Kingsway Solar Community Action: The Work Goes On

It's been a busy month for the Kingsway Solar Community Action (KSCA) group. We hope you've spotted some of us at the public consultations or come across our leaflets. Most importantly, we hope you've submitted your responses to Kingsway. Your opinion matters!

But our work doesn't end here. At the Extraordinary Parish Meeting on Thursday 5th December, at the Balsham Institute, local parish councils came together to discuss working collaboratively on the solar farm development. The meeting was well attended and included a presentation via weblink from Dr Catherine Judkins from Say No to Sunnica group, the Town and Parish Council Alliance, and UK Solar Alliance.

In sharing her experiences with the room, she described the five-year process for the Sunnica solar farm. She emphasised the importance of persistence, saying "You do need to stick with it and work through it, because it is a process that you do need to engage with" and added, "Think of it as working in waves – some periods will need more engagement than others."

At the meeting, KSCA emphasised the need for strong representation, saying, "We need voices who can negotiate on behalf of the communities to achieve the best outcome."

We met with Pippa Heylings MP, who is pushing for a Land Use Framework to improve decision-making on large-scale solar projects. The meeting included a good mix of people from KSCA, the parish council, and the district council, showing how we're working together.



KSCA also met with David Vernon from Kingsway to

KSCA also met with David Vernon from Kingsway to discuss our concerns and objections to the solar farm (more details to follow). As we move forward, we'll need to involve experts, from ecologists to lawyers, to ensure we have strong evidence and representation.

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Weather, Wars and Wishful Thinking?

Is it just me, or do others feel that the world's becoming increasingly unpredictable; and not in a good way? Writing in early December, it's a challenge to guess what will be most relevant in the New Year: the weather (aka 'climate change'), wars and peace . . . and wishful thinking? Yes, surely these still seem like good bets: dark clouds variously threatening and shaping our hopes for the coming year.

In our villages – hardly at the centre of world events – we can pretend it's otherwise. We can carry on just as usual. But tell that to the residents of Weston Colville and West Wratting, wondering how best to respond to the prospect of being embedded in a vast solar farm. Tell that to our farmers. Show indifference to our Ukrainian refugees, to our friends with families in the Middle East, or fearful of the rise of anti-semitism? Oh don't worry, everything will be sorted out by diplomacy, Donald Trump and Artificial Intelligence: humanity is endlessly innovative and resilient. For most people, Christianity probably also falls into that same category of 'wishful thinking'.

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Granted, the Church's message can appear fanciful, or obscure, and most Christians (myself included) aren't the best examples of what we preach! Still, the teaching, death and resurrection of Jesus Christ is always relevant. We're alerted to immature fantasies about ourselves and the world, like "But we're innocent. The fault lies entirely with the greedy and selfish; there's a limited supply and you need to fight to get your share and protect yourself at all costs".

But if we can learn to see through our anxious and panic-driven defences, and have a 'change-of-heart', we begin to see the light of what we truly need most: the maturity of a human love and a community that always gives freely, as well as receives, with thanks. Yes, that's only possible if everyone 'changes heart'. But you've got to start somewhere.

Christians believe that God's love gives the power – of weakness and vulnerability – to change heart. Indeed, that's the only worthwhile path to take. The rest is empty futility.

Hmm – perhaps I should rethink my New Year's resolutions!

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Collection for the People of Ukraine



A collection for the people of Ukraine will be held on Saturday 25th January at Abington Primary School from

9.00 am until 12.30 pm. Supported by Abington School and the Granta Vale churches, this will be the fifth collection organised by Rotarian Tony Collett and Saffron Walden Rotary.

According to the United Nations office in Ukraine there have been (up to end of October) over 39,000 civilian casualties in Ukraine, consisting of 27,000 injured and 12,000 killed. This has led to thousands being displaced and in need of warm clothing and footwear in good condition, stable food and household items including pasta, rice, canned goods and gluten free items, toiletries and cleaning materials, cooking utensils, torches, batteries and crockery. In addition cash donations are needed towards the purchase of pallets of food, and these can also be made at the Rotary collection point in cash or by credit card on 25th January.

Tony says, "The response to the previous four collections from residents of Abington and other local villages has been truly heart-warming so I am hopeful it will be the same this time."

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Balsham Gardening Club

Balsham Gardening Club held its very last meeting on 4th December, after 47 years of shows, visits and talks. Although a poignant occasion, we enjoyed a talk by John Gibson, who told us the story of the Royal Papworth Hospital from its origin as the Cambridgeshire Tuberculosis Colony in 1918 with just 17 patients and 4 staff, through to the renowned heart and lung hospital. He gave us a vivid picture of Dr Pendrill Varrier-Jones' pioneering approach to the treatment of TB, based on fresh air, good food and light work. Recovering patients lived in small wooden huts with cloth windows and no heating in the grounds of Papworth Hall, regardless of the weather.

The TB Colony grew to treat, house and employ patients and their families, becoming the Papworth Village Settlement in 1929, with its own school and church. The light work started as helping with each other's care and developed into keeping animals and growing vegetables, and then to workshops making travel luggage, furniture and many other things.

John told us how antibiotic treatments for TB were developed, made difficult because of the TB bacterium's protective lipid coat and slow growth. As antibiotics became effective, the hospital used its expertise in chest surgery to specialise in ground-breaking heart surgery, eventually moving to its new building in Cambridge.

After the talk we enjoyed Christmas food and drinks and a gardening quiz, led by Jennie Tipler. The outgoing committee were given garden vouchers in thanks for their work over the years.

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
