West Wratting Book Club

In April we talked about 'A Small Town in Germany' by John le Carré.

This was published in 1968 and written against the background of student protests in France, Berlin and Britain, particularly against the Vietnam War and Soviet tanks entering Prague, as well as, ironically in the face of current events, Britain's attempts to enter the EEC.

It is set in and around the British Embassy in Bonn and Königswinter, a town built on the Seven Hills and, in particular, known for the Drachenfels, traditionally the mountain where Siegfried killed the dragon (two of our number knew the area quite well). All had enjoyed reading it, with comments including that it was very readable, the writing incisive, the language lovely. Other comments were that it gave one a clearer understanding of the Cold War with the moral equivocalness, constant suspicions and uncertain loyalties. It showed how the past intrudes into the present. It was multilayered with a detailed use of language and vocabulary.

One man not present had not enjoyed it as much as we had, commenting on the cynicism of the writing (probably due to le Carré's own experiences).

The score varied between 8 and 9, and we would recommend it.

We will then meet on Wednesday 17th May, at 8 pm in The Chestnut Tree, to discuss 'The Dinner' by Herman Koch, and on Wednesday 21st June to talk about 'Hillbilly Elegy' by J D Vance.

Weston Colville Neighbourhood Watch (NHW)

We have not had any reported problems here this past month but there have been problems in the Camps the Wilbrahams and Linton. We obviously need to take care and watch our security.

The police are promoting a good neighbour policy. Their idea is simple – if we know each other, we can look out for each other by keeping an eye open for our neighbour's home and property as well as our own. Note the registration numbers of strange vehicles, and unusual behaviour by strangers. They may be lost but could be 'casing the joint'. If you are suspicious call 101 and explain what you have seen to the police. Not long ago an observant neighbour in Balsham saw a burglar entering his neighbour's garage, which had an internal door into the house. The police were called and they 'apprehended the villain'.

Up to 250,000 Wonga accounts were compromised in a data breach. Wonga has promised to contact all who may be affected, and is taking steps to protect them. The police are investigating.

Action Fraud advises that fraudsters are sending out emails, which address recipients by name and start with "I am disturbing you for a very serious reason . . ." and end with " . . . the data of your account has been emailed to me." These emails contain a '.dot' file addressed to the recipient. Delete the email and do not open any attachments.

Both the breach at Wonga and these emails aim to steal your bank details. If you are affected, notify your bank or card company as soon as possible and check your accounts.

Weston Colville Marsh Tit Study

Dear Marsh Titters – we have an interesting development for you this month, and a plea for the good people of West Wratting.

As you know, Marsh Tits are shy specialists of deciduous woodland. You'd expect them to head for the woods the first chance they get, especially to set up and maintain territories for the breeding season.

Paradoxically, your Marsh Tits are still coming regularly to garden feeders in mid-April, about half a kilometre from the nearest wood.

Just before Easter, we encountered Taylor (White over Red on Left) and Marshy (Yellow over Green on Left) together at Joyce's garden feeders on the north side of Mill Hill. In the photo, Taylor is on the left. Because



they're now in breeding condition, we can tell that Taylor is a girl and Marshy is a boy. Very likely that they are a pair. What are they doing in a village garden, when they should be holding territory in Great Coven's or Lower Wood?

I suspect that a good, reliable food source is helping Taylor make her eggs and keep up Marshy's strength. It's worth the risky journey to this oasis of food, which implies that the woods aren't offering enough

natural food yet. It's been posited that global warming will bring out the first flush of caterpillars before the breeding season starts for the birds. Bird breeding is largely triggered by day length and so independent of temperature. The birds miss this crucial bounty at a time when they need it most, so they go to garden feeders. It's only a hypothesis, but one that's worth testing.

We're keen to hear of sightings of Marsh Tits in West Wratting. We think that these sedentary birds might be visiting you from Weston Colville, and vice versa.

As a spring bonus, we have possibly the cutest photo imaginable. Rachel, Weston Colville's resident ecologist, was releasing a young male Goldcrest one slightly chilly morning under my watchful eye. However, the bird preferred her warm hands to the

cold outdoors and stayed put. At my behest. Rachel blew gently on him but the warm air bath simply



encouraged him to stay! After about 20 seconds, he decided he'd better go back where he belonged. It still amazes me how completely wild creatures will trust us to this extent.

From the very first day I became Headteacher, the staff and I declared we would do what we thought was morally right, and only for the benefit of our children. I am proud to say that we did not succumb to creating spreadsheets of data for the sake of it, we didn't continually test our children, instead we taught them, and we didn't jump on the bandwagon for each and every new initiative. Instead we took our time and reflected on things before implementing them, always thinking what the impact would be on staff and the children's well-being. Our vision and ethos has remained true and strong. The report identified many strengths of the school including:

'The headteacher provides highly effective leadership. Alongside her committed and enthusiastic senior leadership team, she has led marked improvements to pupils' achievements and the quality of teaching and learning.' The Governors also 'provide good support and challenge to leaders.'

The inspectors also noted that 'The quality of the teaching of reading, writing and mathematics is good. Teachers plan well together, ensuring that pupils make clear progress across the year groups and key stages.... Effective teaching of reading, writing and mathematics is evident across the school and the great majority of pupils make good progress.'

In our previous inspection presentation and handwriting was criticised; this time it was noted that, 'presentation of pupils' work is exemplary.' This is fantastic and all of the hard work the staff and pupils have put in to improve this has now been recognised.

It was recognised that we 'make effective use of pupil premium funding to support disadvantaged pupils and regularly review the impact of the support that has been put in place.'

The Marsh Mail (news from Linton Village College)

May marks the start of the examination season. Year 11 students at Linton Village College are preparing for their GCSEs, including the new style maths and English exams, and our Year 10s sit internal exams this month in all new GCSE subjects.

The move towards 9 - 1 grading, the removal of controlled assessment/coursework, and the increase in required curriculum subject knowledge, has created additional challenges in regards to what students are required to comprehend, retain and recall.

The traditional 'jug and mug' concept of education models children as empty vessels to be filled with knowledge during their schooling. As our students engage with necessary revision and exam practice, it can feel as though the primary purpose of education is to remember and regurgitate.

It is essential to balance the demands of test preparation with retaining children's desire to acquire knowledge and skills. Teachers and parents need to support children to be ready to perform to the best of their ability, while avoiding the process becoming too much of an arduous and stressful slog.

Recent news that the number of students nationally opting to take A levels in maths and English has plummeted this year, with drops of 20% and 35% in entries respectively, is concerning. This has been attributed to the new, tougher GCSEs and to students being less inclined to risk failure with these harder subjects.

It is a shame that a by-product of an insistence on high standards in the 3Rs may be a demise in the interest in and enjoyment of these subject disciplines.

At LVC we are academically ambitious for all of our young people. Being in the top 5% of all schools nationally for progress and exceeding all other OECD countries' PISA test scores is evidence of our students' achievement. However, these measures are only one factor of educational excellence.

Being able to achieve strong results in exams is important for young people – it will help them to open doors in the future. It is equally important to help children to develop and sustain the keys to open these doors: motivation, self-esteem and a thirst for learning.



If you are planning to travel abroad please make sure you allow enough time for any vaccinations you may need. Collect a Travel Risk Assessment Form from reception or download one from our website, fill it in fully and return it to us no later than five weeks before you travel. We will then contact you by phone within one week to let you know if you need to attend for an appointment, where the recommended vaccines or medications will be given and follow-up injections planned. We regret that no traveller will be seen without a completed risk assessment form.

Before your appointment you are advised to go to: www.fitfortravel.nhs.uk Look up the destination you are travelling to, print off the information, read it and bring it with you when you attend your appointment. You can download our Basic Travel Advice Sheet or collect a copy from reception. 

In addition our travel clinic is able to offer a more specialist service with a greater choice of vaccines, for example rabies or yellow fever, which are not free on the NHS.

When you make the appointment the clinician will make it clear which vaccinations are covered by the NHS and which will require payment, and you will be required to pay before your appointment.

Common Questions:

- I am leaving in less than three weeks' time? Inform reception and they will offer you the next available travel clinic appointment. You will still need to fill in and return the Travel Risk Assessment Form before the appointment and the clinician will do what they can, but full immunisation may not be possible.
- *I think I only need a booster?*Fill in the Travel Risk Assessment Form stating previous injections and return it, and an appropriate appointment will be made.
- Will all my injections be given at the appointment? Some immunisation requires a course of up to three injections. You will be informed at your first appointment, and further appointments planned.
- Can I get antibiotics and needles if I am travelling to risky areas?

If it is recommended for the area you are travelling to, we are able to give you a private prescription for antibiotics. Needles are provided in the travel packs that can be purchased.
