

West Wratting Book Club

Our book for October was 'Lone Wolf' by Adam Weymouth.

This is the story of the author's journey in 2022, just as Europe is opening up after the coronavirus pandemic, following the amazingly long journey taken by a wolf from December 2011 to March 2012. It took him from Croatia, across Slovenia and Austria to Italy, taking in farmland, forests, mountains, thriving towns and ruined villages.

He encounters other scientists and naturalists who support the re-introduction of wolves and those who blame them for the loss of their livelihoods due to predation by them. As well as following Slavc (pronounced Sh-laugh-ts), he investigates our interactions with wolves over the millennia, the mythology, and, today, the use by right-wing political parties to stir-up hostility towards them amongst farming communities to gain support, and the parallels with the experiences of and attitudes to illegal immigrants.

Although one person described it as just another of "those books" most of us loved this book, especially the way the author used his journey to investigate so many themes, and thought it beautifully written,

particularly the descriptions of the wilderness. One or two skipped some of the detail to find out what was happening to the wolf, while another would have liked better maps. We would definitely recommend it as a good read.

Scores were mainly 9 and 10 out of 10, with one 6.

Parish Matters

Mostly the words 'Safeguarding Training' elicit either blank incomprehension, or a heavy sigh. Those whose work puts them in



contact with children or vulnerable adults, will certainly know about these training sessions, which they *must* attend, often yearly. They need these safeguarding skills to help protect children and vulnerable adults from harm, abuse and neglect; skills to recognise risks and to respond appropriately when abuse is suspected.

But many, rarely coming across such abuse in their work, may sigh and wonder if this isn't simply another 'tickbox' exercise.

Nevertheless, as we learn daily from the news, the effect on victims of abuse can be profoundly damaging, and the fallout for those suspected of being abusers, and for their wider circle of family and friends, can be disastrous. These aren't risks we can take lightly.

As a member of the Ministry Team serving our local churches, I'm also obliged to attend regular Diocesan Safeguarding Training. And to be honest, in the past I've also sighed deeply. For each year they seem to make it more and more demanding. I guess though, given the shocking record of how churches have handled (or hidden) abuse in the past, that's understandable.

Yes, the Church is rather like any other social institution. And yes, as such, reputations matter. Moreover, if we can't prove that the 'staff' are up to date with their Safeguarding Training, and all the risk assessments have been completed then, God forbid, our insurers might not pay out if there is a disaster.

Yet, much more importantly, I must not forget that our 'welcome' into these buildings and congregations is God's welcome into the Church he founded and sustains. That God has welcomed us into the safety of his love and life means that 'safeguarding' this space is no tedious nor defensive obligation, but an essential witness to God's continuing presence among us. And this year, as our annual reminder that we must all take our part in ensuring our welcome is indeed into a 'safe space', Safeguarding Sunday will be held on 16th November.

Kingsway Solar Community Action

A huge thank you to everyone who came along to our objection workshops and to those who attended the Kingsway Solar presentations to raise your concerns. We're also grateful to everyone who submitted a response to the Stage Two statutory consultation. Our aim was to encourage as many personal and well-informed submissions as possible, and together we achieved just that!

Thank you also for your donations to our GoFundMe campaign, which supported our community activities and helped make our 'No Way Kingsway' signs so visible across the villages during the consultation. Your generosity has kept the campaign active and seen.

Community survey results – our analysis of the community survey (completed by more than 200 residents) formed a key part of KSCA's consultation response. Over 90% of respondents oppose the proposed Kingsway Solar project, with 86% strongly opposed. The top concerns were visual impact on the landscape, loss of productive farmland, and harm to wildlife and nature. Despite this, residents overwhelmingly support renewable energy when delivered in fairer, more sustainable ways, such as rooftop solar, brownfield developments, and community-owned projects rather than large industrial schemes on farmland.

Support the legal fund – our Crowd Justice campaign is raising funds for the legal challenge. The platform ensures donations only go towards a properly funded case; if a target isn't met, pledges are automatically refunded. This gives every supporter confidence that their contribution will make an impact. Crowd Justice also provides a transparent

way to collect small donations securely and track progress publicly. Every pledge, large or small, helps.

Step into Nature – as the seasons change, please keep logging wildlife sightings on *iRecord*. Your observations of birds, bats, flowers, and hedgerow species are vital evidence of the biodiversity that could be affected by the Kingsway Solar development. Every record counts.

What happens next? Our work continues. KSCA will register as an Interested Party when the Planning Inspectorate opens the next stage. This allows us to contribute formally to the Examination and provide feedback as the proposal is reviewed.

The fight to oppose this industrial solar development is not over, and your continued involvement remains essential.

Weston Colville Parish Council

An extraordinary meeting of the parish council was held on Monday 20th October. Meeting documents were available on: *https://www.westoncolville-pc.gov.uk* (search for '2025').

Present: Bridget Durham, John Garrod, Rachel Jennings, Constantine Pagonis, Emma Rayner, Matt Russell, and Jess Ashbridge (clerk). Also present, in part, 15 parishioners.

Cllr Durham welcomed those present. Apologies were accepted from Cllr Vidler.

Public Participation Session – a parishioner raised concerns about having his land used for access for the Kingsway solar farm, without any consultation with him. It was explained that they do not consult with



landowners, for inter-array areas or the connection corridor, at this point, as this wasn't a planning application. The lack of communication was raised as a serious downfall.

Another parishioner was very concerned that panels would be neighbouring their listed property, and also queried why the plans were going ahead before the connection to the National Grid through Burwell. It was advised that connection to Burwell would be in place by 2033; if there was any delay they would face large fines. Land use would be considered, relating to listed buildings.

A parishioner advised that there would be an inverter placed behind the smallholding off Horseshoe Lane, causing constant noise, and that the documentation stated that it would be louder in damp/foggy conditions which, due to the area sitting in a hollow, were likely to be frequent. She was very upset that Weston Green was not listed as a residential area, despite it being a highly populated area.

A parishioner was concerned about how the community funding would be spent. It was advised that this would be consulted on further down the line. Kingsway had already advised that they would not use a set up such as the Cambridge Charity Foundation (CCF), which was responsible for distributing funds from the Wadlow Wind Farm.

A parishioner in Church End was concerned that their houses would be surrounded on three sides, and was also concerned about the problems with battery fires over the chalk aquifers. It was advised that the KSCA had hired a hydrologist to look at the issue of pollution of the aquifer.

A parishioner was concerned about the miscommunication from Kingsway advisers, hearing many different opinions about the same options. It

was advised that trying to delay them was one of the tactics, as they seem to be in a terrible hurry to push things through.

A parishioner felt that the human impact had been woefully not taken into account, on safety and health grounds, with HGV traffic, and dust, two to three years of construction causing noise impact on students, etc.

A parishioner raised serious concerns about the competency and confidence in Kingsway Solar, their lack of engagement, and motivation – simply their motivation is money! They were also concerned that the land would not return to agricultural use, and would be sold off for housing.

Cllr Durham implored that each person and every member of the household submitted a personal response to the consultation, on the areas that would have the greatest effect on their lives. The PC's response would be more inline with planning conditions, and would try not to be as driven by the emotions raised by the proposal.

Planning

24/00192/FUL, Mines Park, Chapel Road – the parish council determined to object to the application on the following grounds: that the development was outside the village envelope; and the road would not support increased traffic. Highways had refused previous applications, however the access splay had been increased by removing hedgerows; the ecology report was 3½ years out of date; the archaeological report was not complete; flooding would seriously impact Chapel Road; the road on the site would need to be permeable; plus there was strong evidence of barn owls, pipistrelle bats, and great crested newts on the site.

Kingsway Solar – a report from the meeting held between Kingsway Solar and the parish council on 15th October was received (see meeting documents). The Statutory Consultation would be running from 17th September to 29th October. Each councillor would focus on certain areas, and provide information for Cllr Durham to collate ready for submission:

The **next parish council meeting** will be on 3rd November. Agenda items will include biodiversity and the pond.

Update from your local MP, Pippa Heylings

Over parliamentary recess I took the opportunity to meet and hear from residents and organisations in South Cambridgeshire. One issue has dominated – the serious funding cut facing the Arthur Rank Hospice. This wonderful organisation, which provides vital end of life care for the terminally ill, is being forced to plan for the closure of 9 of its 23 beds – a reduction of 40% of its inpatient capacity. At the time of writing, the hospice is facing a funding deficit of £829,000.

I have visited the hospice on several occasions and heard from their CEO Sharon Allen, their amazing staff and the patients and families who treasure this resource. Together with Cambridgeshire's Liberal Democrat MPs Charlotte Cane and Ian Sollom, I have set up a petition to call on the government to save these vital palliative care beds. Over 14,000 people have signed our petition calling for a rethink, with 4,500 signatures in just the first 24 hours! I have been so heartened by the extraordinary response of residents as news of this became public. This is a resounding call to action that has been well reported in the media.

Given the level of response and the concern shown, our petition is now addressed directly to the Prime Minister as well as to the Secretary of State for Health. If we can get more signatures, we plan to hand in the petition to Number 10 Downing Street — so please do sign it here — www.pippaheylings.org.uk/campaigns/save-arh-beds — and share as widely as you can to save these precious Arthur Rank Hospice beds and the skilled staff who provide the care for them.



Vaccines

Make sure you're protected this winter – anyone eligible for their COVID-19, flu, RSV or pneumococcal vaccines should make sure they've had them this winter. Each vaccine has a slightly different eligibility criteria:

- RSV vaccine for anyone who is pregnant, aged 75 - 79, or anyone who turned 80 years old from 1st September 2024.
- Pneumococcal vaccine for anyone 65 or over (only one dose is needed).
- Flu vaccine for anyone aged 65 or over (including those who will be 65 by 31st March 2025); have certain long-term health conditions; are pregnant; live in a care home; are the main carer for an older or disabled person, or receive a carer's allowance; or live with someone who has a weakened immune system.
- COVID-19 vaccine for anyone aged 75+; those aged between six months and 74 years and have a weakened immune system because of a health condition or treatment; and people who live in a care home for older adults.

For some people who have got used to have their COVID-19 and flu vaccine together in winter, this
