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

West Wratting Speedwatch

West Wratting operates a Speedwatch team under the auspices of Cambridgeshire Police. We try and cover the three main approaches to the village, and the Common, Honey Hill, Six Mile Bottom Road and the High Street on a regular basis. When operating, we wear high visibility jackets and display a warning sign and a large illuminated screen showing the speed of approaching vehicles. Registration numbers of speeding vehicles are noted and passed to the police for action, with a visit for repeat offenders.

Our function is largely educational, reminding drivers that speed limits exist, and this has a direct and positive impact on driver behaviour. We know we have an impact: static sign data shows that around 30% of drivers exceed the speed limit daily, but when we operate a Speedwatch session in the same location as a static sign this drops to 10 - 12%.

From the Rectory

I've been reminded many times over the last month how gratitude and thanksgiving are central to our lives. A few weeks ago I baptized a child in Great



Abington church and it was such a joy to share with the child's family and friends this thanksgiving for life and the gift of the Holy Spirit. More recently, I attended a family funeral in Pembrokeshire and experienced how mourning and thanksgiving can become deeply intermingled. This thanksgiving may then spill over into reflecting on our priorities in life, reminding us how important it is to give thanks for each day, for family and friends and for all the blessings of life, amidst its sorrows and joys.

Many harvest thanksgiving services and suppers have also been enjoyed over the last month. Here we praise God as the one who gives and seek to respond with generosity. Thanksgiving, however, is actually at the heart of any Christian worship. We hear scriptures and bless and share bread and wine with thanksgiving. Holy Communion reminds us that even under the shadow of the last supper, when Jesus anticipates clearly his suffering and death, he still gives thanks. It's no wonder, then, that thanksgiving permeates our prayer. Anne Lamott, the contemporary American novelist, said prayers are often, at their heart, a mixture of: help, sorry, thanks and wow!

Lower Wood Nature Reserve Update

For safety reasons, due to fallen and hung up trees, a part of Lower Wood has been temporarily closed as shown on the map at the bottom of the webpage: https://www.wildlifebcn.org/nature-reserves/lower-wood

Felling works are scheduled to take place at the end of September / early October. During felling operations, the whole wood will be closed for a few days due to the presence of forest machinery on site. We will use the webpage above to give updates on start and finish dates of the work and when the site will be fully open again.

Regular visitors to Lower Wood will be aware that there is a regular cycle of coppicing done as part of our woodland management. Coppicing is a centuriesold traditional method of woodland management. It is


the practice of cutting broadleaved trees to ground level, which then promotes lots of vigorous new shoots to grow back from each stump. After some years (which can range quite widely depending on the species of tree and the desired product), the straight poles produced are used for a wide variety of purposes and the cycle may be repeated indefinitely. In the UK, it is a truly sustainable way to manage woodland and provides a wide range of conditions that support different species at different times.

The initial extra light from coppicing encourages plants to germinate and flower, such as oxlips, which in turn supports a range of insects including Purple Emperor butterflies. As the coppice ages, birds such as Marsh Tits and Blackcaps use the dense bushy growth for shelter and nesting. The fruit and nuts from plants such as bramble and hazel provide food for a variety of small mammals and birds.

Traditional coppice management mimics natural processes like wind and storm damage, or grazing by large animals such as bison that we no longer have in our woodlands. Without some form of management many of our woodlands would become dark, overshaded and dominated by big mature trees without any variation in structure, age or cover. Ultimately, this reduces the amount of wildlife that can live in them.

At Lower Wood we are aiming to provide a mix of regularly managed areas as well as areas that are left relatively untouched. The Wildlife Trust BCN would like to thank the many local volunteers who have joined in the warden's work parties over the years to get essential management work done in the wood.

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Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

October is the month where our Marsh Tits really appreciate it if you start to put sunflower hearts out regularly in your gardens. It may be the difference between life and death for many of this year's youngsters, who are still a bit clueless about where to find natural food when it becomes scarce in the colder months. I was interested to discover that birds are warmer than ourselves: on average, 1.87°C higher during rest and 2.43°C higher when active (*Prinzinger et al, 1991, https://doi.org/*

10.1016/0300-9629(91)90122-5). Given that Tits are small and so have a huge surface area to weight ratio, they will need a lot of food to keep their resting bodies at around 39°C overnight. You can get sunflower hearts online for about £1 per kilo, delivery included. We'll happily pass on details of a supplier if needed.

Most of you will recall last August's plea in this column to reduce your speed around blind bends, like Barnie's Bend between Balsham and West Wratting, to save the lives of our avian relatives. I deeply regret to report the passing of 'Ralph', Johnny and Emma Kaye's beautiful horse, hit by a car speeding around a bend. It was not a quick or clean death. Ralph's rider Maria was thrown; mercifully she survived without



broken bones, but mentally it is something she will find hard to get over. **Please slow down on our rural bends, when you can't see around them.** You know it makes sense . . .

To happier things: in August, I was privileged to meet this now rare bird on the Sussex coast. It's an adult

female, very laid-back and perching on my fingers, on its way back to the Congo after an all-too-brief summer holiday making new life here in the UK. She has a brick-red tail and the males have a loud song that, once heard, is not forgotten. What is it? (answer on back page of Challenge).

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West Wratting Parish Council

At the meeting held on 23rd September the following were some of the items discussed. The full minutes can be seen on both noticeboards.

Planning:

S/2783/19/FL – certificate of lawful development for a single storey extension was supported.

Possible solar farm – no planning application has been received but following a joint meeting with the developers and West Wickham Parish Council it was agreed that although a small proposed scheme of solar panels at present, it could become much bigger, very visible and a possible road safety hazard.

Finance: a list of authorised payments and monies received are shown on the draft minutes.

Fox Road barriers: on 17th September a meeting is to be held in Balsham to look at the official evidence so far collected, which is a necessary part of the process to enable prevention of four-wheel vehicles and trailers from using this bridleway and to stop antisocial behaviour.

Sale of telephone box: Please see separate item concerning this.

Recreation ground & pavilion:

- a) Proposed gates the posts are now in place and the fabrication of the gate is in hand; a drawing of the proposed gates will be sent to the council for approval.
- b) The battery for the defibrillator will need replacing and the parish council was asked if they would purchase this. Costs were requested by council.
- c) There is a problem with dog poo and litter left on the recreation ground. Cllr Chandler undertook to check with SCDC if they would provide replacement bins as the present bin is in very poor condition.

Play area: Cllr Chandler said that so far £13,146 had been raised through grants and donations. An application to Wadlow Wind Farm Fund has been made and the application to Amey will be submitted shortly. The Adoption of the Public Access Statement required by Amey was agreed and signed following distribution to all the councillors.

Any other business: several of the trees in the Causeway have died and one tree is in need of some pruning. Cllr Harvey said that the Tree Officer was

attending the next Combined Parish Meeting and this problem could be raised with him.

The next parish council meeting will be held on Monday 11th November and all are welcome to attend. *Jenny Richards, Parish Clerk*

Sale of Telephone Box

The parish council has been asked if the unused telephone box in the High Street could be sold and removed. Before any discussion goes ahead it was felt important that the village should be asked for their views about the 'red' landmark. It is a shame that it remains unused, it would make a good 'book exchange' or an information centre. Someone I'm sure would enjoy turning it into something useful or quirky. Please do let the parish council have your views on a possible sale.

Weston Colville Parish Council

A parish council meeting was held on Monday 2nd September.

1. District and County Council reports and items of interest – our local county councillor and district councillor discussed the drainage at Church End for which funds have been allocated for this financial year; our county councillor said he would try to determine what was planned. It was agreed that no progress had been made with footpath 19 due to the reluctance of the owners to spend any money. It was agreed that the need for repair, including pictures of the damaged bridge, would now be posted on the county highways repair website. It was agreed that details of the street lighting cooperative would be forwarded to the chairman.

Our district councillor mentioned that the new ice rink was open and the council is keen to maximise its use.



2. Parishioners' Question Time – none raised.

3. Planning

The Jubilee Farm, the Linnet Hall Barn, and the two Weston Woods Farm applications shown as 'awaiting decisions' in last month's Challenge have now been approved by SCDC. The Mines Farm reapplication is still awaiting decision.

4. Matters In hand / arising since last meeting

4.1 Website update – a parishioner is preparing photos for the website and the clerk has sent all the relevant council documents that need to be uploaded onto the new website. Details of the new website will be circulated to all councillors and the clerk prior to the November meeting so it can be approved for use at that meeting and made live.

The provision of parish council email addresses for all councillors though Microsoft, which will hopefully be free, is also being investigated, with feedback on this due by the next meeting.

- 4.2 Car Park transfer from SCDC to WCPC the council agreed to pay a further £500 to SCDC to complete this transfer, provided it was fully completed by the end of 2019.
- 4.3 SID update none given at the meeting.
- 4.4 Footpaths update as previously mentioned, photos of the damaged bridge for footpath 19 will be logged on the County highways website with a request for repair to see what response they give. It was also reported that all other parish footpaths were in good repair.
- 4.5 Highways update still no progress on sorting out the drainage at Church End, which is in this year's Highways budget, so progress is expected before April 2020.

The closure of Mill Hill and Common Road is still scheduled for 9th September until 4th October to allow culvert repairs. Currently both jobs are planned to be concurrent.

A quote is still awaited for a full cut of the roadside verges, to be obtained for the November meeting. The council was requested to send a letter asking relevant landowners to trim their roadside hedges.

4.7 Street lights – it was reported that several quotes were awaited for street lighting which will be circulated to all councillors. If none prove competitive, then the option of joining a parish council cooperative and delaying any move away from the county council unless power networks insist on a change would be investigated.

5. Matters for the council to discuss / vote on

- 5.1 Gritting scheme the council agreed unanimously that we did not want to be part of this.
- 5.2 Suffolk Accident Service the council agreed unanimously that there were insufficient funds to contribute to this service.
- 5.3 Policies the council agreed to adopt the new compliments and complaints policy, the new financial regulation policy, and a new health and safety policy.
- 5.4 Wadlow Wind Farm fund representative it was agreed to keep the existing representative and deputy.
- **6. Playground** repairs are ongoing, with a full report to be given at the next meeting.
- **7. Finance** the accounts to the end of August 2019 were presented at the meeting
- **8.** Matters for next agenda it was agreed that the council approve all donations to organisations at the November meeting to allow for accurate budgeting, and end the process of making donations throughout the year. It was also agreed that the dates for all parish council meetings in 2020 would be set at the November meeting.

The Meadow School

We are always thrilled to see the smiling faces of children returning to school in September and this year was no exception. The start of term has gone very smoothly, and it has been lovely to see old faces returning and welcoming in all our new children and families. Our youngest children have settled in brilliantly, with the help of their new Year 6 buddies who are invaluable at training them in the tricky aspects of school life, especially helping them to cut up their food and balance their tray without dropping its entire contents on the floor!

For the rest of the school, children have dived straight into their learning. Children had already spent time on their transition days back in July getting to know their new teachers and class mates, which really helped relationships start positively. This year we are having a huge focus on developing children's vocabulary. There is extensive research on the impact of a vocabulary-rich school and home life; vocabulary at the age of five is a strong predictor of success at age sixteen. Each teacher is using a 'Word of the Day' to build children's vocabulary and already children have been exposed to words such as 'plethora' and 'bland'. If you are a parent or relative of a Meadow pupil, please do encourage them to share these new words with you.

The school undertook major building works to our drainage this summer. Over the past few years, the school has suffered some serious damage with flash

flooding. After a laborious grant application, we were awarded funding to install an advanced borehole and drainage system to the school



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field, only used twelve times before. This meant digging up the entire Early Years area and Key Stage 1 playground and digging a 30 metre hole in the school field. Now this is all complete, we can relax when there is a storm warning issued!



Alongside the building work, we have installed some new playground equipment for the children, generously funded by the PTA.
The children now have access to some fantastic

giant musical instruments, a sensory maze to explore, and a giant solar panelled stop watch. The children have loved exploring these and have already made up some new games. We are very grateful to the PTA for all the hard work they have put in place in order for this to happen.

This month one of our own WI members, Gean Taylor, gave us a talk on Holistic



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

Bonfire night can be plenty of fun for all of the family to enjoy, but with lots of potential hazards, it's really important to keep you and your family safe.

Help support your local community this year and go to an organised firework display instead of holding one at home. If you do plan on using fireworks or lighting a bonfire at your own home, however, please ensure you consider our safety advice below:

Fireworks:

- Only buy fireworks marked BS 7114
- Light fireworks at arm's length using a taper, stand well back and never go back to a lit firework
- Never throw fireworks or put them in your pockets or clothing
- Light sparklers one at a time wearing gloves, and place used sparklers in a bucket of water
- Never give sparklers to children under five
- It is illegal to sell fireworks to someone under the age of 18 or to light fireworks in a public place

Bonfires:

- Do not light bonfires in unsuitable weather conditions, particularly when windy
- Do not leave bonfires unattended
- Keep a bucket of water or a hosepipe handy just in case.
- Build bonfires well clear of buildings, garden sheds, fences and hedges
- Never use flammable liquids to start the fire
- Never burn dangerous rubbish such as aerosols, paint, foam furniture, rubber tyres, batteries, etc
- Before you light the bonfire, check that children and animals are not hiding inside and are a safe distance away
- Always consider the location of a bonfire or firework display – smoke drifting near or on to roads can have devastating consequences.

A Carer's Story

(This is the first part of Frank's story; further instalments will appear in due course.)

Barbara was diagnosed with Alzheimer's disease in early summer 2012, although her memory had been deteriorating for months before then.

Initial shock gave way to anger that this had happened to us, and I still allowed my irritation to show when Barbara asked a particularly strange question, or did something especially daft, but I quickly reminded myself that she was not in control, and I shouldn't become frustrated. Instead, the advice from everyone was to 'go with the flow'. If you don't, you risk your own health being affected.

My vision of life post-retirement was for us to continue to explore Europe and enjoy our music and gardening in a more leisurely sort of way, but I thought Alzheimer's had put paid to that.

I initially suffered from waves of self-pity, but quickly realized that this was simply being selfish.

One trick is to see the funny side of things, which is not often possible, but when it is it provides real relief.

My day is filled with jobs – mainly repetitive ones, but luckily I enjoy doing practical things, even if they are unpleasant, and get great satisfaction out of seeing something well done, even if it's relatively trivial, like doing the cooking. Walking the dog is very therapeutic.

The main thing was to try to be positive and get on with life as much as we could, and this is where organisations such as Carers Trust can be a great help. At the outset, shortly after the diagnosis, we had the good fortune to seek the help of the Alzheimer's

Society, and a very helpful lady kick-started various schemes and gave advice on how to obtain help in the form of a reduction in Council Tax, applying for a Blue Badge, Attendance Allowance, etc.

This advice and assistance is also available from other organisations, including Carers Trust, Age UK, etc. but it just so happened that we went to the Alzheimer's Society first.
