West Wratting Book Club

At our December meeting and Christmas meal, eight of us including husbands discussed 'The Reader on the 6.27' by Jean-Paul Didierlaurent.

It was agreed that this was a rather odd book with a futuristic, almost Orwellian feel to start with, which made us think it was set in a future where books were not allowed. It then became clear that the 'hero' of the book, Guylain Vignolles, is actually working on a machine, the Zerstor, that pulps 'remainders'. This is then turned into the paper for new books. One of our number suggested that the writing was rather awkward but this may have been due to the translation. Guylain and his co-workers are representative of those in lowly jobs, ignored and taken for granted by the better off, on the fringes of society but vital to keep it going. This is reflected in the initial reaction of the company to the terrible injuries sustained by his friend, Giuseppe, in an accident in the Zerstor and which has strange repercussions.

Guylain's one pleasure in his grey and repetitive life is to rescue the odd pages which escape pulping and read them out loud on the train to work, no matter how graphic and disjointed they may be.

When he comes to the notice of two ladies, it results in first himself and then a co-worker, an inspired proponent of the alexandrine form of poetry, being invited to read to a group of elderly people. On his arrival, they are just dozing in their armchairs but his reading to them brings them alive. When he finds a memory stick on the train it opens up whole new possibilities as it contains the writings of a public lavatory attendant, a commentary on her daily life and the way people behave towards her, to the point of making her feel unable to use a laptop to write on



while she is working because it does not fit with their idea of the sort of person she should be. He sees in her a kindred spirit.

It was felt that the ending was rather sudden and somewhat weak. However, it is ultimately a book about the pleasure of reading to and being read to, the joy that words, whether poetry or prose can bring to otherwise grey lives, and that one should not make assumptions about people. One person suggested that it would not be a book she would keep but would pass on to others who might find pleasure in it. One or two said they would recommend it to others. The scores were mainly 6 out of 10, but with one 7.

We will meet again on Wednesday 17th January at 8 pm in The Chestnut Tree to discuss George Orwell's 'Down and Out in Paris and London'. Don't worry if you don't manage to finish it – you can still come and discuss it.

Ministry Matters



Happy New Year from our Ministry Team! By the time you are reading this, I hope you will have heard that we have appointed a new rector to

replace Dr Julie Norris to lead our group of seven churches (as I am writing this, the interviews for the post of rector have not yet taken place).

The Church of England has a complex system of appointing priests to new posts. At the very end of the process is the final decision of our Diocesan Bishop, who appoints and licenses the new priest.

But before that, all our churchwardens, who are all 'Bishop's Officers' appointed by the Bishop of Ely, the Right Revd Stephen Conway, have the responsibility of selecting the new rector.

In addition to that, every parish in the Church of England has a Patron who is also responsible for appointing the parish clergy. Our seven churches all have patrons who take their part in the appointment process, and they will be coming to the Installation Service to formally present the new rector to the bishop.

As you can see, it is a complicated procedure.

Happy New Year, and 'may all your troubles be little ones'. Now for that New Year resolution: let's aim for better security at home to discourage thieves and keep ourselves safer?

There are no reports of trouble in either of our villages – a relief after the past few months. However there was a burglary, and tools were stolen from a van, in Balsham. Damage to windows was caused by stone throwing in Wilbraham, and Linton experienced a business burglary and theft of diesel.

Further afield there were four separate thefts of bags from vehicles by smashing windows. Please do not leave bags on view in any vehicle. Also for those who use their car to reach Whittlesford station, a car was stolen and items were stolen from another vehicle.

If you are over 65 and concerned about your security it is worth contacting The Bobby Scheme. This charity has helped several people in our village by providing and fitting alarms. There is no charge if you have been the victim of a crime, and only a donation if you haven't. If you need better security call them on 01480 413311 and discuss your needs. Online shopping is a very useful tool of our modern lives, and Action Fraud has advice aimed at keeping us out of trouble. Always check you're on the correct website. To be secure, particularly when paying for something, the webpage should start with https and ought to show a locked padlock sign. It is also worth knowing that 65% of Action Fraud reports during the 2016 Christmas period were linked to online auction sites. Payments via bank transfer offer you no protection if you become a victim of fraud; however, Paypal and credit cards offer better protection.

Matters discussed at the November meeting included:

1. Litter picking in the parish – Colin McColl, who coordinates the West Wratting and Weston Colville Litter Pickers, gave an update of litter picking in the parish. He is looking for a volunteer to litter-pick the Six Mile Bottom road in Weston Colville .

2. Planning

2.1 Planning discussed and voted by parish council:

3. Matters progressed since the last meeting:

3.1 Website – a quote has been obtained for $\pounds 299$ to create a parish website. This is being followed up.

3.2 Car park transfer from South Cambs District Council (SCDC) to Weston Colville Parish Council (WCPC). This is has been complicated by an appeal against the council's land registry application for this site, which is now incurring considerable legal costs. Next steps will be discussed at the January meeting.

3.3 Tree Warden Report – the parish council is currently not responsible for any trees in the parish so no action is required by the tree warden.

3.4 Ditch and stream clearing – drains at Mill Hill / Brinkley Rd, Church End were reported by the Clerk to Highways as needing attention after recent heavy rain highlighted the issue of the amount of surface water flowing down the highway and not into the drains. Highways has made no progress with any of this. It was agreed that county councillor Batchelor would be provided with the details so he could follow this up and try to get some action on these issues.

A discussion was held regarding whether a communal skip should be placed in the Reading Room car park for village 'green waste', following a request from a parishioner. This was unanimously rejected on the basis it would be impossible to control what people actually dumped in the skip, which could lead to some extremely high disposal costs, especially if white goods were placed in the skip.

The council regrets the decision to close the post office but fully understands why this is happening, and would like to recognise the invaluable service Christine Tilley has given the village for over 33 years, and to wish her a long and happy retirement. It was agreed that the council would give its full support to any viable proposal to re-open a post office in Weston Colville if such a proposal is made.

Planning meetings (if required): 5th February, 9th April, 4th June, 6th August, 1st October, and 3rd December.

Weston Colville Parish Council – Vacancies

A very happy New Year to you all, and I hope you had a peaceful and joyous Christmas.

The following items are some of the matters discussed at the parish council meeting on 13th November. The draft minutes are posted on the website and noticeboards.

1. Due to the resignation of Hanneke Okkenhaug we were pleased to co-opt Susan Locke on to the council; however due to her illness we were unable to do it on the 13th. We also need to fill the vacancy due to Rachel Causton's resignation. Both these councillors will be sadly missed.

2. Please see the planning details in the draft minutes on the noticeboards.

3. Update of affordable housing: the planning application will be sent shortly for the council to approve or not.

4. Finance: please see the draft minutes with the full details of authorised payments and receipts.

5. Maintenance: Cllr Nichols had been told by Highways that the road markings would shortly be carried out. The potholes along Common Road will also be filled in shortly.

6. Traffic issues & speed restrictions:

- a) Speed Indicator £1179.02 has been paid as West Wratting's contribution towards the purchase of the speed indicator.
- b) Jellycat Lorries Cllr Nichols has spoken to the manager and written twice about the size of vehicles coming through the village but had heard nothing back.
- c) Drains these have been cleared out following the chairman's request to Highways.

Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

Happy New Year, Marsh Titters!

I've taken advantage of the overfed, overtellied festive spare time to dig through our data for golden pieces of knowledge - arr, Jim lad . . . I've done a Chris Packham and produced a chart:



A useful nugget jumps out from this chart straightaway: Despite weekly ringing sessions and almost continuous garden monitoring for nearly two years, Marsh Tits were not seen at all in June. In fact, for 2016 and 2017 combined, only four birds were seen from 3rd May until 30th June (three were seen in the woods, and only one in a garden). That's under 2% of the 226 total sightings in both years. Conversely, 88 individuals were sighted from 1st March to 2nd May (39% of total). Of these 88 birds, 68 were seen in gardens and 20 in the woods.

So, like teddy bears' picnics, Marsh Tits breed in the woods, out of sight. March to June is considered to be the classic bird breeding season. Thus, our Marsh Tits are slow starters: they're sitting on eggs or chicks rather later than other birds, and indeed later than Marsh Tits in some other parts of the UK.

It also indicates that we should stop ringing Marsh Tits in the woods in May and June, to avoid any chance of disturbing the breeding of this Red-Listed species. So that's exactly what we're going to do in 2018: a self-imposed ban on woodland ringing in May and June. Spotting Marsh Tits with binoculars on your woodland walks with the dog, or ringing in gardens away from the breeding woods, won't bother this woodland specialist that can fly and nest out of your reach. So please keep those sightings coming in; without your scientific data, we wouldn't know anything about how best to protect these birds.

And – just because it's New Year – I'll pass on this tidbit from our parent Marsh Tit study at Monk's Wood Research Station. They use colour rings with two colours on them, as well as the single-colour rings which we use, which means that with two rings, they can have three colours per bird, necessary for the larger numbers of Marsh Tits they have in the National Nature Reserve. For ease of resighting, their birds - although all true Brits - can have different national colours: Spain (yellow/red-yellow), France (blue/white-red), England (white/red-white) etc. This paparazzi photo shows the Monk's Wood ambassador for Italy, sporting the national colours of green, whitered.*

Granta and Shelford Medical Practices Proposed Merger

The NHS is changing rapidly. General practice remains the bedrock of the NHS but needs to adapt to be able to meet both current and future needs of our populations.

Nationally there is already a significant shortfall in GP numbers, and this is going to get worse. With an aging population, health care needs are more complex and patients are attending the surgery much more frequently than in the past.

Put simply, the traditional general practice which has worked so well for so long is no longer able to service patient needs. Government policy is that only large general practices will get access to new funding streams. Without this additional resource, patient care will suffer.

The GPs of both Granta Medical Practices (Barley, Royston, Linton and Sawston) and Shelford Health Centre believe that the best option for maintaining and improving services for our patients is through coming together to form a single practice. At present the practices are consulting on this proposed merger. We are keen to seek views of all those who might be affected.

The practice teams already work very closely together. We believe that by coming together the existing services provided to our patients will not just be more sustainable but that we will be able to add new services, enabling improved care in our practices. A merger also facilitates the hoped-for integration of community nursing and support teams with the practices as part of the nationally recognised 'Primary Care Home' model of integrated care.



There is no suggestion of, or intention to, shut any of the surgeries down nor to stop providing core general practice consultations from each site. Some administrative and specialist services may be delivered from a single location.

Already the Granta merged practices are better placed to retain and recruit clinical staff than many surrounding practices, ensuring high levels of continued service despite the national shortage of doctors and nurses in primary care.

Shelford and Granta Medical Practices are committed to providing the best possible care for our patients within the NHS system.

We are keen to evolve to remain as relevant for our community in the next half century as we have been since the foundation of the NHS. Together, with some 44,000 patients, we will be big enough to deliver modern healthcare while remaining small enough to care and be responsive to our patient needs.

We have been providing a travel service here at Granta for over 30 years. To meet an ever increasing demand for travel advice, vaccinations and malaria tablets for travellers we will be expanding our service in the New Year.



Many GP surgeries no longer provide travel services at all, so we are very excited to be able to offer our patients an increased, dedicated, and streamlined travel clinic which can offer more appointments during the week.

We will be able to offer our travellers the opportunity to purchase mosquito nets, insect repellents and travel packs with all those essential remedies, along with medical first aid kits and needle packs.

If you are planning to travel abroad, please download a risk assessment form from the website or collect one from reception. We will then provide advice on the recommended vaccinations, and any other advice you may need for your trip. We will contact you to book an appropriate appointment for you. This may be in our private clinic if you require yellow fever, rabies, Japanese encephalitis or malaria tablets, which you will need to pay for, or an NHS travel appointment will be offered if you are just needing hepatitis A, typhoid or a tetanus booster, which are free.

Remember, some vaccines need four to six weeks to complete courses, so please contact us in good time.

Small Villages Community Warden Services

The Community Warden Service assists older people, aged 60 or over, in the villages of Balsham, Weston Colville, Horseheath, Castle Camps, Shudy Camps, West Wickham and West Wratting, by supporting people to live independently in their own homes.

The warden makes daily contact with older people using the service either by telephone or in person to establish their well-being and what assistance is required. The service is provided Monday to Friday and can be provided on a permanent basis or for temporary periods (eg following hospital discharge).

The Warden can assist with, for example:

- Watering plants/feeding pets.
- Small amounts of shopping/posting letters.
- Collecting prescriptions/help with paperwork.
- Above all, to be a regular source of reassurance and information to support independent living.

The Warden Service is funded by SCDC, the parish councils and Cambridgeshire County Council. It is managed by Age UK Cambridgeshire and

Peterborough and is open to local people for a small charge each week, payable to the warden.
