
# West Wratting Oil Syndicate

# West Wratting Book Club

The book we discussed in November was 'Tender is the Night' by F. Scott Fitzgerald, which people found to be a difficult read and hard to get into, with one person unable to manage it at all. This was somewhat surprising to those of us who had read and enjoyed 'The Great Gatsby', and may have had something to do with it not being in chronological order.

One person described it as somewhat esoteric and existential, although it was agreed that it was a good study of human nature, with intelligent observation. One quote suggested as an example of this was "Later she remembered all the hours of the afternoon as happy – one of those uneventful times that seem at the moment only a link between past and future pleasure, but turn out to have been the pleasure itself." It was thought that it could have been shorter and written more tightly. Others felt that the writing must have been good because they were instantly transported to the time and place, and that it was a description of a rather unattractive type of rich American society. There were also instances which shone an unpleasant light on their attitude to black people.

It was thought to be a very good description of the times and a particular class, with the Hollywood

glamour of 'sweet young things' falling for older men. It was interesting as a study of the disintegration of a brilliant man with a great future when he falls in love with the wrong woman. Fitzgerald obviously drew on his wife's schizophrenia for the character of Nicole, although wrongly attributing the latter's illness to her father having abused her. One wondered if the misogyny shown was a reflection of the author's attitude to women or whether he wished to show the unpleasantness of such attitudes. The visual descriptions of the beautiful scenery seemed to make it perfect for making into a film (which was, in fact, done in 1962). It was particularly evocative for one of our number who had spent time in Nice and Cannes, and felt it seemed not to have changed much from the time described in the book. She had actually listened to it on CD but had had to keep winding back to keep track of events.

Despite all the difficulties, it was still felt worth while reading it, such choices broadening our horizons. Most gave a score of 7-7.5 out of 10, although the person who had listened to it gave it a 9, perhaps a reflection of the way this format put across the story and personal experiences of the place described. Some would not recommend it although it would be a good read for anyone who wishes to stretch their reading experience.

The December meeting will be our pre-Christmas meal on 14<sup>th</sup> December at 7.30 for 8 pm, when we will review 'The Girl on the Train' by Paula Hawkins. We still have a couple of places free for the meal so please let me know if you wish to attend.

Our first meeting of the New Year will be on Wednesday 18<sup>th</sup> January when we will be discussing John Le Carré's memoire 'The Pigeon Tunnel'.

# Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

The West Wratting area has experienced problems this past month – a locked shed was broken into and £2,000 of domestic equipment was stolen; also a group of 'foreign hoodies' were trying to stop and enter passing vehicles on Honey Hill. At the Balsham end of the same road a vehicle had its window smashed. A forced entry took place in Wilbraham, the people involved left when disturbed by the householder, and the police seized their vehicle.

Further away, bigger villages have seen more burglaries and theft than seems normal. The largest thefts were two mobile saunas mounted on trailers, a burger van and a motorcycle with its trailer. Many other items have been stolen including jewellery, cash and cards, bicycles, phones, iPods and a laptop.

A householder was cold-called by a man offering to do gardening work for £50, then two men appeared and blocked the householder's view. He discovered that a laptop and £250 had been stolen.

The police made two suggestions about cold calling. 'If you are not sure, don't open the door' and 'Please consider the Buy With Confidence Scheme' (a Trading Standards approved scheme which is designed to promote and support good reliable

#### Weston Colville Parish Council

The following items were discussed at the Weston Colville parish council meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> November:

**District Councillor's report** – the Local Plan is still continuing, and is due to be completed next year.

The Boundary Commission has meant that Castle and Shudy Camps are no longer in our area. As a result, there will only be one councillor, rather than two. Linton will in future be included in South rather than East Cambs. Discussion on Devolution is continuing, with a decision expected on 17<sup>th</sup> November.

**Highways** – the public consultation on speed limits is now finished and a costed report is awaited. Estimates have been obtained for installation of a footpath on Mill Hill, but both figures were thought to be very expensive.

Winter Gritting Routes – the route covering Weston Colville showed no changes. The route is circular covering Mill Hill, Chapel Road, and Common Road to Church End.

Wind Farm Fund – following a report on allocation of funds, one successful application from Brinkley was for illuminated signs giving motorists a reminder

of their speed. The cost was £4,500 for two signs. Cllr Scott suggested this might be something that Weston Colville could apply for and instal at Church End. Evidence of need is required but there is historic evidence of speeding via the Speedwatch initiative. If necessary the equipment could be borrowed to do another survey of speeding.

**River Maintenance and Verges** – the ditch behind College Farm and watercourse is being dug out.

Grilles still need clearing, and some drains have collapsed. Cllr Durham is still in contact with Brian Heffernan to address the problems. The drains around the Reading Room need to be looked at.

**Pop up Pub** – an alternative contractor has been found to provide the beer. It will be fully funded except the charges for use of the Reading Room. The three month trial will start once evenings are lighter in the spring.

**Planning** – outline plans for the Horseshoe Road exgarage site were discussed. The proposal is for one large detached house. The council were of the opinion that the space would be better used for two low cost houses. This view was sent to the Planning Department.

Tea and Cakes – following the suggestion at the last meeting that the council would use the donation normally given to Age Concern to fund a Christmas party for elderly people in the village, Cllr Durham made an approach to the committee who organise the regular Tea and Cakes. After discussion it was agreed that £25 would be donated by the parish council to fund presents for the children at the Christmas Tea and Cakes. The money for the elderly would remain in the Briggs Gift fund, to be considered next year.

# West Wratting Parish Council

First of all there are thanks to be given. Cllr Rachel Causton asked me to thank all those who volunteer to keep the childrens play area clean and tidy all the year round. The new log traverse bar is now in place and the surface areas have been power-washed, with thanks to Robert Covey who did this job for free.

Colin McCall, the Tree Officer, who recently had a bad car accident on the Common Road, asked that something was put in Challenge about the dangers of this road, with cars driving much too fast, and advising people to drive much more slowly.

At the parish council meeting on 14<sup>th</sup> November the following items were discussed:

#### Maintenance -

Diseased trees – Michael Rowland attended the meeting to discuss the diseased trees in Hayter Close. Two have died from honey fungus and this is now spreading. It was agreed that the diseased trees need cutting down and the stumps ground out, top soil removed and reseeded. If the trees are replaced care needs to be taken that they are resistant to this disease.



# The Marsh Tits of Weston in November

Christmas is coming, and your Marsh Tits are doing their best to get fat. They are filling their cute little faces at feeders across the woods and gardens of Weston Colville. Sunflower hearts are their preference, but fat balls and peanuts are good too. In the cold, they're not terribly fussy eaters! They need to eat to keep warm.

Marsh Tits weigh at most around 11 grammes, about the same as a £1 coin. But their body temperature is the same as ours, 37°C. Being tiny, their surface area is vast compared to their mass, so they lose heat rapidly. If it wasn't for the amazingly good insulating properties of their feathers, they could not remain this warm, even when well fed - they'd be dead in minutes. Quite literally, they're wearing their own duvet. The earliest known feathers are about 144 million years old, from the flightless dinosaur Tianyulong confuciusi, first described in 2009. (It may not be the direct ancestor of birds). From that point, feathers allowed animals to stay warm, show off, and eventually to fly. Flight feathers are probably one of the main reasons why birds survived beyond the immensely successful dinosaurs,

which ruled the Earth for 180 million years. (Modern humans have been around for 0.2 million years).

One of the latest additions to our stable is the perky young Marsh Tit Y291462 'White over Red on Left', a totally laid-back little bird, unfazed by its temporary human carers. Colonel Kaye turned up at just the right moment to release it back into the wild. It

seemed to find the Colonel's hands warm and inviting on a chilly morning, and took its time taking off, which allowed us to take this charming picture of The Colonel and the Bird.

It may well be worth putting a big chicken-wire cage around your feeding station if you see Sparrowhawks. It won't trouble the smaller birds and will prevent them being ambushed by the Sprawks while they've got their beaks in the food trough.

# Fouling by Dogs

A number of incidents of fouling by dogs around the village, particularly on the recreation/cricket ground, have been reported recently and over the summer.

The majority of owners behave responsibly and pick up after their dogs. However dog mess left by a minority of irresponsible owners is often the cause of complaints to local authorities and councillors.

It is illegal to leave your dog's faeces lying around in a public area. If a dog is in your care for any length of time, it is your responsibility to clean up its mess.

Make sure you pick up the mess straight away, seal the bag and place the waste in a bin. This could be a dog waste bin or a normal litter bin or, if this is not possible, take the bag home and put it in your own bin. Do not throw the bag over a fence, hang it on a tree or leave the bag on the pathway. Make a note of where the public bins are on your route so that you can dispose of the waste responsibly.

# Who is responsible for clearing away dog fouling?

It is the responsibility of the dog owner or the person in charge of the dog to clear up any dog foul left by their dog. The regulations state specifically that being unaware that the dog has fouled, or not having a suitable means of removing the faeces, is not a reasonable excuse for failing to clean up after a dog.

#### What can you do?

If you do not clear up after your dog, you could be fined. The maximum penalty for committing an offence is £1,000 in a magistrate's court.

Alternatively an authorised officer of an authority may issue a fixed penalty notice; the amount of the fixed penalty can be set by the local authority and is usually between £50 and £80. As well as clearing up your dog's mess, as a dog owner you can help reduce any health risk to the public by regularly worming your dog.

If you have information about a dog walker/owner who fails to pick up, report it to South Cambridgeshire District Council on 03450 450 063. Try to provide as much detail as possible so that any appropriate action can be taken.




- Kitchens are a fire hotspot, so take care while cooking festive fancies. Never leave cooking unattended, and turn off appliances when not in use.

# Securing Your Home

Burglaries are happening regularly across villages in South Cambs, usually during the day when properties appear to be empty, with cash and jewellery being the common

Another option is the Bobby Scheme, a local charity which provides a service to older or vulnerable people by improving home security to reduce crime and the fear of crime. The Bobby Scheme works with a number of partner agencies, including the police, fire service, local authorities, Age UK and others.

Trained staff come out and fit a range of security devices such as window locks, door chains, personal attack alarms, window and door alarms, to help people feel safe in their own homes. Other security advice and reassurance is also provided. On average it costs the Bobby Scheme £130 to work at each home, so they do ask people to consider making a donation so that they can continue to provide such a great service. This is how the scheme works:

- If you have been a victim of crime and you are over 60, you can receive a free visit.
- If you are 65 and over or disabled and would like a visit from the Bobby Scheme to reduce your chance of becoming a victim, they ask for a contribution of £30.00 towards their costs.
- Key safes suppled and fitted from £50 and £80.
- Other specialist products are available for purchase.


