There will be a **fill up this month**, the last one this year, with a cut off date and time of Monday 8<sup>th</sup> October at 6.30 pm. Place your orders either by email to me at *richardholness023@btinternet.com* (please put 'Oil' in the subject box; if you don't get a reply from me to your emailed order within 48 hours, please place your order with the pub by phone), or by phoning the pub during licensing hours – not too late, please – on 290384. Please also make sure that you tell me if you have any special delivery requirements, such as 'Phone day before for gate to be unlocked', etc. We may be using Boilerjuice or another order consolidation website, as they seem to be getting very aggressive with their pricing.

Remember that syndicate orders take at least a couple of weeks from the cutoff date to be collated, brokered and delivered, but if you take the minimum of 500 litres every time there's a fill up, you'll always be buying at the best price. Details of the supplier, price and delivery dates will be placed on the West Wratting website www.westwratting.org.uk about three days after the order cutoff day.

#### West Wratting Book Club

After a summer break, we met to discuss two books.

Nearly everyone had enjoyed reading 'Eleanor Oliphant is Completely Fine' by Gail Honeyman. One person did not like it and did not think it well written. There were funny as well as poignant and painful moments. Most loved the main character and thought Raymond was a kind, hospitable person who saved her from herself. The way her mind worked caused her to misinterpret everyday events wrongly or see significance in them that was not there, creating a scenario to block out other events from her past. Another felt it was an interesting take on building trust in someone so damaged by previous experience. Some thought the plot a little bit obvious and contrived or unbelievable, in particular, how quickly events brought about a change in her behaviour. It was a reflection on relationships and the impact of upbringing, in particular her lack of understanding of other people. Scores varied from 4 to 9 out of 10, most being at the higher end. All except one would recommend it.

All enjoyed reading 'The Woodlanders' by Thomas Hardy, although some found it difficult to get into at first. Several wished that they had read it before, or had been inspired to read or re-read other Hardy novels. One comment was that it was a banal story beautifully written. One theme could be seen as the damage caused by the heroine's father in giving her an education and experience which meant she did not really fit into the level of society to which she had been born and the one to which she (or at least, her father) aspired. The descriptions of the towns, village and landscape are wonderfully portrayed while one learns fascinating facts about the way of life, rural lore and crafts, and colloquial terminology. **GARDEN MAINTENANCE** We offer a professional and reliable service from lawn mowing to new planting projects. It also highlighted the power that the landowners still had over their tenants, social changes taking place such as divorce law, and the interest in new medical or pseudo-medical science (as also referenced in 'The Essex Serpent').

It could be said that it was a very moral ending, despite previous tragedy. It could be suggested that the true heroine is Marty. The average score was 8 out of 10, and all would recommend it.

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#### Weston Colville Parish Council

At the meeting held on 5<sup>th</sup> September, the following items were discussed and where necessary agreed.

**Parishioners' question time:** concerns have been raised by parishioners via email about the removal of the post box from the site of the old Post Office, and the lack of its replacement. Currently the nearest post boxes are at the Church End or Weston Woods approximately a mile away. Councillor Harvey will discuss with a colleague at the District Council and provide contact details.

**Planning:** planning to be discussed and voted by Parish Council – none.

Concerns have been raised about the development on the Paddock, Horseshoe Lane. Councillor Ashbridge to contact the case officer Luke Waddington on behalf of the parish council.



Website update: Councillor Pagonis is in talks with the website company as they want to charge extra fees for additional users; this is being challenged. The proposal is to start with three editors, and for the website to contain useful links, events, and photos of the village. There will not be an open forum, as this will cause GDPR concerns.

#### Road drain clearance and repair update:

Councillor Batchelor is going to chase up the works. There are concerns about the ash trees at the top of Mill Hill, Councillor Garrod raised the issue with highways in January and received a response in August.

**Speed Indicator Device (SID) update:** data was collected from the week the SID was in place in the village on Chapel Road. 743 vehicles passed the device in a week, of which 218 were speeding (40%). Many were in the high 40s and some over 50 mph. The next placements will be further down Common Road on the way out of the village, and heading towards Mill Hill. Data is being collected to put forwards to Highways for traffic calming measures in the village.

**Footpaths and rights of way:** there was a discussion about the bridge north west of College Farm which is



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a vehicular bridge in danger of collapsing, and has not had vehicles over it for many years. Footpath 19 uses the bridge for access to cross the Stour. The bridge has been the cause of some flooding by causing a blockage. It has been reported to CCC on these grounds in the past. The landowners (one from College Farm, and from the land north east of the bridge) are proposing to take it down, and are asking if CCC can help fund this as part of flood prevention measures. Clarification is required for responsibility of reinstating the right of way by putting in a footbridge? Councillor Durham has logged her concerns with Highways. Councillor Batchelor agreed to provide a contact in Highways who deals with bridges.

Village sign: Councillor Ashbridge has repaired the sign.

**Trees:** there is a proposal to chop down the trees by the Reading Room car park to hedge level as many are dead and dying. Allen Scott received a quote from Alexander Talbot to carry out the work for £550. Councillor Ashbridge is going to ask Ashley Garrod to quote too. Ash die back has been witnessed in Lower Wood; The Woodland Trust management plan needs to be consulted on this



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**Playground:** Councillor Jackson was absent from the meeting, so will update on the slide maintenance at Church End at the next meeting. Councillor Hubbard has dealt with all the maintenance concerns at the Recreation Ground.

**Finance:** mandates for bank signatories: signed by Councillor Pagonis and Councillor Ashbridge. Councillor Jackson will sign and return his mandate to Councillor Vidler on his return. Mandates for the RAF Wratting Common Memorial Charity: signed.

Reading Room car park transfer: document to be signed by Councillor Vidler and the Clerk in the presence of Rhodri Rees on Friday 14th September. Rhodri is happy to discuss with the Six Mile Bottom estate taking ownership of the strip of land and the stream at the back of the car park for no additional fees. In twelve years it will be possible to apply for absolute ownership. Clerk to establish a terrier (a register of the lands belonging to a landowner) for parish council land ownership.

Matters for next agenda: Post box; trees by Reading Room car park.

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### West Wratting Parish Council

The following were items discussed at the parish council meeting held on Monday 10th September. The draft minutes are available on the village noticeboards.

#### **Opportunity for public statement:**

1. SisseMcCall spoke about the Mobile Warden Scheme, which would like to see an increase in the donation made by the parish as this has been the same for many years. It will be discussed at the next meeting.

2 She also spoke about the need for refurbishment of the play area. This was discussed later.

3 Colin McCall asked for more volunteers to help pick up litter; ten bags had been collected at Six Mile Bottom Road. He also said that the cross-field footpaths would soon be reinstated once the drilling has been completed.

#### **Finances:**

The Chairman requested that the incomes received from the Tennis Club and the WWFC should be looked at with a view to increasing them and would like it discussed at the budget meeting in January.

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#### Maintenance:

1 Fox Road barriers - no progress as yet. It is hoped that those parties involved will be at the next Combined Parishes meeting.

2 Poo Bins – no progress.

3 Dilapidated building – the council are endeavouring to get something done with regard to the safety of the building.

Correspondence: a request from South Cambs. to draw up an Emergency Plan was discussed and the chairman said he would complete the form and return it.

Recreation ground & pavilion: the chairman is unable to attend the next sports pavilion meeting but his place will be taken by Cllr Roberts. The Ambulance Service had been informed of the code number for the defibrillator and an information notice placed on the equipment. The new gate should soon be in place. There is concern about the parking of cars on the road at the bend but if it happens please inform the police.

Traffic issues & speed restrictions: Cllr Bonfield would like to have another set of speed signs at a cost of approximately £2,000. Funding could possibly be found from the Wadlow Fund. The system is working well. Two new volunteers have offered their services to help with the Speed Watch.

Play area: quotes are being sought for the replacement of the surfacing round the play equipment. Three will be required.

The next parish council meeting will be on Monday 12<sup>th</sup> November; all are welcome to attend.

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### District and County Council Reports

**A1307:** the next meeting of the Local Liaison Forum will be on 12<sup>th</sup> September at 6 pm in Sawston Village College. This is to outline the next steps for the Greater Cambridge Partnership's funding to make upgrades to the road.

On a related note, the stretch of the A1307 from Haverhill past Horseheath is being resurfaced between 17<sup>th</sup> September and 7<sup>th</sup> October. The road won't be closed but there will be a slow 10 mph convoy in place to get the traffic through, so expect delays if you travel this route.

**Local Plan:** we actually have some progress to report this month. South Cambs has the Inspector's report on the SCDC Local Plan submission and is preparing to publish this on Monday 3<sup>rd</sup> September. Following this we need to look at a work plan for moving this forward; most likely it will be brought to the next full council meeting at South Cambs, in September.

**Business Support:** South Cambs is still offering free business support sessions to people who either currently run their own small business or are thinking about starting one up. The sessions are run by NWES, an external non-profit company. More details

**GCSE results:** well done to Linton Village College for recording another excellent set of GCSE results, with 74% of students achieving 5 GCSEs at Grade 4 or above. 20% of students achieved Grade 7 or above (that is equivalent to the old A and A\*; the grades changed to numbers this year). The new pass grade is 4, the equivalent of a C. The old pass was a D.

**Combined Authority:** the Authority is in some disarray with the unexpected departure of the Chief Executive and the surprise appointment of a (now ex) County Councillor as a full time Director. This was relatively well publicised in the local media.

The Government has had to step in to tell the Combined Authority and the Greater Cambridge Partnership to get their acts together and start working together. There have been disputes over who is responsible for road transport improvements. Some large projects have been halted at the insistence of the Mayor. We hope this will not affect the plans for the improvements to the A1307 though our area.

#### Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

It's been an early autumn bonanza for Marsh Tits. We're averaging more than one bird per session. To be fair, we are targeting this rare species, but we are getting hardly any young birds hatched this year. This is worrying news. The only youngster we've found, Red/White over Black on Left 'Sumo', was ringed in Joyce's garden bird bistro on Mill Hill on 21<sup>st</sup> July, then reappeared in Great Coven's Wood on 16<sup>th</sup> September. So the youngsters do travel the 500 metres from the woods to the village in search of food. As broadleaf woodland specialists, they probably use the tall hedgerows and trees to do it.

The take-home message is: if you can see a wood from your garden, please put out sunflower hearts or birdseed in your garden from now until March. The national survival of this beautiful little bird could depend on it.

On the bright side, we are getting adult birds. Four new adults were encountered since the last Challenge, of which half were hatched last year. This year was their first breeding season. If they managed to find a territory in the little deciduous woodland that remains in this part of England, they would have bred. So the number of youngsters – the 'productivity', in ornithological terms – could pick up next year.

Speaking of youngsters, we have a treat for you . . . may I present The Two Florries?

The rather cute and eponymous Florence, (granddaughter of Johnny and Emma Kaye) and proud Dad Philip, and her namesake, Blue over Green over Red 'Florrie' the Marsh Tit, who hatched last year.





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Fabulous! One Florrie keeps talking about the other, but heck, I can't remember which one . . .

My birdringing trainees Rachel and Paul had a treat too: two teenage male Nuthatches – hatched last year

- and an adult female Nuthatch, possibly their mum. The two teens are pictured here (the birds, not the trainees).

Nuthatches are unusual in that they sound just like a guinea pig (thanks for the simile, Duncan) and can turn one of their front



toes around to face backwards. This gives it an X-shaped 'zygodactylous' foot (two toes forward and two back) like a Woodpecker. So, like the latter, it can go up and down tree trunks, but can still use the 'three toes forward, one back' configuration of most other birds. Isn't nature amazing?

The start of term has gone exceptionally smoothly, and it has been lovely to see old faces returning, and to welcome in all our new children and families. The beginning of term is always full of happy smiles, shiny shoes, new jumpers and neat hairstyles; let's hope it lasts! We are especially proud of our youngest Early Years children and how well they have adapted to school life. Hardly a tear has been shed, and they have adapted to their new learning environment very quickly. - All healthy children aged 2 to 4 years of age as of 1<sup>st</sup> September 2018. Please note that children aged 5 to 9 years (but not 10 years or older on 31<sup>st</sup> August 2018) should be vaccinated in school
- Please speak to your local practice nurse if you have any queries about this
- Clinically eligible patients, aged 6 months to 17 years and 18 to 64 years of age
- Pregnant women
- Those aged 65 years and over
- Those in long-stay residential care homes
- Carers.

If you are a patient registered with Granta Medical Practices you have the flexibility of choosing where you would like to go for your vaccination. When you ring to book your appointment, please state your age so that you can be booked into the appropriate clinic.

#### Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service

Follow our 'top tips' to ensure your home is kept safe and warm all year round.

#### **Chimneys and Fires**

• Have your chimney swept once a year or more frequently if you burn wood

- Avoid burning resinous woods that quickly build up soot
- Only burn fuels suitable for your burner (ie never burn anything other than wood in a wood burner)
- Do not overload the grate/ appliance
- Do not bank fires too high and remember to let them burn out well before you go to bed
- Check the hearth, floor and furnishings near the fire for hot sparks/embers
- Do not place objects on or over the mantelpiece which cause you to stand too close to the fire in order to reach them
- Use a fire/spark guard to prevent accidental fires and make sure it has the kite mark or conforms to British/ European standards
- Inspect your chimney breast, particularly the roof space. Make sure it is sound and sparks/fumes cannot escape through cracks or broken bricks.

#### Wood/Multi-Fuel Burners

- A qualified and competent engineer should install all wood/multi-fuel burners and boilers – regular maintenance should be undertaken to prolong the working life of the appliance. Specialist servicing and maintenance will usually be provided by the company you purchase the appliance from but you can also refer to *www.solidfuel.co.uk* for advice and information
- Ensure correct ventilation is in place when the appliance is in use
- Wood burning appliances should only use the right quality wood recommended by the supplier
- Regularly inspect the chimney and flues
- Generally wood should be well-seasoned (usually wood kept dry and stored for around two years)





- Avoid wet or newly felled wood as this will cause tars/ creosote deposits to form in the burning appliance and chimney
- Using laminated chip boards will leave binding glue deposits
- For each slow burning period there should follow a quick burn to dry out unwanted tar/creosote deposits and to warm up the chimney again
- At the end of each burning season and at least once during the season the entire system should be cooled and thoroughly cleaned to maintain top performance.

#### Most importantly

- Fit a smoke alarm that carries the kite mark or British Standard Number 5446 and test your alarm weekly by pressing the test button, and know the life of your battery
- Always also install a CO alarm in the room where the burner is installed. Chimney fires continue to be a common occurrence in home fires in the winter months.
- We experience an average of 81 chimney fires a year in Cambridgeshire alone.
- Whatever fire you have, or fuel you burn, it is vitally important you have your chimney swept to avoid a build-up of ash and soot.
