### West Wratting Book Club

After our summer break we met outside at The Chestnut Tree to discuss two books.

'The Wild Silence' is the sequel to 'The Salt Path' by Raynor Wynn. It is an examination of the author's childhood, her and Moth's earlier life together, their later experiences, and how this brought her to writing 'The Salt Path'. She explores the consequences of its publication and their attempt to regain the positive effects on Moth of walking with a perhaps ill-advised trip to Iceland.

There were contrasting views amongst our group with one finding it difficult to get into, another not wanting to read it but then being pulled in, while others loved it. All agreed on her excellent descriptive powers and the amazing relationship that Raynor and Moth had. One of our group thought it was rather disjointed but, in contrast to some of our number, enjoyed the Icelandic trip.

Despite certain reservations, it is still worth reading if only to discover what followed the earlier story and how Moth fared. Scores ranged from 7 to 9 out of 10.

'The Versions of Us' by Laura Barnet opens at Cambridge University where the main protagonists are students, giving it some local interest. It examines how small decisions can change the pattern of our lives and the directions we take. We are given three versions of the story with chapters of each version following on. One had to make the decision whether to read all of version 1, then 2 and 3, or read each chapter of each version following on from each other. We all seem to have decided on the latter but agreed that it would be useful to have notepad and pen to hand to keep track. One person felt unable to read it. Another felt it was a clever idea but was not keen on the writing style. Others enjoyed it, liked the concept and the question that whatever path you take do you always get to the right end, the intertwining of lives with happiness and unhappiness on each path. All scores were 7 out of 10.

Our next book is 'Daughter of Fortune' by Isabelle Allende, to be discussed on Wednesday 20<sup>th</sup> October at 7.30 pm at The Chestnut Tree.

Just a reminder that prescriptions are now being held at the pub for your collection. These are put into a bag at the surgery which is picked up and brought to the pub on Monday, Wednesday and Friday. Please allow a little extra time if you are collecting from us.

Sorry, this seems very early, but we now have RNLI Christmas cards available. We will also be advertising our Christmas menu shortly.

Finally, we are taking a holiday to coincide with the October half term. There will be relief managers staying at the pub but we will be operating on reduced hours and not serving food from Friday 22<sup>nd</sup> October to Sunday 31<sup>st</sup> October. The pub will still be open every day as follows for drinks:

Monday to Thursday 5.30 pm to 11.30 pm Friday 4 pm to midnight Saturday noon to midnight Sunday noon to 10.30 pm.

Please bear in mind the reduced hours during the week if you need to collect prescriptions. We appreciate that some of you may prefer not to come out after dark; if you need to collect earlier in the day



please call the pub during opening hours the day before. We can then check your prescription is here and arrange a convenient time for you to pick up during the following day.

Apologies but we will also not be serving food from Friday 19th to Sunday 21st November due to a family wedding. Whilst we are not serving food, if any of you would like to come in for a drink and bring or order in a takeaway we are happy for you to do so, and our team will provide plates, cutlery etc if needed.

### West Wratting Clay Shoot


Once again our annual clay morning took place at Six Mile Bottom, hosted by Richard and Jackie Clarke.

### Weston Colville Community Flood Plan

The village Community Flood Plan has now been approved by the parish council and the latest version can be viewed on the parish council website (now in a more prominent position for easy access) at www.westoncolville.org.uk

The Flood Plan, initially mentioned in the April edition of Chasses, identifies areas of the village that are most prone to flash flooding during periods of heavy rainfall and marks them on maps of Church End and Weston Green end of Weston Colville. It provides information where help can be obtained in the event of a flood and identifies personnel and organisations who can provide assistance. In this context we have five volunteer Flood Wardens from the village who will be available to help out during flooding events: Bridget Durham (07790 705821), Faye Parker (07815 608897), Peter White (07757 257530), Alastair Douglas (291475) and John Garrod (07776 061492); contact details are also available on the website.

The Flood Plan has been developed in conjunction with the Environment Agency who have also provided the village with various pieces of equipment, free of charge, to help mitigate the effects of flooding. These include hydrosacks and hydrosnakes which serve the

same purpose as sand bags but are much easier to store and move around. They will be stored in black 'grit' containers at Church End and by the Reading Room. They will be kept locked to avoid theft but access will be via parish council members and particularly the Flood Wardens. A submersible pump, drain rods and 'Flood' signs are also available via the Flood Wardens.

We would like to remind residents of the rights and responsibilities of riparian owners, ie if you own land adjoining, above, or with a watercourse running through it, you have certain rights and responsibilities for its maintenance and clearance to enable water to flow freely.



### From the Rectory

At the time of writing, we are looking forward to harvest festivals in our churches. Harvest festivals in this country are usually traced back to the 1840s when the church responded to the many 'Harvest Home celebrations' by including an annual harvest thanksgiving service on the first Sunday of October, often accompanied by bringing to church gifts of fresh produce and other foodstuffs.

Nowadays our harvest festivals in church are usually celebrated sometime in early-mid autumn and are times when we give thanks for the many gifts of God and seek to be generous in Christ's name. ### Nature Notes

Autumn is definitely here, time to start the autumnal feeding that keeps our wild birds going through the winter. We know that young Marsh Tits rely on village garden feeders from October to March. It helps make up for the fact that 93% of their food resource – British native woodland – has gone.

Sightings of these rare birds would be very welcome at cambsmarti@gmail.com or Chassenge. Thank you!

Please, please clean your feeders regularly. We have seen a male Bullfinch along Mill Hill with a Scaly Leg infection so bad that it couldn't stand on its feet. Scaly Leg looks like the bird's feet and legs are encrusted with salt; it is contagious, caused by mites and also by a virus, and can be passed to and from domestic poultry. Clean feeders go a long way to limiting transmission of this disease.


And now, some happy people. Early last month, Kelly Pryce invited us to ring the birds in her garden

for science and was delighted to meet this Blue Tit. The bird clearly liked Kelly too – it let her live. It must be her Irish charm and love of nature which spared her life. (Blue Tits are small, brightly coloured and



nutritious – natural predator targets – but also abundant. How so? Because a) they'll eat your birdseed till you're out of house and home; b) they breed like rabbits in any warm, dark place and c) they are unremittingly ferocious. No-one takes on a Blue Tit with impunity . . .)

Later in September, we encountered a new Marsh Tit at Johnny and Emma Kaye's garden, our first since lockdown. It now rejoices in the name of Green over

It's not well known that energyefficient LED lights are worse for moths than yellow sodium vapour streetlights, because



LEDs produce more blue light. A study in Oxon, Bucks and Beds published last August found that moth caterpillar numbers in hedges beside rural roads were 52% lower under LEDs and 41% lower under sodium lights compared to nearby unlit areas. In grass verges, moth caterpillars near LEDs were a third lower than in unlit areas, while sodium lights had little effect (https://www.science.org/doi/10.1126/sciadv.abi8322).

The good news is that LEDs are dimmable and can be linked to motion sensors and have cheap filters fitted to remove blue light. In 2019, Worcs County Council fitted lights with red filters to a road to help bats. There has been no effect on road safety (www.bbc.co.uk/news/uk-england-hereford-

worcester-49534621). Maybe, our local councils could fit red filters to new LED lights?

### West Wratting Parish Council

The following is a précis of the minutes of the parish council meeting held on 13<sup>th</sup> September. The draft minutes can be read on the noticeboards in the village.

- 1. **Opportunity for Public Statement:** three members of the audience wished to take part in the discussion regarding issues with the WWFC/Sports Pavilion.
- 2. Vacancy for a Councillor: Dr Matt Williams-Gray, who had been proposed at the July meeting and accepted, signed the Declaration of Acceptance form and the Declaration of Registered Interests, countersigned by the Chairman, who welcomed him on to the council.
- 3. **Planning:** a retrospective planning application made for 38 High St and 9 High St has been looked at. There has been no breach of planning control.

#### 4. Maintenance:

The Lamb Pub development: there is nothing new to report at present.

Highways: the drains and gullies have still not all been cleared out. Cllr Batchelor will expedite this matter. Complaints also about the road sweeper which visited twice to do pavements and road, both before harvesting began so a complete waste of time.





*Footpaths:* it was suggested that this now becomes a fixed item on the agenda if Cobby agrees.

Verges & Pocket Park: six free trees from SCDC will be put in the pocket park and Ashley Gerrard will check the park for suitable siting. The question of the grass cutting contract will be on the next meeting's agenda.

### 5. Recreation Ground:

Recreation ground gate: Cllr Davey is looking at ways to achieve simpler and better access through the gate as at present it is difficult to open.

Asbestos: this has not yet been removed. Cllr Harvey will check this out.

Noise & other issues: there have been many complaints by residents local to the rec about the high sound level of music played whilst training is going on and then again in the evening. Chris Hodson, Chairman of the WWFC, was keen to get these matters resolved and was happy to hold a special meeting to sort out the issues.

#### 6. Traffic issues:

*SID equipment:* this is now back in working order and seven new poles will be sited in the village in order to move the SID sign round.

*Parking:* the cost of marking the dropped kerbs was too expensive so this idea has been dropped. The area for disabled parking needs to be remarked.

**Reports by District & County Cllrs:** these are published on the website.

The **next Parish Council meeting** will be held on Monday 8th November in the village hall and all are welcome.

Covid Community Champion – it was determined that Jo Jackson and Melanie Stammers should be nominated for all their efforts coordinating and carrying out help for the vulnerable during the pandemic.

**Defibrillator** – the clerk will carry out some fact finding with local parish councils as to how often their defibrillators are checked and serviced, and also whether the cabinets are plugged in.

Highways Actions at the Ford on Horseshoe Lane – the concrete sandbags had been removed from the bank so agricultural machinery could fit through the ford. Large concrete blocks had been placed on top of the banks, to stop vehicles circumnavigating the gates during the winter months. There was a real concern that during heavy rains, the soil would erode into the ford leading to flooding issues. A ridge had also been created, damming the stream that ran behind the houses. Cllr Batchelor was asked to chase Highways about this before the autumn rains begin.

**Dog Waste Bin** – SCDC had determined that as there was a dog waste bin at the top of Horseshoe Lane, and there was no evidence of a lot of waste on the paths near the ford, that they would not provide a bin (combined dog waste and litter bin). The suggestion was that the council purchase the bin, and pay for it to be emptied, and that it should be sited near the former garage plot. The clerk would find out about costs of the bin and emptying.

Free Trees from SCDC – there was no more room on parish council land for a new tree. The Reading Room Committee and Johnny Kaye will be asked whether they required any trees. One could be planted by the bench on Mill Hill.

Flooding – the gullies and pots will be cleared within three months on Mill Hill, Chapel Road and Common Road. Cllr Garrod had an updated version of the Flood Plan. Cllr Garrod was thanked for all his work.

**SID** and LHI – Cllrs Ashbridge and Hubbard will apply for the maximum amount available through the Local Highways Initiative (LHI) of £15,000 (10% paid by the parish council). Measures were likely to include gates at the village entrances/exits, speed roundels painted on the road, and more repeater signs.




