### West Wratting Book Club

Due to various circumstances, we were unable to meet in December so discussed 'A Tale of Two Cities' by Charles Dickens in January over a meal at The Chestnut Tree.

This classic story opens with the well-known passage beginning "It was the best of times, it was the worst of times . . .". Some of our number were struck by how relevant it seems to our own times. The story is set at the time of the French Revolution, contrasting Paris and London, and revolves around an elderly man imprisoned in the Bastille, his daughter, a French émigré and the way in which their lives become entwined. Dickens paints a vivid and heart-rending picture of the selfish and wicked treatment of the French peasantry by the aristocracy that explodes into the new horrors of the Revolution. Dickens' knowledge of this period of history is impressive (although he himself admitted his debt to Thomas Carlyle's 'The French Revolution). Despite the darkness there are some moments of humour. His language is as wonderful as ever, bringing to life his characters with all their uniqueness and human foibles. Near to the end, there is yet another famous quote. This book can seem daunting but is very





rewarding for those who stay with it, with a satisfying ending. Scores ranged from 8.5 to 10 out of 10.

For our next book we are reading 'Still Life' by Sarah Winman, to be discussed on Thursday 15<sup>th</sup> February at The Chestnut Tree at 7.30 pm.

### The Chestnut Tree

*Restaurant Review – "Excellent food, outstanding value".* 

Last year, when Pete and Rachel announced they were moving on, there was considerable anxiety about what the future held for our much loved village pub.

Well, Mark and Joanna are now installed and, in short, The Chestnut Tree is in good hands. Regular drinkers have been enjoying their friendly hospitality and excellent beer since the New Year. Indeed, with Harry managing the inter-regnum in December nobody has gone thirsty.

After some work to expand and upgrade the kitchen, food was served on Friday 12<sup>th</sup> January to a large group of regular diners. Delays and problems with builders meant it was touch and go as to whether things would be ready but Mark was able to deliver dinner to a full restaurant. I was on the other side of the pub that evening enjoying the beer but all reports about the food were good. There is a relatively short menu but with something for everyone – to my eye it is a clear step above basic pub food but does not attempt to be a 'top end' gastro-pub . . . and exactly what I was hoping for.

### The Chestnut Tree West Wratting

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Firsthand experience of the food had to wait until Sunday. Joanna and I enjoyed a starter of smoked mackerel with beetroot followed by a roast Sunday lunch. The fish was warm and served on a slice of good quality, freshly toasted sourdough bread and well presented. The roast came with all one might expect – a huge Yorkshire pudding, roast potatoes, parsnips and carrot, kale, red cabbage and cauliflower cheese.

Two extra 'touches' that we liked. First, Joanna's request for well-done beef was honoured; second, an extra jug of gravy was offered without us asking.

After two substantial courses we had no room for dessert.

So, an excellent lunch but the final surprise was the bill. Starters are about £2 cheaper and mains £2 to £4 cheaper than local equivalents.

Finally, we were able to secure a table as a 'walk in' – but this will not last  $\ldots$  so do book.

### Parish Matters

"Remember that you are dust and to dust you shall return."

This chilling reminder of death is the first part of the sentence said as the clergy smear ashes on the

foreheads of those attending church services on Ash Wednesday. And no less demanding, the sentence ends, "Turn away from sin and be faithful to Christ".

To non-believers and believers alike, this can be heard as a further sobering threat: "Get your act together, my dear, or you won't get to heaven!" But I don't think that's the case.

You may already have guessed, from the bizarre sight of Easter eggs on supermarket shelves at New Year that, indeed, Easter is particularly early this year, on 31<sup>st</sup> March. And so Ash Wednesday, the first day of Lent (some 40 days or so before Easter Sunday) is on 14<sup>th</sup> February.

Lent marks the six weeks of preparation for the events of Jesus' crucifixion on Good Friday: the Friday before the celebration of the Resurrection of Christ on Easter Sunday. So, perhaps, that sentence about remembering that "you are but dust" seems a bit premature, and especially mean when we've all just seen our New Year's resolutions crumble!

No, the discomfort, or even shock, of being reminded of one's mortality is pressing us to ask the right question. The sort of 'meaning-of-life' question: a fundamental question mark in the life of any adult.

But equally, for all of us, the easier option is to swerve back from this thought to the multiple (and necessary) distractions in our lives, drawing us away – arguably in a psychologically healthy fashion – from those uncomfortable questions about our pettiness and failures, the abandoned hopes and, dare we wonder, ultimately the futility of life?

Sadly, however, many of the more serious distractions – again, war in Europe, the endless atrocities in the Middle East, and the perilous consequences of unchecked global warming – merely compound our sense of helplessness and fears for the future. "Here's something else the world's unlikely to be able to fix!" So, in the end, what's the point? Isn't it just best to skim over the surface of life as best we can? The demand to "Turn away from sin", doesn't perhaps seem that helpful, especially if read primarily as





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something about being 'good' and, even, doing your bit to fix the world.

No, essentially for Christians, Lent is firstly an invitation into the much more difficult space of being clear-eyed about yourself, and about the world, and most particularly about the dark underbelly of the suffering and failures that can't be fixed . . . and the futility of it all if, anyway, death is its final full stop.

And then, staying there as best you can. Staying there and wrestling and trusting that the path we follow to Good Friday will this year yield up another piece of the puzzle and deliver the glimpse of a deeper answer. An answer that surprisingly, shockingly, gives the inspiration for New Life . . . the life, and selfless love, and hope and joy of Easter.

### Weston Colville Parish Council

A summary of items discussed at the meeting on Wednesday 3<sup>rd</sup> January is below. For the full minutes please visit *http://www.westoncolville.org* 

**Public Participation Session** – a couple came to discuss the building plot at the bottom of Horseshoe Lane, which they were in the process of purchasing. The site has outline planning. The PC was advised that Footpath 16 ran through the site, and would need to be diverted closer to the fence behind the houses. There were no comments from the councillors about the footpath diversion. A reserve matters planning application would also need to be submitted. Parking concerns were raised during the outline planning application – it was confirmed that parking would be provided on the site. The planning application would be discussed when it was submitted.

**District and County Council Reports and Items of Interest** – Cllr Batchelor reported that the planning application for the proposed solar farm near Balsham would be decided by the Secretary of State, as it would be so large. The public plans would be released by the end of the month. Cllr Harvey would meet with Cllrs Garrod and Rayner on 4<sup>th</sup> January to discuss flooding along the Stour.

**Flooding** – the drains on Common Road had been cleared, and the drains on Mill Hill would be cleared within the financial year. Cllr Garrod would seek quotes to clear the ditch near the Reading Room car park, and the Clerk would write to the Reading Room, and West Wratting Estate about clearing the ditch next to the cricket field. Cllr Durham had reported the drainage grips on Chapel Road.

**Footpaths** – work had begun on Bridleway 14 and the permissive path, removing the hedge between them.

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LHI Bid 2024 – it was determined not to apply through Local Highways Initiative for a Mobile Vehicle Activated Sign. Cllr Batchelor was asked chase up the price of a device from the County Council. Former Cllr Hubbard was thanked for putting the Speed Indicator Device up in the village.

**Handyman** – the clerk had sought quotes from handymen – only one came to visit the village. The clerk will approach them to remove the fence in the Reading Room carpark, and restore the bus shelters.

**Playground** – a report and an update from the working party was received including showing proposed plans for the fenced-in area and the outer area. Cllr Durham questioned why proposals had been put forwards before the responses from the survey had been received. Cllr Pagonis responded that the costs varied, and the working party wanted to seek quotes to find out what was possible, in terms of placement and costs. The two proposals that were put forwards could be fine-tuned following the results of the survey. It was suggested that multiple funding sources would be found, rather than carrying out fundraising in the village. An outline proposal was put forward that the PC would contribute up to a maximum of £5,000 for the project. The working party will complete funding applications.

**Precept** – the precept for 2024-25 was determined at  $\pounds$ 12,500, remaining the same as 2023-24.

**Date of next Parish Council meeting** – 4<sup>th</sup> March. Jess Ashbridge, Parish Clerk

### West Wratting Parish Council

The following is a shortened version of the draft minutes of the meeting held on 8<sup>th</sup> January. A full copy of the draft minutes can be found on both noticeboards in the village and at *https://westwratting.org.uk/parish-council-minutes/*.

**Footpaths:** Colin McCall reported that cross-field paths still not reinstated will be done as soon as it is possible to get on the fields, due to heavy rain.

**Electoral matters:** Simon Chandler would act as temporary chairman at this meeting and decisions will be made on the various positions at the March meeting. Four of the newer councillors are attending a CAPALC training course this month.

**Co-option Policy:** proposals for this policy had been distributed and it was agreed that it should be adopted and added to the Council Policies page on the website.

**Confidentiality Status of Letters and Documents sent to the PC:** all documentation is available to the public unless information is specifically requested to be confidential. The Freedom of Information Act also allows for this.

**Planning:** fuller details are shown in the draft minutes.

*23/0349 & 0343 – 83 High St* has been refused by SCDC.

23/04750 – Lamb Yard: supported with no comments but concern over the monitoring of said demolition. Cllr O'Donovan will make further enquiries with the Environment Dept about status and plans.

#### **Streetly Farm Proposed Anaerobic Biodigester:**

Cllr S Chandler had attended the public meeting and put information in **Challenge** and on the village website about the plans and the objections by West Wickham PC. He thought it unlikely that it would get permission in its present form.

**Finance:** the list of payments is shown in the draft minutes. There was considerable discussion about how much should be contributed by the PC to WWFC towards the year's grass cutting. It was agreed that WWFC had not received the annual increases they should have had under the existing agreement. Cllr S Chandler presented his calculation of the backpay and cutting rate for 2023 under those existing conditions. The response from WWFC was that it wasn't enough, and a further increase was requested. In addition, invoices were presented for hedge and tree cutting for the last three years. The PC emphasised that all such work needs prior authorisation and invoices must be presented promptly, in time for the annual audit. It was agreed that a working group will discuss these matters with recommendations to be presented at the March PC meeting.

**Budget & Precept:** the budget needs for 2024/25 were outlined which included LHI contribution, maintenance work on the village hall, pump, sign and bus shelter. A more detailed plan will be made. The precept was discussed and it was agreed and voted on that this should be increased by 4%, being the rate of inflation.

#### Maintenance:

Highways problems: Cllr S Chandler had carried out a survey of the potholes in Six Mile Bottom Road up to the Icknield way crossing and sent it to CCC Highways reporting webpage who have responded saying the work will be carried out within 21 days. We look forward to seeing when that happens! *The Kissing Gate:* Colin McCall had spoken to the Footpaths Officer at CCC who told him that there was no money available for a gate between churchyard and horse fields that would give access for buggies or wheelchairs. Probable cost is £4,000 - £5,000. Possible funding could be applied for from the Windfarm Fund.

*Village Hall:* Martin Davey is now chairman of the VHMC.

Land Registration: Cllr S Chandler has undertaken to deal with this. Once the necessary forms have been completed by existing registered owners they will be submitted to the Land Registry so that the PC will be shown as the registered owner rather than the names of individuals.

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**Boundaries between Village Hall & Boreham development:** Martin Davey is looking into this as he believes the present boundaries shown are incorrect. He will contact Dysons Developers.

### Traffic Issues & Speed Restriction equipment:

*LHI application:* Martin Davey is submitting this application on behalf of the PC and reported that it was ready to go but he would like the PC to increase the contribution percentage to 20% of the bid (£2,000) as he felt there was a better chance of it going through. After a vote this was agreed.

Six Mile Bottom Road pavement: Cllr L Chandler, who had been in touch with the Dept of Education Transport regarding the safety of this road for children, reported that a survey had been done jointly by Education Transport and their Road Safety Officer, who have agreed the route is unsafe and a shuttle taxi service offered to the families affected. Highways say that the cost of a pavement is extremely high because of civil engineering difficulties. Further discussion at the next PC meeting.

### **Granta Medical Practices – Appointments**

Here at Granta, we continue to offer a mixture of face to face, telephone and online appointments. I would like to take this opportunity to explain how our appointments system works and what is available to Granta patients.

Firstly, please be assured that no-one apart from clinicians make clinical decisions about your care when you first contact us. Our reception teams have clear criteria, set by GPs, as to what can be put straight onto a clinician's urgent list. However, if they or you are unsure, they will take your details and discuss your concerns with the clinical team and then get back to you.

When ringing for an appointment you will be asked if there is a particular clinician you would like to see, either for continuity of your presenting problem or continuity of overall care. It may be that you don't mind who you see – you just need to speak to someone about your current medical problem.

Please do help our reception team by providing as much information as possible. All information is treated as confidential and will only be used for triage purposes. They are simply trying to make sure you are seen by the right person, in the right place, at the right time.

If you do feel that your problem is not urgent, you will be asked if a routine appointment may be more suitable, or perhaps a long term medical conditions appointment, a palliative care appointment, or whether we can help you in any other way.

If your appointment starts with a telephone call then, together with the clinician, it can be decided whether a face to face appointment will be the appropriate next step.

Routine appointments are available a few weeks in advance, all pre-bookable via our reception teams and online. New routine appointments are released daily at 8 am and at 2 pm to allow for regular availability. If you ring and there is nothing available, our reception team can send you a link that is valid for seven days (that you can check daily) to pre-book a face to face or telephone appointment, so that you do not need to ring back.

Alternatively, if you would prefer, you could use Accurx Patient Triage via our website to have an online consultation with a clinician. We do ask however that you only send routine queries as it can take up to 72 hours to respond.

There will always be sickness, annual leave and the perception that clinicians are not seeing patients. However, on average, Granta's doctors and nurses see around 4,000 patients face to face per week, and consult with another 3,500 via the telephone and online. We continue to try and accommodate all of our patients in a way that suits and please be assured that we are continuously reviewing and revising patient access.
