West Wratting Book Club

For May we read 'Prophet Song' by Paul Lynch, the Booker Prize winner in 2023.

Set in Ireland and, specifically, Dublin, this is the story of one woman's fight to keep her life and family together as society disintegrates around her. This dystopian story, reminiscent of 'The Handmaid's Tale' and 'Nineteen Eighty-Four', was described by our readers as harrowing, frightening, thought-provoking, chilling, even depressing but brilliantly and exquisitely written. The style of continuous writing with no paragraphs has a 'stream-of-consciousness' feel which pulls you along.

The main character, Eilish, is an intelligent, well-educated woman, a microbiologist, with teenage and younger children plus a father who seems to be drifting into dementia. However, she is unwilling or unable to admit what is happening around her, and the need to find safety elsewhere. She is determined to hang on to some sort of 'normality' even as her life disintegrates.

It gives you an awareness of the smaller details of the effects on the individual rather than the larger scale events of a war.

Setting it in Ireland, somewhere closer to home than other theatres of war, it acts as a lesson as to how

It is a reminder of how people can find themselves pushed into desperate actions and situations when trying to escape from such horrendous events. Very much a lesson for our times which lingers in the mind. Although rather dark and disturbing, well worth reading. Scores were between 8.5 and 9 out of 10.

Kingsway Solar Community Action

Following our AGM in April 2025, we're pleased to report a rise in membership, reflecting the growing concern within our community.

To keep everyone informed and connected, we've launched a members' WhatsApp Announcements Channel to complement our regular updates on Facebook and to allow us to share important information quickly and directly.

Recent developments in Weston Colville – several residents in Weston Colville have contacted us after receiving letters from agents acting on behalf of the Kingsway Solar project. Where appropriate, we have encouraged landowners to consider granting access, especially when it supports informed decision-making for ecological surveys.

However, we are also aware that certain residents have been issued with a Notice under Section 172, compelling access to their land. This has understandably caused concern. These issues have been raised with local planning and with Pippa Heylings, and we are awaiting further clarification and guidance.

We will continue to monitor the situation closely and provide updates as more information becomes available. If you've received similar correspondence or have concerns, please get in touch. We're currently gathering all related information.

Step into Nature: June's Call to Action – Butterflies! Thank you to everyone who's taken part in our Step into Nature campaign so far. For

June, we're asking you to look out for butterflies, which are important indicators of a healthy environment.

Please keep recording your



sightings—especially anything unusual, rare, or protected. You can log them via *iRecord* to help us gather vital data within a

2 km radius of the proposed Kingsway Solar site. Let's keep showing how much our local wildlife matters!

Join the National Community Walk – Say No to Kingsway Solar

Sunday 8th June, 10 am. ↑ Meet at West Wratting Rec Ground car park, Bull Lane, West Wratting, CB21 5NP.

Certainly, so far this year we seem to have been subjected to a torrent of bad news, depressing forecasts, inhuman behaviour and horrific events that, were I to possess any, would make my hair stand on end! However, before concluding that the world is going to hell in a handcart and abandoning all hope, I have to encourage myself and thereby, I hope, you to pause and for just a moment take stock. Weston Colville Parish Council – Chairman's Report, 2024/25 Parish Meeting

This has been a challenging year with both exciting and worrying developments within the village.

Replacement of the Green Play Area

I would like to start with the exciting development first, which is the new playground on the Green with its many and varied activities for all ages. Following a public consultation the subcommittee produced a proposal to redevelop the play area and made several successful applications for grants to support its cost. This is certainly the most ambitious and costly project the council has undertaken in all my years on the council. I would like to especially thank Councillor Pagonis, Councillor Rayner, the clerk Jess Ashbridge, Jo and Daniel Jackson and Amie Jordi for a very successful and well executed project, the results of which are clear for all to see. The new playground has been actively used for a few months now and its official opening will be on Sunday 11th of May when you are all invited to join us at The Green.

Kingsway Solar Farm

The worrying development in the last year has been the proposed Solar Farm development which would potentially surround the village with solar panels. The council is opposed to this and has made robust replies to both the informal consultation by Kingsway and to the scoping process for the Kingsway Solar environmental statement. I am pleased to say that the planning inspectorate included our concerns in the response requested from Kingsway. I would also like to thank all those who helped me with the council response. The council will continue to ensure it is involved in and responds to all aspects of the project as it develops.

Flooding in the Village

This has been another successful year for flood prevention in the village, including updating the flood plan for the whole village and getting the County Council Highways department to complete more actions to alleviate flooding in the village, notably the clearing of the Stour behind the old council houses and around the Horseshoe Lane ford. The Reading Room trust and the parish council have also had the ditch by the Green and next to the Reading Room carpark cleared. Flood wardens are still in place and have dealt efficiently with several incidents of

flooding on Common Road. I would like to thank Councillors Garrod and Durham and their fellow flood wardens for their hard work in delivering this. The County Council Flood Risks officer is also continuing his visits to the village and implementing plans which should further reduce flooding in the village.

Maintenance of Roads and Verges

The parish council organised its usual verge cutting programme and continued to provide street lighting for the village. Limited progress was also made with getting potholes repaired and gullies and drains cleared. This continues to be a never-ending task and there are still many potholes to fix.

MAVS - Speed Indicator Sign

Following a very generous donation from a parishioner last year the council continues to use its two mobile activated vehicle signs which show the speed of vehicles passing through the village. These have definitely helped to improve road safety, and a considerable amount of data has been collected which worryingly shows a small number of people driving through the village at up to sixty mph.

Grass and Hedge Maintenance

The council continued with its programme of grass cutting and hedge trimming around the war memorial, and at the Church End playing field and the play area on The Green.

Play Areas

An annual safety inspection of this equipment has also been carried out by an outside expert to ensure it meets current safety standards, with the recommendations raised being implemented alongside all other necessary maintenance work.

Annual Budget for the Parish

I regret to report that the council felt it necessary to increase its precept for 2025/26 to provide funds to help fight the proposed solar farm. However, due to an administrative error by South Cambridgeshire district council, the amount payable by parishioners increased significantly more than this to compensate for the reduced charge they made last year.

Finally, I would like to end by thanking all my fellow councillors and our clerk for their time and effort in supporting the work and objectives of the council.

Flooding – a report was circulated about the actions on Common Road. It was suggested that the report was sent to the owners of Stour House about digging a ditch across their land to drain into the Stour. The clerk would write to them. Cllr Vidler would chase the Flooding Officer, for an update.

Footpaths – Footpath 16 would be closed for six months while building works took place at the bottom of Horseshoe Lane.

MVAS (mobile vehicle activated signs) – Cllr Russell had had problems downloading the data, but would circulate it before the next meeting.

Kingsway Solar Planning Meeting – Cllr Vidler attended the meeting organised by the Greater Cambridge Planning Department. The case would be determined by the Secretary of State. It was determined that the parish council would register as an Interested Party, to be included in the consultation.

Village Picnic/Playground Opening – the

Playground Working Group had organised tea and cakes, a fun dog show, candy floss, and music for the event on 11th May. Cllr Vidler would cut the ribbon on the new playground at 12.30 pm. The Reading Room had agreed that the council could use the recreation ground, and would be operating the bar

during the event. The clerk had checked with Zurich, and the event was covered under the council's insurance, as the gathering was under 2,000 people.

council was awaiting the switch-over to http://

Risk Assessment/Health and Safety – the defibrillator was rescue-ready. The clerk would check the expiry date for the pads.

Playground – the Play Inspection Company will be paid £250 + VAT to inspect the play areas; the quote from ROSPA was much higher. A discussion was held surrounding overspend on the new playground, the deficit was £6,331.62. The clerk would approach the Reading Room, to ask if they would split the difference.


Annual Return 2024/25 – The Internal Audit report was received, with no actions required. The Annual Governance Statement and the Annual Accounting Statement were approved. The Public Inspection of Accounts would occur between 3rd June and 14th July. The required documents would be submitted to the external Auditors PKF Littlejohn before the deadline of 30th June.

Dates of the next meetings in 2025 are: 7th July, Wednesday 10th September, and 3rd November.

West Wratting Parish Council

The Annual Meeting of the parish council took place on 12th May in the Village Hall.

Cllr Simon Chandler was re-elected as chairman, with Cllr Paul McKenna appointed vice-chairman.

Key council documents including Standing Orders, Finance and Risk Registers, the Asset Register, IT and Retention Policies were reviewed and approved. The council also agreed its insurance cover for the coming year and approved the annual financial return.

The council sadly accepted the resignation of Cllr Parsons, and the vacancy will be advertised soon.

Council finances remain healthy, with a reported balance of just under £59,000. The annual precept of £14,300 was received.

Regular payments were approved, including a £1,200 annual grant to the village hall, reflecting a recent saving on the council's insurance premium. A £54 contribution was also approved for advertising the village website in the Challenge magazine, and a domain transfer to a new web host was agreed.

Planning matters included updates on local applications:

- Approval of dormer designs at Lamb's Yard but rejection of surface water plans.
- Pending application for solar panels at Camgrain.
- Approval for removal of two ash trees at 59A High Street.

Regarding the Kingsway Solar Farm, the council approved commissioning three independent reports (traffic, hydrology, and air quality). Work on a sample solar array exhibition is progressing, with land suitability to be reviewed.

Upcoming events at the sports pavilion were approved, including a family party and the Classic Car Show in June. Progress was reported on lease agreements and funding applications for pavilion maintenance.

The council continues to pursue speed limit reductions and road safety improvements, including re-submitting the 20 mph application.

The next council meeting is scheduled for Monday 14th July at 7.30pm in the village hall.







Get Ready, Go Digital, Stay Connected

Landlines are changing. By January 2027, traditional landlines will be upgraded with digital technology.

This national upgrade is known as the Digital Switchover and will mean that landline calls will be made over the



internet instead of the old telephone network. Telephone providers are responsible for switching customers to the upgraded service, but everyone is encouraged to check if and how the change will affect them, especially those who rely on their landline or use a telecare device.

For many, the change will be simple. All you will have to do is plug your landline phone into a broadband router instead of a traditional phone socket. But for others, especially those who rely on their landline for care alarms, medical devices, or staying in touch, it's important to understand what the change means and what action they need to take in order to stay connected.

Connecting Cambridgeshire is running the Get Ready, Go Digital, Stay Connected campaign to help local residents prepare for, and feel confident about, the change.

The switchover will mainly affect:

- People without an internet connection at home
- Those who rely on a traditional landline not already upgraded to a digital phone service
- Users of telecare and personal alarm systems, eg fall monitors or lifelines.

Three things to do:

- 1. Contact your phone provider to find out if the change affects you.
- 2. Need support? Ask a trusted friend or family member to help.
- 3. Use a personal or fall alarm? Contact your provider to ensure it will still work with the new system.

Look out for scams. The switchover doesn't require upfront payments. If you get a suspicious call, hang up and contact your phone provider using the official number from a recent bill.

Support each other. Know someone who might need help? A quick conversation or offer to help them call their phone provider could make a big difference.

No one should be left behind. Whether it's you, a neighbour or a relative, now is the time to ask the question: is your landline ready?
