We are looking for helpers to keep the church clean and tidy! St Andrew's is open to visitors every day of the year and offers a calm, cool and lovely space.



### Kingsway Solar Community Action

Find out what Kingsway Solar Farm could mean for our villages – this August, we're holding a series of public talks about the proposed large-scale solar development and how local residents can get involved to challenge it. Everyone is welcome.

The statutory consultation for the Kingsway Solar Farm is likely to begin in September and will be open for public comment for six weeks. This is our one and only opportunity to respond to Kingsway's plans, raise concerns and give feedback. Your voice matters: join us to see how you can take a stand and help stop this development.

#### **New NSIP Solar Initiative**

KSCA is set to join a new initiative, Stop Oversized Solar (SOS), alongside other groups campaigning against large-scale solar projects that fall under the Nationally Significant Infrastructure Project (NSIP)

planning rules. The initiative aimed to meet with parliamentarians in July to highlight concerns about industrial-scale solar developments. We've contacted Pippa Heylings to urge her to take part.

### **Step into Nature: Bats and Owls Matter**

As part of our Step into Nature campaign, we're shifting focus from July's Bug Hunt to bats and owls this August. Our local area is home to a



rich bat population, including the rare and protected Western Barbastelle. We also have a healthy population of tawny owls and barn owls in the area. Interestingly, Kingsway's surveys haven't recorded any owl activity so far, making your observations even more important.

Please log any sightings on iRecord to build a clearer picture. Even if you're unsure of the species of bat, all records are useful. There's a special page on the website giving further details if you'd like to upload audio recordings (*kingswayaction.org*: see the news section).

#### Parish Matters

Hello! My name is Alastair France and I've been delighted to be part of the Ministry Team for the Granta Vale villages for the last few months.

I've recently retired from full-time employment and have been exploring my ministry within the Church of England for some years – and now rather feels like the time. I've lived in Stetchworth with my wife, Rebecca for 36 years, where I've been a churchwarden and led services locally in the Raddesley group for many years.

There is a 'discernment' process where the Church and the candidate decide whether going forward towards ordination is the right thing for them both. For those candidates of a 'certain age' who have experience within Church that process can be modified a little so that training can start earlier (although the discernment process is still as rigorous; just some of the process happens at the same time as study). This is called the Elizabeth Pathway and I'm delighted that I've been accepted for this and will commence my formal training with a summer school at the end of August.

I'm also very pleased that I will continue to work with the team here in these villages; the Granta Vale group led by Iain will act as my 'training benefice', although I will continue to lead some services 'up north'. During my study I will also continue (provided I can manage the workload) to be part of the chaplaincy teams supporting river users in the Cambridge area and separately to staff, visitors and passengers at Stansted Airport (neatly covering two of my other interests). My previous career in technology gave me many opportunities to travel and work in interesting places, and I do enjoy drawing on that variety of experiences when leading worship.

I look forward to meeting many more of you over the next couple of years!

# A Tribute to Rosemary Westley

Last month the village lost one of its stalwart supporters. Sadly, Rosemary Westley passed away after a debilitating disease. May she rest in peace. On behalf of the church and church wardens we'd like to pay tribute to the extraordinary life she led and the



enormous contribution she made both to church and village life.

After being evacuated from Kent during the war, she arrived in Weston Colville as a young child along with the rest of her family and she has lived nearly all her long life here. It's clear that she had a deep commitment to the work of the church as well as an uncomplicated but profound Christian faith. There are simply countless events to which she has contributed to along with her twin Maureen and her sister Kath. The list is exhausting but included are annual flower festivals, winter lunches and fundraising events, special services at Christmas time, Easter and Remembrance Sunday, and all the hidden work that often goes unrecognised in keeping a small village church alive and in business.

Rosemary and Maureen have been an amazing partnership, serving together as church wardens for over 25 years, singing in the choir for even longer, cleaning and decorating St Mary's Church, and there's hardly ever been an occasion when the twins haven't been directly involved in church activities. There were also many behind-the-scenes activities involving the Ely Diocese and the Synod, requiring attendance at meetings and events, representing Weston Colville in the wider church.

In all this, Rosemary's commitment to her Christian faith, her willingness to do the best for our village, and her loyalty to friends and family have all shone through. She, along with Maureen, have left a legacy unequaled in recent village history and many will mourn her passing. After a very well-attended and moving funeral service on 16th July, she has been laid to rest, joining her beloved Stan Goward in the churchyard.

### Weston Colville Parish Council

The council met on Monday 7<sup>th</sup> July. Full minutes and meeting documents are available at http://www.westoncolville.org.uk

Control of Dogs — Events that occurred on 4th June at the flooding meeting were discussed, where a dog had jumped on Cllr Durham, scratching her leg. Cllr Vidler stressed that his comments in Chasses about this were not intended to be a personal criticism, but a criticism of a minority of dog owners, who caused problems due to a lack of control.

Flooding – Cllr Harvey asked whether responsive cutting of the Stour ditch behind The Green/
Horseshoe Lane would be appropriate; it was advised this would be the best approach. Cllr Garrod reported on a meeting on 4th June, with Cllrs Garrod, Durham, Vidler, Brian Heffernan, Simeon Carroll, plus another flooding officer, Cllr Geoff Harvey, Cllr Henry Batchelor, and 3 parishioners. Short term action was to cut a gulley in the land opposite Stour House, which had been carried out. Gulleys further up Common Road would be looked into, as they were in a poor state. Highways would write to riparian owners about their duties. Cllr Durham advised that grips on top of Common Road had stalled due to electrical cables.

**Footpaths** – Footpath 16, at the bottom of Horseshoe Lane, closed until December.

MVAS – There had been some extreme speeds recorded, 91mph on Common Road; a very low percentage, but significantly dangerous speeds. High speeds had been recorded by the Recreation Ground of over 50 mph at 5 pm. There was a request for the sign to be added along Common Road, due to children walking to the school bus.

Kingsway Solar – a proposal was put forward to install a temporary mock-up of a solar panel in the village. Members of the Kingsway Solar Community Action (KSCA) group attended and made a report. Where the panel would be situated was discussed, and also the sizing; it was felt that a proposed full-sized panel should be used, not a scaled down version, for maximum impact. It was thought that the panels could be between 3.5 m and 5 m, but Kingsway Solar had not divulged the proposed size.

In West Wratting, the village was consulted for where the panel could be positioned; the mental health aspect had been discussed there. It was suggested attending other sites, to show the infrastructure surrounding the panels and to establish the concerns and comments people had. There would be a meeting in August run by KSCA, to discuss further. Cllr Pagonis suggested using augmented reality glasses, to demonstrate the impact the panels would have.

A report from Pippa Heyling was received (in the meeting documents).

Weston Colville PC would join a Parish Council Alliance instigated by West Wratting PC. A financial contribution had been suggested, and public donations had been received.

**Statutory domain** – a .gov.uk domain had been purchased. The website would be moved over to http://www.westoncolville-pc.gov.uk. Councillor emails would be moved over. Accounts would be changed to basic email for councillors, but the clerk would retain the full Microsoft Office package.

**Highways** – the potholes on Chapel Road had been reported. It was noted that the pavements on Horseshoe Lane would be resurfaced in August.



**Dog Waste Bin** – a combined litter and dog waste bin had been installed at the end of Horseshoe Lane.

Risk Assessment/Health and Safety – the defibrillator had failed. Options were discussed, and it was determined to follow the suggestions of Community Heartbeat. A new defibrillator and cabinet, £1,620, would be purchased, as the old cabinet was single-skinned and creating condensation. Defibrillators arre only viable for approximately 8 years. Cllr Rayner would ask if the Reading Room could apply for a Community Chest grant retrospectively.

**Playground** –the safety inspection was scheduled for August, through the Play Inspection Company. The playground spending deficit was discussed. The Reading Room will contribute £2,500 towards the deficit, leaving a £4,100 deficit. It had been understood that the parish council would cover the deficit, however, the clerk had failed to minute this.

The **next Parish Council meetings** will be on Wednesday 10<sup>th</sup> September and 3<sup>rd</sup> November.

## Control of Dogs

At the recent parish council meeting I cited advice given to police officers about the Dangerous Dogs Act (as amended by the Anti-social Behaviour, Crime and Policing Act 2014) which creates a criminal offence of allowing any dog to be dangerously out of control. A dog can be regarded as being dangerously out of control on any occasion where it causes fear or apprehension to a person that it may injure them. If a dog does injure a person, including by scratching or bruising, the offence is aggravated and legal action may be taken against the owner and/or the person in charge of the dog at the time.

### West Wratting Parish Council

The parish council convened on Monday 14<sup>th</sup> July. Key matters discussed:

Governance and Policy: the council formally adopted updated Health & Safety and Disciplinary & Grievance Procedures. A budget of up to £1,000 (plus VAT) was approved for legal work on behalf of the Village Hall Management Committee, with thanks to the VHMC for preparing this work.

**Finance:** a schedule of payments was approved, covering staffing, maintenance, insurance, and community support (including Age UK). The council noted that the total funds held as of 30<sup>th</sup> June stood at £56,009.76.

**Planning:** the council received updates on local planning matters, including:

*Camgrain* – application for installation of solar panels and infrastructure.

*Daisy Cottage, High Street* – proposal for a two-storey rear extension and associated alterations.

**Kingsway Solar Farm:** the chair provided an update on the Kingsway Solar Community Action Group (KSCA), noting the value of parishioner correspondence. A webinar with Greater Cambridge

It was resolved to approve a budget of £11,550 + VAT for legal reports from Richard Buxton Solicitors, fully funded by public donations. The KSCA mock-up display is intended to be located at the village pound, subject to risk assessment.

West Wratting Sports Pavilion Club (WWSPC): no new event requests were received. Updates were provided on the Wadlow Wind Farm Community Fund and ongoing lease and improvement discussions, with the working group to meet again prior to September.

Village Assets and Maintenance: updates included:

- The agility trail could be replaced with s106 funds.
- The defibrillator battery has been replaced and registered on the circuit.
- Pocket park maintenance has been completed, with thanks to Cllr McKenna.
- Repairs to the bus stop guttering are to be undertaken by the chair.
- Bark will be ordered to improve playground surface safety.

**Highways, Road Safety and Footpaths:** no timeline is currently available for the LHI application. Investigation continues into additional speed signage for the village. A budget allocation of approximately £8,000 for future signage is to be considered later in the year. No footpath report was received at this meeting.

**Councillor Vacancy:** the council continues to seek applications for co-option. The deadline is 14<sup>th</sup> August 2025.

**The next meeting** of the parish council is scheduled for Monday 8<sup>th</sup> September, at 7.30 pm in the village hall.

# District & County Councillor's July Report

Expiry of Postal Votes – following a change to the law as part of the Elections Act, postal votes no longer apply indefinitely, but expire after a period of three years. Around 15,000 South Cambridgeshire postal votes are due to expire at the end of January 2026. SCDC may contact affected electors via email, post or text message (or via a combination of means) to raise awareness of the changes and to ensure they have sufficient time to make a new application if they want to before next year's elections. SCDC also plan to include an article in South Cambs Magazine in Autumn 2025. Questions can be emailed to the elections team, elections@scambs.gov.uk

**Acorn Anaerobic Digester** – the planning application has been rolling through the system for a few years now. It finally came to Suffolk County Council's planning committee and was refused. Since the developers have said they will be appealing the decision, this may not be the last we hear of the plan.

Local Government Reorganisation – council leaders have identified preferred options for creating new unitary councils across Cambridgeshire and Peterborough. The announcement has been made in response to a national government requirement to replace the current district, county and city councils with simpler unitary councils, instead of two tiers of local government. From April 2028, rather than dealing with separate county, city, and district authorities, residents will access all services – from road maintenance and bin collections to education, planning, social housing, social care, and support with benefits – through a unitary council.



### Flu Vaccinations

The flu vaccination programme starts in October for all eligible adults, except pregnant women and children, who will be offered the vaccination from late September. Pregnant women are vaccinated to protect both mum and baby in first few weeks of life. Children get flu earlier than adults as they are 'super spreaders'.

You should get vaccinated because:

- getting vaccinated against flu can help protect you, your family and friends.
- everyone is susceptible to flu, even if you are in good health and eat well.
- you can be infected with the virus and have no symptoms but can still pass flu virus to others, including family and friends, patients or residents.
- the flu vaccine has a good safety record and will help protect you. It cannot give you flu.
- the impact of flu on frail and vulnerable patients can be fatal and outbreaks can cause severe disruption in communities, care homes and hospitals.

You are eligible for a free NHS flu vaccination if you:

- are aged 65 and over
- have certain long term health conditions
- are pregnant
- live in a care home
- are the main carer for an older or disabled person, or receive a carer's allowance
- live with someone who has a weakened immune system.

Additionally, eligible children include:

- children aged 2 to 3 years
- school aged children (reception to year 11)
- children aged 6 months to 17 years with certain long term health conditions.

This year we are also giving the Covid-19 vaccination at the same time as the flu, if you are eligible. You are eligible if you are:

- a resident in a care home for older adults
- aged 75 years and over
- aged 6 months and over and are severely immunocompromised.

All flu clinics run from 8.30 am to 4.45 pm.

To book your flu vaccination please call 0300 234 5555 and choose the Granta site of your choice, or wait to receive your SMS link via your mobile phone to book your appointment.

programme. It offers an important opportunity for personal development and community involvement through four components: volunteering, physical recreation, skills, and an expedition.


**Volunteering** involves

Building on the success of last year's new format, this is a chance for club members and visitors to get together and have a chat over tea and cake whilst enjoying some gardening-themed stalls and activities.


