

Email me at joanne10664@gmail.com organisation of former Israeli and Palestinian combatants leading a non-violent struggle against the occupation, co-founded by Bassam in 2005 (two years before his daughter was killed). McCann examines their personal journeys to come to terms with their tragedies and to find some way of bringing good from this by interweaving various threads of historical, contemporary, and later events as well as the migration of birds and their interactions with humans. It builds through many chapters, some very short, others longer, to the full account of the central events. The number of chapters references 'One Thousand and One Nights' which Rami read to his daughter, Smadar, at night. One could think of the structure as the warp and weft of a traditional carpet with the intricate border surrounding the central main design.

One of our readers referred to the story as a "hymn to humanity" and very moving. Other comments were: astonishing, brilliant, extremely honest and fascinating.

One person didn't finish it and, although she thought it beautifully written, couldn't get on with the style of writing. Some thought that the author had tried to get too many ideas and themes into it, while another found it difficult to separate fact from fiction.

Most agreed it was well worth reading, well researched and very informative.

Scores were mostly 8 and 9 out of 10, with one 4.

Our next book is 'Miss Benson's Beetle' by Rachel Joyce, at 7.30 pm on Wednesday 16th December, via Zoom unless otherwise informed. We hope to bring a Christmassy flavour with a glass of something and some nibbles.

#### From the Rectory

As we turn our gaze towards the Christmas season, we know this will be a Christmas like no other. At the time of writing there is no certainty about what we will be able to do. We'd like to have



family and friends over, to sing carols together, to share joy and laughter, but we are unsure what the pandemic guidelines will be. So many things we have always taken for granted seem up in the air!

It's a similar story with our Christmas church services. We will certainly have Zoom services each Sunday in December and on Christmas Day, but we don't know yet whether we will be able to hold services inside our church buildings or even outside them. We hope, however, to gather outside on the Sunday before Christmas or on Christmas Eve, to listen to carols and hear the story of the birth of Jesus. Please do keep an eye on our church website and noticeboards, or perhaps find out by word of mouth, to see if this and any Christmas services inside our churches may happen.



So much uncertainty, at a time of year which usually feels traditional and familiar! Yet the Christmas story is actually a mix of uncertainty, fear, hope and new life. A child, brought into a world under the rule of Rome and born in difficult circumstances, is the Christ child who is greeted, as Luke's gospel says, as "Saviour, who is the Messiah, the Lord". Good news conveyed by these simple words, which invite a lifetime's reflection: Jesus is "Emmanuel, which means, 'God is with us"". Words which speak of Jesus' identity and the work of the Spirit; which provide a testimony to the past, a witness to the present and hope for the future.

A traditional Christmas carol we often sing is 'O little town of Bethlehem', written in the mid-19<sup>th</sup> century but still very popular today. The last words of this

> carol also declare that, in Jesus and through his Spirit, 'God is with us': "O come to us, abide with us, our Lord Emmanuel". I hope we get the chance to sing this and other carols this Christmas and, in this time of uncertainty, hear the good news they proclaim.

### Weston Colville Parish Council

A meeting held at 7.30 pm on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> November via Zoom. Full minutes are available on *www.westoncolville.org.uk* The following items were discussed and where necessary agreed.

**Resignation** – it was noted that Cllr Jackson had tendered his resignation with immediate effect. The councillors all extended their gratitude for the works that Cllr Jackson had carried out during his time on the parish council, and determined that a formal letter of thanks would be sent, plus a note in Challenge.

**Road Safety** – this was discussed following the SID/ LHI update. Road safety actions in the village were discussed, as there was concern that accidents would occur due to speeding traffic. It was noted that it was no coincidence that neighbouring villages were going to greater lengths to reduce speeding. The measures that had been applied for were passive measures (roundels), as active measures required the installation of more street lighting (speed humps etc); the village roads do not lend themselves to chicanes. It was determined that Cllr Hubbard would contact Josh Rutherford to discuss further with him, as applications require his agreement, and for the clerk to carry out fact-finding into funding sources.

**Cambridge Eastern Access Consultation** – it was determined not to complete the consultation, but to place the link in Challenge for interested parties.

**Poppy Appeal** – it was determined to donate  $\pounds 10$  for the RBLI Poppy Appeal (S137).

**Grass Cutting Tenders** – it was determined that the duration of the tender would be for three years, that the areas involved would remain the same, with no additional changes to the instructions. The clerk was instructed to seek tenders for determination in January.

**Meeting Dates 2021** – the council will meet on the first Monday of the month, except in May for the AGM/APM, when the council will meet on Wednesday 5<sup>th</sup> May 2021.

**SID and LHI** – there was no update on the LHI, the deadline for the application had been the end of September. The SID was providing similar data, and it would next be used on the exits of the village.

**Footpaths** – it was noted that the bridge at the junction of Footpath 18 (Weston Colville Parish) and Footpath 15 (Carlton Parish) had still not been repaired, a new bridge had been placed on a path that was not a footpath. Cllr Batchelor requested that he be copied in on all correspondence relating to footpath issues. The signage that had been placed on the permissive paths, and on private paths had been making it easier for walkers to know where was permissible to go. The footpath 19 diversion should be formalised soon.

Flooding and Road Drainage – work on relocating the bridge at the bottom of Horseshoe Lane should be completed within 4 - 6 weeks, and the gullies at the Common Road end of the village done before Christmas. The work at Church End should take place this financial year. Cllr Durham will clear the gaps into the ditches. The sunken gulley on Mill Hill still has a dip, and it is not acting as a drain, although the work has apparently been completed.

**Street Lighting** – two of the nine street lights have been changed to LEDs, Cllr Vidler has chased to find out when the others are to be converted.

**Playground** – Brett Jones is able to install the new fence at the recreation ground in January, and has been instructed to do so. Cllr Hubbard carried out maintenance works at the recreation ground, and received help from a parishioner. The clerk had written to thank them. Cllr Hubbard requested that the clerk complete the grant offer form.

**Date of Next Meeting** – 4<sup>th</sup> January 2021, to be held via Zoom. There will be a planning meeting on 7<sup>th</sup> December.

### West Wratting Parish Council

Before giving you a précis of the draft minutes from the Zoom meeting held on 9<sup>th</sup> November, there are some particular points for your attention.

#### Dog fouling & Dog Handling and Control:

considerate dog owners are always welcome in West Wratting but please clear up after your dog to keep it a pleasant place for everybody.

You can use any plastic bag to pick up your dog's waste and put it in one of the dog waste bins or litter bins. Dog waste from your garden can be double-bagged and placed in your domestic waste bin.

It is important for all dog owners to take responsibility for cleaning up after their animal, as not only is it unpleasant to look at and even more unpleasant to step in, it can pose a health risk. For example, *toxocariasis* is a rare infection caused by roundworms in the digestive tracts of dogs. It can cause headaches, eye problems and fever in humans if they come into contact with it.

If you spot a dog fouling problem, you can report it to Environmental Services (*env.health@scambs.gov.uk*) or use the online form.

Those who fail to pick up after their dog can be fined £50, so please ensure you have bags or poop scoops with you every time you walk your dog.

It is also your responsibility to keep your dog under control, either on a leash or by command. It is frightening to children when a large dog is running amongst them. A lack of control could become a police matter so please be careful when on the recreation ground with your dog(s).

**Childrens Play Area Grass Cutting:** please, if anybody has a spare hour once a week in the summer, less often in the winter, to keep the grass cut in the play area contact Jenny Richards (parish clerk) or one of the parish councillors (see noticeboard).

b) All but one of the affordable houses built in Six Mile Bottom Road are now occupied.

**Finance:** the authorised payments and receipts are shown in the draft minutes.

**Budget:** this will be discussed at the January meeting and the council was asked to consider what projects or equipment might be needed for the future.

#### Maintenance:

*Pocket Park* – it was agreed that more time needs spending on the upkeep of the Pocket Park.

*Play Area* – see the item above.

*Dug Outs on Sports Ground* – it was provisionally agreed that the dug outs could be possibly used from November to March but must be removed once the season was over. This will be discussed at the next Sports Pavilion Committee meeting.

#### **Traffic issues & Speed Restriction Equipment:**

a £1,500 award has just been granted by the Wadlow Wind Farm Trust for the purchase of another SID for the village. The council will also have to put money into this project.

**Reports by District & County Councillors:** These are published on the website but Cllr Batchelor had two further points to make:

a) *Brexit* – if there is no deal, it may affect businesses in West Wratting. There is a link to the Chamber of Commerce: *www.cambridgeshirechamber.co.uk/brexit/*b) The Highways Officer, Nicola Burdon, has moved to a new post. Contact Cllr Batchelor if there are problems.

### Wildlife Friendly Gardening

Try not to cut back and tidy too much now. It's better to leave decaying plants as they are, creating homes for mammals and insects to hibernate in.

Hollow stemmed plants and seed heads are also great in providing a safe environment for our insects. Pile up dead wood and leaves in corners to help insects and small mammals to make warm homes.

Ivy really is the jewel of the winter months. Being an evergreen, it is the most important plant during the autumn. Its flowers provide a vital source of food for bees, butterflies and all other pollinators, its leaves provide shelter for birds and insects throughout the colder months, when other natural cover is thinning, and the birds enjoy its berries which are full of crucial calories just when they need it most!

If you are stuck for ideas for Christmas presents, why not buy something for wildlife, such as an insect hotel or a hedgehog house?
