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From the Rectory

It was with deep sadness we received the news Queen Elizabeth had died in early September. It brought with it a sense of loss on many levels and may



take some time to sink in. Queen Elizabeth was the only monarch many of us had known all of our lives. A constant presence in the political and cultural landscape of this country for so long, in times of both peace and adversity. There has been a tangible sense that an era has come to an end; that this country will never be quite the same again.

Yet also something new has begun. When I first heard reference to 'the King' it felt strange! Yet I was very moved listening to the often deeply personal King's address given on the day after the Queen's death, when he reflected on his mother's reign but also pledged himself to follow her example of service and duty. Let us pray for him in his new role, as he takes on a huge privilege and burden, and will need inward strength and guidance to fulfil this role.

In mourning for Queen Elizabeth, we also give thanks. She was an inspiring Christian witness around the world through her Christmas broadcasts and her public conduct. She also connected with our communities in Cambridgeshire at key moments of celebration. Many may remember her visit, already in her nineties, to the plant research centre outside Cambridge when she was determined to plant the tree herself. She went on to open the Royal Papworth Hospital, revealing her commitment to serve and her resilience to meet the demands of her office at an age when most people had retired.

Latterly, as she relied on a shepherd's stick to remain mobile, we continued to see her public service guided by the opening words of Psalm 23: "The Lord is my shepherd". Service carried out with a strong sense of vocation and often with wisdom, humour and joy. As we reflect on some momentous changes in our national landscape and perhaps contemplate more personal changes in our own lives, we may also recognise that Jesus Christ calls each one of us into a life of faith and service, and that this is a vocation we may respond to with thanksgiving and joy.







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Weston Colville Circular Walk

Litter Picking

Thank you to ALL regular litter pickers in West Wratting and Weston Colville, and in particular those who have responded to recent calls for assistance. It is so much appreciated by villagers and visitors. More equipment is being sourced.

Just a few points to consider while picking near roads:

- 1. Always wear something bright in colour
- 2. Always wear protective/gardening gloves
- 3. Always use a litter picker and bags
- 4. Some of the ditches are deep. Save your ankles by borrowing an extendable picker.
- 5. Do not rely on vehicle drivers to maintain your safety by changing their driving style. Be vigilant and stay on the grass verge where there is one, or close to the road edge.
- 6. Picking litter beside the roads with small children and dogs in attendance increases accident risk and should be avoided. Luckily, we have plenty of beautiful off-road paths and byways which are much safer.

The litter pickers previously placed in Weston Colville telephone box were removed and despite requests, have not been returned. If you would like to borrow pickers or need collection bags provided by South Cambs please contact me.

West Wratting Book Club

After our summer break, we met at The Chestnut Tree to discuss 'The Adoption Papers' by Jackie Kay and 'The Nowhere Man' by Kamala Markandaya.

The first part of 'The Adoption Papers' is the story in verse of the adoption of a black baby by a white Scottish family and contains echoes of the author's own life story. The verses alternate the voices of the birth mother, the adoptive mother and the child, identified by different typefaces. It was agreed that it was an interesting concept but the typefaces had not really helped. Two people did like it more than others, with one enjoying the verse form although the

other agreed it was not really coherent. The second part was a selection of different poems which contained sometimes uncomfortable images from recent decades relating to class and ethnicity. It was a difficult read, some of which might warrant rereading. Scores were 5 and 7 out of 10.

First published in 1972 but set between the 1940s and 60s, 'The Nowhere Man' was considered a much better read if, as one of our number commented, somewhat uncomfortable and upsetting. With themes of discrimination, scapegoating of immigrants and racist violence, it charts how social and economic problems brought about changes in attitudes to those who as part of the British Empire gave to and suffered so much for Britain and, at first, felt welcomed. Comparisons to 'Small Island' were made by some. It was frightening how unfounded rumours and misunderstandings could lead to such dreadful outcomes. Sadly this is still relevant today with the latter magnified by social media. Although it might seem to be a grim book, it is a powerful and suspenseful read with a dramatic ending. Scores were 8, 9 and 10 out of 10.

Our book for October is 'My Pen is the Wing of a Bird: New Fiction by Afghan Women' with a foreword by Lyse Doucet. We will meet at The Chestnut Tree at 7.30 pm on Wednesday 19th October. *Linda Gorman (290653)*

West Wratting Parish Council

The following is a précis of matters discussed at the parish council meeting held on 12th September. Draft minutes will be found on the noticeboards.

The chairman paid tribute to the Queen following her death, and a minute's silence was held.

Councillors:

- a) Co-option of new councillor: Emma Parsons was proposed and seconded and the council then voted to co-opt her.
- b) *Vice Chairman position:* Cllr Williams-Gray offered to take this position and was accepted by the council.

Planning: there had been no new applications.

22/02487/LBC – 81 High St: the parish clerk will check with the Conservation officer if planning permission has been given and also check what work is being carried out.

S/02931/19 – Wadlow Farm Clay Pigeon shooting facility: following an item in Challenge about late shooting at this facility the parish clerk had been told by Richard Clarke, who is in charge of it, that the opening hours were 8.30 am to 7 pm. No parties were allowed and any infringement would risk his livelihood.

Proposed development of The Lamb and site owned by Borehams: there is concern about soil contamination by chemicals. The chairman will contact the SCDC Contaminated Land team.

Finance: authorised payments are shown in the draft minutes posted on the noticeboards.

- *a)* External auditors: external auditors have accepted the letter of exemption for a full audit.
- b) Parish clerk's gratuity: a vote was taken following the distribution of details and it was agreed a gratuity payment would be made when the clerk resigned or retired.

Maintenance:

- a) Highway problems: a list of all the work needing to be carried out within the village boundary had been sent to Highways several weeks ago, with no response. The parish clerk will write to Lucy Frazer (MP) about this and also about the delay in getting the poles for SID.
- b) Pocket park: it was agreed to look into the cost of a new access gate.

c) Condition of five trees planted this year: Cllr Lock reported on their condition following a request from SCDC after the very dry summer. Cllr Lock said that two were definitely alive and hoped the other three would soon show signs of life.

Recreation Ground: the main issue at present is the parking on roads when WWFC training and matches are held, often without thought of where they park. Chris Wiseman (PCSO) will be contacted for his advice and also it will be mentioned in the letter to Lucy Frazer.

Play area: a swing was reported broken. Ben Wilcocks made an emergency repair and then contacted Action & Play, the company who erected the equipment, who came and checked all the swings.

Youth club: a request had been made to discuss setting up a youth club. It was felt that the cost of setting this up and getting people to run it on a regular basis would be difficult. Storage of equipment would be a major problem. Those who are interested might like to contact Iain Mcall who wrote an article in Chassenge.

The next parish council meeting will be held on Monday 14th November and all are welcome.

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Weston Colville Parish Council

The following items were discussed at the meeting. held on Monday 5th September. The full minutes and meeting documents can be found on *http://www.westoncolville.org.uk*

Public Participation Session – a parishioner provided a copy of a report he had created about flooding, and offered to assist the Flooding Committee with drafting a letter for parishioners advising them of their riparian responsibilities, as he felt the County Council leaflet on this was not enough. He had concerns about the wall bordering the Stour on Common Road, and felt that this should be replaced and could be made higher to reduce flooding. He also expressed concerns about the culverts on Common Road, and that ditches were not being kept clear, following hedge cutting for example.

District and County Council reports – lengthy discussions were held on the proposed congestion charge to drive into Cambridge. Cllr Batchelor advised that getting as many people as possible to comment on the consultation when it was published would be of benefit. There was also a discussion about SCDC operating a four-day week.

Flooding – Cllr Garrod reported that the Flood Plan had been updated, with maps showing the flood zones in the village. The actions had been updated with the digging out of the grips and gulleys on Common Road remaining outstanding. An updated version will be published on the website. Cllr Vidler had received an email from Brian Heffernan with a suggested letter for parishioners, it was suggested that this letter was distributed to all parishioners in the village. Cllr Garrod will draft the letter, for approval at the November meeting.

SID and LHI – bidding will reopen at the end of October, but the criteria would be changing, and projects such as acquiring a MVAS sign, or speed reductions, would be separated from bigger projects. Cllr Ashbridge had been asked to speak to the Thurlow Estate about a contribution to the LHI bid. The council was keen to hold applying until a concrete proposal for traffic calming was proposed.

Footpaths – changes to the permissive path/bridleway from the bottom of Horseshoe Lane had not been made due to a change in the Rights of Way officers at the County Council. Cllr Durham will remain in touch with the landowners.

ICO – following the Internal Audit report, Cllr Pagonis would investigate whether to register with ICO as data controller at an annual cost of £35.

Risk Assessment/Health and Safety – the defibrillator was rescue ready on 5th September.

Dates of Parish Council meetings in 2022 – 3rd October (planning), 7th November, 5th December (planning).

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District & County Councillors' Report

Cost of Living – the latest South Cambs magazine contains a two-page spread of information that may be of use, as well as content on the website that points people towards support available: https://www.scambs.gov.uk/cost-of-living-support/

City Access Consultation – a 'Sustainable Travel Zone' road user charge has been put forward by the Greater Cambridge Partnership (the body currently implementing the upgrades to the A1307) for private vehicles between 7 am and 7 pm on weekdays. The plans are part of a package to improve public transport, reduce congestion in the city and help the environment through lower emissions. A £5 congestion charge to drive into and around Cambridge is being considered as part of a 'once in a generation' plan to shake up how people travel during the working week.

Whilst driving in the city could be more expensive, the GCP has revealed plans to make buses cheaper. Flat bus fares have been proposed. In Cambridge a bus ticket could cost £1 to travel in the city, with a ticket in the wider 'travel to work' area (where we are) to cost £2.



This is still very much a proposal at this stage. What this could mean for us, is cheaper, more frequent bus travel. We would like to hear your thoughts on this, as we represent the views of the electorate here, so please do let us know.

Four Day Week Trial – the District Council has announced that they are going to trial a four-day working week, initially for 470 office workers. The trail will run for three months from January 2023. Detailed planning is underway to improve working practices and to support staff to work more efficiently. Detailed performance measures will be put in place to judge the success of the trial. The expectation is that around £1 million can be saved if staff retention and recruitment improves leading to a reduction in reliance on expensive agency staff.

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Update: Flooding Matters in Weston Colville

This is just to provide a brief update on matters relating to flooding in the village.

The heavy rainfall incidents in August after a long spell of dry weather provided a reminder of the risk posed by surface flash flooding around the county and closer to home in the village. This recent rainfall was nothing like the extreme event of June 2016, when a number of properties in Weston Colville were badly affected by flooding, but a reminder of what could be in store for us as the climate warms.

While the parish council continually challenges the District and County Councils to maintain the surface drainage systems within the village, the responsibility rests on individual land and property owners to maintain water courses that run both through and adjacent to their properties. These 'rights and responsibilities of a riparian owner' are set out in a document produced by Cambridgeshire County Council as the Lead Local Flood Authority (LFA) under the Flood and Water Management Act (2010). This document is referenced in the Weston Colville Community Flood Plan, drawn up two years ago by the parish council and which can be accessed via the parish council website at www.westoncolville.or.uk. More information on riparian responsibilities can also

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be obtained from the County Council by emailing floodandwater@cambridgeshire.gov.uk

The Flood Plan has recently been updated and now includes in the appendices additional maps highlighting the areas in the village which are particularly at risk of flash flooding. It also includes recent actions in the village by the County Council to mitigate flooding, including drain clearance on Mill Hill and the cutting of grips from the road to the ditches along Chapel Road.

Village residents can help mitigate the risk of flooding by helping to keep all drainage ditches clear of vegetation and other impediments and looking out for blocked grids on road gullies (in the August heavy rain, many grids around the village were blocked with straw blown from lorries transporting bales). Straw can easily be removed but mud and stones might need more encouragement! Keeping the gullies clear enables surface water to get into the surface water drainage system and away from property. If you see a blocked grid that you are unable to clear yourself then please contact one of the Flood Wardens listed in the Community Flood Plan: there are five wardens in the village. We can all play a role in helping to mitigate the risk of flooding in our village by keeping our streams and ditches clear and looking out for impediments to drainage from the road surfaces into the drains and ditches. Your co-operation is appreciated.

Hydrosacs and Hydrosnakes (modern day sand bags!) are now available for use by all village residents. They are located in locked bins behind the bus shelter at Weston Green and adjacent to the telephone box and Church End. The Flood Wardens have the digicodes for the locks and the codes can also be obtained from any member of the parish council.

Nature Notes

It's the season of mellow fruitfulness. There is a massive crop of haws on Hawthorn trees and hips on the Dog Roses this year.

It is a good time to start feeding the birds again, especially the clueless youngsters who've never yet seen a winter. Photo of the Month goes to Len and Ben Eeles, who spotted a Raven in Church End, Weston Colville on 18th September. Ravens are bigger and heavier than Buzzards. The smaller bird above it is a Jackdaw, to give you an idea of the size difference. This Jackdaw had the good sense to stay above the Raven; it takes



time and effort to gain altitude, so the Jackdaw could escape if the bigger bird tried to catch it.

The Raven's call is a distinctive deep 'cronk' – once heard, never forgotten. It sounds a bit like a bow-saw catching in dry hardwood.

Raven intelligence is legendary. The Nobel Laureate Konrad Lorenz had a rescue Raven called Roah, which had a 7 cm dagger-like beak. Corvids are known to remove eyes from dead animals and Lorenz wanted to see if Roah would attack his eyes. While the huge bird was sitting on his shoulder, he brought his eye up close to the lethal beak. Roah pulled its beak away, but when Lorenz persisted, the Raven put two and two together. It thought that Lorenz wanted to be groomed. So from then onwards, whenever Roah landed on Lorenz's shoulder, it would very gently groom his eyelashes with its enormous beak. (I do hope that *nobody* tries this with any animal!)
