Restoration of West Wratting Pocket Park

West Wratting Pocket Park is a semi-wild area of land about 0.75 hectare, planted with a selection of more than 110 trees. To visit it, head out of West Wratting along Six Mile Bottom Road and you will find it on the right about half way to the Icknield Way crossing. (Grid reference: 52.1506602, 0.3353217)



Originally the pocket park was the village chalk pit, owned by West Wratting Parish Council. When it was no longer used for this purpose the council leased the land to Cambridge County Council highways department. When the lease expired in 1993, members of the village and parish council chose to turn it into a nature reserve and name it the 'Pocket Park'.

Top soil was applied over the whole area, then in 1994 West Wratting Parish Council, led by John Cunningham, invited our community to help with the co-ordinated planting of trees. Families and individuals from West Wratting planted trees, wild flowers and grass.

For a long time during its initial growing phase the park was maintained by Melvyn Cottage (one of its founder members). Later the parish council employed somebody to mow a grassy path around the park twice a year. Occasionally a party of volunteers from the village has been organised to clear the weeds and tidy up the park.



Recently maintenance has been neglected and the park has become overgrown with brambles and weeds. After 28 years of unchecked growth, the trees and hedges are due to be pruned to allow light and space for them to grow healthy and strong. The parish council has arranged for this work to be carried out in early February.

Our goal is to restore the pocket park to being a place for trees and nature to thrive and for local visitors to enjoy.

Things to consider for this project are:

- Access it is possible to walk or cycle to the pocket park but please be extremely careful with road safety. There is space for two vehicles to park off the road in front of the gate.
- **Information** it would be nice to have a sign on the gate that is descriptive / informative.
- **Tree maintenance** a tree surgeon will attend to the overgrowth and damaged branches during this winter dormant period.
- General maintenance we hope to arrange further working parties once the tree work has been done. The parish council hopes to find somebody who can mow the paths 3 - 4 times per year.
- Encouraging and supporting existing wildlife workers and visitors should be respectful of the habitats and wildlife that live in the park.

If you visit the park, look out for hares, foxes and badgers living there. As well as these, many birds and insects feed on the variety of wild plants. There are some large nests in the tree tops; perhaps somebody will have an idea what kind of bird they belong to.

The pocket park belongs to the parish council and the people of West Wratting. It is our responsibility to take care of it for its environmental benefits and for future generations. It would be lovely to hear from anybody who is interested in supporting the restoration and maintenance of the pocket park. Please get in touch with your ideas and knowledge of the wildlife / history of our Pocket Park.

West Wratting Parish Council

The following is a prècis of the draft minutes of the meeting held on 10th January 2022, which will be posted on the two noticeboards.

Planning:

- 1. Colin McCall congratulated the council on the outcome of the *proposed telecommunications mast installation*, which has been refused by SCDC Planning.
- 2. *Borehams' proposed development*: the developer has sent another set of pre-plans which the parish council will discuss at a planning meeting on 18th January.

Finances: the authorised payments are shown in full in the draft minutes.

- 1. Budget for 2022/23: the chairman said the accounts were in good order but asked about any possible major costs in the coming year. A second MVA sign will cost approx £3,500 and money needs to be set aside for any work to be carried out on the pocket park. It was agreed that the budget would remain the same.
- 2. *Precept for 2022/2023:* this was discussed and a vote taken and it was agreed that an increase of 3% should be requested.





3. *The parish council's contribution towards grass cutting of the recreation ground*: it was agreed that this should be increased by 3%. At the same time the contributions received from the Tennis Club and WW Football Club should also be increased by 3% for the maintenance of the ground, eg hedgecutting and tree pollarding etc.

Maintenance:

- 1. *Highways:* the drains have been cleared and new gullies cut but there has been a repeat sewage flooding caused by the rubbish put into the system. Please see separate item on this.
- 2. *Pocket park & grass verges*: Cllr Davey needs to know what work is going to be carried out and the possible cost before confirming the employment of people to do this work. Please see separate item on the history of the pocket park.
- 3. The *six free trees* have been received and will be planted in the designated site.
- 4. Two deep *potholes* have been reported to Highways but CCC have queried the pothole in Hayter Close, saying it is the responsibility of the houseowner as the road has not been adopted. The parish clerk is looking into this.

Recreation ground: the substance thought to be asbestos has been tested and once the result is known it will then be removed in the correct way.

Jubilee Celebrations: please read the chairman's item about this.

The next parish council meeting will be held on Monday 14th March at 8 pm, and all are welcome to attend. It is hoped that the Age UK Mobile Warden will give a short summary of her work.

Nature Notes

Snowdrops and Winter Aconites are out; the air is sweet with the sugary, aniseed scents of Sweet Box (*Sarcococca spp*) and the nutmeg fragrance of Wintersweet (*Chimonanthuas praecox*). If you're lucky enough to know a Nepalese Paper Plant (*Daphne bholua 'Jacqueline Postill'*), the honeyed smell is so powerful you could lean on it.

You will all have noticed the increase in bird songs outside. Great Tits seem particularly vocal with their "Teacher Teacher" call, but they are also excellent mimics. I heard one in the Botanic Gardens which I mistook for a Long-Tailed Tit. In the conifers, Goldcrests are surprisingly loud for Britain's tiniest bird, best described as a very high-pitched "Fiddlydiddly-dee!" They will come down to sing right in front of you, which is rather brave for a bird weighing the same as a 20p piece.

In early spring, the best things to attract birds to your garden may surprise you: water and cotton wool. Lots of people put out food – in surburbia, there is estimated to be one feeder for every nine birds. What is not well known is that in freezing conditions, the big risk is dehydration. To generate heat, you need to metabolise food. To do that, you need water. And the

available water has turned to ice. Clean, unfrozen water, especially in the early mornings, is a magnet for cold birds.

Cheap cotton wool, dry sphagnum or wood moss are very good at attracting nesting birds. Spiders' webs are favoured by Long-Tailed Tits and Goldcrests, as their cosy, enclosed nests have to expand like bellows as their brood grows; strong, stretchable spider silk holds it all together. But beware: synthetics like acrylic and polyester will not rot away at the end of the season. The long fibres of horse, dog and human hair are deadly, though birds love to line their nests with it. I've seen a Blue Tit nestling which had lost its foot when it became entangled in horse hair, cutting off its blood supply.



I'm delighted to report

that our oldest Marsh Tit, Black over Red 'Moaty', has survived the winter and seems to have paired up for the 2022 breeding season. S/he's six years old now, three times the normal wild lifespan. Len and Ben Eeles took these photos of Moaty and its unringed partner last month in Church End, Weston Colville. Note to bird feeders in Church End: Moaty is very partial to sunflower hearts! Joyce Oliver has seen Black over White over Black 'Rasputin' along Mill Hill, also feeding on sunflower hearts, together with a Brambling. Enjoy this beautiful 'Viking Chaffinch' while you can - they will be gone by the end of March.

LVC students have been enjoying enriching learning opportunities in recent weeks. We teach about things like the plague and small pox, we never envisaged we would be ourselves living through a pandemic that in years to come people will learn about in History lessons in school.

This term in school, the children will be studying the following topics that will drive much of their learning:

Infants – 'Grab Ya Brolly!' focussing on UK weather and Grace Darling;

Years 3 and 4 – 'Rainforest Adventure', looking at South America, and also studying rocks as a side focus topic;

Years 5 and 6 - 'Where in the World?' focussing on comparing the UK and the USA.

All of our year groups have been undertaking mammoth Design Technology projects this term, which have involved many lessons researching, evaluating and experimenting.



Year 5/6 have evaluated, explored

and researched different musical instruments. They then spent a whole day making their very own musical instrument. There was lots of measuring, cutting, gluing, fastening and testing but by the end of it, all of the children were able to perform on their own instrument. We were incredibly impressed with the orchestra they formed!

The Infants did exactly the same for their biscuit making project. This included the very hard task of tasting lots of biscuits to see what the crunch, texture, crumbliness and of course, taste was like. They then

used all of these ideas to design and make their own biscuits. The test was in how they tasted and I think we all agreed they were yum!



Thanks to our wonderful Parent Teacher Association (PTA) and Tesco blue token community collection, we have been able to re stock our library with some amazing new books, and replaced some very old books from our reading scheme. One of the most powerful things we can do in school is enable children to find a passion for reading as this opens up so many opportunities in the rest of their life. We are always on the look out for community volunteers who might have an hour to spare each week to come in and listen to our children read. The children love it and so do the volunteers!
