and your luck, for few other places in the whole country ever see one of these red-listed birds.

Our research shows the number of different Marsh Tits visiting one Weston Colville garden's sunflower heart, fat ball and peanut feeders between 12th October and 17th November 2017. Although they hate to leave safe, broadleaved woodland with tall shrubs, Marsh Tits increasingly come to reliable garden feeders as the daytime temperature drops to single digits, to keep themselves warm. The key word is 'reliable'. The householder has been feeding regularly for twenty years (it doesn't take twenty years for the birds to realise you're a reliable feeder, of course). Adult Marsh Tits which haven't been seen since March and April, such as Green over Yellow on Left 'Delia', are turning up on garden feeders. We're seeing juveniles starting to come more often some days after the adults, so the location of 'sure bet'



winter food may be being passed on between generations of Marsh Tits, inadvertently or deliberately – we don't know yet.



Left Black, Right Yellow 'Dexter', an adult female whom we first met in Great Coven's Wood on 20th March 2016 and has been giving us the slip ever since, is shown here buttering up Christine King, in whose warm hand she



stayed after release. Christine the Marsh Tit Whisperer . . . the rumour started here, folks :)

Two more adult Marsh Tits earned their colour rings in November: Left Black, Right Red 'Baron von Richthofen' (The Red Baron) and Left Black, Right Green 'Lord Sparkington' (Sparky), whom we discovered too late was a mum! (in my defence, birds really only have naughty bits in the breeding season). Our Cornish correspondent Rachel Durham will be pleased to learn that Sparky is indeed a sparky character.



Keep an eye out on your sunflower heart feeders for Bramblings, Chaffinch lookalikes from Scandinavia and Northern Europe. They have overly short pink/ red waistcoats and too much black on them to be a Chaffinch. Hawfinches are here too. Very deep and powerful beaks – a hazelnut is no problem.

Remember it's Christmas for all, and share some leftovers with the birds – fatty rind, nut cutlets, and cut-up roast potatoes are great, but no eggnog please! Our work suggests it's the difference between life and death for them at this cold and wet time of year.

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


The Meadow School

Marsh Mail (news from Linton Village College)

Supporting children to grow up healthy and well is a key priority for schools and parents; good mental health is a crucial part of young people's wellbeing. Mental health, like physical health, is on a continuum; it is not a binary state.

Studies by organisations such as Young Minds reveal that mental health issues are a particular concern for young people: one in ten children have a diagnosable mental health disorder (that's roughly three children in every classroom); almost one in four children and young people show some evidence of mental ill health (including anxiety and depression), and half of all mental health problems manifest by age 14.

These conditions have a significant impact on children's ability to lead a happy and successful life; the consequences of poor mental health can have lasting damage. And yet there is a chronic shortage of access to specialist support: waiting times of over six months for a referral are standard.

At LVC we have witnessed a growing number of mental health issues. We recognise that these can be triggered by personal circumstance or as a result of trauma, or due to stress experienced by a need to feel accepted and successful.

We have introduced Mental Health Champions at LVC, who have benefited from specialist mental health training from educational psychologists and CAMH. We have also raised awareness and de-stigmatised mental health across the college, using the *#oktosay* initiative, to be able to identify concerns and signpost early support. We have also developed our PSHE programme to include educating young people about mental health.

Nevertheless, our ability to respond stops at first aid, as with other medical conditions; we are first and foremost educators, not expert clinicians.

The government's green paper on children's mental health is due to be published by the end of the year. It is anticipated to tackle internet safety and the impact of social media. While we welcome this emphasis on e-safety and a preventative focus, there also needs to be a commitment to providing the necessary resources for schools and parents to support children's welfare and good health.

Cambridgeshire Fire and Rescue Service

It is the time of year when we're enjoying a tipple with friends, cooking up festive feasts for the family, and entertaining loved ones. With all the fun to be had it is easy to be distracted when cooking in the kitchen.

Half of all fires in the home start in the kitchen, and more than half of those are as a result of distraction whilst cooking.

We want to help ensure your festive cheer doesn't go up in smoke this Christmas by sharing our tips below for safe cooking over the festive season:

- Never leave cooking unattended
- Do not cook when tired
- Do not cook when under the influence of alcohol, drugs or medication that makes you drowsy
- Regularly clean the grill pan and oven. Built up fat can easily catch fire
- Never leave anything cooking if you leave the house
- Do not leave anything flammable on or near the hob - tea towels, oven gloves and even washing baskets can catch fire
- Take care when using microwaves. Fires can start when people put food in too long. Always read the instructions on the packet - never guess the time needed
- Oven chips or temperature control deep fat fryers are safer than using a chip pan. If you do use a chip pan, do not fill it more than one third with fat and turn the heat down if the oil starts smoking
- Fire can break out in household appliances so you should regularly maintain dishwashers, washing machines and driers and never leave them on if you go out or when you go to bed
- · Have a working smoke alarm on each floor of your home. If it keeps going off when you are cooking it is probably in the wrong location or you may have the wrong type of smoke alarm
- Never take the batteries out of your smoke alarm.

If you do have a fire in the house, get out, stay out and dial 999.

HOOP (Housing Options for Older People)

Cambridgeshire County Council is working with South Cambridgeshire District Council on a sixmonth pilot project which has launched in South Cambridgeshire – HOOP (Housing Options for Older People).

The project offers specialist housing advice and support to older people, starting with a questionnaire asking older people (over 65s) about their home and how it suits them. This can be completed on line or via a leaflet. The answers are then used to put people in touch with local housing options (sheltered housing, extra care schemes), support services and community groups that can provide a mixture of practical support and advice, with the aim of helping people to make informed choices about their housing and wellbeing at an early stage.
