



West Wratting Book Club

Our first book for 2019 was the well known classic, 'Great Expectations' by Charles Dickens.

Several people had read this on at least one occasion previously but enjoyed re-visiting it. It was suggested that Dickens' portrayal of women was suggestive of misogyny, particularly in his portrayal of Pip, the hero's sister and, in a different way, Miss Havisham. However, he is a good observer and philosopher. Comments included: a wonderful book, amazing stories and nicely drawn characters, extraordinary

language, a tapestry of plots. He has a very dense writing style with perhaps too long and detailed descriptions which can make it hard work at times. However, it is well worth staying with it. There are also a lot of 'coincidences' but it was pointed out by one of our number that such things can happen in real life, giving one or two examples. It was considered a book of its time, perhaps drawing from events happening at the time of writing. The descriptions of the characters are extreme to the point of caricature but can be considered pointed satire, in particular aimed at class differences and the law. The development of Pip's character is well done but one person thought the ending disappointing. It was pointed out that this may have been because the original ending was considered too unhappy, not least by the contemporary author and close friend of Dickens, Wilkie Collins, and re-written. All would recommend it with the proviso that one has to be prepared to allow plenty of time to read it. Scores were between 8 and 10 out of 10. The film of this will be shown on Wednesday 6th February at the Weston Colville Film Club.

Our February book will be 'Melmoth', the latest book by Sarah Perry. We will meet on 13th February to discuss this and then on Wednesday 13th March to talk about 'WarLight' by Michael Ondaatje.

From the Rectory

By now I feel I have Brexit indigestion. In the morning, I turn on the radio to hear it's a 'Brexit Breakfast'. There is even a 'Brexit Barometer' gauging fluctuations in



public opinion. For the time being, we seem trapped in a peculiarly British groundhog day, with a succession of momentous events seemingly leaving us exactly where we were before. The one thing commentators do seem to agree on is that it's a time of uncertainty and upheaval.

For most of us, however, uncertainty and upheaval are woven into the fabric of our lives. The Christian faith has often reflected on this. The bible speaks frequently of the uncertainties and upheavals encountered by the people of Israel and the early Christians. It shows how this formed them into a pilgrim people, who in these crucible moments realised their reliance upon God's guidance, like a light shining in the darkness.

This powerful image is given special prominence in the Christian festival of Candlemas, celebrated in early February. It's one of the most ancient of Christian festivals, dating back at least to the

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4th century. Its focus is the story of the presentation of Jesus in the temple as a six week old baby and the prophetic words given by two people in that temple, Simeon and Anna. In this baby they see a 'light for revelation'. Candlemas also often uses candles as a symbol of Jesus as the 'light of the world'.

The light of Christ can show us things about ourselves: the good, the bad and everything in between.

It's also a light which does not overwhelm us, but may guide us in our lives through all the uncertainties and upheavals we may face. This is summed up in the poetic and prophetic words from Luke's gospel, sometimes known as the Benedictus: 'in the tender compassion of our God, the dawn from on high shall break upon us, to shine on those who dwell in darkness and the shadow of death, and to guide our feet into the way of peace'.

West Wratting Parish Council

The following items were some of the matters discussed at the parish council meeting held on Monday 14th January. The draft minutes are available on the village noticeboards.

- 1. Opportunity for public statement: Colin McCall, in charge of footpaths, reported that these were in reasonable order and all had been reinstated. He reminded parishioners that those who have hedges on to the pavement or road should be checking whether or not they need cutting back.
- 2. Kelly Austin (Social Navigator, Granta Medical **Practice**) said she was employed by the practice on a two year contract and was visiting all the medical centres who are now part of the Granta Practice.



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Her job is to keep in touch with patients referred by doctors, district nurses or the parish nurse and assist them in finding the right person to talk to about their needs. She hopes that people in need of help or information will get in touch with her. Her email is k.austin1@nhs.net

3. Parish Councillor vacancy by co-option: the parish councillor vacancy will be filled by co-option.

4. Finances

- 1. The cheques were authorised and signed.
- 2. The precept for 2019/2020 was discussed and the chairman proposed a 3% increase, which would be an extra £341.00. A vote was taken and all agreed.

5. Maintenance:

- 1. Fox Road barriers the Traffic Regulation Order has not yet reached the consultation stage due to the person involved being on long-term sick leave. However Emma Knight has now taken on this job and will be in touch with those villages involved.
- 2. *Car parking on pavements* the ecops were asked by Cllr Lock what could be done and they said anyone seeing a vehicle parked on the pavement should ring 101 and an officer would be sent out to get the vehicle removed

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
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- 6. Additional Policies: the chairman had reviewed the existing standing orders and suggested that the policies set out by Mike Rowland for the village hall could be added to these and would cover everything at present lacking in the standing orders.
- **7. West Wratting Village Hall:** replacement of folding doors it was suggested that the village hall committee first apply to the Community Chest for funding.
- **8. Traffic Issues & Speed Restrictions:** there have been problems with the SIDs not recording correctly and Trevor Hall from West Wickham will contact SWARCO about this. The purchase of another SID would be useful.








9. **Play area:** quotes are being sought for the replacement of the surfacing round the play equipment but the committee of three are now considering doing a total refurbishment with the purchase of new equipment and are therefore contacting various play equipment companies to come and look at the site and quote for a suitable scheme. This could be a project where parents of children using the play area could volunteer to be involved in this worthwhile scheme.

The next parish council meeting will be on Monday 11th March; all are welcome to attend.

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Weston Colville Parish Council

At the meeting on Monday 7th January the following items were discussed and where necessary agreed.

District and County Council Reports and Items of Interest: District Councillor Henry Batchelor and County Councillor Geoff Harvey delivered their reports. County Council will be carrying out improvement works on the A1307 in the summer (a new bus lane, easier turning access for lorries at Dalehead Foods, and new traffic lights, and more bicycle racks at the Babraham Park and Ride). District Council has secured money for pothole repair, and the mobile library scheme is continuing. An ice rink is being built near Marshalls. South Cambs District Council (SCDC) aim to be 0% carbon emissions free by 2050. Cllr Harvey now has a seat on the A1307 strategy board.

Parishioners' Question Time: a parishioner has complained about the new dog waste/litter bin that has been placed outside his house – following a request from parishioners during the November meeting. He advised that there used to be a lidded bin on a post on the opposite side of the road, and is concerned about vermin with the open style bin. It was suggested that the lidded bin at the cricket pitch be swapped with the new bin, which would be of more use for litter, and for it to be positioned on the post. Clerk to liaise with Cllr Harvey, and Arnie Leader from SCDC.

Emergency Plan: to update the Emergency Plan for the village. Recommended the use of the recreation ground, Reading Room and church in case of an emergency. SCDC to receive an authorised users contact list. The location of the defibrillator to be noted. Sandbags are available on a pallet if there is somewhere to store them under cover. Cllr Durham to update SCDC.

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Planning

Planning to be discussed and voted by parish council – S/4655/18/PA, conversion of barn to dwelling, Linnet Hall Barn, Road to Linnet Hall, Weston Colville, CB21 5PF – out for consultation. No objections, all in favour.

Weston Woods Update – Cllrs Vidler, Jackson, and Garrod attended a meeting in November, to discuss potential changes to farmyard prior to planning being sought. No objections are likely as the new agricultural buildings will not be visible from the road, or by the public.

Matters in Hand/ Arising since last meeting

Website update – Cllr Pagonis has looked into a company that specialises in websites for parish councils, which would cost £299 to create, however it would then charge £10 a month for each user registered. Cllr Pagonis then suggested that his company could set up the website for a one-off fee, and then step away, offering no follow-up support, allowing as many users as were required, for £50.

Road drain clearance and repair update – there is a proposal for a larger gully at Church End or relocating the gully completely. Works will not commence until



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the next financial year. Cllr Batchelor will continue to chase Highways.

Speed Indicator Device (SID) update – Cllr Hubbard was not present, and so will update fully at the next meeting. A high volume of traffic has been noted coming in from Haverhill direction, with speeds of up to 65 mph. Wadlow Windfarm have provided grants towards traffic calming measures, to be investigated before the deadline in July.

Footpaths and Rights of Way: bridge over Stour, Footpath 19 – no repair has occurred yet. There is a proposal to move the footpath, Cllr Durham to update at the next meeting.

Tree Warden: Cllr Garrod attended training at the end of November, which discussed who owns the trees in a Cambridgshire Village Treescape, and which authority to contact with concerns. Awaiting further training dates.

Post Box: the post box has been in place since before Christmas, but Cllr Ashbridge was advised by Royal Mail that it would not be open for use until 12th January.

Matters for the Council to Discuss/Vote on

Tenders for grass cutting for 2019 – Cllr Garrod has received some quotes and is waiting for others for cutting the verges and the recreation areas and war memorial. To be agreed at the next meeting.

Icknield Way – the council has been advised to contact the officer at SCDC directly with relevant information. A letter has been received by a parishioner, which contains views shared by many that gating the bridleway will discourage fly tipping and travellers, and allow better use for all. Proposal to gate on the condition that land owners have full access. All in favour. Clerk to scan and send the parishioner's letter to the officer in charge at SCDC.

Age UK – A letter has been received asking to increase the annual contribution from £250 to £450. The contribution is paid for by the Briggs Gift, and it is not an affordable increase. Clerk to write to Age UK advising them of this, advising them that it was increased last year, and in the current climate all the parish council can afford is £250. All in favour.

Reading Room car park transfer update – no update, Rhodri Rees has sent the completed documents into Cambridgeshire County Council. Clerk to ask Cllrs Batchelor and Harvey to chase CCC.

Draft Budget – presented and discussed. There will not be a Reading Room layby, and all s106 funds have been allocated. Clerk training will be paid for by her other employer, as the council receives a bursary from the Local Association of Councils.



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Marsh Tit Study

Your Marsh Tits are feeding like crazy at present, trying to get a look-in at feeders past the hungry hordes of bolshie Goldfinches and big Greenfinches. Please keep an eye out for their colour rings and put some sunflower hearts out, high up near deciduous bushes where they're safe from cats and Sparrowhawks. As always, we're grateful for ringed and unringed sightings, reported to me (cambsmarti@gmail.com), Mel (m_stammers@btinternet.com) or Challenge.

And . . . Valentine's Day is nearly upon us. Traditionally, this is the day that the birds pair up to nest. If you've been listening in the garden or the woods, you'll know that the birds have been singing their territories (roughly translated as "Gerroff, You!" and "Hello, Ladies!") since late December or early January, so the idea that that birds wait until February to choose nesting areas is a bit out of date, in more ways than one. For example, for the last two years, I've had Blue Tits rummaging through my empty nestbox (whose hole is too small for Great Tits) and Great Tits carefully inspecting my study window ledge as a prospective nesting site. In October!

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The ubiquity of global warming can be seen in migrants that breed here. For example, Blackcaps and Chiffchaffs are now regularly seen over winter in places where they were previously absent. Joyce saw Blackcaps in Weston Colville last December. The latest report on the State of the UK's Birds shows this to be a national trend (https://www.rspb.org.uk/globalassets/downloads/documents/conservation-science/220-0653-17-18-sukb-2017-web-20-3-18.pdf). The advantages for the birds is they get first pick of the best breeding sites when spring comes around, and they're not exhausted and hungry from the exertions of migration (and no risk of getting shot for the table as ambelopoulia, of course).

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The Meadow School

The new year is always a good time to help children stop and reflect on the past year and engage them in looking forward to new beginnings. It has been fascinating listening to our children talk confidently and hopefully about their future. In times of great uncertainty within the nation, it is refreshing to hear children aim high with such positivity.

This year we spoke to the children about what the term 'resolution' meant and what the origin of the word was. We discussed how 're' in resolution means repeat, or replay. This is really important for children to understand, as so many children just give up once they have been unsuccessful a first time. We constantly refer to resilience and perseverance at school, and we know that a resilient child will be more successful in the long term. We do a number of activities within school to help foster these capabilities, including Forest School, child-initiated learning, project work, and open ended topics. Knowledge is key to a child's progress, but they also need to know what to do when faced with uncertainty or disappointment, to reflect on the challenges and make a new plan for success. Further to our discussion on the term 'resolution' we looked at how



to separate salt from water in a salt 'solution'. It was a great image to help children understand how we can keep starting again when things have gone wrong. We hope that this representation of a New Year resolution will stick with children as they go through the year, and help them to remember that every day is the opportunity for a new beginning.

The start of a year always means the start of new topics and learning within school. January was full of exciting entry points for topics, with every year group going out of school on a trip. When we talk with the children about what they enjoy most about their learning, top of the list is always trips which enrich their learning. The trips taking place this term have been no different. Year 5 and 6 spent the day at Stibbington as evacuees to start their World War Two topic. The children thoroughly enjoyed their time spent at school, enjoying a typical 1940's playtime, playing games such as skipping and hoops. Some of the children even enjoyed their World War Two lunch of Spam sandwiches! The surprise air raid drill was a particular highlight as the children had to head out to the Morrison shelter and experience what is was like to 'keep calm and carry on' until the all clear was given. Hearing the buzz of conversations as they

arrived back in school, with teachers and children commenting on the best trip 'ever', made it evident how important these 'Living History' days are.



Year 3 and 4 spent the day learning how to be polar explorers with a trip to the Polar Museum in Cambridge, as part of their topic 'Into the Freezer'. The children were taught about the history of polar expeditions, dressing up in readiness for an expedition, and exploring the artefacts from many famous expeditions, including Sir Ernest Shackleton's. We have definitely inspired a whole generation of polar explorers!

The Infants enjoyed a wonderful day at Duxford Imperial War Museum, in readiness for their flight topic 'Up, Up and Away.' They loved looking at the aeroplanes up close, walking on Concorde and listening to the volunteers talk so knowledgeably about the aircraft.

Marsh Mail

We know that the teenage years are important ones for young adults to develop their own sense of personal identity and independence. As with other key childhood developmental stages, adolescence is characterised by testing boundaries, experimenting with risk-taking and forging connections with others.

Significant advances in technology have dramatically changed our students' means of being able to communicate and has transformed the experience of being a teenager. While this has created many benefits not afforded to previous generations, it has also made the teenage years more challenging to navigate. The fear of missing out is more acute when you can view others' social lives in real time. The pressure to be connected and seek others' approval is much enhanced, as is the opportunity to behave in a way that causes others upset or harm.

Internet Safety Day, on 5th February, has the theme 'Together for a better internet', and seeks to raise awareness of online safeguarding issues but also to spark a national conversation about using technology responsibly, respectfully, critically and creatively. Our student Digital Leaders play a key role in this.

One of our key expectations at LVC is to behave in a caring way to contribute to a safe community. This includes students and staff taking responsibility for their own safety as well as noticing and reporting changes or concerns in others, including bullying.

This duty of care extends beyond the college. The dedicated safeguarding email account (thinkpink@lvc.org) provides an opportunity for community members to contact the College with concerns about children's welfare and to share safeguarding information that poses a risk to children.

We are also working in partnership with the local police to safeguard the college community. Their involvement in drugs education for our January PSHE day is one example of this.
