Saturday Morning Café, West Wratting




So: have you seen our churchyard? Do come and walk round and even pop into the church for a 'help yourself' cup of coffee!

Our book for May was 'The Dinner' by Herman Koch, which centred on a family coming together for a meal in a very exclusive, expensive and pretentious restaurant. The two adult male protagonists are brothers and it gradually becomes clear that they have come together to discuss their sons. The background to this event is gradually revealed by the perhaps unreliable narrator, Paul, who is one of the brothers.

Most people enjoyed reading it, although at least one person thought the subject matter too dark, and found it difficult to understand the references to it being funny, while one person hated it. All agreed that it was gripping, interesting psychologically, with a lot of moral dilemmas, the central one being how far you would go to protect your children.

It was felt that the reader is left to make a lot of assumptions, and to wonder why certain events did not have a different outcome.

The score varied between 8 and 8.5, and we would recommend it.

We will meet on Wednesday 21st June to talk about 'Hillbilly Elegy' by J D Vance. We will then take a break for July and August, returning in September (suggested date: 13th) to discuss 'A Street Cat Named Bob' by James Bowen, plus one other to be chosen – suggestions welcome.

Well! Although I barely managed to beat the Boilerjuice 'Bulk' price in March, the May fill up result was much better.

Twenty houses in West Wratting participated in the order placed on 10th May with Conquest Oil (who seem to be undercutting the other suppliers at the moment) and deliveries were completed on 17th May. Conquest Oil won the West Wratting order with a price of 35.10p per litre, which was a huge saving of 3.38p against my benchmark Boilerjuice 'Bulk' (for 2000+ litres) price of 38.48p. All prices + VAT.

For interest, prices in the last twelve months have been: 2016 May 27.00p, July 31.60p, September 32.00p, October 37.20p and 2017 January 44.25p, March 40.95p, so prices are heading back down.

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Claire Gillett, your Parish Nurse

Hello! I have been working in a temporary position as your parish nurse since October last year, but am now thrilled to be appointed as the permanent parish nurse, being part of the team caring for your pastoral needs.

I have been nursing for forty years (with a break for children duties!) and doing parish nursing since 2011, working as the parish nurse for St Mary's Ely and combining that with working with the national body of parish nursing, developing more services within East Anglia.

As your parish nurse I work for the seven churches, covering West Wickham, Weston Colville, West Wratting, Balsham, Hildersham and Great and Little Abington. I work three days a week: Mondays, Tuesdays or Wednesdays, and Thursdays. I am not an emergency service or a replacement for the services already available to you through your GP, but I do hold an honorary contract with Granta Medical Practice and have access to the surgery.

I am available to assess your health needs and encourage your wellbeing, whether that is in your body, mind, or spirit, and whether as a patient or as a carer. I can support you through any health difficulties you may have and help you access services you may be unaware of.

I am able to spend time talking through issues you may have concerns about, in your own home or on the phone. These conversations are confidential at all times, however I can contact other health professionals if you so wish. I also attend some groups in the area, so you can catch me there. If you would like me to come to any group you are involved with please contact me.

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As a Christian as well as a nurse, I can come alongside you in prayer if you wish, however the Parish Nurse service is open to all faiths and none.

We have been running a series of parish nurse events, which gives you the opportunity to meet both myself and other members of the parish nurse management group. Please do come along, they are informative and enjoyable evenings and there is no charge for attending.

If you would like to support the service financially, or with your time, or if you are interested in becoming a volunteer in any capacity (for which a DBS check would be obligatory) we would welcome your input. Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

We have been visited by another 'knocker', someone who knocks on a door or doors for personal gain. In this case the knocker was abusive, difficult and wanted money. He gained nothing and has not been reported anywhere else. He had a rucksack on his back and was dressed like the young men who visit to sell items. These events can be frightening. Calling 101 is a good idea so that the police know what has happened.

There have been several crimes in Balsham, including theft of red diesel and cash, and damage to property. Garden sheds and outbuildings have been in focus, with a wide range of items stolen. We are advised to think about the items kept in sheds, and how secure

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they are. Also try not to leave anything of value in your car overnight, and make sure it is locked.

The police have launched a website where you can register complaints about parking in our villages. There are some rules in the highway code which are 'must not' rules. Background – Peter Lloyd, who was born in North Wales, served as a Wireless Operator with No 105 Squadron at RAF Wratting Common during 1944 and 1945. He flew 25 missions over Germany and was with the first crew that dropped food to the starving Dutch, who were still controlled by the German military forces.

Ruth Lloyd, who was born in Broughty Ferry near Dundee, joined the ATS and eventually ended up at RAF Wratting Common as a Radar Plotter for the anti aircraft guns as well as Bombing Trials at the end of World War II.

Peter and Ruth met at RAF Wratting Common and were married in 1946. After being demobbed from the armed services they lived in Hull and London until retirement, upon which they moved to Peter's home town of Ruabon, near Wrexham.

They both had fond memories of the Wratting area and returned many times over the years. During these return visits they made many friends among the locals and regarded the area as their second home. They were both involved with the reunions and twice yearly services which are held at the airfield memorial.

Unfortunately, Ruth passed away in 2001 and Peter in July 2008. Due to their love of the area, their surviving children decided to set up an Educational Trust in their name with the aim of helping deserving young people to start university life.

- 7. Matters Arising from Minutes of 9th May 2016: Cllr Holness reported on the Les Moulton Trophy awarded for the first time last year to Philip Tempest and his family. Cllr Holness will put something in Challenge about the award again this year for 'Vegetable Grower of the Year', and judging will be in July.
- 8. Any questions: regarding Parish Land and Properties, the Chairman said that grid ref 6070,5120-5140 will be removed from the list as it is not worth registering. Ref 55855345 will also be removed as this land has been in the possession of Dungate Farm for many years.

The meeting closed at 8.00 pm

Chairman's Report

Since the last annual parish meeting there have been several changes in the membership of the council. Rupert Snow stepped down from the council and we have a new councillor this year, Tim Bonfield.

The parish council holds a large number of properties and lands in the village, some of them small (two noticeboards, benches etc) and some of them very large, including the sports pavilion and village hall.

Over the last year the parish council has taken the step again of increasing the precept by the cost of inflation. It is important to note that it is recommended that the council hold at least a year to a year and a half's full precept in reserve. As can be seen from the accounts we are close to 80% of this higher reserve figure. Over the past year a number of emergency tree works have been required which, as many of you who have had to have this type of work done in their properties know, can prove costly. Works have also been required on the children's playpark and it is therefore essential that the amount available for such emergency or crucial work is available.

To continue our works on improving the safety of pedestrians and other residents in the village the parish council has again been successful with a bid to the Highways local improvement fund. Together with the promise of generous contributions from local residents and the parish council we are working up a plan to introduce 40 mph limits further out from the existing 30 mph village speed limits to improve road safety.

Cllr Holness is providing valuable liaison with the sports pavilion committee, just as Cllrs Okenhaug and Nichols provide on the village hall committee. Cllr Causton has also secured funding for improvements to the children's play park, which ensured we did not have to dig too deeply into the parish reserves.

I would also like to thank Simon Anderson for continuing to cut the grass and Colin McCall for his tireless efforts as footpath officer and litter picking crew warden.

It is the view of myself as chairman and also the membership of the parish council that by engaging positively on a one-to-one basis with all groups active in village life we can greatly improve the lives of everyone living in West Wratting.

The parish is known in wider district circles as 'one that gets things done'. I hope that we can as a group continue to make this so over the next twelve months.

Reports submitted to the Annual Parish Meeting by West Wratting Clubs & Activities

Village Hall

Overall we have had another good year, and a less exciting one than the last!

Our village hall continues to be well used. Our regular activities, including Keep Fit, T'ai Chi, FitSteps, and the Saturday Café, are thriving. In addition, Friday Bridge and Over 60s have continued to support us in their use of the hall. Elections and Cycle Club events make welcome and important contributions to our income. Our finances remain healthy, helped by a private donation of £1,000 from Mrs Barbara Moulton. We are very grateful to her for this very generous and totally unexpected leaving present! Last year saw the completion of the major refurbishment of the toilet block. Next on our list is redecoration and refurbishment in the committee room and kitchen. The lighting in the committee room has been upgraded. Painting the walls, ceiling and woodwork, initially by committee members, was completed by a contractor. We are seeking quotes to replace the floor covering in both rooms, and also to replace the three remaining single-glazed windows on the north facing aspect with double-glazed units.

We are fortunate in having an active and diligent committee. It is because of their efforts that much of the general maintenance, external as well as internal, is being achieved at minimum cost. My thanks to all concerned.

11. Maintenance:

a) Trees in Hayter Close: Mike Rowland is going to replace the two diseased trees which had been removed, the stumps taken out and soil replaced. He will choose trees which will not be affected by Honey Fungus. Scilla Harvey has also asked to plant two trees by the pound, having written to the residents of Hayter Close for their comment, and the Parish Council will wait to hear the result of this before approving or not, and will also check with the Tree Officer whether it is suitable.

b) Grass cutting tenders: two tenders had been received, one from CGM at a cost of £135.68 + VAT for verge cutting and $\pounds 23.00 + VAT$ for the occasional cutting of the pocket park. Mark Grimwood of Weston Colville had quoted £55.00 per cut and £25 for the pocket park, with no VAT. Cllr Holness proposed that the quote from Mark Grimwood should be accepted and this was agreed. He does considerable grass work in the village so



will cut the verges when necessary. Cllr Holness said he would ask the owners of Pear Tree Cottage if they could cut the grass round the village sign, and if Mark Grimwood would cut the playground on a regular basis.


- 12. Correspondence: none
- 13. Football club & sports pavilion: Cllr Holness reported that they are still trying to rent more land to increase their number of pitches. Security was again raised at the last joint meeting re a floodlight at the end of the car park and one on the end of the pavilion. They thought this a good idea provided the parish council paid for it. Cllr Holness will look into the cost of floodlights or solar lighting. The fact that the football club had put up a notice one weekend when there was a lot going on in the village saying that the rec car park was for football club members only is possible cause for concern. However it was felt that this was a one-off thing and unlikely to happen again.

14. Traffic issues & speed restrictions:

a) Minor Highways Improvement Scheme: the chairman was pleased that an award had been granted and they are working on the project.

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comparative prices were discussed at the last meeting and the 'smiley' one was likely to be the choice. Three parishes will share its use so each parish would have it for a month at a time, in total four months in the year. Discussions to be held to work out share of cost and maintenance. Insurance costs need to be shared to cover the six parishes involved in this project. It was agreed the parish council should continue to be involved.

c) **Parking issues**: there have been complaints about parking outside the village hall hampering buses stopping at the bus stop. It was pointed out that Highways should mark it up as it is a bus stop. The chairman said he would have a word with David Lines about a sign.

- 15. **Transparency compliancy**: this has now been put in place with information eg agendas, minutes, accounts, list of parish councillors, and dates of meetings being put on the website. The parish clerk will send this to Mike Rowland, or a councillor could take on this job.
- 16. Land Registration: this has now been completed after investigating the two small pieces of land as shown on the parish meeting agenda, which are of no worth, one being a piece of verge





and the other found to now be owned by Dungate Farm.

17. Report by Camb County Cllr Henry Batchelor: recently elected.

- a) City Deal of £39m for improving the A1307.
- b) Devolution a Mayor has now been elected.
- c) Police website is available for problems like car parking.
- d) Library catalogue available now online giving titles of books available.

18. Report by Dist Council Cllr Fraser:

a) **Local Plan** is still not in place but meetings are being held to resolve this problem. Probably next year when it will be agreed.

b) **Housing** -5,500 houses are now owned by SCDC and income is being generated by purchasing houses and doing them up, giving an extra income of £60,000 this year.

c) Community Chest available from 1st April of £1,000 per bid. Three bids can be made in one year.
d) The Forum meetings seem to be a success, with officers from SCDC attending and explaining issues with parish councillors.

e) Cllr Fraser was asked if he could look into the **lack of poo bins** being delivered as they were ordered six months ago and sites were given.

19. Any other business:

a) RoSPA report shows that there is some repair work needed on the play equipment, most of it minor. The chairman said he would let Cllr Causton have his copy of the report as she is happy to look at it and draw up a list of requirements.

b) Section 215 Town & Country Planning re derelict buildings – put it on the next agenda.

The next parish council meeting will be held on Monday 10th July at 8 pm. All are welcome to attend.

Weston Colville Annual Parish Meeting

The annual parish meeting was held on Monday 15th May in the Reading Room, Weston Colville.

Chairman's Report

The last year has again seen the council pursue many activities, mainly in support of the community-led parish plan adopted two years ago. Good progress has been made with most of the plan actions, with several now complete.

Mobile Phone Signal: there is now a good mobile phone signal in all parts of the village.

Broadband Speed: this action is as complete as can be influenced by the parish council, with BT providing fast broadband to all houses that require it, with fibre links provided to the individual houses at Church End.

Maintenance of Roads and Verges: the parish council implemented its usual verge cutting program this year and continues to provide street lighting in the village. Extensive work has also been done by the County Council at the parish council's request to clear gullies and drains in the village, although more work is required at Church End.

Speeding through the village: the local Speedwatch group has ceased operating due to lack of an organiser. The parish council plans to place a last notice in Challenge asking for a new volunteer to lead the Speedwatch volunteers and keep it operational.

The parish council succeeded in obtaining a grant to create a 40 mph buffer zone on all entrances to the village outside the existing 30 mph zones, which would not have been possible without the speed information provided by the now defunct Speedwatch group. The work is now largely complete.

A request has also been made to ask the council to look at the cost of installing speed 'chicanes' to slow down the grain store lorries which speed through the village. There is real concern that this will lead to a serious accident soon.

Social Events: the council has again been happy to offer support to the film nights in the Reading Room, which now has a PSVL licence which will allow a greater selection of films to be shown, and also the Friday Tea and Cakes and the parish walks. Regular 'pub' quizzes and specific interest talks and events have also been held to widen the social scene in the village. The Reading Room committee has ensured that events are published monthly in Challenge.

The 'pop up' pub for the Reading Room has also progressed, with a provider identified, and hopefully it will soon become a reality.

Rural Nature of the Village: it has been decided that there was no need to put copies of all village planning applications on both the parish council notice boards, as those affected are notified by the council, and appropriate signs are also put up. Due to the number of documents now included with planning applications the only real way to view them is on the council website. The parish council has again committed to carry out its programme of hedge trimming and grass cutting at the war memorial and the play areas at The Green and Church End .

Church End Playing Field: this is now complete and seen as a great success for the village. The new play equipment is well used. The parish council has provided two picnic bench seats for this area and a goal post net. This action is now closed.

Public transport: the Balsham 'Helping Hands' group has now extended its service for getting people to medical appointments to include Weston Colville. The parish plan group is still looking for a volunteer to coordinate a car share scheme for the village. The council has agreed to place a last notice in Challenge to see if anyone is prepared to volunteer. If this fails Councillor Pagonis agreed to provide a list of existing car sharing apps to anyone interested.

Housing: the group recognises that there is still a need for affordable housing in the village and agreed to support any proposals. Unfortunately, there are currently no plans of proposals to provide this and the parish council will keep a watching brief for any scheme that is put forward.

Footpaths: the proposal to provide a footpath between Church End and The Green has proven not to be viable as the specification for the path required by the County Council Highways department makes it cost prohibitive (over £100k). An alternative suggestion was made to look at rolling the trimmed verge and a quote is to be obtained.

Assets of Community Value (ACV): it was agreed that the parish council would look at applying for ACV status for Church End Playing Field, the Reading Room and the Recreation Ground. I thank all my fellow councillors for their work, and I look forward to another successful year for the village.

Weston Colville Parish Council

A summary of the parish council meeting held on Monday 15th May, after the annual parish meeting:

1. County and District Councillor Reports: Henry Bachelor has secured the seat of County Councillor and will oversee thirteen local parishes over the next four years, and looks forward to working with Weston Colville Parish Council. He is also a District Councillor for Linton.

2. Election of Chairman and Vice Chairman: Ray Vidler has been re-elected chairman, and Bridget Durham has been elected as vice chairman. Constantine Pagonis has been elected as Responsible Financial Officer.

3. Appointment of New Parish Clerk: a change of clerk from Christine King to Melanie Laing was proposed by Allen Scott and seconded by Matt Jackson.

4. Change of Planning Procedure: the clerk advised that new planning procedure be drawn up to incorporate latest transparency legislation. All present agreed that a draft procedure should be drawn up by the clerk and circulated along with a suggested lanning letter For neighbours. Draft procedure to be read before next meeting and added to agenda with a view of adopting procedure at 17th July meeting.

5. Speed Indicator Device (SID): Matt Jackson reported that the local parishes were willing to split the costs of an SID as a proportionate percentage with smaller parishes. At present the following has been suggested by Trevor Hall, Councillor for West Wickham: "following the Combined Parish Forum when it was proposed that Carlton and Weston Colville would like to participate in the SID Scheme as a lower use member, I have looked at how it could be achieved. I propose that the total cost for two units could be split into twenty shares; each of the six original parishes could take three shares and Carlton and Weston Colville take one share each. Usage of the equipment would be similarly shared. Thus there would be two groups each consisting of three fully participating parishes and one parish with reduced access, each sharing one SID. This would mean you would have access to a SID for a period of one week in every ten weeks, with the other parishes having access for three weeks in every ten weeks. I attach the pricing for each of the different SIDs available,

and the spreadsheet contains a page for the costs for your two parishes and also the other six parishes. Please note that the costs can be reduced by limiting the number of locations where you wish to deploy the instrument. This is particularly the case with Thermotor products."

6. Highway Maintenance (John Garrod): Speed signs have been completed; blocked and suspected collapsed drain outside 30 Mill Hill; blocked drain between 14 & 15 Church End – to be reported; collapsed drain outside Lane Cottage – to be reported; pot hole between Church End and Bull Lane, West Wratting – to be reported.

7. Speed Chicanes to Slow Down Lorries: main problem route is Common Road into Weston Green. Highways will be consulted to see if this idea is possible along this stretch of road and find out costs. A Local Highways Initiative scheme could potentially support this project.

8. Grass Cutting: all agreed to keep the depth of verge cutting to 1 m. Some spring bulbs will be cut in this area but it was felt that road safety issues were more of a concern.

9. Assets of Community Value: in England, an asset of community value (ACV) is land or property of importance to a local community which is subject to additional protection from development under the Localism Act 2011. Suggested areas to look at were Church End Play Area, the pond, the Reading Room, the Recreational Ground and Covey Wood. A report is to be prepared for the next meeting.

10. Financial Matters: move current account from Lloyds to Unity Trust Bank online. All agreed in favour.

Payments since last meeting: Simon Ratford, grass cutting, £375.00.

Proposed payments: Age UK, Community Warden Scheme, £200.00. All agreed the Age UK invoice should be paid from the Briggs Gift Fund. Balance to date: Lloyds £18533.17.

An extraordinary meeting will be held to approve the Annual Return when ready for submission.

Asset register needs updating to include defibrillator and benches at the Church End playing field.

11. Date of Next Meeting: Monday 17th July.

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Hay Fever

At this time of year many people suffer from hay fever, caused by an allergy to grass or hay pollens. Grass pollen is the most common and tends to affect people every year in the grass pollen season from about May to July. However the term 'hay fever' is often used when allergies are caused by other pollens such as tree pollens. Tree pollens tend to affect people from March to May. Weed pollens (eg nettles and dock) tend to pollinate from early spring to early autumn.

Symptoms are due to your immune system reacting to the pollen. Hay fever is also called 'seasonal allergic rhinitis' because symptoms tend to occur at the same time or in the same season each year.

Hay fever is very common and affects about two in ten people in the UK. You are also more likely to develop hay fever if you already have asthma or eczema. Asthma, eczema and hay fever are collectively known as atopic conditions, or atopy. A tendency to atopy can run in families.

Common symptoms are:

- Runny or blocked nose
- Itchy nose and or throat
- Sneezing
- Itchy and watery red eyes.

Less common symptoms include:

- Loss of smell
- Face pain
- Sweats
- Headache.

Asthma symptoms, such as wheeze or breathlessness, may get worse if you already have asthma. Some people have asthma symptoms only during the hay fever season.



Your doctor can usually diagnose hay fever from your typical symptoms that occur during the hay fever season. Commonly used treatments are antihistamine nasal sprays, antihistamine tablets, steroid nasal sprays and eye drops. If your hay fever symptoms are not controlled on the medication you are taking after two to four weeks you should discuss this with your doctor as you may need to try a different treatment.

If you develop asthma symptoms during the hay fever season you may be prescribed an inhaler. If you already have asthma, your asthma may become worse in the hay fever season, which may require a change in the dose of your usual inhalers.

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Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

The Marsh Tits have finally headed for the woods. The amount of natural food is blossoming, they have young and territory to defend, so they don't use our garden feeders so much. Even so, we still get regular reports of Marsh Tits chobbling away at seeds and peanuts in Weston gardens.

This is a crucial time to keep putting food out. The chicks' rate of growth is phenomenal. Blue and Marsh Tit eggs are slightly smaller than a Smartie chocolate button. Fledglings weigh at least 10 grammes. Hatching to fledging takes a mere 19 days. If they don't eat frequently, they die. If it's cold and wet, the parents can't find wild food, and then your feeders are all that stand between death and survival for their brood.

Incidentally, if you want to stop squirrels and rats helping themselves to your costly bird food, mix it with the hottest chilli powder you can find. You can roll fat balls in it. Birds can't taste the heat of chilli (it's why the latter are also called 'bird peppers') but our fellow mammals certainly can! To learn more about this, try here: www.researchgate.net/post/ *How_did_birds_adapt_to_eat_hot_peppers* In a simple garden test in Weston, we saw a drop in the amount of chilli-treated seed taken per day, but untreated peanuts were taken at the same rate until they were also treated. We also tried offering treated and untreated peanuts together in the same feeder. There was no discernible difference in visitations by Blue or Great Tits, but I didn't spend a lot of time watching. All the nuts disappeared in two days, as usual. I do feel slightly sorry for the portly local squirrel, who looks at us rather balefully now. Tough luck, my furry friend! I hope he sees it as his healthy new diet plan.

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Regulars of this column will recall me waxing lyrical about the sedentary nature of Tits. They're homebodies who don't like to travel. In the journals, the term is philopatric (site faithful). Now for the surprise.

Blue Tit Y291400 is an adult ringed in Great Coven's Wood on 20th March 2016, well over a year ago. This bird decided to move near Thetford in Suffolk, 47 km away, where it was re-encountered by Thetford Ringing Group on 4th February 2017. That's 30 miles in old money. (To put this in perspective, my previous re-encountered Blue Tit had travelled from Colney Heath to St Albans, a whopping 3 km, less than 2 miles). Longer distance dispersal is essential to maintain healthy genetic diversity within a species, but is rarely demonstrated in Tits.

We're hoping to catch Marsh Tits doing this too, and their first port of call could be West Wratting or Balsham. So please, dear Wratting readers and Balsham birders, keep your eyes peeled for little, black-headed Tits sporting coloured leg rings . . . Alternatively, I'm looking for gardens with feeders in West Wratting and Balsham whose owners would be happy to host a ringing session for the occasional morning at weekends. You will get to meet your local Robin and Dunnock, face to face. Once you've done that, you'll look at your garden friends in a whole new light, next time they show up on your windowsill. 
