West Wratting Book Club

Our February book was 'Melmoth', Sarah Perry's follow up to 'The Essex Serpent'.

This book was, to a great extent, a reworking of the 1820 Gothic novel 'Melmoth the Wanderer' by Charles Maturin, an Irish playwright and clergyman, which itself has echoes of the story of the Wandering Jew. In particular, the conceit of having a number of different stories within the main story echoes the structure of Maturin's book but the sex of the eponymous character is changed from male to female. These stories detail the histories and actions of those touched by Melmoth in varying historical eras and countries.

All agreed that it was a very dark story, with one of our number, who described it as very depressing and grim, unable to finish it. Other comments were that it was not pleasurable to read and had nothing nice

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about it. Although another person agreed with these comments she felt that it did have more to it which redeemed it, reflecting certain human truths and the guilts, whether small or great, that we all carry and the way in which this can affect us. However, two of our number enjoyed it despite the dark themes and grimness. One of those identified particularly with the main setting of Prague. It was granted that it was brilliantly written, with certain scenes beautifully described, and it was written very cleverly. It was felt by one person that the ending gave no feeling of hope although another thought that there was a hint of redemption and a happier future for one character. Having recently read 'Great Expectations' it was agreed that one of the characters reminded us of Miss Havisham

Given the differing views, it was not surprising that scores varied from 4 out of 10 to 8.5. Some felt that they could not recommend it while at least one person felt they would do so to those who enjoyed Gothic novels, with a 'health warning'.

We will next meet at The Chestnut Tree at 8 pm on Wednesday 13th March to talk about 'WarLight' by Michael Ondaatje.

been baptized in the River Jordan and experienced a revelation affirming his identity as the Son of God. He was then led into the wilderness to discover more about what it meant to be the Son of God and maybe see the world anew.

Lent can also be a time when we renew our vision. Do we need to take a step back from our regular pattern of doing things to see with a different perspective? Do we need to review our priorities and be transformed by the renewing of our minds? Perhaps in doing so, we may become more aware of the sheer wonder of being human and of the pearl of great price, which is the presence of God in our lives. *Revd Iain McColl*

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Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

We have good news this month.

So far, 59 resightings of colour-ringed Marsh Tits were submitted by resighters this year. Eight colourringed Marsh Tits have been seen, so have survived the winter. Not one of them is under two years old. A special mention in resighting despatches goes to Joyce Oliver, Dr John Rogers, Anne Bragg, and Ben Eeles. Well done, all!

Two years is the usual age at which wild Marsh Tits go to meet their Maker, so round here the Marsh Tits are long-lived. In fact, very long-lived: three of the birds seen – Red over White over Black on Left 'Guvnor', Red over White over Green on Left 'Useless Eustace' and Black over Red on Left 'Moaty' – are two years old or more; two are at least four years old (double the wild lifespan) and three – Red over Green on Left 'King Charles the First', White over Green on Left 'Pacer' and Red over Black on Left 'Rob' – are at least five years old! This is astonishing for a species in steep decline elsewhere in the UK.

Please keep your eyes peeled for these old ladies and gents, and especially the young pretenders. 'Guvnor' has been making his presence felt across Weston Colville, from the northwestern end of Mill Hill south as far as the edge of civilisation by the old Methodist Chapel along Chapel Road, where the farmland begins. Reports please to me (*cambsmarti@gmail.com*), Mel (*m_stammers@btinternet.com*) or Challenge. Thank you for helping these rare and charismatic birds.



And for something completely different: thanks to the generosity of the Wadlow Wind Farm Fund and Mackays of Cambridge, we are acquiring two camera

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feeders. One has just started trials, and has already achieved a first: two colour-ringed Marsh Tits in the

same photo! These birds are Red over White over Green 'Useless Eustace' and a partially identified bird. where we can only see a solitary Black ring on the left leg. This could be one of three birds: Green Right, Black Left 'Lord Sparkington',



Red Right, Black Left 'Baron von Richthofen' or Yellow Right, Black Left 'Dexter'. It's early spring and birds are likely to be going about in pairs. Useless Eustace is an adult with a wing length of 64 mm, making him almost certainly male (97% certainty, according to the Marsh Tit guru and my mentor, Dr Richard Broughton). So Black Ring on Left is probably female. With an adult wing length of 61 - 62 mm, 'Lord Sparkington' is in fact 100% Lady Sparkington. The Red Baron has a wing length of 66 mm, making us 97% sure he's male, and 'Dexter's 62 - 63 mm wing makes us 83% certain of her femininity. Thus, it's reasonable to rule out the Red Baron (who's only been seen twice anyway, the last time in November 2017).

Update on David's Expedition

It has been three weeks since I arrived in Laos. My initial positive impression of the country and its people hasn't altered; in fact, the longer I stay here, the more I find myself falling in love with every aspect that this country has to offer.

Everyone recycles cans and glass bottles here. There are constantly beer crates full with empty bottles



outside restaurants, waiting to be sent back to BeerLao. They also collect the tins and send them to a recycling plant and get paid for the material. Why? Because they don't burn . . . that's right, everything that can be burnt and turned into ash, will be.

They don't have a central landfill for non-recyclables. Instead, they make big piles of rubbish and burn it. In Indonesia, they were used to using natural materials and so rubbish that they threw into the river would go back to the land and degrade in a short amount of time. When plastic came around, they did what they had been doing for hundreds of years and threw it into the river, creating the situation they now have.

The next part of my journey involves kayaking down the Mekong through Cambodia.

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The Meadow School

Spring term always feels like a quick one, and as teachers met to discuss children's progress at Parents' Evenings this week, it suddenly dawned on them that we are already half way through another academic year.

Along with the sunshine outside, the school environment suddenly appears much brighter. Teachers have worked hard to put their displays up around school, each display purposefully planned to match the learning of each year group. As you walk around school, it is clear to see the progression across the school, with photographs of the very youngest children learning in their environment, to pages of beautifully neat writing or art work from our older children.



This term, Year 5 and 6 have been immersing themselves in World War Two, and grappling with very adult themes of appeasement and the rights and wrongs of war. Although we might dismiss talking to our children about these topics in

current affairs, the maturity of the discussions which have taken place in class have made it very clear that given the right skills, our children are not only able to understand these themes but that they also have very strong opinions themselves!

One of the defining elements of each topic this term, has been the access to quality children's literature linked to each topic. Years 5 and 6 have been reading 'Good Night Mr Tom' by Michelle Magorian. The children have absolutely loved exploring the themes



of evacuation through the book and have written some amazing emotive diaries. In Years 3 and 4, the children have continued their interest in the Polar regions through the fantastic book 'Ice Palace' by Robert Swindells. This book is excellent for teaching new vocabulary and the children have used the book to write their own endings to the story, using the new language they have learnt. In Years 1 and 2, the teachers have used a beautifully illustrated wordless picture book called 'Journey' by Aaron Becker. The children have absolutely loved studying the illustrations and inferring the story through the pictures, eventually painting their own settings and writing their own adventure stories. It has been so lovely using high quality books which inspire children's imagination and their writing. We are really looking forward to World Book Day, when we are planning to use 'Lost Words' by Robert MacFarlane and Jackie Morris as a whole-school art and literacy topic.





It was with sadness that we reported the death of our friend, long time member and treasurer Pat Faircloth. Her quiet manner yet keen sense of



humour will be greatly missed. Pat had a talent with flowers and her arrangements were always thoughtful and inspired.

Our speaker at the February meeting was Geoff Hodge who, as a writer for many magazines and websites as well as presenter on local radio, was more than qualified to deliver his topic – the war on weeds!

From the outset he admitted there is no wonder cure but knowing your enemy was the key to giving yourself a chance to eradicate the scourge of most people's gardens. Whilst annual and biennial weeds are annoying, the perennials are the most challenging. Geoff then explained that in this 'guerilla war' an arsenal of weapons may be needed. Hand tools were discussed and it was agreed that the hoe was the most useful in this category. Weedkillers, used wisely, are another form of defence, whether it be a RTU (ready to use) spray, concentrate or ready mixed sachet. It is always important to follow the instructions precisely. Choosing the correct weedkiller is also vital if you are to see results.

Once weeds are under control, mulching is a good idea but at an ideal thickness of 3 to 4 inches it can be costly. Ground cover plants are another way of forcing out the weeds, and a variety from shrubs to herbaceous perennials were suggested.

Geoff kindly donated tools to the raffle and I think we all left feeling armed to face the enemy in the garden.

Dave Arnold has kindly organised our May meeting, which will be a trip to Great Easton Lodge near Dunmow on Wednesday 8th May at 5pm, cost £6.50. Please let Bren know if you would like to go and whether or not you will need a lift.

Cambridgeshire Fire & Rescue Service

Have you had your chimney swept in the last year? We experience an average of 81 chimney fires a year in Cambridgeshire alone. Whatever fire you have, or fuel you burn, it is vitally important you have your chimney swept to avoid a build-up of ash and soot.

Chimneys and Open Fires

- Have your chimney swept once a year or more frequently if you burn wood
- Avoid burning resinous woods that quickly build up soot
- Only burn fuels suitable for your burner (eg never burn anything other than wood in a wood burner)
- Do not overload the grate/ appliance
- Do not bank fires too high and remember to let them burn out well before you go to bed
- Check the hearth, floor and furnishings near the fire for hot sparks/embers
- Do not place objects on or over the mantelpiece which cause you to stand too close to the fire in order to reach them
- Use a fire/spark guard to prevent accidental fires and make sure it has the kite mark or conforms to British/ European standards
- Inspect your chimney breast, particularly the roof space. Make sure it is sound and sparks/fumes cannot escape through cracks or broken bricks.

Wood/Multi-Fuel Burners

- A qualified and competent engineer should install all wood/multi-fuel burners and boilers – regular maintenance should be undertaken to prolong the working life of the appliance. Specialist servicing and maintenance will usually be provided by the company you purchase the appliance from but you can also refer to *www.solidfuel.co.uk* for advice and information
- Ensure correct ventilation is in place when the appliance is in use
- Wood burning appliances should only use the right quality wood recommended by the supplier
- · Regularly inspect the chimney and flues
- Generally wood should be well-seasoned (usually wood kept dry and stored for around 2 years)
- Avoid wet or newly felled wood as this will cause tars/ creosote deposits forming in the burning appliance and chimney

- Using laminated chip boards will leave binding glue deposits
- For each slow burning period there should follow a quick burn to dry out unwanted tar/creosote deposits and to warm up the chimney again
- At the end of each burning season and at least once during the season the entire system should be cooled and thoroughly cleaned to maintain top performance.

Most importantly:

- Fit a smoke alarm that carries the kite mark or British Standard Number 5446, test your alarm weekly by pressing the test button and know the life of your battery.
- Always install a CO alarm in the room where the burner is installed. Chimney fires continue to be a common occurrence in home fires in the winter months.
