Our book for October was 'Flatlands' by Sue Hubbard. This was inspired by the well-known novella 'The Snow Goose' by Paul Gallico, which was aimed at children, and made into a BBC television film starring Jenny Agutter and Richard Harris, set against the background of WWII and Dunkirk.


In contrast, this book is aimed at adults and changes several details of the character's situation. It examines the relationship of two damaged people and how they helped each other to heal, in particular from the point of view of Freda as an old woman in a care home. All considered it an easy read but several thought it rather miserable, bleak and depressing. However, the descriptions of the Fen landscape were evocative and the language enjoyable. The author had obviously done a lot of research and some felt that she had tried to include too much, although some details did add period colour.

Scores ranged from 5 to 7.5 out of 10.

Wildly Preserved Foods

I am hoping to start a small business centred around fermented and preserved food. As a starting point I have several people who regularly get fermented vegetables (live not pasteurised) from me. It works via a WhatsApp site: I let people know on a Sunday what is bubbling that week and they let me know what they would like and give me a donation towards the cost of the materials. For example, this week I had sauerkraut with fennel, kimchi, hot chilli sauce, fermented ketchup and Caribbean sauce amongst other things available. I suggest £1/100g donation. If anyone is interested in being added to the Fermenting group, please contact me on 07984 655116 or via the village WhatsApp group.

If anyone has surplus vegetables or fruit and wants a home for it, I am more than happy to process it on a 50:50 basis ie you get half the produce back in a preserved form.

On another note, my marmalades were awarded medals in the National Marmalade Awards and are still available along with varieties of jam and chutneys – again drop me a text if you want any.

On 21st November in Weston Colville I will be giving an evening talk on fermented food, with tastings. Please contact me if you want to come, and for details of the time and venue.

From the Rectory

In church, November always feels something of a 'transitional' month, waiting for the season of Advent, which in turn heralds Christmas.

However, a significant fixture in November is Remembrance Day and so also, Remembrance Sunday.

I always have problems with Remembrance Sunday and its place in our national life, for as a younger man, it seemed obvious (and easy) as a Christian to hold a pacifist position. The appalling, mutual brutality of war was a gross affront to what God wanted for the world. Christians should take no part in it, nor collude with what could appear to be a celebration of military victory. In the end there were no victors, only deep and prolonged damage to both sides. And always seeds sown for further bitter enmity.

Yet the war in Ukraine, particularly, has pushed me further into a corner of doubt. Surely the stance of listening to the needs of both sides, compromise and appearement, in the face of an authoritarian and duplicitous aggressor, isn't good enough. When we pray for Ukraine and the people of Russia we're not simply asking that they start being nice to each other.





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Yes, we pray for peace, but also for justice. And we support Ukraine in their desperate fight to preserve the freedoms of a liberal democracy as we fought, rightly, in two World Wars, to preserve our values and freedoms.

Our democratic nation state, with its institutions and balances against tyranny, isn't perfect. But its relative stability and fairness alone foster future peace and prosperity. Moreover, in a world facing the rising threats of global warming and the rapidly evolving technologies of Artificial Intelligence and biological sciences, surely the only chance for their containment, and use for the benefit of all, are the regulatory frameworks that only stable, honest and cooperating nation states can provide?

Thus, remembering with gratitude the sacrifices of our forebears in facing down the evils of tyranny seems more important than ever.

So what, if anything, does the Christian gospel have to add to this? Perhaps we need to raise our sights above a too cosy and complacent proclamation of God's love for us, to embrace more faithfully our trust in the dreadful, but life-giving paradox of the Cross: God sharing in the profound conflicts in our lives, to bring us all home safely . . . together.

Poppies for Remembrancetide

Poppies will be available in Balsham at the Post Office, Coffee Shop, The Bell Inn, The Black Bull and at church services in Balsham, and at The Chestnut Tree in West Wratting, from 27/28th October until Remembrance Sunday, 12th November. My grateful thanks to all of them and to those who are helping me distribute poppies. With changing

circumstances, there will not be a local house-to-

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For those of us who no longer use cash there is now an easy way to make a donation for your poppy. There are QR codes specific to our area, ECF03, on collecting tins – just scan and donate, cashless and anonymous, and with Gift Aid applied if wished.

Cash is of course most acceptable in the collecting tins, or cheques in envelopes labelled POPPY APPEAL handed in at the Post Office, where there are also Gift Aid forms with envelopes, upon request (increases your donation by 25% at no cost to you). Wooden crosses will also be available in the Post Office, Coffee Shop and Chestnut Tree, plus reflective poppies etc, but 2023 enamel pins have not been possible owing to supply difficulties (supermarkets will have these). A few non-dated pins may be available locally.

Totally recyclable, plastic free poppies have been developed, but for use only when others have been used up, to avoid unnecessary waste.

Please give generously to help the Royal British Legion support our ex-service men and women. Thank you.

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Nature Notes

Our trees and hedges are colouring up now. Look out for the vivid banana yellow leaves of Field Maple (*Acer campestre*) – it's the easiest time of year to spot this species, even at a distance.

Last month, Margaretha Galt undertook a moth survey in her Weston Colville garden. Our expert Steve Thompson set up a light trap on a cold but still October night, a sparse time for moths, but in just

three hours we found five moths, all of different species: Common Marbled Carpet, Green Brindled Crescent, Barred Sallow, Chestnut and The Brick (yes, it really is a moth – brickcoloured, of course. It is the only Brick seen by Steve this year.)



Margaretha is keen to promote a medieval hedging technique – Dead Hedging. Erect upright poles in a wide-spaced double line where you want your hedge and pile brash between them, interweaving branches where possible. (Often called lop and top, brash is defined as the parts of a tree normally left behind after felling: branches, foliage and the crown). It's quick, free and stock-proof if done properly. Dead hedges are the perfect biodegradable habitat to overwinter beneficial insects for arable farmers. Personally, I've seen dead hedges used to prevent visitors and poorly managed dogs from straying into vulnerable wildlife areas in a well-known nature reserve, and it seems to work.



'One place, one time, one life: Lord Fairhaven's life at Anglesey Abbey' was a most interesting talk given by Helen Ackroyd on 9th October. Surprisingly, some people attending the meeting had enjoyed the gardens but never been inside the house.

Founded as a priory around 1135, Anglesey has seen huge changes over the years. Helen explained the more recent history regarding the fascinating Fairhaven dynasty, and how the house was altered as we see it today, holding the vast collection of books and treasures bought by Lord Fairhaven.

Anglesey Abbey cannot really be described as a museum, as it retains its welcoming character and comfortable family atmosphere.

At our October meeting, Jonathan Crisp from Cambridge County Council gave a talk on recycling in the county. We learnt how the recycling system works, and how much cash can be generated when



stuff is recycled rather than going to landfill which costs the council money. He emphasised that our refuse bins are for packaging materials and that larger objects and textiles, electricals and tools should be disposed of at the county recycling depots at Milton and Thriplow. We are apparently very lucky in South Cambs as the council can recycle many things that other councils cannot. Plenty to think about after this meeting, especially that food waste is a major contributor to CO₂ emissions, and that the average household wastes over £70 worth of food a month.

Our next meeting is on Tuesday 14th November, when our speaker will be Linda Cook from 'Turn and Burn' who will be showing us how to do pyrography, hopefully with a chance to have a go ourselves. We also plan to have a sales table for members to sell any handmade items.

Hilary did so much and with such enthusiasm for our garden club, and sadly died in September. Hilary will be remembered fondly and will be a much-missed member.

Following a last minute change of speaker, we were able to welcome Robert Brett, the curator of the RHS gardens at Hyde Hall, whose talk was entitled 'Yours & My Need For Plants'.

Robert was a very engaging and knowledgeable speaker, who joined Hyde Hall eight years ago. He spoke initially of the projects the RHS undertakes, for example creating gardens in hospitals for patients and relatives to enjoy and find solace. Britain in Bloom is an RHS initiative to bring communities together and enhance their villages/towns, just one of the areas that the RHS contributes to, to make such a positive effect.

The RHS has a sustainability strategy using plants that enjoy dry conditions, so watering is kept to a minimum. They have used peat-free compost for the past ten years.



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Hyde Hall has created a wildwood, planting 5,000 trees around its periphery. Preserving wild flower seeds and establishing a wild flower meadow – which now has seven species of orchid – and engaging in plant trials, are just some of the things they are passionate about. Visitors can enjoy a wonderful garden with the RHS shop, garden centre and restaurant.

Seasonal Advice from the Fire Service

Floods – make sure you are aware and prepared for floods by signing up for flood warnings in your area: https://check-for-flooding.service.gov.uk/alerts-and-warnings Be sure to check road conditions for where you're driving to, and keep your distance from the vehicle in front. Remember, drive to the conditions of the road, and slow down.

If a road is closed because of flooding, take note of the signs. It's closed for a reason. It's not worth the risk to drive through flood water. If you do get stuck, you'll need to call your vehicle recovery company. The fire service will only respond if there is a risk to life – they won't be rescuing your vehicle.

Chimneys – with the days getting shorter and the nights drawing in, make sure your chimneys are ready and safe for use this winter. Get your chimney swept before lighting your first fire of the winter.
