

From the Vicarage

Clothes for Iraq — the local churches have a link with Canon Andrew White's Foundation for Relief and Reconciliation in the Middle East (FRRME). Last week we heard via Keith Johnson of an urgent appeal for warm winter clothes and blankets, to be sent to Iraq for people who are struggling in the face of winter storms. Many homeless and destitute people have fled unrest, and are now facing the snow and cold without adequate clothing. Over one weekend,





blankets and boots. Keith Day and Keith Johnson then drove a van, packed to the roof, to a collection point in Brighton, to be loaded onto an articulated lorry bound for Iraq.

Archdeacons' visit — in February, your Parish Church Councils will be meeting the Archdeacons to discuss future strategies in the Ely Diocese. The number of active clergy is falling, the pattern of churchgoing has changed, and the fundraising needed to finance clergy and buildings falls on an ever smaller number of people. On the other hand, this region has a fast-growing population and there are many large new housing developments. The Diocese of Ely is trying to devise a strategy which will respond to this reality. We cannot take for granted that things will continue as they have always done. What aspects of the church's presence in your village are important to you? Let us know, so we can tell the Archdeacons.

Lent Course — on Thursday 26th February, 7.30 pm at Hildersham Church, we will begin the joint parishes' Lent Course. This is the first of four evenings when we will look at why people pray, what is going on in the brain when we pray, can silence be prayer, and what can we do when prayer is difficult? We begin with the Archdeacon of Cambridge, who will tell us about different ways that we can pray and why people do it at all. Please feel we know to come along and discuss this fascinating aspect of human experience.

Confirmation Classes have just begun. If you would like to join in then please let me know.

West Wratting Book Chib

On 20th January we reviewed 'The Chimp Paradox' by Prof Steve Peters, about a 'Mind Management Programme for Confidence, Success and Happiness'.

Of those who had read a large proportion of the entire book, most had found it interesting and enjoyable, recognising some 'chimp' behaviour in themselves and others around them. They had started to try to apply some of the things learnt from the book to their own lives, although it was felt that it would be rather difficult to put the whole programme into effect. One person, who had some knowledge and training in this subject, was not so impressed and felt that it 'fell be tween two stools', being too generalised. Other comments were 'interesting as an overview and introduction to those not familiar with such models', and 'good for teachers/managers/people motivators'.

We would be inclined to recommend it to certain people only. The average score for those who enjoyed it was 7 but this was brought down to 6 when all scores were included.

We will meet next on 17th February at 8 pm at The Chestnut Tree to discuss 'A Time of Gifts' by Sir Patrick Leigh Fermor. This is the first in a trilogy of





books describing his walk as a young man across
Europe in the 1930s, from the Hook of Holland to
Constantinople. As well as being a well-known travel
writer, he is famous for leading the band of resistance
fighters on Crete who kidnapped the German
commander, General Kreipe, an event immortalised in
the film 'Ill Met by Moonlight'. We hope that this is a
book that will appeal to both sexes, who would then
enjoy coming to discuss it. It is always a relaxed and
enjoyable evening, with the book under discussion
often acting as a springboard to wider discussion.

One book suggested for March is 'Eleanor Marx: A Life' by Rachel Holmes .



Thanks to all who took part to make it a fun evening. Although not a fund-raiser, the balance of money from the evening (£140) will be donated to our village hall roof fund.



All prices +VAT, of course. I've grown used to beating the Boilerjuice price by 1-2 p, but the price is now so low I suppose that I'll have to be happy with a saving of just under a penny.

On the Buses

I moved to Weston Colville only last July and I love living in our rural idyll. As a 'newby', and from London, I was curious about what lay be hind the 'one bus a day' promise, and fascinated that after so many rounds of 'cuts', there would be a service from Cambridge to the village. When Alastair needed the car one day, early that summer morning, I waited under the tunnel of trees at the bottom of Mill Hill. At 7.19 a double-decker came trundling round the corner. I had a choice of seats as the second passenger on, and of course sat top front, with the Cambridgeshire countryside set out below me and all around, ripe com glowing in the sun. The 16A timetable had shown me it takes an hour and ten minutes to Cambridge, and I wondered how. I soon foud out: it took us 20 minutes to reach West Wratting and then I saw a pattern — each time there was a T-junction with a sign to Cambridge, we'd go the other way. On the way home, it can take an hour in Hills Road traffic just to get to Addenbrookes. But this isn't a moan or a rant - in the right season it's a stunning tour, it requires patience but is usually somehow entertaining, it's always a transport option appreciated when needed - and it does get you there. There are a couple of little stories

I can tell, the first showing the entertainment value and the second how the service will work even when it apparently doesn't.

Coming back from work on a September afternoon, after the Sixth Formers had all got off in Balsham and West Wratting, there were only two of us left. After only 6 weeks living here, I was proud to be able to suggest going back to West Wratting. He laughed: "I've been driving buses for 20 years, and this is the first time I've had to look at a map!" It turned out the lady lives in Brinkley and

Alastair's amazed that I walk through the door earlier than the bus would have got me to Addenbrookes. I email a photo of my £29 receipt to Stagecoach and a lovely lady at Customer Services assures me my taxi fare will be refunded and that as I should be able to rely on the service, they would make sure it didn't happen again. I banked my cheque and haven't had a problem since. Fantastic.

Weston Colville Parish Council

The following items were discussed at the meeting held on 5th January (full minutes will be posted on both notice boards):

Speed Limit Changes: it may be possible to organise a 40 mph buffer in Common Road and Chapel Road. An application for funds to cover the cost of additional signs will be made to the Community Chest.

Church End Playing Field: estimates are being obtained for the play equipment. The PC will contribute £2K and applications for further contributions will be made to the Community Chest and Wadlow Windfarm.

Footpaths and Stream Maintenance: the footbridge at the end of Clamps Lane has been repaired. Regarding stream maintenance, a visit has been made by the flood risk officer, who was concerned at the build-up at Horseshoe Lane by the ford. He will write to all the landowners along the stream requesting action be taken to clear blockages. South Cambs have agreed that a contractor could cut the obstructing vegetation. A further meeting will be held with another contractor to discuss possible dredging.

Community-led Parish Plan: the uploading of the completed questionnaires is ongoing. There will be another meeting of the group on 9th February when the analysis of results will be discussed.

Grass Cutting: Cllr Garrod has obtained four quotes for the cutting of grass and hedges, as follows:

- Grass around the War Memorial
- Grass and hedge at the children's playground adjoining the cricket ground.
- Grass and hedge at Church End recreation ground.
 It was agreed to fund twelve grass cuts and two hedge cuts in the year.

Precept for 2015/16: it was agreed that a precept of £8,100 would be requested, this giving an increase of 2.7% over the current year.

VE Day: Cllr Durham has recruited a volunteer to assist with the organisation of the VE Day celebrations on 10th May. It was agreed that the residue of funds collected at the Diamond Jubilee could be given to this celebration. It was hoped that a silver band could be funded, to play 1940s music.

Unfortunately, Ruth passed away in 2001 and Peter passed away in July 2008. Due to their love of the area, their surviving children decided to set up an Educational Trust in their name with the aim of helping deserving young people to start University life.

opportunities we do. If you have some time to spare and would be interested in helping, then please do get in touch. We are particularly interested in starting up our chess club again at lunchtime, so if you know anybody who knows their way around a chess board, please point them in our direction!

We were very surprised, but also delighted, to hear recently that Mr Idzi Cyrankowski, the former owner of Hunters Moon, had bequeathed a small amount of money to our school. After consulting with the children and staff we have decided to honour this extremely kind gesture by using the money to install some friendship stops in both of our playgrounds.

Friendships, emotional well-being, and considering the whole child is a focus for The Meadow this year. I am sure you will all be aware from recent press coverage that there are national concerns regarding child and adolescent mental health. The numbers of children as young as 5 who feel anxious, self-harm, become withdrawn over friendship or family issues, worry about pressures of school, or have low selfesteem, are on the increase. I believe as a school we have a duty to incorporate work within our curriculum to prevent this. At the end of last year I applied for The Meadow to be the champion school of a Peer Massage pilot scheme. Staff are currently being fully trained and the project is being rolled out into the classes. Already the children are commenting how they are feeling less anxious, and are being taught techniques to help them relax and not feel so pressured. Teachers are also noticing a difference in the attitudes and behaviour of the children after completing the daily 10 minute programme. We are watching and waiting with great excitement to see how the programme develops, and we will of course be sharing the results with you all!

Those of you who have visited the College or driven past in the last few weeks may well be wondering why it is that we have wrapped up the 1930's listed building like a parcel. Well, it is a long story, but I will try to give you a brief account.

For years the windows in the listed building have been a headache. In 1937 they were beautiful: made by Crittall with the most up-to-date technology, they looked shiny, operated with precision, and folded out in a French-window style to allow the children of rural Linton to sit outside, close to their classrooms, on sunny days. For the first 30 years of their life they performed like this but in the 1970s, 80s and 90s they began to rust, hinges broke, fasteners dropped off, and they fell into disrepair. Attempts were made to paint them and this resulted in windows that were fused with rust and gloss. Eventually most became unusable. Unfortunately by this time the building and the windows had gained 'Listed' status, and using standard education funding it was not possible to replace them. Last year, the Academy gained a large grant to enable us to replace the windows with Crittall



units that looked virtually identical to the existing ones. Twice, however, South Cambs refused to approve the replacements. It was infuriating; we finally had the money to fix a 50 year old problem and we were not being allowed to put the solution in place! What we have been allowed to do, however, is to strip them right down, repair the originals, and then repaint them. This is a timely and costly business. The money we have been a warded has to be used by April, so the work needs to happen now in the coldest part of the year. To enable this to happen a plastic tent is covering the building to keep the windows free from wet and frost while the work takes place. All of this sounds idiotic, doesn't it but it is as it is. By April we will, at least, have windows that work and also look back to their shiny best.

Our job is to make when important decisions are made



about local health and care services. We are interested in any recent experiences you have of local health or care services that you are happy to share with us.

The big health story in the news this New Year is about pressures on our local hospitals. We know that these are linked to other issues like getting to see a GP when you need to, and getting care in place when you are coming home from hospital. We have two new projects that will look at some of these issues from a different view point.

In our 'First Steps to Health' project we want to find out about the first thing you would do to solve different health issues. Would you work it out yourself, see a pharmacist, call NHS 111, or see your GP? We all solve things in different ways. Knowing what you do can help our local GP practices and the people who make decisions about local health services to plan better care. Please do take part in our survey, either on our website or by contacting our office.

We also need you to help us develop our local 'Care Home 'project. We want to use our statutory 'Duty to Enter and View' for local care homes. This means we have a legal right to visit places that provide public health or care services, to see what kind of care they are providing.

We need to recruit volunteers to be Authorised Representatives, whose role would be to go into local care homes and talk to the people there about the care being provided. This might include talking to residents, their relatives, friends and care home staff. The volunteers would get lots of training and support.

Do you have any recent experience of a local care home, or do you know someone who has? Please tell us about it. We will use what you tell us to plan which homes we will visit and what to look at. We are also talking to the County Council and the Care Quality Commission, to help us plan where we should visit.
