



Burnt-out and abandoned cars are often removed by the salvage companies at minimal cost, or even free, the salvage companies recouping their costs by dismantling the car and selling the contents on. For example, aluminium sells for about £2,000 per ton.

- or, during the same period, have resided in that area or within three miles thereof;
- or, during the same period, had his/her principal or only place of work in that area.

West Wratting Book Club

We read two short books for February: 'The Sense of an Ending' by Julian Barnes and 'The Lover' by Marguerite Duras.

The latter is based on the author's own life in 1930s Saigon, South Vietnam (then part of Cochin China) and, later, France. It describes the love affair of a young French girl with a rich young Chinese millionaire and the effects on her family. Nobody enjoyed reading this book. It is a book of its time and, probably, something new which may explain why it won France's Prix Goncourt. With today's changed sensitivities and awareness, it was not a comfortable read despite some very good, even beautiful descriptions Scores were between 3 and 5 out of 10.

'The Sense of an Ending' was a better and more rewarding read with people finding it fascinating, enjoyable, amusing but uncomfortable in parts. It starts with an older man remembering his last year at school, as one of a group of three teenage boys beginning to find their place in the world, 'bookhungry, sex-hungry, meritocratic, anarchistic'. A new boy joins the class and, almost by default, becomes part of the group, changing the dynamics and affecting later events. It examines how friends drift apart as well as the way that earlier relationships can





Nature Notes

Now is the absolutely best time to see Marsh Tits in your garden. The trees and shrubs are not yet in leaf and the birds are hungry. They've just come through winter and they feel the need to expend a lot of energy defending a territory and raising a brood. For that they need food and water and nesting material, and they're prepared to travel from the woods to get it.

If you live within half a kilometre of a deciduous wood and put out sunflower hearts, water and cotton wool now, you are far more likely to see a Marsh Tit. (NB not horse or long hair, please – it's dangerous to chicks). In the last ten days before writing this, Joyce Oliver has recorded multiple sightings of three different, colour-ringed Marsh Tits at her feeders in Weston Colville, plus new unringed birds. It's a bonanza! Because they're ringed, we can give you a CV for each bird: Joyce's known visitors were 'Useless Eustace' (Red over White over Green), ringed as a second-year immature in 2018, so now six years old; 'Henry' (Green over White over Red), ringed as a juvenile in 2020, now three years old, and 'Rasputin' (Black over White over Black), ringed as a

juvenile in 2019 and now four years old. It's important to note that the wild life span of Marsh Tits is estimated as two years, which means that the estimate is wildly wrong or Weston Colville is a special place with unusually long-lived birds. It also indicates that colour-ringing does not reduce the survival of these birds – an important point for me as a conservationist birdringer.



Note that Marsh Tits are essentially black and buff birds, about the size of a Blue Tit: there's no white in the solidly black cap

and no green, or yellow, or reddish tints at all.

If you see a Marsh Tit, even unringed, please let us know, through cambsmarti@gmail.com or Chassenge. Your data is critical to their survival in the UK. Thank you.

Sharka was born in the Czech Republic and her childhood was spent mostly with her grandma helping with the garden, growing their own vegetables, and keeping chickens and rabbits. They preserved everything they grew, bottling and making chutney and jams. It was the 'good life' in every sense.

When she came to England, her aim was to get her children closer to nature and share their garden with wildlife, and to grow wildflowers. Sharker took an RHS course in horticulture and then became a volunteer at Wimpole Hall gardens. She started changing her own garden and added a pond. Friends began to ask for help with their gardens, and this led on to Sharker taking a gardening design course.

With her children now adults, she made a new front garden for a friend's mother and this led to her starting her own garden design company, called 'Utopian Gardens'. She was asked to make a small border for a stand at Chelsea for a company selling patio black spot cleaners. It was interesting for our members to see the slides of the development of the garden and stand. At our next meeting on Wednesday 1st March at 7.30 pm in the Church Institute, Dr Gwenda Kyd will be speaking on 'Plants to Drugs'. All welcome.

The Infants' artist of the month is Giuseppe Arcimboldo, famous for creating portraits from fruit




and vegetables. Year 1 created their own Giuseppe Arcimboldo inspired portraits.

Help and Support When You Need It

To continue our series of articles about support available, this month we're highlighting some of the support that can be available for people who have some form of physical or mental impairment.

Council Tax discounts

The size of the discount depends on the make up of the household and it may be backdated. There are two main criteria:

1. Someone in the household has a **Severe Mental Impairment** which is defined as 'a severe impairment of intelligence and social functioning that appears to be permanent'. This can come from dementia, profound learning difficulties, brain injuries, severe strokes and more.

You/they are receiving one of a number of qualifying benefits. This can include (but isn't limited to) meanstested and non means-tested benefits such as attendance allowance, disability living allowance, personal independence payment, some parts of universal credit, and severe disablement allowance.

2. **Disabled Band Reduction Scheme** – you may be eligible for this scheme if you live in a larger property than you would otherwise need, purely because you or another occupant is disabled.

If you qualify, your bill will be reduced to the next lowest council tax band. For example, if your property is in band D, you'll pay the band C rate. If your home is already in the lowest band (band A), you'll get a 17% discount on your council tax bill instead.

Visiting Support Service

SCDC offers a visiting support service to all residents over the age of 65 (or under 65 if you're in sheltered accommodation). That means any resident in the

South Cambridgeshire area, not just those in council housing.

The team offers free help with:

- Finances (eg setting up payment plans, applying for benefits, sorting out debt);
- Health (eg access to medical care, help with medicines and personal care);
- Loneliness (eg help to get out more and find activities you'd like to do).

It's surprising how much they cover. If you want to find out more have a look on the District Council website or ring 01954 713000.

It's also well worth while checking out other support that the council offers. For example, they may provide an occupational therapist to assess what simple safety changes can be made to a home, such as grab rails. They also have grants (eg Disabled Facilities Grant) to help pay for adaptations.

Planning and Parish Councils

South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) informs parish councils when a planning application is lodged.

The parish council can only take into account certain matters when determining a planning application, and SCDC makes the final decision. We welcome comments on Material Planning Considerations, which include the following but are not exclusive; a full list is available on the SCDC website.

Some Material Planning Considerations

- *The principle of development* do you agree that the proposal is the right use or function for the site?
- *Scale and massing* is the proposal the right size for the site, and does it relate appropriately to the buildings and spaces around it? Will it cause unreasonable overshadowing or loss of daylight or sunlight?
- *Listed buildings and conservation areas* is the proposal appropriate with regard to heritage, including listed buildings, scheduled ancient monuments or other heritage assets nearby?
- *Green space and biodiversity* does the proposal enhance biodiversity, are trees and hedges affected, and is any proposed green space well-designed to be functional and safe?
- Has the applicant considered *local wildlife or* protected species such as bats, badgers, owls, great
 crested newts and birds.
- *Streets and roads* will they be safe and useable for vulnerable users, children, pedestrians and cyclists, as well as drivers?
- Surface water, foul water drainage and flooding issues considerations as defined by national regulations and case law, so we can't take them into account when deciding on planning applications.

Please do not comment on:

- The loss of a private view from your property.
- Loss of value to your property.
- Moral objections for example, to betting shops or amusement arcades.
- Photographs of your property, neighbour's property, people or number plates.

- Matters controlled by other legislation for example, structural issues covered by Building Regulations.
- Offensive statements that have a negative impact on a person's reputation personally or within their trade, profession or business.
- Comments that discriminate on the grounds of race, religion, sexual orientation, gender identity or disability.

Heeling in at Lower Wood

This poem was first published in Issue 99 of The Rialto poetry magazine as a result of being Highly Commended in The Rialto Nature and Place Competition 2022.

We work in pairs: one digging and planting, the other setting guards and hammering stakes, swapping every few trees to switch muscles, the clay so thick we jump on the spade then rock, front to back, side to side to prise it out. Checking the size of each cleft, we select from bundles in sacks: oak for a deep one,

Two weeks from the end of the second year, the day after my third jab, every damn sapling is a metaphor, or an omen, and it can't just be me thinking, this is the way to spend an apocalypse: planting a wood, pressing the earth snug, the warden nodding, saying, That's good heeling in, that is.

Alison Binney writes: The poem was inspired by a day spent planting trees with the Wildlife Trust at Lower Wood, Weston Colville in December 2021. At that time, the omicron variant was causing covid case numbers to rise steeply once again, and tree-planting therefore felt like a grounding, hopeful antidote in otherwise unsettling times. For the sake of accuracy, I should say that it was a Wildlife Trust ranger, rather than the warden, who supplied the last line of the poem that day. But in writing the poem, I preferred the warm sound of the word 'warden', alongside the words 'snug' and 'nodding', so I have used a little poetic licence here in changing 'ranger' to 'warden'. The etymology of 'warden' – with its connotations of watching or guarding – also feels more fitting.
