West Wratting Book Club

We read two books during our summer break: 'Pharmacopoeia' by Derek Jarman and 'North and South' by Elizabeth Gaskell.

'Pharmacopoeia' is a collection of the author's writings about nature, the building of his garden, the plants about which he was so knowledgeable, and his experience and feelings as his illness progresses. Those of us who read it thought the writing beautiful, with the descriptions very evocative and inspiring to those who know the area. There is also sadness and a directness about what was ahead of him, with a sense of meditation about the writing. It made us all want to (re)visit the area and his cottage at Dungeness. The score was an average of 8 out of 10.

'North and South' was written in the mid-19th century at a time of great social change and industrialisation. It is a mixture of a romance and social comment. It first appeared as a serial in Dickens' weekly journal and it was possibly at his request that Gaskell wrote it. Some thought that the plot was clumsy in parts with some unbelievable plot devices. However, the descriptions of the seeming contrast between the

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poverty and suffering of the northern workers and the conditions in the south are well drawn. Some of the themes still seem familiar today: the split between north and south, concern over changes in the countryside – some for the good, others not – and new religious ideas. Margaret acts as a means of bringing those from the different classes and parts of the country together in the hope of gaining a better understanding of each other. She has some prejudices to start with, particularly against those in trade (eg the Gormans, who are coach builders) but her better character, compassion and concern for others comes to the fore. Despite some reservations we all enjoyed it. Scores were between 7 and 9 out of 10.

We will next meet at The Chestnut Tree at 7.30 pm on Wednesday 16th October to read 'Lessons in Chemistry' by Bonnie Garmus.



Parish Matters

In their articles last month both Iain and Hannah reminded us to be thankful for the many blessings we receive in this life. This month I would like to continue that theme with, perhaps unsurprisingly for



me, an emphasis on health. October 18th is the festival of Luke the Evangelist, author of not only the Gospel that bears his name but also of the Acts of the Apostles. Luke was a doctor (Luke the beloved Physician) and his gospel reflects his interest both in the medical aspects of Christ's ministry but also in the compassion our Lord showed to the suffering. Luke gives us a fascinating insight into the availability of healthcare in his account of the healing of the woman suffering from haemorrhages when we hear that, before touching the hem of Jesus' garment, she had been 12 years without cure and, as we hear elsewhere, had spent all her money on doctors.

October also sees the commemorations of both Elizabeth Fry and Edith Cavell. Elizabeth Fry is best known as a prison reformer, her work for the sick, particularly in the training of nurses being overlooked. Fry established a School of Nursing at Guy's Hospital in 1840 in advance of Florence Nightingale at St Thomas's and it was a group of 'Fry Nurses' that Florence took to the Crimea. Perhaps better known is Cavell who selflessly cared for German and British Troops in World War I and in 1915 died in that cause.

These three people, in their different ways, demonstrated the love and care our Lord had for the sick and suffering in times when care was scarce or simply not available. Today we here are privileged to have access, largely free of charge, to healthcare provided by dedicated and highly skilled front-line professionals working tirelessly day and night in sometimes impossible circumstances. Our NHS most certainly does need fixing and I hope and pray that our politicians and leaders have the courage and resolve to do what is needed but, in the meantime, let us be thankful for all those who day by day are following the example set by St Luke, Elizabeth Fry and Edith Cavell.

Operation Christmas Child

This Christian organisation sends filled shoeboxes to needy disadvantaged children in many parts of the world. The idea is to



pack a box with lots of fun things, but also some practical items. These boxes are then distributed to children who may never have had a gift before, or had new things for themselves.

In 2023 Operation Christmas Child sent 252,000 boxes from the UK. It would be great if this number grew even more. The boxes tend to go to Eastern European countries, Central Asia and Africa.

It is never too early to knit (hats, gloves, soft toys), buy, or make items. Look on the website for ideas and keep a look out for items such as stationery, soap, toothbrushes, small toys, balls, and games (only new or in very good condition).

There are 3 age groups: 2 - 4, 5 - 9, 10 - 14, either boy or girl.

Get a shoebox, (not small child's or boot box please), cover it with nice paper, and away you go. I have a limited source of preprinted boxes.



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Collection week this year is 11th to 18th November. Boxes can be dropped off at my house (20, West Field, Lt Abington).

Coffee and Scone Day – Wednesday 23rd October, 10 am - 4 pm, when you can drop in for a cuppa, and browse items that can be bought for the boxes.

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Weston Colville Parish Council

Abridged minutes of the Weston Colville Parish Council Meeting held on Monday 2nd September. For the full minutes please go to www.westoncolville.org.uk

Flooding – the last occasion of flooding on Common Road was at 3 am on a Saturday in July. Riparian letters had been delivered, and actions had been taken on Common Road. However it was felt that the culvert under the road was insufficient. The ditch had been cleared of undergrowth behind the houses on The Green/Horseshoe Lane. There was frustration from home owners about the flooding, as the frequency had increased, however ultimately the responsibility lay with Highways. The PC would continue to chase them. The update from the Reading Room re the neighbouring ditch and the ditch by the cricket field will be chased.

MVAS – Cllr Vidler shared the data from the MVAS. On Mill Hill 98% vehicles were within the speed limit (highest recorded speed 58 mph). Brinkley Road had the lowest compliance with 93% within the speed limit, however the highest recorded speed was 75 mph.

BT Digital Voice – it was understood that the roll out had been postponed. It is possible to request keeping a standard phone line from BT, rather than having a digital line.

New Laptop for Clerk – the Council will contribute up to £350 for the first year, including device and all subscriptions. Little Abington PC had already committed the same figure, and it was hoped Horseheath PC would do similar. Following discussion, it was felt that going for a MacBook would be the best option considering the longevity of the device, creating the best value for money.



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Grass Cutting Tenders, March 2025 – November 2028 – the tender letter will be circulated to councillors for discussion and approval in November.

Risk Assessment/Health and Safety – the defibrillator was rescue-ready. The playground inspection report was discussed, and it was determined to seek quotes to bury the concrete below the slide at Church End.

Playground – an update for the playground rejuvenation was received. The funding had been promised, and the contractor – Setter Play – could be instructed to complete the works within the fenced area. It was suggested asking the Reading Room to pay the deposit from the Rural Prosperity Grant. Once the deposit was received Setter Play hoped to install the new equipment approximately 6 weeks later.

Wildly Preserved Launched

As many of you know I have been producing preserved and fermented food for some time now, but over the summer I registered Wildly Preserved as a food business, was inspected by our local Environmental Health Officer, and was awarded 5 stars for food hygiene, so now the preserves and ferments are officially for sale.

I try to use organic and or very locally grown ingredients, and use variously sized recycled glass jars. At present the rate is $\pounds 1.10/100g$.

Examples of preserves are: various types of marmalade; plum and sweet cicely jam; cabbage and celeriac kimchi; fermented tomato ketchup; sauerkraut with fennel; and the aptly named fermented 'cheery tomato bombs'. No week is exactly the same, so I let people know what's available on a Sunday and then deliver their order generally by the following Wednesday.

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Community Warden for Age UK

My name is Lucy Cameron, and I am the community warden for Age UK Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. The villages I support are Balsham, Horseheath, West Wratting, Shudy Camps, Castle Camps, Weston Colville and West Wickham.



You may see me dashing from village to village supporting my service users each day, Monday to Friday. My working hours are 9 am until 1 pm, and the support available is flexible to meet the needs of each person.

I start the day by making a phone call to all the people using my service. This lets me know they are all OK and allows me to plan what is needed for the day. No two days are ever the same.

I then start my visits, which could include picking up a small amount of shopping needed by a service user, or collecting a prescription to deliver to someone.

I can support people with lots of other tasks – perhaps making a doctor's appointment or booking hospital transport; there might be a letter they need supporting with, or a telephone call that needs making.

Sometimes it's just nice to spend time with an older person and listen to the wonderful tales of years gone by. This can reduce feelings of isolation and loneliness.

We are currently able to offer four weeks' free trial of the warden service, so if you are interested or know

Vaccinations Update

As we approach the colder months, a number of vaccines can help protect you against serious illness, including:

The **RSV vaccine**, new for 2024, helps protect against Respiratory Syncytial Virus (RSV) that can make babies and older adults seriously ill. This is offered all year round and is recommended if:

- you are pregnant (from 28 weeks onwards) to help protect your baby after they are born
- you are aged 75 to 79 (if you turn 80 on or after 1st September 2024 you're eligible for the RSV vaccine until 31 August 2025. You are not eligible for the RSV vaccine if you turned 80 before 1st September 2024).

The **flu vaccine** helps protect against flu, which can be a serious or life-threatening illness. It's offered on the NHS every year in autumn or early winter to people at higher risk of getting seriously ill from flu. You can get the vaccine if you are:

- aged 65 or over
- · have certain long-term health conditions
- are pregnant
- live in a care home
- are the main carer for an older or disabled person
- receive a carer's allowance
- live with someone who has a weakened immune system.

The **shingles vaccine** is offered all year round. Shingles is a common condition that causes a painful rash. It can sometimes lead to serious problems such



as long-lasting pain, hearing loss or blindness. You're more likely to get shingles, and it is more likely to cause serious problems, as you get older or if you have a severely weakened immune system. The vaccine is recommended for:

- people who turn 65 on or after 1st September
- people aged 70 to 79
- people aged 50 and over with a severely weakened immune system.

The **pneumonococcal vaccine** is offered all year round. It helps protect against serious illnesses like pneumonia and meningitis and is recommended for:

- babies
- people aged 65 and over
- children and adults at higher risk of getting seriously ill.

Please speak to any member of our reception team to check if you are eligible for any of the above vaccines and to book into a vaccine clinic.
