

West Wratting Book Club

Our book for May was 'Sons and Lovers' by D H Lawrence, and nine of us gathered to discuss this early 20th century classic.

The first section has a different feel to the rest of the book, which concentrates more on Mrs Morel's and her children's relationships. It jumps quite a bit from season to season so is sometimes difficult to follow. Set in a Nottinghamshire mining village, it concentrates on the Morel family. It opens with a description of the village and its development, and then gradually homes in on Gertrude Morel. It soon becomes clear that she is from a different class to her husband, having been attracted by his charisma and good looks, and the contrast to her father and her previous love. It disperses some of the stereotypical ideas of a mining community as well as highlighting the strong desire for self-improvement and education, touching on class differences.

Intimacy, disillusion and family relationships are also major themes, with more than a hint of Freud. The descriptions of the towns, mines and countryside are vivid and evocative, especially for one of our number who knows the area well. The language and dialect were particularly fascinating and enjoyable.

This was an interesting and thought-provoking read. Scores were mainly 7 out of 10 with a 5 and a 9.

Our next meeting will be at The Chestnut Tree at 7.30 pm on Wednesday 14th June, to discuss 'The Cloisters' by Kathy Hays.

Hospital Transport Scheme

I recently requested hospital transport for an outpatient appointment at Addenbrooke's Hospital, because I am unable to walk or stand and need to be transported in a wheelchair.

There is usually a telephone number to ring for transport on the appointment letter. When we rang the number, they were very, very helpful, booked me in and gave me a reference number. It is useful to book for the return journey at the same time and you will get another reference number which you need to take with you.

Tell the reception desk when you arrive that you are using hospital transport for your return and they will ensure it all works.

On the day of the appointment I had a telephone call to say the ambulance would be here in about 30 minutes and it arrived on time.

I found the transport scheme very helpful and would recommend ringing to ask if you are eligible for hospital transport.

Bells of St Mary's Church

Residents of Weston Colville at Church End / Mill Hill may have been startled to hear the bells of St Mary's chiming in recent weeks – probably the first time they have sounded for more than 25 years – and perhaps you heard them on the afternoon of the coronation, or for the service at St Mary's the following day.

As someone in the village remarked, back in January, "They've rung for the coronation of every monarch since there have been bells in that church; won't it be a shame if they're silent this time around?"

So over the last few weeks a little group came together to make sure this didn't happen. This group was made up almost exclusively of people who had

never pulled a bell rope before, including eight children and young people.



The bells at St Mary's are not cleared for fullcircle ringing and can currently only be 'chimed'; nevertheless, this didn't stop everyone learning to chime 'in thirds' and to make a reasonably recognisable sound of church bells in rounds. We rang for 35 minutes before the special coronation service on Sunday 7th May, and again at noon to mark the loyal toast. Before all this could begin it was necessary to get the bells looked over by

an expert, and we are grateful to the Diocesan Bell Advisor, Tom Ridgman, for his visit and report, which left us with a long list of things to do! With enormous help from Oliver Mills and John Heald we have made our way down this list.


We must also thank Dr Mike Rowland for his input and for hosting our little group at St Andrew's, West Wratting, to improve our technique, which he certainly achieved.

West Wratting Parish Council

This is a précis of the minutes taken at the parish council meeting held on 11th May. The date had to be changed due to insufficient councillors being available to attend.

Election of Chairman, Vice-Chairman: the position of Chairman was left open and Cllr Williams-Gray agreed to remain as Vice-Chairman. Cllr Parsons agreed to be representative on the Sports Pavilion Committee and Cllr Roberts will be asked if he will continue to also be a representative as he was not present.

Planning: the clerk was asked to enquire from the Planning Dept whether the work being carried out on the Boreham site was permitted as planning permission had not yet been granted. Also to enquire about 22/02487, where work has been carried out although the planning permission had been refused.



Finance: the internal audit documents were signed; Statement of Accounts and bank reconciliation also signed following approval by the council. An exemption letter sent to the external auditors was minuted as being in order.

The authorised payments are shown on the draft minutes to be posted on the noticeboards and on the website.

Maintenance: the risk management assessment had been carried out, necessary for the internal audit, and quotes are being sought for refurbishment of some of the village assets, eg the bus shelters and the pump. Some of the tidying up could be done by volunteers.

Correspondence: SCDC has confirmed receipt of the Assets of Community Variation.

It was agreed to donate £100 to MAGPAS Air Ambulance following receipt of a letter. They had attended two emergencies in the village.

Village Hall: Martin Davey and Tim Bonfield are happy to continue to represent the council on the Village Hall Management Committee, for which our thanks.

The present trustees on the Land Registration document re ownership of the village hall are no longer on the council or living in the village. The clerk will consult a solicitor.

Recreation Ground: the RoSPA safety inspection has been carried out satisfactorily on the play area. It was agreed that bark should be purchased for areas where required.

The next parish council meeting will be on Monday 10th July at 8 pm. All are welcome.

West Wratting Parish Council

Extracts from the minutes of the West Wratting Annual Parish Meeting, held on Monday 15th May.

Chairman's Report: see separate document. Following the chairman's report a presentation was made to the chairman, who is retiring after nine years as a councillor and four years as chairman. She was thanked for what was not always an easy task but which she managed in a most capable and understanding way.

Parish Lands & Properties: quotes have been sought and received for maintenance work on the Pump House, the bus shelters and the village sign. It is hoped that some of the maintenance will be done by volunteers.

Any Questions: new residents to the village asked if the parish council had communication with Highways regarding speeding, and how planning applications were dealt with. The Chairman explained that there were close links with Highways and at present an application for a 20 mph speed limit within the village had been submitted. The 40 mph buffer zone had been instigated by the council several years ago, and monitoring the traffic with Speedwatch equipment was continuous. She then explained how the parish

council dealt with planning applications, which the council was expected to comment on, either for or against. Planning meetings were held when necessary.

Chairman's Report

Since our last meeting there have been several changes to the membership of the council. Councillor Locke has resigned. On behalf of the council and residents, I thank her for the excellent work she has done and made our community a better place. She will be greatly missed. We have a new councillor, Cllr Parsons, Welcome. Cllr Williams Grey is elected as vice-chairman.

The last year has presented many challenges. WWPC has been in constant discussions with relevant authorities to provide a community communications hub. The council seeks to support statutory and emergency services in the local community through the provision of information, local social assistance and communication. Contributions are made to local charities such as Age Concern and the air ambulance which was recently called to two emergencies.

The council has continued to carry out a range of village activities including maintenance of verges, the Pocket Park, and the recreation ground. There is liaison with the relevant authorities to repair potholes and clear gullies and drains.

Many residents volunteer in different ways; examples include litter picking, tidying verges, helping those in need, raising funds for charity and more. We are so lucky that so many people have a sense of community. The council would like to thank all those in our village and beyond for all the good neighbour acts helping those who are in need.

The council holds a large number of properties and lands in the village, some small (two noticeboards,



benches and the Pound etc) and some very large (including the sports pavilion and village hall). A risk assessment was carried out and it was noted that repairs are needed on the pump and stand and the village sign. Quotations are underway for this.

The village hall is such a valuable and important asset and my thanks go to the Village Hall Management Committee. Not only have they maintained the fabric of the hall but improved it. The hall is now fully operational and in a strong financial position. Mr Davey and Mr Bonfield have agreed to be the representatives on the Village Hall Committee on behalf of the council. Mr Davey is exploring installing broadband in the hall.

The recreation ground and sports pavilion are excellently managed by the Sports Pavilion Committee and football club. A grant was obtained to refurbish the changing rooms. There are proposals for solar panels and a change of use for the no-longerused bowling green. I have resigned as representative, and Cllrs Roberts and Parsons have been nominated. The AGM is due to take place on the 17th May.

Cllr Parsons, on behalf of WWPC, is now maintaining the defibrillator at the sports pavilion.

The council has a wonderful refurbished playground, much admired by several villages and well used and well maintained. A safety inspection by RoSPA has taken place and some minor issues will be addressed. A request is made to replenish the bark.

The council has taken the step again of raising the precept by the RPI. It is important to note that it is recommended that the council hold at least a year and a half's precept in reserve. The financial position is good, with adequate reserves of money.



Road safety is taken very seriously by the council and current projects involve Highways road safety measures to bring awareness of speeding. The council had purchased its own speed devices, and now poles to support these devices, and would like to thank Mr M Davey and Mr T Bonfield and other volunteers for their continuing work on Speed Watch. The council has applied for a Local Highways Initiative grant to purchase further speed restriction, eg sharks teeth and gating. Cllr Chandler is working with SCDC to restrict the speed in the village to 20 mph. County Cllr Batchelor is investigating signs saying 'Not Suitable for HGVs' in the roads approaching the village. At the request of residents there are now dedicated spaces for parking for residents of Hayter Close.

There are proposals to continue with maintenance and improvement of the Pocket Park to promote a wildlife habitat.

The Challenge magazine is supported by the council and is very useful resource for all. Thank you to the editor and all other contributors, and also to Dr Mike Rowland for managing the village website.

I would like to thank all the parish, district and county councillors and C McCall, as foot path officer, for the generous time and effort that they give so freely to the West Wratting parish.

Congratulations to Rachel and Pete for their hard work of running The Chestnut Tree, not just as a successful business but as a community hub. Their hard work is greatly respected and held in high regard.

Lastly but importantly I would like to give my personal thanks and on behalf of the PC, to Jenny Richards, the parish clerk, for all her assistance, advice and professional expertise.

West Wratting Village Hall – the management committee has held five meetings this year.

Village hall use returned to normal with the resumption of Tai Chi, FitSteps and the Saturday Café. Sadly there was a mid-year break in the Keep Fit sessions, due to the personal circumstances of the leader. These are now back on track. We also have new regular bookings for dog physiotherapy sessions.

At the start of the year we reinstated our normal hall hire fees. Despite the recent substantial rise in energy costs we decided not to increase our fees this year, but we will keep this under review. Our bank balance is lower than this time last year because of increased maintenance expenditure but our financial situation remains healthy.

Maintenance issues have kept us busy. Following a number of remedial measures the 5 year Electrical Installation Condition Report (NICEIC) is now satisfactory. Subsequently a defective ceiling light and emergency light have been replaced. Sticking fire exit doors have been eased. The internal kitchen door and bi-fold doors continue to stick intermittently as the building moves, probably with changes in the weather. This is not new and we don't have an answer to the problem.

We are still collecting quotes for painting the north façade of the hall.

The faulty front door lock has been replaced and the 13 key-holders have been issued with new keys.

Routine servicing of the fire alarm system and of the boiler has been completed. We have had one oil fill of 800 litres.

Externally, we now pay for grass cutting and hedge cutting and these have been well maintained. A deficiency in the rear boundary fence was allowing

Weston Colville Annual Parish Meeting

This was held on Wednesday 3rd May, and was attended by Ray Vidler (Chairman), Bridget Durham (Vice Chair), John Garrod, Constantine Pagonis, Jessica Ashbridge (clerk), and five parishioners.

Extract from Chairman's Report – in the last year the council has continued to carry out a range of village maintenance and to support activities including:

The Platinum Jubilee Celebration – the late Queen's Platinum Jubilee celebrations in June last year were attended by a large proportion of the village and the vast majority hailed it as a great success. I would like to pass on my thanks to ex-councillor Ashbridge who chaired the group planning the event. Unfortunately, there was insufficient support for a similar event for the King's Coronation.

Flooding in the village – the flood prevention working party has built on last year's successful work programme by updating the flood plan for the whole village, and is still looking for support from riparian landowners and the County Council Highways department to ensure its actions are completed. Flood wardens are in place to deal with any incidents. I would like to thank Councillors Garrod and Durham for their hard work in delivering this.

Maintenance of roads and verges – the council implemented its usual verge cutting programme and continued to provide street lighting for the village. A notable success was the completion of the drainage work at Church End and clearing a lot of the road gully pots on both sides of Mill Hill. Progress was also made with getting potholes repaired and gullies and drains cleared. However, it seems a never-ending task and there are still many more potholes to fix.

Grass and hedge maintenance in the village – the council continued with its programme of grass cutting and hedge trimming around the war memorial, at the Church End playing field, and the play area on the recreation ground.

Play areas – an annual safety inspection of this equipment has also been carried out by an outside expert to ensure it meets current safety standards with the recommendations raised implemented alongside all other necessary maintenance work. I would like to thank ex Councillor Hubbard for carrying this out.

Annual budget for the parish – I am pleased to be able to report there will be no increase in precept for 2023/24.

I would like to end by thanking all my fellow councillors and our clerk for their time and effort in supporting the work and objectives of the council. I would also like to appeal for new members of the council to fill the two existing vacancies, to further the council's work.

Report on The Warm Hub, by a member of the Reading Room Trust – the hub opened on 14th November 2022, and had 81 openings up to 3rd May. There had been 618 visits so far. The highest attendance day was the Bosnian Lunch (30), the lowest attendance had been zero! 16 volunteers, to whom the Reading Room Trust were extremely grateful. had been running morning and afternoon shifts.

The scheme was funded primarily by SCDC via ACRE and the WCPC. The Reading Room put up £500 and agreed to underwrite the project. Significant sums (over £600) had been received in donations from lunches and events.

Had it been a success? Yes and no. It didn't reach people who wanted to work in a warm place. We know of some villagers who were still at home in the cold alone. So, the Warm Hub concept may have been mistaken, BUT we have had some very important one-to-one conversations with a few people who were clearly lonely, perhaps depressed and in need of a friendly chat. This had included villagers who had been recently bereaved, or who had lost pets, and those who were carrying other burdens such as illnesses or delayed operations. They just needed a listening ear. There had been a few regular visitors who didn't join in the crowded events.

Several new ideas had really taken off, eg lunches, IT clinics, and veterinary advice sessions.

It had been cheaper to run than we thought. The Reading Room was quite efficient to heat. Other new hubs had reported similar outcomes.

We are looking to organise one or two more events/ activities like health support with Linton Navigators and low impact exercise. ACRE came up with more funding, sufficient to open on Wednesdays and Fridays, possibly until the end of June.

Public Comments and Questions

A parishioner raised concerns about speeding entering and leaving the village at Church End. Vehicles were travelling at great speeds up and down the hill, where there were large vehicles exiting the property at the top of hill, and there was a dip in the road obscuring traffic. She asked about whether the speed limit could be lowered, and was advised that as it was the edge of the village this probably wouldn't be successful. She asked about the use of a Speed Indicator Device (SID). The council has the use of the SID one week in eight, as it was shared with other councils. It was suggested that a Local Highways Initiative (LHI) grant could be applied for, and the council could investigate purchasing a SID. Last time the SID was in Weston Colville it was on the hill in Church End.

A parishioner raised concerns about surface water flooding, and said that it had been the wettest March for 40 years. The Stour had flowed steadily through the ditch; however, it had looked high behind the properties at the junction of Common Road and The Green. He asked whether the council was aware of a hedge planting scheme by Highways on Common Road; the council had not been made aware of the planting. He also raised concerns regarding planning enforcement, and was advised that the department is very slow in responding to queries.

A parishioner asked whether funding could be applied for to improve the playground on the recreation ground, as there were a lot of young children in the village, and the current playground was quite tired. Funding could come from the Wadlow Windfarm, the National Lottery, or the parish council. It would be discussed further in the parish council meeting, but it was hoped a working party could be put together.

District and County Councillors' Reports were received. Cllr Batchelor expressed his thanks to the parish council for all they did to support the village. He was asked if there was any progress on potholes, and he advised that the clerk should email with any that were causing particular problems. He was also asked about the LHI (Local Highways Initiative) scheme, and applying for MVASs (Mobile Vehicle Activated Signs) following discussions at the Annual Parish Meeting. The LHI was only now awarded annually in January; Cllr Batchelor advised that councils could also apply directly to purchase MVASs from the County Council, at a discounted rate.

Flooding – concerns were raised about the ditch between the Recreation Ground and the neighbouring paddock. The clerk will contact the farm manager at West Wratting Estate to add it to the list for clearing.

Coronation Event – a decision had been made by the Reading Room not to host a Coronation event on the recreation ground due to changes in their insurance policy. There would be a celebratory church service on 7th May, followed by refreshments, and the bells would be chimed by children from the village, for the first time in more than 25 years.

Bus Shelter Vandalism – the bus shelter outside the Reading Room did not belong to the parish council. The clerk was asked to establish ownership with the Reading Room. The bus timetable had been removed, and the clerk would get it reinstated.

Playground – the Play Equipment Safety report from David Bracey was received, and Cllrs Pagonis and Rayner would work through it. Brackets were required for the basket swing at Church End; it was believed that these had already been purchased by a former Cllr. Cllr Pagonis would check. It was suggested that a working party could be established to rejuvenate the play area at the recreation ground, and the clerk would place an advert in Challenge asking for volunteers.
