

Our book for March was 'WarLight' by Michael Ondaatje.

This book is set in the years after the war, based in London to begin with but then set in various parts of England and around the world. It looks back at what preceded the opening events and the later consequences. It is based around two children left with a friend to look after them while their parents are away. However, all is not as it seems and they become more and more involved in the shadowy world of their guardian and his mysterious associates. All present had thoroughly enjoyed this book, with comments ranging from an amazing storyteller, beautifully written with a strong ending, really enjoyed, brilliant. One person felt that it was not necessarily pleasurable but was a good read. Others reminisced about their own experiences of the London canals and River Lea which make up a major part of the story. Slight criticisms were that that it dipped in the middle and one or two people were uncertain about the way it was structured. The quest for the past is compelling and the history of certain aspects of post Second World War events, in England and abroad, fascinating. All would recommend it, with scores varying but an average score of 8 out of 10.

When we start to see other people and the world around us in this light, we recognise that discerning God's presence and seeking to do acts of lovingkindness are not just marks of Lent, but a way of being and doing which can help us walk through an open door into a world transfigured by grace.

Beware of Scams

Scams come in all shapes and sizes, with it being estimated that every year over 3 million people fall victim to scammers, losing $\pounds 5 - 10$ billion in the process. In addition to the financial detriment, the effect on health and wellbeing can be devastating. No one is immune, with all ages being targeted. However, senior citizens are a favourite target, with the average age of a victim being 75.

Scams range from people knocking on your door, to fraudsters trying to get your personal details online. The criminals attempt to trick you with official looking documents and websites, convincing telephone sales patter and texts, with the aim of persuading you to either:

- 1. Give them your internet passwords or your bank details never do this
- 2. Send a processing or administration fee
- 3. Pay postal or insurance cost
- 4. Buy an overvalued product or have unnecessary work done
- 5. Get you to make a premium rate phone call.

We can all help to tackle scammers by reporting people targeting you or those you know.

Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

One important thing you can do now to aid local breeding of Marsh Tits and other birds is to put out nesting material. Cotton, wool and natural fibre lint from your clothes drier filter is ideal. Put it into an empty peanut feeder to stop the fluff blowing around your garden. It's free, direct recycling and rarely offered, so a magnet for breeding birds and a lot cheaper than peanuts for bringing birds into your garden!

I have lots of clean cotton lint to spare, as I've been collecting it for years. (Yes, I'm a recycling devotee.) West Wratting Parish Council

At the meeting held on 11th March the following items were discussed. Drafts of the minutes are posted on the village noticeboards and shown on the website.

Footpaths: Colin McCall would like more volunteers to help with keeping the footpaths in good order, particularly for the Weston Colville area.

Parish Council Vacancy: Barry Glennon-Lynch was co-opted onto the council following a vote after being proposed by the Chairman and seconded by Cllr Roberts.

Jacqueline Douglas (Community Worker under the Parish Nurse Plus Project) spoke of her role in supporting the Parish Nurse, her areas being West Wratting, West Wickham and Weston Colville, in finding out the needs of people with regard to transport, activities, facilities and a key part is to access services. Age UK and Reach are associated with this scheme. A Community Hub meeting will be held each month in Balsham Institute as advertised in Challenge where all those involved in the scheme will be on hand to help and advise. Finance: details in the draft minutes.

West Wratting Village Hall: the chairman, Mike Rowland, is hoping to raise funds to cover the cost of replacing the folding doors without using parish council funds. He agreed that any large project would be carried out by the parish council as they could reclaim VAT.

Recreation Ground & Pavilion: the next meeting on 13th March will discuss gating the grounds. The management committee also wishes to apply to create boreholes for watering the pitches.

Traffic Issues:

- a) Access to High Street from Spicers Close the residents of Spicers Close wish to put up a mirror to help with access to the High Street. A decision/ visit is awaited. If the mirror was positioned on private property this would be acceptable but would require planning permission.
- b) *Footpath along Six Mile Bottom Road* this is a good idea and District Cllr Batchelor suggested applying to Greater Cambridge Partnerships who are keen to promote and fund cycleways.
- c) *Play Area* Ben Willcocks, Cllr Chandler, Cllr Glennon-Lynch and Alex Brown had discussed the options, being: a) tidying up and repairing those items reported by RoSPA, and jet washing surfaces for the present, followed by b) a major design for a completely new play area. Two schemes have already been looked at and another is expected. The cost will be approximately £60,000 - 80,000, so a great deal of fund raising would be needed. It is hoped to put these designs on display at a Saturday Café morning.

Weston Colville Parish Council

At the meeting on Monday 4th March the following items were discussed and where necessary agreed.

Emma Knight from SCDC will be attending the next Combined Parishes Meeting to listen to concerns raised about the Icknield Way Byway, before opening the consultation about gating it; sufficient evidence has been provided by Weston Colville, more is needed from the other villages.

Planning – S/0691/19/FL Weston Woods Farm, Common Road, Weston Colville – replacement/new farm buildings and drainage attenuation within existing farmstead. No objections; buildings will not be visible from the road or by the public and are for agricultural use.

Website update – the website is ready, the next stage is securing a domain name, and email addresses. Photographs of the village and councillors to be added, and all the council policies and standing orders, and a section for Challenge. The clerk has enquired with CAPALC whether any Transparency Funding is available to add the minutes and agenda from previous years.

Road drain clearance and repair update – no update. A missing highways manhole cover was reported in Church End for Cllr Batchelor to chase.

Footpaths and rights of way – Cllr Batchelor to enquire about possible routes for redirecting footpath 19, as replacing the bridge would be very costly for the land owners. Also enquiring about installing a bridge for the footpath by the Methodist Chapel.

Dog waste bin – working party required; Cllr Jackson is to organise a working party to swap the small red bin from the cricket pitch with the new bin, and to site the small bin on the opposite side of the road next to the footpath. Once this has occurred the clerk is to inform SCDC for their collections.

Tenders for grass cutting for 2019 – four tenders were received for grass cutting of the amenity sites and cutting the verges. Following a discussion it was proposed that Trevor Potter would continue to cut the verges, and the clerk was instructed to discuss fees with another party, and if resolved to instruct them to cut the amenities.

Date for the meeting in May – the clerk cannot attend the meeting on 20^{th} May, or 13^{th} May. The

Annual Parish Meeting and Parish Council Meeting will be at 7 pm on Wednesday 15th May.

Traffic calming – a brief discussion was held with Cllr Batchelor; a Highways Officer needs to be paid to inspect the area before an application is submitted. Cllr Batchelor to look into the cut-off date for the application.

Gritting – there have been complaints from parishioners about the lack of gritting on The Green and Common Road, the route used by public and school buses. Cllr Batchelor to enquire with Highways.

Playground – for the annual playground inspection, ROSPA has quoted £95 per area (plus VAT) and requires an additional £38 fee if the clerk attends the inspection. An independent inspector, David Bracey, has quoted £135 plus VAT to inspect both areas, which the clerk can attend for no extra fee. Clerk instructed to appoint David Bracey.

Reports by County Cllr Harvey & District Cllr Batchelor

Council Tax – both the County and District Councils have the ability to raise council tax each year. They (almost) always take this option up and have both done so this year, with the District raising their rates by 3.56% and the County raising their rates by 4.98%.

Neighbourhood Plan – congratulations to Great Abington Parish Council for being the first parish in South Cambs to get their Neighbourhood Plan adopted, a long and arduous process. We will be meeting with the cabinet member responsible shortly to see if there are any prospects of simplifying and speeding up the process.

Shire Hall – the County Council is relocating to Alconbury, in an attempt to save money by not using the expensive Shire Hall location.

The QuickSticks hockey tournament took place in Comberton, where the children were playing against other schools from across Cambridgeshire. We are always very proud of how well the children represent The Meadow School, with a fantastic 'have-a-go' attitude and politeness towards other players. We are looking forward to seeing how the school gets on in the forthcoming Tag Rugby tournament and Cross-Country competition.

March 7th was World Book day, where we spent the whole day immersed in 'The Lost Words' by Robert MacFarlane and Jackie Morris. 
While less rural areas may be more prone to criminal behaviours, this does not make villages such as Linton immune to them.

In recent months we have developed stronger educational links with Cambridgeshire Constabulary. Our students have benefited from police sessions entitled 'What's the Point?' including an appreciation of the facts and consequences of carrying weapons. The police have also contributed to input about county lines (gangs that target young people to take and sell drugs across county borders). It is important that our children are aware of practices that seek to exploit them and entice them into criminal behaviours.

Peer pressure has become more sophisticated and significant with the development of technological communication and mobility. Research into the rise in online grooming, facilitated by social media platforms, has coincided with a spike in adolescent mental health issues.

The African proverb 'it takes a village to raise a child' is particularly relevant at the moment. More than ever, our young people need responsible adults in their communities to keep them safe and prevent them from seeking acceptance by more dangerous means. Reporting concerns to the college (*thinkpink@lvc.org*), the police (*www.cambs.police.uk/report/Report-Shared/ Report-a-concern*) and students' families is integral to this.

Balsham Gardening Club



For our February meeting our own member Alice Warley, very expertly told us about her experiences of plants

of the Sonoran desert, in Arizona. Alice has been visiting a friend in this region for several years. Her knowledge and enthusiasm for these seemingly desolate areas was evident and we were surprised to learn about the abundant plant life, its uses, and how it is adapted to this harsh environment. The Sonoran desert covers approximately 250,000 square miles, half being in the USA and half in Mexico, in the state of Sonoro.

The Oxford English dictionary describes a desert as 'an uncultivated, sparsely inhabited tract of land, a wilderness, now specifically a waterless and treeless region'. It can also be described as a place where water demand exceeds supply!

Alice informed us that temperatures in the summer could reach 48° C. In the winter rainfall is a light drizzle, the majority of the rain falls in the monsoon season between July & September, but this rain runs off the land. The climate is subtropical.

Despite dictionary definitions, apart from the obvious cacti & Agave plants, flowering trees and shrubs do survive in this region, as Alice's slides revealed.

One interesting species is The Saguaro it is a protected tree like cactus, which grows to over 40 feet tall and is the Arizona state symbol. The plant may live to over 200 years old. It produces white waxy flowers between April & June, and a red fruit 6-9 inches long which ripen in June. The flowers open at sunset and produce a perfume, which during the day attracts hummingbirds and gila woodpeckers to the nectar. Bats & moths are the main pollinators. The native Tohono O'odham people harvest the fruit in June & July, and the families stew it for several hours to make a sweet syrup.

Alice explained that desert plants are not dull, they provide structure & make an attractive garden but she advised to plant our desert loving plants well in advance as they can take a lifetime to grow!

With our hotter summers, next month's speaker will prove very useful to us all, gardeners or not. On Tuesday 2nd April in the Meadow school, 7.15 for 7.30 pm, we will have a presentation from Anglia Water on 'Water Conservation'. There will be light refreshments and a raffle. Guests £3. All welcome.

David's Expedition

Cambodia is a beautiful country, but has a dark side that I have attempted to bring light to.

In Laos I decided to paddle to Vietnam and document the plastic tide down the Mekong. This was a massive learning curve, as my first kayaking expedition, in a country that I'd never been to, which speaks little to no English, and solo at that!

The owner of the hostel in Don Det was doubtful that my homemade hammock would work so gave me one of his old and slightly broken ones. This set a trend and I was given gifts of food and little bits and pieces that I could not find in the Loatian markets. This was a great confidence booster and I will always be grateful for the parting gifts and support from backpackers just before I left.

I can understand why around the mooring sites in a town there was so much rubbish generated by the river people. With no easy alternatives, and lack of knowledge on plastic leakage etc, the fishermen discard all their rubbish on the bank because any extra weight that they and their family generate just slows their boat down and costs them more in fuel.

Although there was a lot of rubbish on the sides of the

river, I found very little floating in the river. There were several occasions that I found it in mangroves, which essentially act as natural filters for the rivers, and again in fishing





traps, where the only thing the fishermen caught was plastic. Hopefully this means that most of the rubbish that the fishermen make is deposited on land, but I doubt this. It doesn't matter, as I would predict that come monsoon season, it all gets washed down to the sea anyway.

At Ruessej Chrouy, 25 km north of Cambodia's capital Phnom Penh, the beach was around 2 km long, completely filled with rubbish, with a couple of hundred people milling about their everyday business. With many beautifully decorated fishing boats moored to the bank, it was clear this was a popular site to sell the goods the Mekong provided. Families ate, worked and lived in this rubbish heap, but didn't seem to mind.



From this point onwards, even when there were no buildings on the banks, I still couldn't paddle more than 5 m without paddling past a piece of plastic. Ranging from full bin bags to small bottle caps, it was everywhere. All the way down to Vietnam, the problem stayed pretty constant and almost certainly got worse further into the delta,

At one point, on a beach where a lot of plastic had washed up, I saw a man and his son walking down and collecting the bottle caps (made from a valuable plastic that can be recycled) to sell back to the companies. They also collected aluminium cans and glass bottles that are heavily recycled in Cambodia (or sent or sold to another country for recycling) and have been so for some time. It was unclear if this was how

they made the majority of their money, but they were definitely there for profit and not to clean the beaches. This was still encouraging, as it shows that there is value in other people's rubbish, which could be a turning point if everyone was aware of this.

Plastic Free Cambodia are leading the charge on educating local people and organizations in the importance of living plastic free lives, or at least close as to them as possible, and I would like to thank everyone that contributes to such a great organization. I am so proud to be raising money for a program that has such a great leadership and education mission.

Thanks to everyone who has donated, or will donate. I have been humbled by your generosity, which has spurred me on since I made my Go Fund Me page (*gf.me/u/q3w73p*). Please carry on sharing the campaign and its updates, as this was the main aim for creating the page, although the money is greatly appreciated by myself, Plastic Free Cambodia and Surfers Against Sewage.
