flowers drew many admirers. This year, a particular attraction was a wonderful collection of wedding dresses from across the ages, loaned by different





From the Rectory

What an amazing World Cup it's been: so many exciting and unexpected results and so much drama. We enjoyed a thrilling run by the England team, who were



rewarded with an unexpected semi-final place. Then there was the entirely unforeseen transformation of the England manager, Gareth Southgate, into a fashion icon!

It's also been fascinating to hear the experiences of those who travelled to Russia during the tournament. With a background of international tension and prior clashes between English and Russian fans, many feared it would be a dangerous and inhospitable place. Fans and journalists alike, however, found their preconceptions dismantled, encountering a warm welcome from many, and a rich and varied culture.

This tournament, then, has been enthralling partly because of its unpredictability; its power to surprise and amaze. Yet we can find ourselves, in other areas of our lives, trying to eliminate risk and unpredictability as much as possible. I'm sure I've often allowed my decisions to be shaped by fears or sought refuge in a settled viewpoint, perhaps because I feel more secure that way.

The Christian faith, however, has always said following Christ is a risky business; it is certain to take us out of our comfort zone. One of my first books on the Christian faith was called 'God of Surprises' by a Jesuit priest, Gerard Hughes. It suggests we may often be formed by our fears and hold onto pre-conceived ideas about other people and God which aren't helpful. By deepening our prayer life and letting go of our fears, however, these false images and insecurities may gradually dissipate. This in turn draws us into a richer experience of life and of God's activity.

Most of us, at times, take refuge in our fixed ideas or are worried by uncertain futures. We can, however, find joy and richness in the unpredictable and surprising nature of life, and experience more of what the Gospel of John calls, 'life in all its fullness'. We may also trust that God will be our guide on this journey and lead us more deeply into his Kingdom.

Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

Two white vans have been seen acting suspiciously in Weston Colville recently. Both have been reported to the police. A white van pulled on to a drive in Great Shelford, someone got out and stole a roll of electrical wire – just like our experience. Copper cabling and up to five tractor batteries were stolen from Church Road, Carlton early this month and a car was stolen from Linton. An arsonist set fire to straw on a farm in Linton. In Great Abington the owner returned home to find three men in the rear kitchen. The men left.

The police dog unit offers us this advice: please don't leave your dog in the car, even for a short time, in this weather. They will not be helpful, so close the door, put the phone down and do not open emails unless you recognise the sender.

Please report any suspicious activity. Use 999 in an emergency and 101 for all other calls. Please gave as much information as you can: for a vehicle, make, colour, model, registration number; for people, height, build, ethnicity, hair colour, clothing, and any distinguishing features like tattoos. The police value your calls. You can also report things online, first logging on, then selecting 'report a crime' or 'report a concern'.

Road Markings and Potholes: nothing has been done as yet about the disappearing road markings but many of the potholes have now been repaired.

Dilapidated Building Action: a query has been raised as to what now happens regarding the order put on this building since the fire has now made the building unsafe.

Football Club: the latest report has been put on the website and fuller details are given in the minutes which will be on the noticeboards.

Traffic Issues and Speed Restrictions: Cllr Bonfield reported that the Speed Indicators (SPIDS) were working well and providing useful information regarding quantity of the traffic and speeds being done, with 41% of cars breaking the speed limit. It was suggested that the purchase of another SPID would be very useful. A vote of thanks was given to Cllr Bonfield for getting this project up and running.

Cllrs Nichols and Bonfield met with Jason Ablewhite to discuss the data produced by the speeding indicator devices. Mr Ablewhite indicated there may be funding for permanent cameras.

Report of meetings: Cllr Nichols had attended the Joint Parish Councils meeting.



The reports of County Cllr Batchelor and District Cllr Harvey have been put on the website and are also detailed in the minutes.

Any other business: It was suggested by the Chairman that a Minor Highways Improvement Scheme award should be applied for in order to improve the junction at Honey Hill/Six Mile Bottom Road by enlarging the grass verge preventing cars from driving straight across this junction.

The next parish council meeting will be held on Monday 10th September at 8 pm.

Parishioners' Question Time: an email was received from a parishioner about the defibrillator, and the code being accessed by visiting Councillor Garrod and his neighbour, and the suggestion that every household in the parish should receive a card with the code on it. This was discussed by the council, led by Councillor Jackson, as he had just received defibrillator training. The best practice if the defibrillator is required is to ring 999; they have the code, and can explain how to use the machine. The machine also gives very clear instructions on how to use it. A poster is going to go up next to the defibrillator explaining this.

Matters in Hand/ Arising Since Last Meeting:

Village Sign – this has been reported to Highways, by process of registering it via the portal and emailing the relevant people.

Road Drain Clearance and Repair Update – a water leak is suspected on Mill Hill, as the road is wet despite no rain for over six weeks. An email has been received from County Council flood risk officer Brian Heffernan advising that Highways are going to raise a works order to have the gully jetted and trace the location of the outfall. Highways have also advised they could look into relocating the existing gully cover further into the road surface to see if this would catch the water prior to entering the ditch that in turn goes down the side of the properties on the north side of Brinkley Road.

Speed Indicator Device (SID) Update – data was collected from the week the SID was in place in the village; 50% of drivers were speeding, with speeds being recorded in the high 50s (mph) at Church End. There were some issues with the technology at Weston Green, so no data was recorded, however there is a very supportive group amongst the parishes sharing the devices, so data will be collected next time they are back in the village.

Combined Parishes Meeting: Councillor Jackson attended the meeting held in Balsham in June. The advice given was to report any Highways problems via the online portal, and also to email referencing the portal enquiry number. He learned that there is scope for councils to carry out their own works for potholes for example, using council contractors.

Wadlow Wind Farm: Councillor Durham reported on the Wadlow Wind Farm Community Fund grants. There is £48,000 available, and the success rate for projects requesting funding is 96%. The deadline for applications for the autumn round is 1st August.

Matters for the Council to discuss/vote on:

Layby at the Reading Room – the development of a layby has been voted on previously, with the parish council paying for half the works and the Reading Room Committee paying the other half. The original quote was £550.

Phone Box Restoration – There was a discussion about the telephone box at Church End. Councillor Jackson would like to take on the project, potentially applying for a grant from Wadlow Wind Farm. The phone box is to be restored to be used for the good of the community.

carries the first of our three colour combinations on his left leg. There are only two ultralight colour rings, as before. The top ring has two colours on it. The lower colour ring is black, as are all Marsh Tits ringed at Joyce's on the northern side of Mill Hill.

We are also delighted to say that Y291485 Green over Blue on Left 'Florence', a four-year-old female ringed at Mel's on southern Mill Hill, has



been spotted chobbling away on a feeder at Jacqueline and Alastair's in Church End. She's undergoing the full adult moult after the breeding season. It's a very good sign that she's still with us; wild Marsh Tits



usually survive for two years. Speaking of full adult moult, here's a good reason why adults



hide in the bushes while they're changing their feathers in July - Sept: they look like their scary dinosaurian ancestors. I offer this adult Blue Tit S320162, sporting a Mohican hairstyle, as proof. Trinny, Susannah and Gok Wan would have something to say about it, I'm sure.}

At a secret location not too far away, I spent the World Cup final looking for one of

our rarest non-native mammals. Behold 'Laid-Back' Jack, an Edible Dormouse (*Glis glis*). Look at his




