# Kingsway Solar Community Action: Next Steps

After a hectic December, KSCA had hoped for a well-deserved break over Christmas. However, Kingsway chose to release their Environmental Impact Assessment Scoping Report (a total of 328 pages plus four appendices) on 17th December, despite advice from the Planning Inspectorate to avoid the holiday period due to reduced capacity for responses. Local councils, including parish councils, had until 14th January to provide feedback on what the report includes. KSCA was pleased to support the parish

councils in preparing their responses, which are now available to read and download on the KSCA website.

We are not alone! KSCA has put together a list of all the large solar projects in the pipeline, showing where they are in the planning process. We've also explained how the development process works, so you'll know when you can have your say on the Kingsway project. The next big step is the Statutory Consultation, which Kingsway plans to hold in summer 2025.

There will be an official announcement in local and national media with details about the consultation, including dates, locations (for any in-person events), as well as online forums. During this consultation, we'll need support from experts like ecologists and lawyers to make sure our community is properly represented. If you can help, please get in touch!

#### West Wratting Book Club

Our book for January was the Booker Prize-winning 'Orbital' by Samantha Harvey. The author wrote this book during the covid lockdowns, drawing in particular on the live feed from the International Space Station, and follows 24 hours of orbits. We all enjoyed this book very much.

In between meteorological observations and other scientific experiments, and when they are not sleeping, the ISS crew spend much of their time observing space and the earth going past. The details of the physical effects on their bodies is enlightening. The language is beautiful, with the author finding so

many different ways to describe the countries and continents passing beneath them. It highlights both the astronauts/cosmonauts' personal thoughts of family and friends left behind on Earth as well as the larger picture, seeing the world as a single entity with no borders, highlighting how connected and reliant on each other we are, as are they on the space station. And yet there is the knowledge that there are wars and natural disasters going on below them. It draws attention to how much of the latter is caused by human action. This is a thought-provoking, brilliant and inspiring read. Scores were between 8 and 9.5 out of 10.

Our next meeting will be at The Chestnut Tree on Wednesday 19th January at 7.30 pm to read 'The Spinning House' by Caroline Biggs, the story of the infamous arrest and imprisonment of unchaperoned women found walking the streets of Cambridge after dark in the nineteenth century.



#### Parish Matters

The seasons within our liturgy emphasise waiting for God's revelation. We began with Advent, a season of waiting, and now we are at the finishing line



I have a deep interest in the education and support of children. I believe they are our future, and we have a responsibility to guide and encourage them to explore the love and wonder of God.

Bringing a child into God's house may not be to everyone's taste; it can be daunting. But it is a vital part of our faith and community. It is an action that resounds in heaven, significant both for the child and for those waiting to receive them. In Luke 2:22 - 40, we see Mary and Joseph bringing Jesus into God's house for the first time. Like any parents, they are hoping for welcome, blessing, and comfort. Waiting to receive them are Simeon and Anna, whose joy in this tiny baby is palpable.

I think there's an echo of Candlemas whenever a child is brought to church, especially for the first time. It's always a holy and fragile moment. I believe the best way to welcome children isn't necessarily with something flashy, but simply by being there, ready to receive them in a space made for them. I've witnessed children's lives enriched by church relationships, where some of their favourite people are not other children, but adults who take time to chat, show interest in their latest fascinations, and share biscuits.


Think of what can be received from these moments: the congregation receiving the fulfilment of their hopes and prayers, and the child and family receiving a joyful welcome. #### St Mary's Window Repairs

Almost exactly 200 years ago, St Mary's church tower collapsed, destroying a fair bit of the church on the way. Amazingly, within a year the place was rebuilt. Fragments of the ancient medieval stained glass – those not destroyed in the Reformation – were incorporated into new windows in the north wall. These are historically very important, as few examples of medieval stained glass survive. We need to take action to conserve these.





Despite the extraordinary achievements of those who oversaw the reconstruction in 1825, two further windows have now sustained 200 years of weather battering and the leadwork and wooden frames are now badly degraded. If we don't act quickly, we'll come into the church after a storm and find glass strewn all over the place.

Restoration work on ancient glass is highly specialised and the only local company who can tackle the work has a long waiting list – literally years. We don't have that long, but fortunately a 'window' has opened in their schedule (sorry) and they can start work almost immediately. They can also repair the leadwork and glazing in the worst two Georgian windows. The problem is that we simply don't have the funds in the church to pay for this kind of repair work which costs thousands of pounds.

Thankfully one highly-generous parishioner has agreed to pay for the conservation of the medieval

glass. Another former member of the church has kindly made a major donation, so we are left with about £4,000 to raise in order to keep the church weatherproof. Now we need your help!

People always say that The Church has loads of money, and that may be. But none of it reaches this little outpost in Weston Colville. We have to be self-sufficient. Please consider whether you can make a donation. Everything will help. If you are a UK taxpayer, it's possible for us to reclaim the tax you paid on any contributions, through Gift Aid. All we need is your name and address, and an email or note saying you wish your donation to be gift-aided. We can do the rest.

You can give with a card or a smartphone in the church, by cash or cheque, or by direct transfer if you prefer. (Barclays, 20-74-05, Acc 50935883)

This is an urgent appeal to meet the cost of repairs which are essential, and beyond our church's means. We are (thankfully) not faced with the crisis of 200 years ago, but to keep the church open for all the people in the village, we need to act quickly to keep the glass in, the weather out – and the door open.

#### Weston Colville Parish Council

A meeting was held on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> January. Full minutes and meeting documents can be found on http://www.westoncolville.org.uk.

**Age UK** – a presentation from the Age UK Warden Scheme was received from Sarah Lees. Currently two of the twelve people being looked after by the Small Villages Warden live in Weston Colville. She said the wardens aimed to reduce loneliness, isolation, collect prescriptions, signpost to other organisations, and support people and their families. Wardens were mental health trained, dealt with bereavement, and were dementia friendly. A recent report conducted by South Cambridgeshire District Council (SCDC) demonstrated social value return, the warden scheme offered high value for money, however there was a £6,000 deficit for 2025/26 (£500 per client). SCDC had dropped their funding for this financial year. Sarah hoped there would be an increased contribution from WCPC, but she was grateful for all donations so far. The scheme did not receive direct money from the main Age UK charity, despite being under their umbrella. Sarah Lees was thanked for her presentation, and funding will be considered when the budget is discussed.

Flooding – this had been better on Common Road since the culvert was cleared by a parishioner, but the PC was still waiting for a Floods Risk Officer to bring a consultant out to create a long-term solution. Flooding had been high at Horseshoe Lane ford, the day before the meeting. Debris had been found in the culverts.

**Footpaths** – requests had been made by a number of parishioners for a dog waste bin at the bottom of Horseshoe Lane. Previous applications to SCDC had been unsuccessful.



#### **MVAS** (Moveable Vehicle Activated Signs) –

Cllr Russell had now taken over the MVAS. The devices would be moved to Chapel Road and Brinkley Road coming into the village. There were spare brackets, so they could go in different locations.

Kingsway Solar Farm Environment Impact
Assessment (EIA) – a letter from the Planning
Inspectorate requested comments for the Environment
Impact Assessment, as a consultee of the application.
Cllr Durham had attended a joint PC meeting on 5th
December, where a representative from Stop Sunnica
was present; they had won their case with the
planning inspectorate etc, however Ed Miliband had
pushed the proposal through in two days and Stop
Sunnica, SCDC and Cambridgeshire County Council
(CCC) did not appeal due to the legal costs involved.

Kingsway Solar Community Group (KSCG) were acting as a really good resource. It was important to collaborate between the PCs. Cllr Vidler had created a document specific to Weston Colville for the EIA scoping document, using West Wratting PC's document as a basis. The reasons for objection were based on planning objections. It was clear that Kingsway Solar had not surveyed Area C, due to the unsuitability of the area, such as roads, flooding, battery electric storage risk, landscape and visual amenity. There were lots of mistakes, listed buildings not incorporated, etc. Cllr Pagonis proposed an opening for the document, adding major concerns in bullet points.

Cllr Garrod thanked Cllr Vidler for the amount of work carried out in a very short amount of time from 17<sup>th</sup> December to 14<sup>th</sup> January. There would be a list of pictures appendices, views from listed buildings were required, and photographs from heritage settings.

Listed properties and views: Weston Colville Hall, Three Horseshoes Farmhouse, Church, Lane Cottage, Pathways, Pound Farm, Pound Farm Barns. KSCG had Map Capture What 3 Words with views, just for parcel C, for Weston Colville. Simon Chandler (West Wratting PC Chairman) asked that endorsements were made for West Wratting's report – there was a draft map with photos. It was suggested including a reference to the Environment Agency flood plan. Weston Colville was not listed as a residential area in the Kingsway Solar documents.

Setting up a working group was discussed, comprising two councillors, three parishioners, and a Kingsway Action member. It would be a long-term project, over at least next three to five years. Cllrs Batchelor and Harvey were very supportive. Cllr Batchelor suggested having a joint meeting with planners involved with the Sunnica application, before the formal consultation.

**Policies** – the biodiversity policy will be brought back in March. Cllr Garrod would amend the policy using CCC and SCDC policies. It was suggested liaising with local bodies – land owners, PCC, and Woodland Trust etc. Hedging for new area round pond had been ordered from the Woodland Trust by Cllr Jennings.

**BT Digital Voice** – The clerk would take action on the email sent by Cllr Batchelor.

**Village Event 2025** – to celebrate 80<sup>th</sup> VE Day and the official opening of the playground – discussion to be moved to March.

Playground – the works for the fenced area were completed in November. The deposit had been paid for the second stage, which would be installed in mid/late January. Funds from Thalia had been received, and a donation of £1,000 from Field Compost Ltd. Final costs for playground due were £18,057.50, plus VAT. It was proposed to acquire signage for sponsorship/inspection signs, budget up to £200. Picnic benches would be discussed in March.

Precept 2025/26 – The precept was determined at £15,000. £2,000 was budgeted to start a fund for fighting Kingsway Solar proposals. SCDC made an error on the precept last year, and although the PC had received the correct amount, parishioners were charged a reduced rate, and therefore it would appear that there would be a large increase this year.

#### West Wratting Parish Council Meeting

The council met on 13th January. Below is a summary of the discussions and decisions.

**Public Participation** – a resident shared updates on local footpaths, encouraging feedback from others via the village website.

#### **Council Business**

- *Planning Training:* the clerk will arrange two planning webinar sessions for councillors by polling for suitable dates.
- Challenge Magazine Grant: a £150 annual contribution was approved.
- *Village Hall Grant:* a grant application for £1,548 to support the village hall was not approved. The council is exploring alternative funding and insurance options with the Village Hall Management Committee.
- AgeUK Community Warden Scheme: the council approved increasing its contribution to £275 to continue supporting this important local service.

**Finance** – the council reviewed and approved the budget for 2025/26, setting the precept at £14,300. Bank balances were noted to remain healthy.

**Planning** – no new planning applications were received, though updates on ongoing applications were discussed. The council will draft a formal parish plan to help guide future developments. The approved hedge works at Randswood Farm were also noted.

Lamb's Yard Development – the council confirmed it will take ownership of the wildlife area being constructed as part of the Lamb's Yard development. Necessary arrangements, including insurance liability during the ten-year support period, are being investigated.

**Village Hall** – updates were received on discussions with Dyason Developments regarding the village hall. Cllr Ryder is compiling photographic records of the building's current condition for reference.

**Kingsway Solar Farm** – the chairman provided an update on the Kingsway Solar Farm Working Group. The council's response to the EIA scoping report was submitted before the 14<sup>th</sup> January deadline. Summaries of meetings are available on the village website.

- Approval was given for an event on
   7th February featuring a ZZ Top tribute band.
- Two darts teams were admitted as affiliated clubs of the pavilion.
- Rule changes were approved, including:
  - Reducing the quorum for committee and general meetings.
  - Increasing the number of guests members may sign in.
- Progress is being made to review and revise the pavilion's lease and agreement. A working group comprising councillors and pavilion committee members will begin drafting updates.
- The council will continue supporting additional bin collections and approved grass-cutting costs for 2025.

The Sports Pavilion Working Group will propose a solution for fast-tracking event approvals. Grant applications to the Wadlow Wind Farm Community Fund are also being prepared.

**Small Assets** – research is underway for repairing the historic Pound and repurposing the old telephone box. The defibrillator battery will be replaced in October 2025, with pads replaced in April 2026. These costs are being budgeted for future years.




