Covid-19 Vaccinations

GRANTA Medical Practices

At the time of writing, we are about to embark on the mammoth task of vaccinating our 44,000 patients with the COVID-19 vaccinations. Please be assured that everyone will be vaccinated. However, please remember that we have to vaccinate in accordance with Public Health England's priority list.

Initial doses of the Pfizer vaccine were made available to areas of highest infection, including Peterborough City Hospital, and also to Addenbrookes Hospital, centres able to handle the ultra low (cryogenic) temperature storage needed. In the past few weeks, many Granta patients over 80 years old have been vaccinated at Addenbrookes. The authorisation of the AstraZeneca vaccine has enabled a wider rollout of vaccinations to GP practices and to other vaccination centres in Cambridgeshire.

As patients of Granta Medical Practices you will be invited for vaccination at the Sawston medical centre which has been set up as our vaccination hub. It is being staffed by practice staff and additional clinically trained volunteers. Appropriate space is needed as patients are requested to stay for 15 minutes for observation after being vaccinated.

Patients will be invited for vaccination by text, phone call, email or letter but should not pre-empt an invitation by phoning or emailing the practice. As a registered patient, GMP has your contact details. At the time of writing they are being restricted to weekends to minimise any impact on the provision of other primary care services by Granta staff.

Due to the extreme demand for the vaccine around the country we may get deliveries at short notice, which means we may have to contact you at short notice.

Please note that you will NEVER be asked for payment for a Covid-19 vaccination, and any texts,

phone calls, or letters requesting payment or bank details should be ignored.

Please continue to keep yourself and our community safe by adhering to national restrictions, social distancing, wearing of face masks and hand hygiene. We would like to thank you all for your patience and understanding whilst you wait for your vaccine.

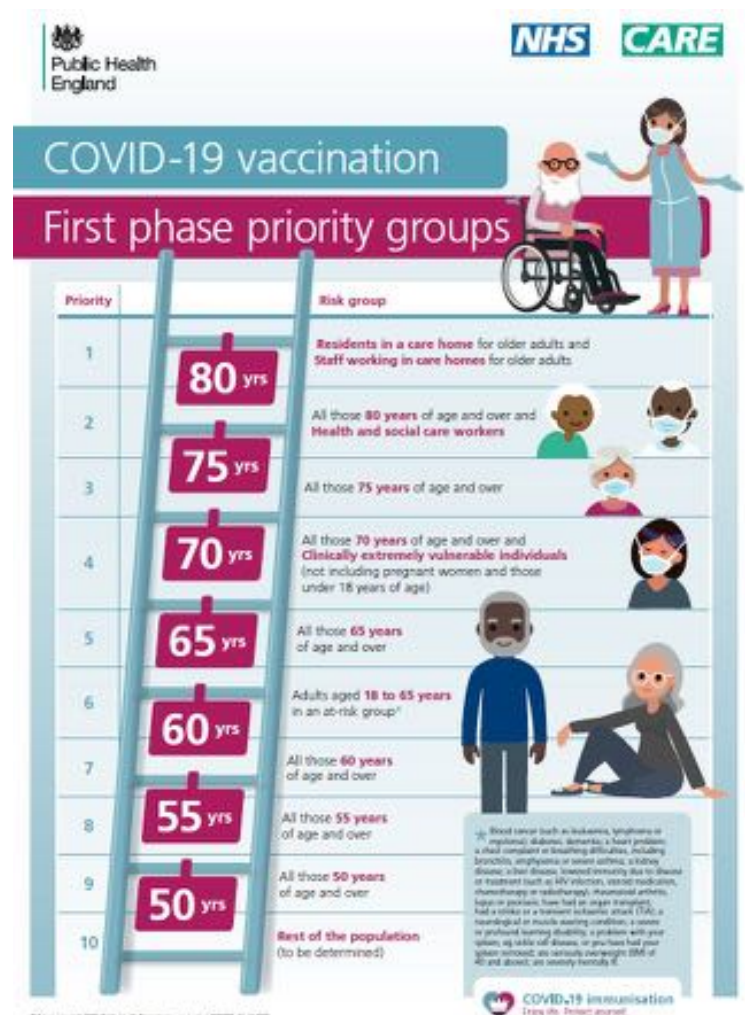

From the Rectory

When we see people in public these days, whether in the shops, perhaps at the doctors, or on television, invariably we see a kaleidoscope of masks. I've seen all sorts! Plain white or blue; multi-coloured home-made masks; even union jacks. Mostly people recognise the reasons for using them. Yet wearing a face mask during the pandemic has nevertheless touched on a raw nerve. Many of us feel uncomfortable about having to mask our faces. How do we communicate well if our faces are hidden? How do we read someone else's expression; how do we pick up on cues?

Maybe, however, there are some insights to gain. The prevalence of masks might encourage us to pay more attention to our whole body in communication. How do you smile with your eyes? How do you



communicate interest or sympathy with your body? As the Christian faith is incarnational, we remember it's our whole body, our whole self, we bring not only before each other but also before God: in kneeling or lifting hands, in speech or in silence, with our hearts or minds.

Our masks may also remind us of the way we present ourselves to the world. We may talk about 'putting on a brave face'; 'saving face'; or 'losing face'. In the Christian faith, however, we can't 'put on a face' before God. The gospels teach us that in following Jesus, we learn more about the truth of who Jesus is, but also who we are. Turning towards God calls for deep honesty. But if we gradually get used to this, we can also approach one another with deeper honesty, understanding and joy.

During this pandemic, but perhaps at any time in our lives, these truths may sometimes recede into the background and sometimes appear in sharp focus. Perhaps this is partly because for now, as the apostle Paul says, we "see in a mirror, dimly". Yet, as Paul adds, "we will see face to face". As we support and love one another in this difficult time, we may also seek to put aside our home-made, self-serving masks and attend to the presence of each other and to God with openness and joy.

West Wratting Book Club

At our December meeting we attempted to introduce a little Christmas atmosphere with drinks, nibbles, home-made Christmas hats and decorations. The book we read and discussed was 'Miss Benson's Beetle' by Rachel Joyce.

Set in the years after the Second World War, this is the story of a woman whose life was affected by childhood tragedy which left her emotionally and intellectually unfulfilled. She finally decides to follow her dream, inspired by her father, with unexpected consequences. It was generally agreed that it was an easy, exciting read, a 'page-turner' and well researched, although one person thought the writing somewhat facile. Another suggested it could be the script for a comic caper including a humorous description of the lives led by expatriate diplomatic wives of the period. There are, however, some serious

themes and dark moments, in particular in relation to a character damaged by his wartime experiences. It is also a study of how new situations and demands can reveal unexpected strengths and abilities, and cause roles to be reversed. Scores were mainly 8 out of 10, with one 6.

In January, we discussed 'The Hotel' by Daisy Johnson. This turned out to be unavailable as a physical or e-book, so we listened to the BBC Radio 4 serialisation (available on BBC Sounds). Not everyone was able to listen to all the episodes. It is a series of ghost stories set around a hotel in the Fens. It starts with a summary of the history of the hotel, the house that preceded it and some of the events that had happened over the years. The following episodes tell the story of different events and those involved, from the farmer's wife accused of being a witch to those who stay at or work at the later hotel. It becomes clear that this is a story of possession and perhaps revenge, with the main protagonists/victims linked by their DNA. It was agreed that it was very much gothic horror with some episodes more enjoyable than others. One person commented on the pleasure of listening to 'proper' English, with others saying that they had found it interesting; quirky but not enjoyable. The need of people to keep returning to a place in their past with perhaps double layers of meaning was raised. Another of our number suggested that it could be interpreted in a different way in as much as there are events from our past that haunt us in a metaphorical way. The final episode reminded some of us of 'The Blair Witch Project'. Scores were between 6 and 8 out of 10.

Our next book is 'Our Kind of Traitor' by the late John le Carré, to be discussed at 7.30 pm on Wednesday 17th February, via Zoom.

Flooding in Weston Colville – Your (Riparian) Responsibilities as a Householder

Surface water following heavy rainfall has again become a problem in Weston Colville. Work has already been carried out to alleviate the problems on Common Road and Church End. Properties along Chapel Road were particularly affected just before Christmas. Investigations carried out at the time, and after the water receded, determined why the water runoff was not contained in the existing drainage channels. The reports are available from the parish clerk. Several of the channels had not been cleared in a while, and debris had collected in them, reducing capacity.

The parish council considers it timely to remind everyone of their responsibility as a householder to keep the drainage ditches around their property clear. These are known as riparian responsibilities. The diagram below explains these responsibilities. Please be aware it is not the parish council's responsibility to keep drainage ditches by the side of the road clear.

A small team of parish councillors has volunteered to identify all areas in the parish subject to flooding by surface water, identify what needs to be done and track the progress of any work. They will liaise closely with Cambridgeshire County Council where their input is required. There is also a plan to help co-ordinate a joint effort by householders with riparian responsibilities.

It is not ideal that several of the original drainage channels have been piped in the past decades, a practice that is no longer supported by the Environment Agency, but if the whole community works to ensure the ditches are clear and pipes run freely and at capacity when needed, we should see a reduction in the number of occasions surface water causes a problem. The West Wrattling Park Estate was very disappointed to receive a complaint (anonymously) about the work being carried out to alleviate flooding to properties at the bottom of Horseshoe Lane, moving the footbridge which will allow higher flow of water in the water course. After talks with George Hay of CCC Highways the estate agreed that CCC could tip spoil from the river onto our land which when it dries out will be levelled and reseeded with grass. Maintenance to the River Stour beside Clamp's Lane will be carried out when the weather dries up, so we can gain access without making a mess.

Muriel Taylor, 1931 - 2021

If you have only become a Weston Colville resident in the last five years or so the name above will not be familiar. Those with a longer association will know my mother, who passed away in January, two weeks short of her 90th birthday. She lived at 6 Common Road for 61 years up to 2014, when she moved to Nichols Court in Linton. She spent her final days at the Meadows Care home near Haverhill.

During her time at Weston she had spells with the WI and Parish Council and for many years ran the Happy Circle Club (for older residents). She was an active supporter of the cricket club, helping out at fetes and fundraising events. After my father died in 1971, she spent seven years working at Cathodeon Crystals in Linton before marrying Arthur Taylor from West Wrattling. They enjoyed 16 years together until Arthur's death in 1994. Thereafter she lived contentedly alone, but in the knowledge that her family were close by and that she was supported by a circle of friends from both villages.

West Wrattling Parish Council

The following are some of the items discussed at the Zoom meeting held on Monday 11th January. The full draft minutes will be placed on the noticeboards.

Vacancy for a Parish Councillor: due to the resignation of Richard Holness there is still one vacancy on the parish council. Please contact myself on email (j.richards597@btinternet.com) or a parish councillor if you would like further information.

Finance: the payments and receipts are listed fully on the draft minutes.

Budget & Precept for 2021/2022: the chairman discussed the up-to-date accounts which show a healthy balance for the coming year. As there is no major project planned apart from the purchase of another SID, £1,500 towards which has been awarded to the council from Wadlow Wind Farm Foundation, and a possible LHI award where we will have to pay half the cost for further road safety improvements, a request for a precept increase of 2.6% (RPI) was put to the council. This was put to the vote and agreed.

Maintenance:

The Lamb Public House: Julie Ayre from Planning joined the Zoom meeting to discuss the situation regarding The Lamb public house and land. With regard to the safety of the building, this is inspected every three months by the Enforcement Officer. The owners have been liaising with Planning with regard to the development of the site but no decisions have yet been made. She said she would keep the parish council informed of any decisions and apologised for the delay in responding to queries raised by the council.

Highway Problems: the drains and gulleys are blocked with leaves etc, causing considerable flooding in The Causeway and also along the High

Street and Bull Lane. The road is also broken up in several places caused by the frost. Reports have been sent to Highways for over 5 months but nothing resolved. There are also deep potholes and very pitted road from The Chestnut Tree along the road to Withersfield. The Highways Officer has now left Highways with no replacement so far. Cllr Batchelor said he would see what could be done about pumping out the drains etc.

Overhanging branches: there are some trees whose branches are hanging over the road causing a vision obstruction. It is the responsibility of the owners to keep shrubs and trees pruned back and if not done the parish council or Highways can ask for this to be done. If not carried out, Highways would carry out the work and charge the owners for doing it.

Traffic issues: a decision will be made on either the 8th or 17th February concerning the LHI application submitted in December.

Weston Colville Parish Council

A meeting was held on Monday 4th January via Zoom. Full minutes and appendices can be found at <http://www.westoncolville.org.uk>.

Co-option of New Parish Councillor: Faye Parker was voted on to the council via co-option.

SID and LHI: at the time of the meeting the SID was near the pond, approaching Weston Green. Cllrs Hubbard and Ashbridge will form a working party to work on the LHI application to be discussed at the May meeting, followed by a public consultation in the early summer on possible actions.

Footpaths: Cllr Durham reported that the bridge at the junction of Footpath 18 (Weston Colville Parish) and Footpath 15 (Carlton Parish) had still not been repaired, and queried why a new bridge had been placed on a path that was not a footpath.

Flooding and Road Drainage: a working party consisting of Cllrs Garrod, Durham, and Parker will carry out a village wide flooding survey. Property owners on Chapel Road will be approached to highlight their riparian responsibility to keeping the ditches bordering their properties clear. An article would be placed in *Challenge* explaining the situation.

Grass Cutting Tenders: T J Potter will cut the verges, with a 1 metre cut 3 - 4 times a year, and once in the three-year period cut the full width of the verge, and spray the Reading Room Car Park.

It was determined that Simon Ratford will cut the play areas and war memorial.

The Meadow School

We welcomed the children back for only one day after Christmas, then heard the announcement that the country was going back into lockdown. Contrary to the rhetoric, our school was not closed; we have very much remained open for children of vulnerable families or critical, frontline key workers. We closed to everyone until 7th January to organise things safely, and the staff worked tirelessly changing all of our plans and re-writing our curriculum to enable us to deliver it remotely to two thirds of our cohort. Then came the trickier aspect still – what happened to the children at home who didn't have access to a laptop or tablet or adequate broadband? Our school community pulled together in the most generous way. Laptops were donated, and money to buy devices to allow everyone to access learning from home. The government laptop scheme only allocated our school ten devices, and as I type this, they still have not arrived.

We have been determined to keep things as structured and normal as we can for the children both in school and at home. We have merged the children in school to have four classes, with one teacher teaching them with Teaching Assistant support, and one teacher to

deliver live lessons to the children at home. This has been no mean feat and the teachers have been absolutely amazing in transforming their plans and getting their rooms set up to enable this. We are keeping our fingers crossed that we all stay fit and well and can continue to deliver this model.

School is a very different place to a year ago, with one way systems, Perspex screens, hand sanitiser dispensers, coned areas to play in, children not mixing outside their bubble, staff wearing face coverings in all communal areas, and all meetings being held online. We can never say we are Covid safe, but we can say we are very Covid aware.

Schools should be full of chatter, laughter, smiles and you should feel the 'buzz' as you walk around school. At the moment we still have an element of that and it is lovely to hear the children at home chatting to their teachers via Google Meet, but it isn't the same. The personal interaction, the smiles, the waves, the high-fives are all missing. We cannot wait to welcome every single one of our children back into school and are very much looking to the light at the end of this awfully long tunnel to be able to rebuild those connections and more than anything, just to be able to hug our loved ones. Please keep safe everyone.

Home Schooling – as home schooling resumes, we know lots of children will be disappointed they haven't been able to visit our stations, or for us to come and see them in school. We've put together some resources on our website, where you'll find everything from colouring in, to virtual tours of a fire station. We've also signposted some other topical resources that you might find useful.

Needing to revert back to remote learning and closing the college to the vast majority of our students came as a shock at the end of term. However, the resilience and adaptability of our staff, students and families has been remarkable.

While the press is quick to criticise teachers and teenagers, I have the privilege of working alongside both and observing how hard both have worked to make online learning a success. Overnight, teachers changed curriculum plans and upskilled to move their regular lessons onto Microsoft Teams. Students stepped up, with the support of their parents and carers, to take greater responsibility for their learning.

Members of staff and volunteers from the local community have contributed to the setup of a rapid Covid-19 testing centre on site. The college's sports centre has been converted into testing bays and the trained testing team, expertly led by our Sports Centre Manager, is now working hard to administer lateral flow tests for staff and students based in school.

In time, as we welcome back more teachers and students to work and learn in school, more testing will be required. While not as accurate as the lab-processed PCR Covid-19 tests, the lateral flow devices can help us to identify asymptomatic cases amongst the college community.

I am incredibly proud of how colleagues and families have responded in the current challenges. The volume of appreciative messages and comments of support have also helped to keep morale high and community relationships strong.
