#### West Wratting Parish Council

The following is a prècis of the minutes of the parish council meeting held on 12<sup>th</sup> July. The draft minutes can be read on the noticeboards in the village.

#### **Opportunity for Public Statement:**

Cobby McCall told the parish council that the PCC had been awarded £3,900 from the Wind Farm Fund to purchase a new motor mower which will be maintained by the PCC but available for use by other groups in the village.

He is putting an item in Chassenge concerning dogs running off footpaths as poults are now being released by the d'Abo estate.

The verges have not been cut, following local government policy. Some field paths have not been reinstated due to weather conditions. The footpaths are being kept clear, and litter continues to be picked up by his team.

**Vacancy for a Councillor:** it is hoped that this position has been filled.

**Finance:** full financial details are shown in the minutes. The internal audit has been carried out satisfactorily and all documents have now gone to the external auditors.

#### Maintenance:

The Lamb Pub development: the meeting organised by the developers to discuss their ideas for the development was well attended. Comments are being invited by the parish council and some have already been received.

Highways: the drains and gullies have still not been cleared out and the council has asked Cllr Batchelor to expedite this matter and if possible give a date so people can be aware and not leave cars parked over drains.



*Verges:* the local government policy at present is to allow the verges to grow freely apart from where vision is compromised.

#### **Recreation Ground:**

*Dumping:* most of the rubbish has been taken away by skip but there is still some asbestos and Dist Cllr Harvey has been given details of where it is situated in order for SCDC to clear it.

*Recreation ground gate:* the keypad and padlock are broken, reported to the Sports Pavilion Committee.

*Dug-outs:* a request to review the decision to only erect the dug outs from October to March was discussed. It was agreed that the original decision should stand.

#### **Traffic issues:**

*SID equipment:* there have been problems with the batteries not lasting, which is being taken up with the manufacturers.

*Parking:* it is against the law to park on white lines and pavements, and best not to park on a bus stop.

**Reports by District & County Cllrs:** these are published on the website.

**Next Parish Council Meeting:** Monday 13th September in the village hall, all welcome.

#### Highways Update, West Wratting PC

Early in 2020 the council invited CCC Highways to review proposed improvements. A team including parish councillors, a Highways representative, and local councillor Henry Batchelor walked the roads in the village and discussed the following requirements: extension of the 30 mph limit to beyond the new housing development along Six Mile Bottom Road; a footpath from the new housing development to the junction of Honey Hill and Six Mile Bottom Road and improvements to that junction; village 'gating'; and improved speed limit marking.

The Highways representative reported back that the 30 mph extension would not be approved as it did not comply with CCC policy, and estimated the footpath cost at around £75K which, unfortunately, is far beyond the limits of the parish council budget. A Local Highways Initiative bid was submitted for the other items but unfortunately was not approved. We are considering future options.

Please would everyone using the village hall, recreation ground, or church, or receiving visitors, ensure that vehicles are not driven, illegally, on the pavement and left parked there. The dropped curbs to the recreation ground are marked with a new sign –



please do not park in front of the dropped curbs, and keep the crossing clear at all times.

Please do not place large objects on the verge unless you are clear that you own the land. Highways usually owns the land adjoining the carriageway.

#### Footpaths (P3)

As all walkers will know, the footpaths are very overgrown due to a combination of rain, Sahara dust and sun. We had an early cut about two months ago, and the County Council confirms that the public cutters are contracted to do the second cut before the August Bank Holiday. This is a long way off, so if anyone is able to help with strimming or mowing the paths, this would be a great help. Otherwise, the only solution is to keep walking the paths as much as possible so the grass is gradually trampled down.

There has also been considerable growth of hedges and brambles, so, again, if any walkers have hedge clippers or secateurs, it would be a great help if they have time to do some cutting back wherever they walk. I know some walkers already do this, but this an 'all hands to the pump' year, so the more of us that do this, the clearer the paths will be.

Meanwhile, Nigel has cut all cross-field paths, including the path round The Grove and also the path between moat and Lordships fields. Thank you.

**Poults** – I had a call from Nigel, the farm foreman, to say the poults will be released imminently, and he and Charlotte, the gamekeeper, would be very grateful if dogs are kept under close control at all times. They are very aware that most people in the village do behave responsibly, so this is just a gentle reminder.



#### Nature Notes

Borage (Borago officinalis) is still flowering strongly in the fields. Shakespeare called it the herb for courage. It's worth watching the bees and other insects pollinating the blue flowers when they're highlighted by the evening sun. A fun interactive build-you-own-bumblebee identification key can be found at the Natural History Museum (https:// www.nhm.ac.uk/research-curation/research/projects/ bombus/key\_british\_colour.html).

Your woods, fields and gardens will also be full of young, gauche birds. Tits (of all species) hatched this year are easy to identify: their colours look faded and there's a strong yellowish tinge to them. Of course, the rare young Marsh Tits are of particular interest to us. Sightings, please, to cambsmarti@gmail.com or Chassenge. Thanks!

It's not well known that the water surface (the air/ water interface) is an acoustic mirror. Sounds in air don't cross easily into water and vice versa, which means we don't hear noise under the waves. A lot of aquatic animals communicate by sound: snapping shrimps; whales which sing to each other across oceans; and herring (before they turn into kippers) talk to each other with . . . farts. 

quiet-please-fish-are-flirting/). Flatulent herring almost caused a diplomatic incident between Sweden and Russia. Strange noises in Stockholm harbour were attributed to Russian submarines, till two Swedish researchers showed that you can get the same noises by putting your ear and a fresh supermarket herring into a bowl of water and gently squeezing the herring. The 2004 Ig Nobel prize for Biology was awarded for this discovery: www.improbable.com/ig/ winners/#ig2004 and www.youtube.com/watch? v=xQ1Jr6QqSlE.

Sadly, humans are creating incredible amounts of noise pollution underwater. Cavitation (small air bubbles created and destroyed by fast propellers on boats) is one cause, powerful military sonar is another. Sound travels further in water than in air, so noise must be hugely disruptive for underwater creatures even at a distance. Human noise pollution has been posited as a reason for the mass strandings of whales and dolphins along our coasts (www.theguardian.com/ environment/2021/feb/04/cacophony-human-noisehurting-marine-life-scientists-warn). So if you're messing about on the water this summer, spare a thought for the life beneath your feet and keep the speed down. Or better still, use a sailing boat.

If you see one out, it will most likely need immediate veterinary attention. The only time a hedgehog is OK out during the day is when it's been disturbed and is renesting. This will be obvious as the hedgehog will have leaves and grass in its mouth.

Sadly, our Y5 children didn't quite make their residential as they were still banned when they were due to go. To make up for this, we recently held a





I appreciate that parts of my constituency, including West Wratting, are poorly served by the main providers of mobile signal, especially in terms of reliable indoor 4G coverage. I welcome the signing of Shared Rural Network (SRN) agreement between Mobile Network Operators (MNOs) and the Government. The deal, which is worth £1billion, will share investment costs between MNOs and the Government and increase 4G mobile coverage throughout the UK to 95% by the end of 2025, irrespective of what network provider people use. It will be underpinned by a legally binding coverage commitment from each operator. I will feed in areas of poor coverage into the Shared Rural Network programme and continue to press for improvements as soon as possible.
