



Our book for June was 'Olive Kitteridge' by Elizabeth Strout, who was recently short-listed for the Women's Prize for Fiction for another of her books. (The prize was won by Yael van der Wouden's 'The Safekeep' which we recently read.)

This is a series of short stories set in a small town in Maine, USA. They are about or related to the eponymous character, Olive Kitteridge, to a greater or lesser degree. They are snapshots of her and other people's lives over several years, their interactions, and how they affect each other. Not all the stories have a proper ending, leaving some dissatisfied.

This book divided opinion. with some loving it while others disliked it. The latter described it as prosaic, insular, boring and tedious with all the characters portrayed in a bad light. Those who liked it did so, in one case, despite or perhaps because of the unlikeable characters. Themes included long marriages, ageing, death, relationships between the old and young (in particular, the acrimonious relationship between Olive and her son), as well as an exploration of nature and nurture and what people tell themselves as opposed to how others see them. One person felt the ending was



a little 'Hollywood' but others did not think this was

Scores varied between 4, 8 and 10 out of 10.

We will now be having our summer break and reconvene at The Chestnut Tree on Wednesday 17th September at 7.30 pm to review two books: 'Homegoing' by Yaa Gyasi and 'The Glass Maker' by Tracy Chevalier.

### Kingsway Solar Community Action

A huge thank you to everyone who joined our community walk on Sunday 8th June. Over 130 residents and volunteers came together to explore the West Wratting countryside as part of a national campaign drawing attention to the spread of industrial-scale solar farms, pylons, and battery storage developments in rural areas.

Afterwards, we gathered at West Wratting Village Hall for wildlife displays, refreshments, and a talk outlining the plans for Kingsway – what's proposed, why KSCA is opposing it, and how local people can get involved.

You can watch the video of the talk and listen to the audio of the Q&A by visiting the news page on the KSCA website (kingswayaction.org).

Watch out for future community events in Balsham, Weston Colville and West Wickham.

We want to hear your views – tell us how you think the proposed solar farm could affect your wellbeing, lifestyle, and connection to the local area. Your feedback will help shape our community response to the next stage of consultation.



MP action – local MP Pippa Heylings recently met with the Project Manager, David Vernon, from Kingsway/Downing Renewables to raise concerns about poor community engagement, lack of transparency, battery fire risks and the need for proper consultation over potential community benefits. She has promised to share a full update soon, including with parish councils.

### Step into nature – July's focus: Insects!

As part of our Step into Nature campaign, we're asking residents to look out for insects this month. Insects play a vital role in ecosystems – pollinating plants, breaking down waste, and providing food for birds and other wildlife.

### Pippa Heylings MP

Following the concerns that have been conveyed to me by constituents and the affected parish councils, I had a meeting with David Vernon of Kingsway Solar. I raised a number of key questions about their process so far in order to hold them to account for decisions



taken, and ascertain how they plan to move forward as a result. District Councillor Geoff Harvey also joined the meeting to represent local people who've raised concerns with him. I challenged Mr Vernon on the poor engagement with the community; lack of early and structured engagement with the local planning authority; and heavy-handed tactics with what I highlighted was inappropriate use of planning regulation to gain access to properties leaving some residents distressed and angry. Though Mr Vernon was confident in their approach despite my concerns, there was an acknowledgment that this could have been handled in a better way. I was pleased to hear from Mr Vernon that Kingsway plan to publish a summary of interim findings from the non-statutory consultation before the next stage of consultation begins. This will be an important opportunity to see the extent to which key issues raised are being considered. Mr Vernon agreed with me that the Statutory Consultation should not happen over the summer state school holidays and confirmed that residents will have time to participate when term begins. Exact dates are still to be published. I was reassured that fire service concerns are being fully considered and I will be supporting my colleagues, Charlotte Cane MP and Calum Miller MP, in their parliamentary work raising concerns on battery safety. I stressed to Mr Vernon that I will continue to push for any large-scale solar farm applications to be informed by a joined-up national approach through the proposed Land Use Framework and the Strategic Spatial Energy Plan. We need a system for ensuring appropriate land is selected for development, balancing competing demands for food production, nature, housing and energy infrastructure, rather than leaving it to a postcode lottery of available land. As

for potential community benefits, Mr Vernon informed me that Kingsway are currently developing their proposal for this as part of the next stage of consultation. He said this would involve, in his opinion, 'significant sums' for a community fund that would be allocated in consultation with the parish councils and local authorities. It remains to be seen whether the amounts being considered are proportionate and follow the best practice, such as the example that is set in Scotland. I appreciate the engagement of local people and will continue to hold Kingsway Solar to account.

### Devana Rewilding Project

Last September, there was a presentation of the Devana Rewilding Project in West Wickham, funded by an investment company called Ground Control, which is transforming a farm estate into a wildlife reserve – which all appears to be a very beneficial project. What was not quite clear from the presentation was how it would, as they said, show that nature recovery can generate sustainable revenue. More light is shed on this by googling 'Biodiversity Net Gain' (BNG), which is a requirement for major development projects such as Kingsway Solar. One of the top hits is for 'Ground Control . . . Buy BNG Units . . . ' and their website immediately flags up Devana as "one of the first Habitat Banks in England to appear on the National Biodiversity Net Gain Sites Register . . . ". So, this rewilding project is to be paid for, at least in part, by developers like Kingsway Solar so as to meet their legal obligation to provide BNG somewhere, even if they destroy the existing wildlife habitat around our villages.








### Balsham Picture House

Their instinct is to sabotage the bridge, but under the leadership of Colonel Nicholson they're persuaded the bridge should be built to help morale, spirit. At first, the prisoners admire Nicholson when he bravely

endures torture rather than compromise his principles for the benefit of Japanese Commandant Colonel Saito, but soon they realise it's a monument to Nicholson himself, as well as a form of collaboration with the enemy. Award winning film starring William Holden, Alec Guinness and Jack Hawkins.



Normal start time of doors open at 7 pm and film at 7.30 pm in the Balsham Church Institute, Church Lane, Balsham. Dave's bar will be open as usual before the film for refreshments.

Years 7 and 8 enjoyed trips to Chessington,


