of the war where we are introduced to a disparate group of characters including Ulysses' wife, Peggy. We follow their lives through the decades, intertwined with major world events, as they find their place in the world as 'transgressive' relationships become more acceptable.

The author does not shrink from using raw, believable language and describing the physical side of relationships without being blatant. There are poignant, sad, tragic and funny moments. Two people liked this book very much, enjoying the descriptions of Italy, in particular Florence and its food, art and architecture. One person was unable to get further than the first part, being unable to relate to the characters or engage with the story, while another read more of it but still couldn't like any of the characters. Scores ranged from 7 to 9 out of 10.

Weston Colville Playground Consultation

200 surveys were sent out to receive opinion on the usage, views and requirements of this area of the recreation field. 63 surveys were received back.

50% of respondents used this area once a month or more frequently. Having been donated to the village in 1885, the recreation field and playground was viewed by 99% as important/very important to the local community. 73% thought the playground was presently in a poor/fair condition, with 16% stating it was good. The majority of respondents visit the recreation field solely to play on the equipment, but 33% use the area for football, walking and learning about wildlife.

We asked what people would like to see and the overwhelming responses were: defined play areas for younger and older children; appropriate equipment for both ages plus additional items such as roundabouts, zipwires, trampoline, spinning play items, football goals, basketball hoops; something specific to our village; a maze; plus more seating and picnic tables.

Pedestrian, wheelchair and pushchair access to the playground is at present restricted due to the gate and 47% asked for this to be amended. 63% responded that if the area was to be improved they were more likely to use this part of the village.

A range of other comments were offered and fall into one or more of the following categories:

1. Problems with the present playground equipment, surface and its maintenance

2. Equipment not suitable for small children

3. Area too small, in particular extending area for younger children

4. Separate areas/equipment for different ages

5. Problems with vehicle access, and specific access problems for wheelchairs and pushchairs

6. Specific requests for additional equipment

7. Why the playground is not currently used by villagers.

Support for the project – five quotes and plans have been acquired and with the results of the consultation and a comparison study of seven other villages' play areas, the working party have agreed a plan and funding applications have been submitted. We cannot guarantee that all wishes will be granted but if funding is successful, it is proposed the installation of equipment would occur within the summer/autumn months.

We would like to thank everyone who took time to complete and return the surveys.

Power Cuts

Is any one else getting very tired of power interruptions in CB21 5NS and 5NT? Sometimes the interruption maybe as little as a few seconds and the substation flashes over, but often after a few flickers that's followed by a power cut of up to five hours. A few seconds may not seem a lot, but I'm guessing that I'm not the only one who is tired of resetting time clocks on electrical appliances and rebooting a

plethora of electronic devices including computers, backup devices, medical devices, music streamers and more. I even have two radios that turn back on at full volume when the power is restored!

I've lived in Weston Green for well over forty years and as far as I can see the situation is getting worse not better. Isn't it time that the parish council and maybe also South Cambs District Council, put some pressure on UK Power Networks to improve the reliability of the electricity supply?

It is also worth noting that over the last year I've recorded the mains voltage as high as 253 volts. That sounds like you're winning something extra, but in reality that is a level way above the 240 volt maximum and is potentially damaging to every light bulb and appliance in your house, as well as being damaging to Solar PV systems.

I invested in an 'optimiser' which has now pulled the maximum mains voltage down to 229 volts, but the 'over voltage mains' had already damaged the solar inverter (a key component of a solar PV system) which had to be replaced.

You can contact UK Power Networks via ukpowernetworks.co.uk or 0800 0294285.

If you have expensive hi-fi I also recommend that you leave it off and isolated from the mains when not using it, because short interruptions and surges when power is restored can also be very damaging to sensitive high end hi-fi. Battery UPS (uninterruptible power supply) and anti-surge systems can help, but they can also degrade the sound and the UPS Systems themselves can be damaged by an over-voltage mains supply.

This term we have seen some noteworthy successes that reflect one of our very important whole-school values, that of having an inclusive cultural environment.

A team from LVC took part in the the Panathlon Xtend multi-skills event run by the Panathlon Foundation, at Comberton Village College, and came first out of all the schools from South Cambridgeshire. They will now represent South Cambridgeshire in the county finals in March. We wish our team well.



Panathlon Xtend is a programme for children with disabilities and special needs in Key Stage 3. Research shows that disabled children's participation in sport drops off in the Key Stage 3 age groups (11 to 14 year-olds). Panahalon started Xtend programme in January 2019 to make sure they helped keep pupils active and engaged after they leave primary education. Another LVC success has been with our Dog Mentor, Ralph. The Dog Mentor Programme, devised by Jenny Duckworth, has built upon the 'benefits of the human-animal bond by providing children positive experiences with dogs that can help them educationally, developmentally, emotionally and socially'.



Our very special Dog Mentor Ralph won the 'You had me at hello' award this month. Ralph trained to be a Dog Mentor in the Summer of 2022 and lives with our Assistant SENCO (special educational needs coordinator) Katie Tooke. Balsham Gardening Club

Balsham Gardening Club met on 7th February to hear

Nigel Start on 'Coping with Climate Change, a survival guide for East Anglia'. He started by describing the challenge of greater weather extremes, especially hotter summers, longer dry



spells, fierce winds, and sudden winter cold. He went on to share his experience of gardening locally, giving us lots of great ideas for our own gardens and allotments.

Nigel explained how we can adapt our gardening to keep moisture in the soil and new pests at bay. Depending on individual gardens, his

recommendations include increasing soil organic matter, cover crops, polytunnels, deep mulches, and storing more rainwater. Just as importantly, we can change the plants we grow, moving away from fine lawns, summer bedding and tender plants, to bulbs, hardy shrubs, biennials and perennials. While it's a challenge choosing better-adapted plants, Nigel was very encouraging, with pictures of beautiful flowering plants and tasty fruit and vegetables that he's growing successfully.

Before we finished the meeting with refreshments and conversation, the club elected David Arnold as chair and re-elected other committee members until the summer.

On Wednesday 14th February, the club visited Fullers Mill at West Stow to see the snowdrops. The garden has a huge number of varieties and the display was wonderful.

The club meets again on Wednesday 6th March at 7.30 pm in the Pavilion, when we'll be making bird boxes and bug hotels. Guests are very welcome.

At our February meeting our speaker was Jan Cassidy, with a talk about

'Women in Prison' and how it affects their families and their mental health. Women make up 4% of the total prison population in England and Wales, which means that there are few prisons in the country and therefore they will be a long way from home for visits. Women are more likely to be imprisoned for minor crimes and therefore have a relatively short sentence, but this causes major disruption to children who must be taken into care. Maybe longer sentences with better support, or community sentences, would bring about better outcomes with less re-offending. It is estimated that 67% of the total prison population suffers from mental health problems.
