

West Wratting Book Club

We read two books for May: 'Silverview' by John le Carré and 'A Short History of the World According to Sheep' by Sally Coulthard.

The opinions of 'Silverview' ranged from "a sharp well-written spy thriller" to "an OK story" and "took a while to get the gist of the book". It was thought that one of the main characters, Julian, was not entirely credible. It was reminiscent of his previous book, 'Our Kind of Traitor', with ordinary people being drawn into the shadowy world of espionage. Some thought it a good ending while one person was a little confused. We enjoyed the fact that much of the action is in Suffolk, with the usual fun of identifying the places depicted. Scores varied from 3 to 8 out of 10.

In general most of us enjoyed 'A Short History of the World According to Sheep', the fascinating and interesting examination of how sheep and wool has affected the development of civilisations, societies and all our lives over the millennia. From Babylonian and Biblical references through the source of lactose intolerance, bog bodies wrapped in woollen cloth, the Highland Clearances to the 'traditional' 20th century Icelandic sweaters, there is a wealth of intriguing facts. Nature Notes

Marsh Tits are still deep in the woods, breeding in warm, dark places just like clothes moths. The juveniles will be venturing to your garden feeders by the end of June. Please report any young Marsh Tits to me (cambsmarti@gmail.com) or to Chasse. They're easy to spot: slightly smaller than a Blue Tit, greyish body, big black crown like a male Blackcap, lots of pale yellow around the face and a gauche, foolhardy disposition like any early teenager.

Your adult Cuckoos will start to leave the UK this month. Did you know that the famous 'cuck-koo' call made by males varies during the year? The two-note call is a descending minor third in April, but over time the drop in pitch widens to a major third and then a fourth, until by June the Cuckoo can even change its call to an ascending interval. Since the Cuckoo doesn't raise its own chicks and so doesn't have to

hold territory to feed them, I suspect this apathetic attitude to calling is linked to sex: when mating time is over, the males simply don't care anymore . . .

You may see lots of webs in shrubs whose leaves have been stripped. It's not spiders, but moth caterpillars. Various species can be responsible, eg Spindle Ermine and the infamous Box Tree Moth, but the Browntail Moth needs a special mention. Its caterpillars are hairy, dark brown with a distinct white line down each side, and are 7 mm - 38 mm in length. The hairs cause a nasty skin rash. Here's a photo of one. Avoid!



If you like growing your own veg, I have an unusual hazard for you: White Bryony (*Bryonia dioica*). It is a common native climbing weed with five-pointed leaves up to 20 cm across, small white starlike flowers and red to purple berries. The photo shows White



Bryony expertly modelled by my other half Eileen. This plant is poisonous – eating it will give you acute diarrhoea – and it will cross-fertilise with its relative, the Courgette

(aka Zucchini). Courgettes raised from hybrid seed taste very bitter and can give acute stomach-ache. Around 2020, two major seed suppliers, Unwins and Mr Fothergill's, are reported to have unwittingly sold Courgette seed which could have hybridised with White Bryony. According to the BBC and The Sun, illnesses occurred after eating Courgettes grown from this seed, including one hospitalisation. Unwins





temporarily suspended sales of the seed for investigation and Mr Fothergill's issued a product recall of batch code 'Aug 20 I'. Best not let White Bryony grow near your veg plot! Read for yourself at https://www.foodsafetynews.com/2020/07/zucchinis-linked-to-rare-poisonings-in-england/ and at https://www.bhaf.org.uk/content/advice/gardening-advice-a-z/poisonous-courgette-warning.

And finally, this photo of a Great Tit chick was taken last month during licensed nestbox monitoring. It's about nine days old, halfway through its stay in the

nest. Please note the horse hair entangled around the chick, which I carefully removed. Horsehair is almost as strong as steel wire and can easily kill or maim a young bird. Parent birds collect it from stables and paddock fences as nesting material. When you



brush your horse or go round a paddock, please think of your feathered friends and try not to leave horsehair anywhere they can pilfer it. Ta muchly . . .

Recycling

West Wratting Parish Council

The meeting held on 9th May was the first meeting of the new financial year and although there was an uncontested election there were still formalities to be carried out. Matters discussed included the following:

Election of Chairman, Vice Chairman & Representatives: Cllr Nichols is to be Chairman. The position of Vice Chairman was left until the next meeting. Cllrs Roberts and Nichols agreed to continue as the representatives on the Sports Pavilion Committee and Tim Bonfield and Martin Davey, although no longer councillors, said they were happy to be representatives on the Village Hall Committee.

Planning: details of planning applications are included in the minutes. There was just one application which had not been dealt with, 22/01473, 1 & 2 Wadlow Cotts, and it was agreed to support this.

Maintenance:

- a) Increases in budget for maintenance: it was agreed that the Tennis Club contribution towards maintenance should be increased from £60 to £70 per year and the WWFC contribution to be increased from £200 to £220.
- b) Grass verges & pocket park maintenance contract: Quotes had been received and it was agreed to give the contract to a local business, William Knoweldon Garden Services.
- c) Risk assessment of village assets: the parish clerk had carried out a risk assessment of the various assets owned by the village, eg village hall, the pound, the pump shelter, bus shelters etc. All was in good order.

Village Hall: Martin Davey had reported that the village hall is being well looked after and is at present well-funded.

Recreation Ground & Pavilion: the chairman had two keys for the gate, one she gave to Cllr Chandler and the other she will keep.

Traffic issues & Speed Restriction Equipment:

Tim Bonfield and Martn Davey will continue with erection of the speed signs poles, the purchase of which is in hand.

Play Area: RoSPA had carried out their safety inspection and apart from some minor faults the report was satisfactory.

Jubilee Celebrations: the parish council has paid for the insurance needed to hold a street party and will contribute a further £130, making a total of £300.

Reports by District & County Cllrs: – the March/ April reports are shown on the website. Cllr Harvey was congratulated on being re-elected.

PLEASE NOTE: THE DATE FOR THE NEXT PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HAS BEEN CHANGED TO 18TH JULY 2022 AT 8 PM IN THE VILLAGE HALL. ALL WELCOME.

The West Wratting Annual Parish Meeting was also held on Monday 9th May. Reports were received from village organisations, and will be in the July issue of Challenge and on the village noticeboards.

Weston Colville Parish Council

The Annual Parish Meeting and AGM were held on Wednesday 11th May. The matters discussed included the following:

Annual Parish Meeting

Chairman's Welcome and Annual Report – the chairman delivered his annual report.

Parish Nurse Scheme – Keith Day and Kim Cox delivered a presentation about the Parish Nurse Scheme. They thanked the council for past support. The scheme was church-led, but open to all; 80% of those helped had no faith. Kim Cox works two days a week but could do more. Her main role was as an advocate, delivering whole person healthcare. She has an honorary contract with Granta Medical Practice, and could task GPs to act. Her other role was as an advisor, navigator, and referral agent. She has 80 people on file, with 30 who are seen regularly. Funding comes from personal donations and PC donations.

Heritage Map – a parishioner is producing a Heritage Map of Weston Colville as part of an extended project qualification (EPQ) from Hills Road. The project started during lockdown. Material has been gathered from primary and secondary historical sources, and the Reading Room Committee have applied for a Community Chest grant to create the sign. The design of the sign will be finalised after the Platinum Jubilee, and will be on display in the Reading Room on Sunday 5th June, for parishioners to look at, and make

suggestions for additional items to be added. There will be a QR code, as not all the detailed information will fit on the map. It will be placed at the Reading Room next to the village sign.

It was suggested by Cllr Durham that permissive paths were added, which could be found on the CCC highways maps. It was suggested an extra copy was printed for inside the Reading Room, to complement the historic maps. Everyone congratulated the parishioner for her efforts.

Public Comments and Questions – a parishioner spoke on his report on flooding. He had sent it to the CCC Flood Risk Officer, Brian Heffernan and had met with him.

Cllr Harvey was congratulated on being re-elected as District Cllr. He delivered a brief report.

Cllr Garrod reported that despite trying to swap grit bins, a yellow one was in situ behind the bus shelter. A new sack truck had been received. The new drains along Mill Hill were filled with rubbish, Alistair Douglas was to be asked to clear them.

SID and LHI – the LHI bid was unsuccessful.

Footpaths – the permissive path to Lower Wood from Mill Hill has been rescinded, and walkers should take the footpath again.

Platinum Jubilee event – an application for a Community Chest grant was unfortunately unsuccessful.

Risk Assessment/Health and Safety – the defibrillator was rescue-ready on 1st May. The risk assessment for the Jubilee event would be covered by the Reading Room.

Playground – the play equipment safety report from David Bracey was received. Some concerns had been raised, and there would be an update from Cllr Hubbard in July.

Finance – £500 will be donated to the Parish Nurse Scheme. It was suggested that accounts for Briggs Gift were changed, as the interest generated was not covering the donations.

The next WCPC meeting will be on 4th July.

District and County Councillor's Report

South Cambridgeshire District Council held elections at the beginning of May and we're both very pleased to say that Geoff was re-elected to represent Balsham, Horseheath, Carlton, West Wratting, West Wickham and Weston Colville for another four years. Regardless of who, if anyone, you voted for, Geoff represents everybody in the constituency on the District Council and is really looking forward to continuing to do so.

The full election results across the whole of South Cambridgeshire are: Liberal Democrats – 37 councillors; Conservatives – 7 councillors. No other political parties are represented on the council.

The next upgrade to be implemented on the A1307 is the safer crossing point at the Hildersham junction. This involves putting in a crossing that all non-motorised users (pedestrians, cyclists and horse riders) can use. This has begun already and will be fully completed in the summer.

In the last year we have both taken on new responsibilities at the District Council; Henry took on the role of Vice Chair of the Planning Committee, and he is also Chair of Planning Committee at the County Council. Geoff jointly chairs the Environment Committee.

The County Council has now officially moved from its premises at Shire Hall, Cambridge to a new purpose-built office in Alconbury Weald. Shire Hall was sold off to a hotel company with a view to renovating the building. The County Council will still have satellite offices around Cambridgeshire, including one in Cambridge, which will be our closest.


