Christingle in West Wratting Church





West Wratting Parish Council

A parish council meeting was held on Monday 8th November and these are some of the matters discussed. Some of the items on the agenda were not discussed because of time, but will be on January's agenda. The full draft minutes will be posted on the two noticeboards. Ten parishioners attended.

Pre-plan CAM1846 – Telecommunications

Installation: it was agreed that there was a need for a 5G installation to improve mobile reception but the proposed siting of a 16m monopole plus base cabinets was totally inappropriate. There were many anomalies in the submission, with misinformation and ignorance of the site. It was agreed to put out a flier to all residents explaining the situation and asking them to write direct or email their comments to N Yager at SCDC Planning, as time to make a response was short. A request for the Conservation Officer to visit the site will also be made.

WWFC: Chris Hodson, chair of the WWSP committee, was present at the Halloween party and as soon as he was aware of the fireworks and it was safe to do so, he stopped them. He has apologised and assured the parish council that it would not occur again on Bonfire Night.

Finance: full details are in the draft minutes. Item c will be discussed at the next meeting in January which is the budget meeting, as will item 7.

Grass Verges & Pocket Park Maintenance:

Cllr Davey is putting together a plan of all the areas needing to be cut, including the Pocket Park, and will then seek quotes for the work.

Six Free Trees: Cllr Lock has ordered a mix of six trees (whips) to be sited between Concordia House and Chapel Road. Permission has been requested from Highways at a cost of £107.

The Queen's Platinum Jubilee: two suggestions have been received but please keep your ideas coming.

Asbestos Removal: the parish council has asked for planning details showing the boundaries of properties adjoining the recreation ground from Planning at SCDC, as they were originally built as council houses. The chairman asked Cllrs Harvey and Batchelor to verify the status as the parish council owns the land on behalf of the residents and the public have access.

The next parish council meeting will be held on 10th January 2022 and all are welcome to attend.

Weston Colville Parish Council

The following items were discussed at a meeting on Monday 1st November. The full minutes can be found at www.westoncolville.org.uk

Hedge at Reading Room Car Park – Cllr Ashbridge will trim the hedge. The owner of the car that has been abandoned in the car park will be asked to remove it by the end of the year.

Chassenge – £125 will be contributed.

The Queen's Green Canopy – a presentation was received, which is available on the parish council website. A note will be put in Chassenge

Defibrillator – this is rescue-ready. It was determined to sign up to the Webnos system which will take responsibility for checking the defibrillator, and reporting it on the system. It was also determined to look into servicing, and downloading the manual.

Poppy Appeal – the parish council will contribute to the RBL Poppy Appeal, via Just Giving.

Flooding – the drains had been done at Church End, and a new kerbed island created to divert the water, and the road widened. New grips need to be dug on Common Road. Cllr Garrod requested that another grit bin was purchased for storage, to be placed behind the bus shelter. New drains were being put in on Mill Hill, and Highways will be asked about the road resurfacing, and if work on the drains would be carried out at the same time.

SID and LHI – the grant application has been made. Once the result of the application was received, a survey could be generated, prior to a public meeting.

Footpaths – the bridge at College Farm has been taken down by the owners. At the time of the meeting, the debris had been placed on the footpath, obstructing it. The owners had 14 days to clear it.

The 26MW wind farm at Wadlow Farm supplies the annual equivalent of 15,000 homes, or 29% of the houses in the South Cambridgeshire District. An annual payment is made by the owner of the wind farm for the lifetime of the wind farm into The Wadlow Wind Farm Community Fund.

Grants are available for projects benefiting local communities that are run by not-for-profit organisations. Grants will normally be in the range of £100 to £10,000, and organisations must comply with CCF's due diligence process as detailed on their website: https://www.cambscf.org.uk/wadlow-windfarm-community-fund.html

Nature Notes

You've probably noticed the arrival of lots of continental birds to our island. Bramblings and thrushes such as Redwings and Fieldfares are all here. Fieldfares have arrived two weeks later than usual. This year, their summer homes didn't get cold and inhospitable enough to drive them out until the middle of October, instead of the beginning of that month. European Chaffinches also migrate here for the winter, but it's mostly only females. They form flocks in our fields, which our resident Chaffinches don't. These flocks may include the very similar Bramblings, the 'Nordic Chaffinch' with unique bold black wing markings. The males have a very short, cropped waistcoat of rosy pink which only comes halfway down the breast, unlike a true Chaffinch.

If you're very lucky, you'll see a Blackbird which is jet-black all over with black bill and legs, like they've been dipped in soot. They're slightly larger and often pretty jumpy. This is a European migrant and they're used to being shot at. It's speculated that the extra black colouration absorbs more heat from the sun.

We had a pleasant surprise in November: after a long absence, one of Joyce Oliver's colour-ringed Marsh Tits returned to her famous birdfeeder bistro. His lightning visit gave us two colours – white over black – enough to tell us that it was likely to be White over Black 'Vinnie', Black over White over Black 'Rasputin' or Green over White over Black 'Czar Nicholas', all of which show up for Christmas lunch. Sadly, Czar Nicholas hasn't been seen since Christmas 2019 and Vinnie since January 2018.
